Waterfront panel sees pavilion concept

**Committee authorizes drafting of
construction bid documents**

The plans for creating a park pavilion at the city's waterfront site now under construction continue to take shape. The Cochecho Waterfront Development Advisory Committee, at its Sept. 26 meeting, voted unanimously to give the green light to its design consultant, CJ Architects, to finalize pavilion plans and ready them for construction bidding.

At the meeting, Carla Goodnight, principal of CJ Architects,

gave a presentation about the park pavilion, providing an overview of the design and the different elements incorporated. As of now, it includes space for boat storage and a vendor, such as for kayak rentals. There would also be a public gathering space, recreation spaces, and bathrooms. CWDAC's park pavilion subcommittee has been working with CJ Architects for the past year on what elements to be included in the final design.

The site work and the foundation for the park pavilion would be included in the ongoing public improvements to the waterfront site. The complete cost for constructing the building is still to be determined, but Deputy City Manager Christopher G. Parker noted at the meeting the city has received verbal confirmation from the federal government that it will be awarded \$500,000 from the Land and Water Conservation Fund to help defray the costs. Parker also noted approximately \$300,000 in Recreation impact fees will be generated for the project.

"We want to create something that is iconic, but we also want to create something reasonable and realistic," Parker said at the meeting.

The CWDAC also received a presentation from Cathartes, the private developer, about the minor adjustments they have made in their plans, and an update on the ongoing public improvements at the waterfront site since construction began in June.

Dover Police Lt. Mark Nadeau graduates from FBI leadership program

Dover Police Lt. Mark Nadeau has graduated from the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) National Academy, becoming the second officer from the department to complete the prestigious program.

Nadeau was among 199 law enforcement officers from 46 states, Washington, D.C., and 21 countries to graduate Sept. 14 from the 10-week FBI National Academy in Quantico, Virginia, the agency's 287th session. He was the only New Hampshire officer in the graduating class.

Fewer than 1% of officers have the chance to attend the academy, which provides advanced leadership, fitness, and communications training. Participants must have outstanding records within their departments to be selected.



On average, graduates have 21 years of experience in law enforcement. Many go on to

executive roles when they return to their agencies.

Dover Police Chief William Breault is the department's only other active officer to complete the program.

An 18-year veteran, Nadeau commands the Special Services Bureau, overseeing the special investigations, crime scene, and legal units.



Annual Apple Harvest Day returns to downtown Dover Oct. 7

The 39th annual Apple Harvest Day festival takes over downtown Dover on Saturday, Oct. 7, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The family-friendly event features live entertainment, food, kids' activities, vendors, contests and more.

Organized by the Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce and sponsored by First Seacoast Bank, Apple Harvest Day draws over 60,000 attendees each year. The day kicks off at 9 a.m. with opening ceremonies and a performance by the Dover High School marching band at the Rotary Arts Pavilion.

Festival highlights include a pie baking contest at 11 a.m., an electric vehicle showcase from noon to 3 p.m., inflatables and rides in the KidZone from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., food vendors, an Apple Harvest Day 5K at 8:30 a.m., and over 300 artisans and crafters lining the streets of downtown Dover. Live entertainment will take place on two stages throughout the day.

The family-friendly event also features a family respite area and calm room, sponsored by the Dover Area Woman's Club, for attendees needing a quiet space.

Free parking and shuttles to the festival will be available from C&J Park and Ride, St. Thomas Aquinas High School, and other locations.

The 39th annual Apple Harvest Day is part of Dover's yearlong 400th anniversary

celebration in 2023.

Citywide hydrant flushing begins Oct. 3

The City of Dover will begin its fall flushing of fire hydrants on Tuesday, Oct. 3. Most flushing will occur from 7 p.m. to 5 a.m. and should be completed within six weeks.

As a result of flushing, some slight discoloration may be noticed in water. If discoloration occurs, it may clear up if residents run the cold water tap for several minutes. Customers may also experience low water pressure while flushing is in progress. Customers are urged to check their water for these issues before bathing or starting laundry.

Court and Union reconstruction plans near final design

Updated design plans for the Court and Union streets reconstruction project were unveiled at a neighborhood meeting on Sept. 21 at Community Services' at the Facilities, Grounds and Cemetery office at 145 Court St.

At the meeting, engineers from the city and Wright-Pierce, the contracted design consultant, presented the updated designs, which are 90% complete.

The design elements include roadway improvements, including adding sidewalks and bike lanes, and utility improvements, such as replacing the water main and improving drainage and sewer mains. Project designs are anticipated to be finalized by the end of December. Once plans are finalized, the project would go out to bid, estimated to occur in January 2024, with construction to begin that spring. The project is estimated to take two construction seasons to complete. The next neighborhood meeting will be a pre-construction meeting, anticipated to occur in the spring of 2024

Dover Parks, Community Trail hours change Oct. 1

The City of Dover is reminding residents about upcoming changes to park and Community Trail hours beginning Oct. 1. Park and Community Trail hours will be 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. daily from Oct. 1 to March 31. The exceptions are Park Street Park, open 7 a.m. to 8:30 p.m.; Hilton Park, open 6 a.m. to 8 p.m. with state approval; and Henry Law Park, open 5 a.m. to 11 p.m. The Adventure Playground at Henry Law Park is open daily 7 a.m. to 9:30 p.m.

At its meeting on Oct. 11, the City Council is expected to consider setting the hours of the new skate park at Guppey Park to 7 a.m. to 9:30 p.m. daily, the same hours established by ordinance at the former skate park on River Street.

All city parks are "carry-in, carry-out," prohibit alcohol, and require pets to be leashed, [per city ordinance](#).

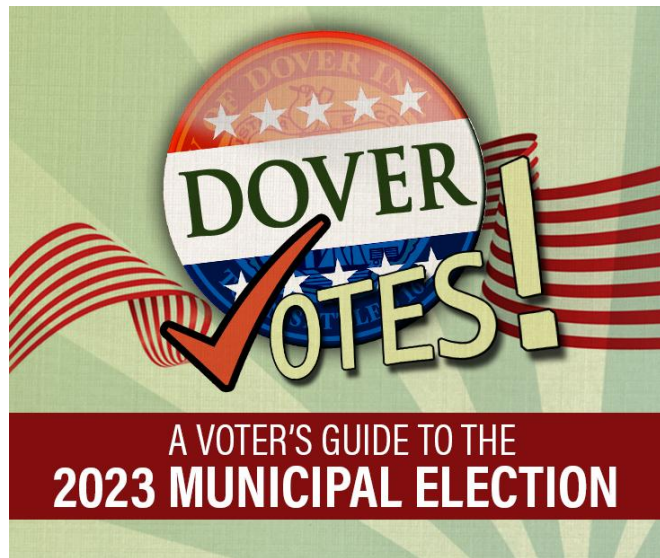

The City of Dover municipal election is Tuesday, Nov. 7, 2023. At the election, voters from all wards will elect the Mayor, two at-large City Councilors, and one at-large School Board member. In addition, voters in each of the six Dover wards will elect a City Councilor and School Board member and election officers, including a Supervisor of the Checklist, a Moderator, three Selectpersons, and a Ward Clerk. Deadline to change party affiliation before the Presidential Primary is Oct. 6

The deadline to change political parties before the New Hampshire Presidential Primary is Friday, Oct. 6, New Hampshire Secretary of State David Scanlan announced this month.

Scanlan also announced that the filing period for the Presidential Primary is from Oct. 11 through Oct. 27. He will announce the Presidential Primary date later this fall.

Dover voters who want to change their party affiliation before the primary should do so at the Dover Clerk's Office in the Customer Service Center on the Ground Floor of City Hall, 288 Central Ave. It is open Monday through Thursday from 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. and Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Registered voters may check their voter information by visiting <https://app.sos.nh.gov/viphome>.

Undeclared voters can vote in the Presidential Primary, but they must choose either a Democratic or Republican ballot and will become a registered

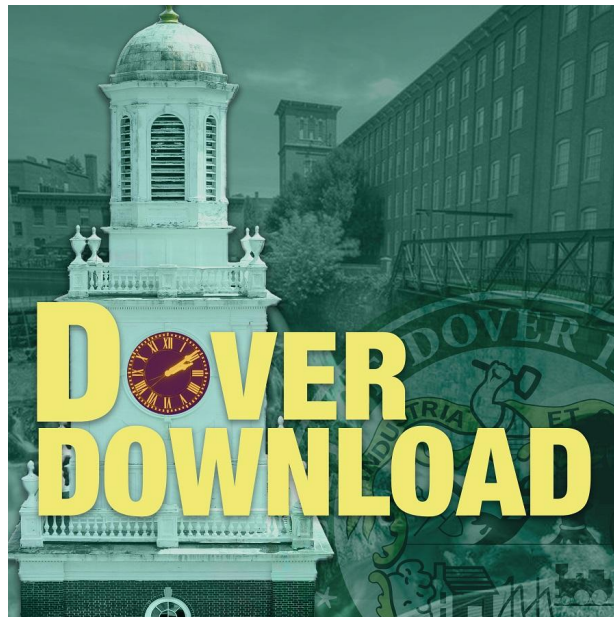

Citizens Leadership Academy offers behind-the-scenes look at how local government works

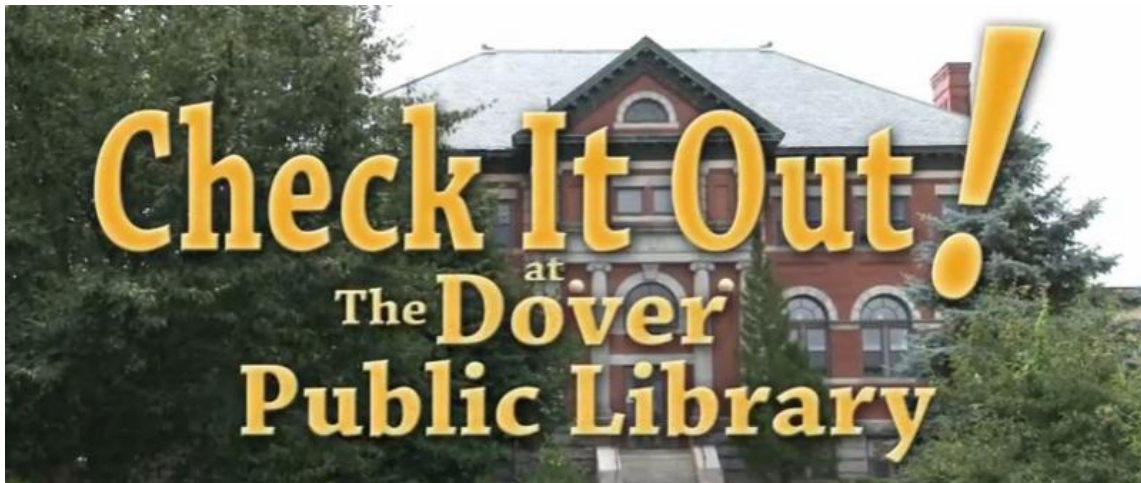
Oct. 4, 1762 — The town voted to build a new bridge over the Bellamy River, at or near the place of an older bridge, and raised 1,200 pounds to fund the construction.

Oct. 6, 1842 — The cornerstone of Dover's new Town Hall was laid this day, on which occasion remarks were made by Hon. John Parker Hale. A variety of pamphlets, papers, coins and other materials were deposited in a box under the cornerstone, including a sketch of Dover, map of the village, list of Town Officers, and newspapers published in town.

Oct. 5, 1859 — The State Fair began on this day, held for the second time in Dover, on Ricker Field. The attendance was large, with gate receipts totaling "\$6,000, a larger sum than ever before taken."

Oct. 2, 1903 — A request for sealed proposals to construct a new library in Dover was issued this day.

Oct. 1, 1998 — Dover Police received a \$369,000 federal grant from the U.S. Department of Justice to fund a five-person investigative unit and to purchase and install technology such as satellite-controlled ankle bracelets for offenders and pen-sized surveillance cameras. According to police at the time, the high-tech, anti-stalking program was the first of its kind in the country.



Hope for Shantytown: A History of the Dover

Housing Authority

Up until the early 1950s, a place existed in Dover known as “Shantytown” or, mockingly by some, “Hollywood”. It was located near the intersection of Tolend Road and Whittier Street and known for the “shack housing, not fit for human habitation.”

Redeveloping Shantytown became one of Dover Housing Authority’s early significant projects. The dilapidated houses, many made from large wooden boxes that once housed pianos, were burned down in 1952, and the following year, Mineral Park was completed, offering clean and modern housing for 124 families.

For the past 70 years, the Dover Housing Authority (DHA) has been working behind the scenes to make major impacts on the city’s development. On Wednesday, Oct. 11, at 6:30 p.m., learn more about this organization’s storied history in the presentation “Hope for Shantytown: A History of Dover Housing Authority” at the Dover Public Library. This talk will be in-person, with the option to watch virtually from home. Sign-up is needed to receive a link to access the presentation online.

Local historian Mark Leno will use historical photographs to cover the rise of DHA from its early beginnings to its present successes in providing housing for many Dover residents. In addition to providing public housing, DHA was a leader in overseeing the improvements in downtown Dover during its Urban Renewal years, where buildings were torn down, other buildings were saved, and changes brought about new bridges and roadways.

During the 45-minute session, attendees will see pictures of Dover in the 1940s and learn about the creation of the DHA, which was tasked with providing housing for WWII veterans and obtaining better parking in downtown Dover. The presentation will also discuss the creation of new housing at Central Towers, Waldron Towers, and the construction of a former church, St Johns, into elderly housing.

Mark Leno retired from the Dover Police Department and works as a Resident Service Coordinator at the DHA. Interested in local history, Leno has written several books on Dover history, including the Dover Police Department and Dover Housing Authority, and the book “Factory on Fire – The Cocheco Mill Fire of 1907”. He has also researched and written several of the Dover Main Street/Woodman Museum Historical Reveals and has recently written a book on the history of the Mount Washington Hotel and Tourism in the White Mountains of New Hampshire called “I Love This Place.”

Library to host virtual evening with Bestselling author Marie Benedict

New York Times bestselling author Marie Benedict will share a virtual presentation on her work writing historical fiction at 7 p.m. Wednesday, hosted by the Dover Public Library.

Benedict will focus on her latest book, “The Mitford Affair,” released earlier this year. The novel explores the role the Mitford sisters - the beautiful, brilliant and eccentric - played in the rise of World War II, both for and against the Nazis.

Benedict is a lawyer with more than 10 years of experience as a litigator at two of the country’s premier law firms. She found her calling in unearthing the hidden historical stories of women. Her mission is to excavate the most important, complex and fascinating women of history and bring them into the present day.

She is known for books including "The Only Woman in the Room," "Lady Clementine," "The Mystery of Mrs. Christie," and "The Personal Librarian," co-authored with Victoria Christopher Murray. Her novels have been translated into 29 languages.

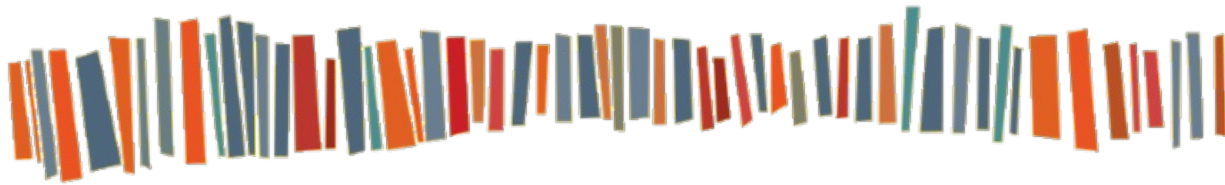
