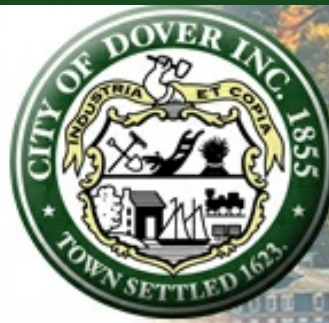

The 38th annual Apple Harvest Day returns to downtown Dover on Saturday, Oct. 1, 2022. The event, which draws more than 60,000 people to the City of Dover's downtown, features great food, live entertainment, a wide variety of vendors, and more. The festival covers eight city blocks from Third Street to River Street and runs from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.



Apple Harvest Day is organized by the Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce. The festival is underwritten by First Seacoast Bank.

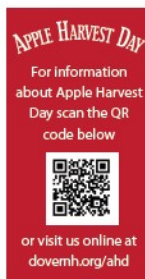

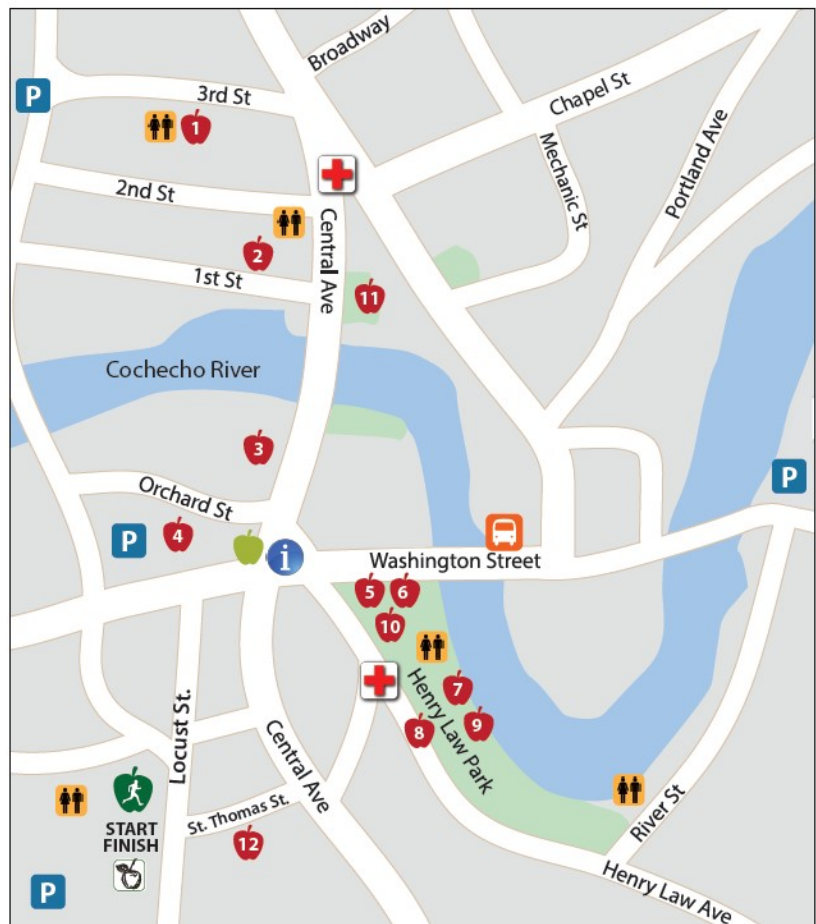

Street closure, parking restrictions for Apple Harvest Day and 5K Road Race on Oct. 1

Overnight parking restrictions continue tonight

Dover Police Chief William M. Breault announces the following street closures and parking restrictions for the Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce's 38th annual Apple Harvest Day festival on Saturday, Oct. 1.

On Saturday, Oct. 1, from 6 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., the following streets will be closed to all traffic:

- Central Avenue southbound from Fourth to Washington streets;
- First, Second and Third streets between Chestnut Street and Central Avenue;
- Henry Law Avenue from Washington to Williams streets.

Southbound traffic on Central Avenue will be diverted through the Third Street lot to Chestnut Street. Motorists should expect delays in the downtown area. See map at the bottom of the email for downtown traffic flow.

Parking and free shuttle service

Off-site parking with free shuttle service will be provided between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. at the following parking lots:

- 118 Central Ave. (Cleary Cleaners/Strafford House of Pizza);
- 279 Locust St.;
- Liberty Mutual at 50 Liberty Way off Sixth Street.

Limited festival parking will be available at:

- Orchard Street parking garage;
- Dover Public Library/McConnell Center municipal lot;
- Dover Transportation Center lot;
- River Street.

Additional road closures for Apple Harvest 5K Road Race

There are additional road closures for Apple Harvest 5K Road Race, which begins at 8:30 a.m. on Saturday, Oct. 1. The Apple Harvest 5K course starts and finishes on Saint Thomas Street in front of the Dover District Court. Post-race activities will occur on the adjacent McConnell Center front lawn.

The following roads will be closed for the race:

- Saint Thomas Street, from Chestnut to Belknap streets (8 to 10 a.m.)
- Rutland Street, from Silver Street to Cataract Avenue (8:30 to 9:30 a.m.)
- Cataract Avenue, from Bellamy Road to Rutland Street (8:30 to 9:30 a.m.)
- Silver Street, between Belknap and Elm streets (8:30 to 8:45 a.m.)

The closure of Silver Street is expected to be brief to allow race participants to cross Silver Street early in the course. Traffic delays should be expected, however. Additional delays may occur on Bellamy Road near Cataract Avenue, where traffic is restricted to a single, alternating lane while runners are present. The course utilizes a portion of the Dover Community Trail between Fisher and Folsom streets.

Parking restrictions

On-street parking will be prohibited overnight tonight, Friday, Sept. 30, and all day on Saturday, Oct. 1, at the following locations:

- Central Avenue from Third to Washington streets;
- Henry Law Avenue from Washington to George streets;
- Third Street from Chestnut Street to Central Avenue;
- Portions of Second Street;
- Saint Thomas Street from Chestnut to Atkinson streets.

Energy Commission, Chamber to host electric vehicle show at Apple Harvest Day

The Dover Energy Commission is partnering with the Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce to host an electric vehicle (EV) show on Saint Thomas Street, by the McConnell Center, during

Apple Harvest Day, Saturday, Oct. 1, from 12 to 3 p.m. The show is free.

Auto dealers, private owners, and the City of Dover will display EV and plug-in hybrid-electric vehicles (HEV) at the car show. Saint Thomas Street from Locust Street to Atkinson Street (between the McConnell Center and the district court) will be turned into a walking mall for the event. The goal is to help inform the community of the available EV and HEV options and whether they should consider owning one.

EV charging installers will be on hand to provide information about installing residential and/or commercial charging stations, including options powered by solar energy. Local and state officials from the state Department of Environmental Services, Clean Energy New Hampshire, and the City of Dover, will be available to discuss EV infrastructure.

City Council to hold workshop on CIP, public power initiative, and Dover's resiliency work

Agenda items include a discussion of the proposed Capital Improvements Program and updates on the 2022 Energy Commission Report, the Community Power Coalition of New Hampshire, and resiliency planning within the city.

The Community Power Coalition, for which the City of Dover is a founding member, will allow participating communities to work together to secure electrical power supply contracts. Resilience Manager Jackson Kaspari will provide an update on the Community Power Coalition, including recent activity by New Hampshire's Joint Legislative Committee on Administrative Rules, Public Utilities Commission and the next steps for Dover.

Kaspari will also provide an overview of the city's action to become a more resilient community. Kaspari with the support of community stakeholders and city staff, has been working on a draft of the Citywide Resilience Plan which is expected to be brought to Council for potential adoption by the end of this calendar year.

City releases bid for public improvements to waterfront site

In another milestone for the waterfront development project, the City of Dover [released its bid](#) for public improvements to the waterfront development site to the four firms the city prequalified earlier this year.

Public improvements include constructing a new street system to provide site access and the utilities necessary to serve the proposed buildings. Other improvements include the construction of a new 3.4-acre public riverfront park, stabilization of the Cochecho River shoreline, site grading to raise the elevation to account for projected sea level rise, and installing a stormwater management system with green infrastructure. Depending on the cost of the bids received, the city may elect to upgrade aspects of the public park in phases.

The bids, due on Oct. 26, 2022, were sent to NorthEast Earth Mechanics, LLC., of Pittsfield, Severino Trucking Co, Inc., of Candia, S.U.R. Construction, Inc., of Rochester, and Sargent Corporation of Stillwater, Maine, which were prequalified through a [request for qualifications](#) the city released on Feb. 24, 2022. The request for qualifications was to determine which firms could undertake such a significant project.

The city's contracted consultant team wrote the bid specifications based on their design for the public portion of the project. The team includes Horsley Witten Group., Inc., of Sandwich, Massachusetts, Ironwood Design Group of Newmarket and GZA of Bedford. The design was vetted by the Cochecho Waterfront Development Advisory Committee (CDWAC) and approved by the Planning Board on June 14, 2022.

As part of the Land Development Agreement between the City of Dover and Cathartes, the developer selected for private developments to the site, the city agreed to fund public improvements up to \$15 million in site improvements to be repaid through tax guarantees. The city will service the bond for the debt by utilizing funds from the waterfront tax increment finance district (TIF).

Cathartes' CWDAC-vetted site plan for the private development of the waterfront was also approved by the Planning Board on June 14. Construction for the private development is anticipated to begin next year once portions of the public improvements are completed. Cathartes plans to build three mixed-use buildings, two multi-family buildings and three clusters of townhouses. The buildings include 418 residential units and approximately 26,000 square feet of commercial space. The residential units include a mixture of rental and for-sale condominium units.



Pregnancy and infant loss remembrance ceremony at Pine Hill Cemetery on Oct. 15

Wentworth-Douglass Hospital will host a remembrance and dedication ceremony on Saturday, Oct. 15, at 6 p.m. at the Children's Memory Garden at Pine Hill Cemetery to honor children who died during pregnancy or as infants. The theme of this year's event, held on Pregnancy and Infant Loss Remembrance Day, is "I See You In My Dreams."

Families coping with all types of perinatal loss are invited to gather for support and community. You will have an opportunity to decorate a luminary bag in honor of your loss, followed by a lighting ceremony. Children are welcome, and art and music therapists will be available to engage guests. There will be light appetizers and time to connect with others.

The event will also include the dedication of new Children's Memory Garden at Pine Hill Cemetery, made possible by Jasper's Heart, a non-profit organization that supports those who have experienced the loss of an unborn, stillborn or soon-after birth child.

Attendees are encouraged to bring a lawn chair or blanket to sit on, insect repellent and a sweater or jacket. Please note: there is no restroom available in the cemetery, so plan accordingly.

Directions: Enter East Watson Street from its intersection with Central Avenue. Follow East Watson Street until you see a chain link fence on the right. Enter the cemetery at the fence opening and follow the signs/balloons past the large monument, keeping to the right until the road's end. The Memory Garden will be on the right. Park anywhere along the route.



Electricity, fuel and rental assistance available through Community Action Partnership of Strafford County

Community Action Partnership of Strafford County (CAPSC) provides financial assistance to those who qualify for electricity, fuel and rental bills. If a client was denied before, CAPSC encourages them to apply again, as program parameters may have shifted.

Eligible clients may receive a discount on their monthly electric bill, from 8% to 76%, and/or an additional fuel benefit depending on gross household income and household size. Earlier this month, the state legislature allocated \$35 million for a new emergency energy assistance this fall and winter to New Hampshire residents earning from 60% to 75% of the state's median income. Households that do not fall into the traditional fuel assistance program are eligible for the new program. The income requirements for all programs are based on the number of people in a household.

- Household of one: \$38,970 to \$48,711
- Household of two: \$50,960 to \$63,699
- Household of three: \$62,951 to \$78,688
- Household of four: \$74,942 to \$93,676
- Household of five: \$86,932 to \$108,634
- Household of six: \$98,923 to \$123,653
- Household of seven: \$101,171 to \$126,463
- Household of eight: \$103,420 to \$129,274

The state has not yet implemented the program, but CAPSC urges those who are eligible to apply for the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LiHEAP). If clients are determined to be over the income requirements for that program, CAPSC will have their information ready when the state's expanded emergency energy assistance program is finalized. Those who are below the above income requirements would be eligible for regular assistance and should also apply for LiHEAP.

Strafford County residents seeking to apply for assistance should set up an appointment via CAPSC's online scheduler at https://straftordcap.itfrontdesk.com/apptonline/landing.html?client_code=STRAFORD. The appointment scheduler includes all the information clients need to bring to qualify for assistance.

Nighttime work on the Spaulding Turnpike in Dover requires temporarily lane closures

The New Hampshire Department of Transportation (NHDOT) began roadway milling and paving operations on the Spaulding Turnpike (NH Route 16) in Dover, in the area of the Dover Toll Plaza, on Thursday.

Weather permitting, the work will be done between the hours of 7 p.m. and 6 a.m., with lane closures being utilized as needed during timeframes of lower traffic flow. Uniformed police officers will be located at the northbound and southbound barrels of the Spaulding Turnpike to control traffic during these operations. Motorists should use caution when driving through the construction zone. The overall duration of this milling and paving work is anticipated to be one week.

The proposed work is part of the Dover-Rochester 29440 project. RS Audley, Inc of Bow New Hampshire is the prime contractor for the \$23 million project, which is scheduled to be completed in June, 2024.

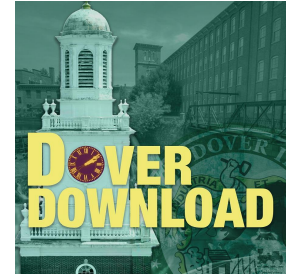

Dover400 reveals new ornament

Dover400, a committee of residents organizing Dover's 400th anniversary, has unveiled its fourth design of a five-piece collector's set of ornaments in celebration of Dover's 400th birthday. Produced by Hampshire Pewter, this souvenir features Dover's Cochecho Falls in the early 1890s.

The Falls are the iconic natural landmark of Dover and have always been the center of activity.

"We hope this year's ornament will cause you to reflect on the wonderful 400-year history of our community," said Sam Allen, Dover400



Annually leading up to 2023, a new design is released, each featuring a distinguished piece of Dover history and culture. Prior ornaments have featured Dover's famed Garrison Hill Tower, built in 1913; the beloved landmark, Damn Garrison House; and the 100-year-old Central Fire Station.

Ornaments can be purchased in person for \$20 at Dover City Clerk's Office, the Dover Chamber of Commerce, or the Dover Library. The group will also have ornaments available at its table during Apple Harvest Day, on October 1, 2022.

Dover400 is currently underway with several fundraising initiatives: \$400 for 400, a campaign seeking \$400 from 400 people; The 1623 Society, a special opportunity to recognize direct ties to Dover with a donation of \$1,623; and selling branded merchandise and promotional items.

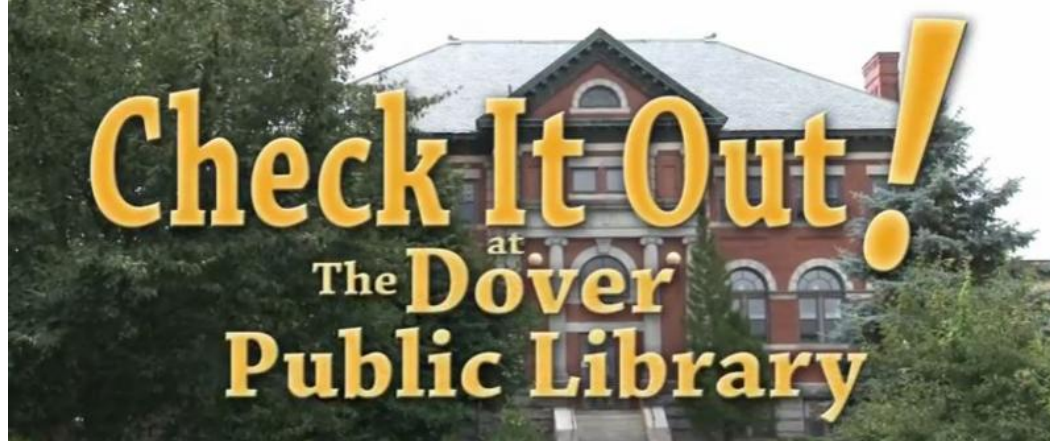
Oct. 6, 1842 — The cornerstone of the new Town Hall was laid this day, on which occasion appropriate remarks were made by Hon. John P. Hale. A variety of pamphlets, papers, coins and other matters, were deposited in a box under the corner stone, including a sketch of Dover, map of the village, list of Town Officers, newspapers published in town, etc.

Oct. 7, 1852 — Five persons were killed and a large number badly injured by a railroad collision near the Weirs. On the train were John H. Smith and Richard B. Cater of Dover, both of whom died.

Oct. 5, 1858 — The State Fair was held in Dover this year, only the second time held in the city, on the Ricker field. The attendance was large and the receipts were "\$6,000, a larger sum than ever before taken."

Oct. 6, 1925 — Foster's Daily Democrat in Dover announced it would publish a play-by-play account of the World Series between the Pittsburg Pirates and Washington Senators on this day. That afternoon, the paper began announcing the series from the office, play-by-play, through a megaphone.

Oct. 1, 1998 — It was a close call for 14 Dover Middle School students on their way home when a 50-foot Ash tree crashed down on the hood of their bus, just missing the windshield. Thankfully, no students were injured. The tree fell as a result of high wind gusts. The wind that day had caused widespread issues and road closures throughout the city that day.

Anne Jennison is a traditional Native American storyteller with both European and Abenaki heritage. Jennison has been sharing Indigenous lesson stories for over 30 years with audiences of all kinds. With master's degrees in both storytelling and history, she brings a wealth of cultural and historical knowledge to enrich her retellings.

When she is not giving storytelling performances, Jennison is the chair of the state's Commission on Native American Affairs and a member of the Indigenous New Hampshire Collaborative Collective. She is also an affiliate faculty member for the University of New Hampshire's Native American and Indigenous Studies and co-creator of the "People of Dawnland," an Abenaki/Wabanaki interpretive exhibit at Strawberry Banke Museum.

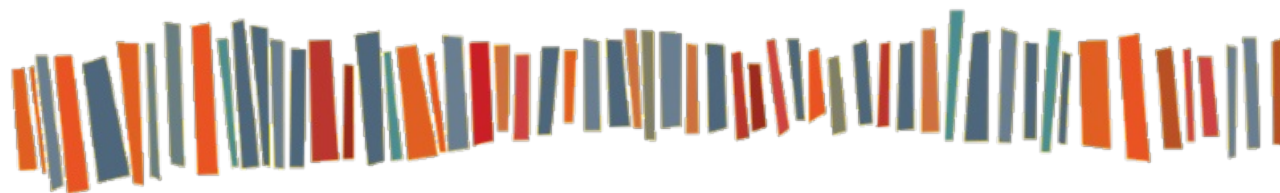
