Filing period for municipal election opens Monday, Sept. 9

The filing period for the City of Dover municipal election begins Monday, Sept. 9, 2019, at 8:30 a.m. and ends Friday, Sept. 20, at 4 p.m.

The municipal election is Tuesday, Nov. 5, 2019.

Candidates for City Council, School Board, and all ward positions, must be a registered voter in Dover and complete the necessary filing paperwork at the City Clerk's office, located at City Hall. A valid driver's license or passport is required at the time of filing. Candidates for City Council must be a resident of Dover for at least one year.

Voters will choose candidates for City Council, Mayor, School Board, as well as moderators, ward clerks, supervisors of the checklist and selectmen, from each ward.

National Citizen Survey seeks opinions from Dover residents

Residents in the City of Dover are encouraged to participate in the 2019 National Citizen Survey, which provides a snapshot of the community and helps Dover measure service performance and quality, and assess community needs. [The survey](#) is now available to all Dover residents online.



"Participation in the survey is very important," said City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr. "Feedback from this survey helps guide decisions that affect our City. I encourage all Dover residents to take the survey and help us chart our community's future."

The results of the National Citizen Survey, combined with other feedback, helps the City Council, various City boards and commissions and the City administration understand and respond appropriately to the needs of the community in the upcoming years, as well as make comparisons with peer cities.

Some residents were selected at random to receive the survey at home, by mail. If you received the paper version of the survey, please complete that version and return it, rather than choosing the online survey.

The city contracted with National Research Center, Inc. to participate in The NCS, an instrument that was developed in partnership with the International City/County Management Association (ICMA) in 2001 to provide cities with a low-cost, high-quality method to conduct market research.

The survey centers on community livability and includes questions about the quality of life in the community, local policies, demographics, rating of local government services and resident use of services.

Survey results will be made available after the survey concludes.

The National Citizen Survey was among the first scientific surveys developed to gather resident opinion on a range of community issues, and has been used in more than 350 jurisdictions across 46 states. The NCS is a high-quality cost-effective scientific survey of resident opinion and an important benchmarking tool that allows for comparison among communities. Communities using The NCS have

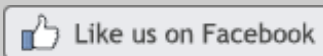

For its sixth annual re-enactment event, the Woodman Museum will present a new edition of "Voices from the Cemetery" on Sept. 28 and 29, 2019 on the grounds of Dover's picturesque and historic Pine Hill Cemetery.

Cast members and tour guides are being sought to act, lead groups, or provide event assistance during this two-day production when famous (or infamous) Dover residents will rise from the dead at their gravesites to entertain you with details from their most interesting lives. All acting roles are for adults, but no acting experience is required. We are seeking individuals with an interest in bringing history to life, and in helping Dover's oldest museum, now in its 103rd year.

In a dozen scenes, laid out all over Pine Hill Cemetery, history will come to life in September during the 60-90 minute escorted tours of this burial ground that dates from 1731. You will learn about 37 noted, nefarious, or notorious Dover citizens who will come to life beside their headstones, regaling visitors with tales of mirth, woe, and amazement. Among the residents lifting their voices in the cemetery will be colonial settlers, sea captains, business and real estate leaders, politicians, industrialists, and even a famous children's author.

Nighttime work planned on Route 4 in Dover

Construction of a new roundabout will affect
motorists for six nights

The New Hampshire Department of Transportation (NHDOT) announces the construction of a new roundabout at the

intersection of U.S. Route 4, Spur Road, and Boston Harbor Road in Dover, will begin Sunday night, Sept. 8, 2019 at 7 p.m.

This work is necessary to complete required roadway reconstruction on U.S. Route 4 to transform the existing signalized intersection into a roundabout. Night operations will be utilized to minimize the impact to daytime commuter traffic.

Alternating one-way traffic will be used at night through the work area with signs, traffic control devices, uniformed officers and flaggers in place to help direct motorists.

Once this roadway construction work begins, motorists should expect a gravel surface throughout the work area until paving operations take place later in the week. Motorcycles should use caution when traveling through the work area.

The duration of this night work is expected to be six nights. Nighttime work hours will be from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m. Adverse weather conditions would delay this work.

This work is part of the Newington-Dover 11238Q project. Severino Trucking Company, Inc. of Candia New Hampshire is the prime contractor for the \$67 million project, which is scheduled to be completed in October 2020.

This year's production will feature a brand new Mother Ginger designed specifically for NBT. Dancers from all dance schools are welcome to audition, boys as well as girls, and adults.

Auditions will be held on Sept. 14 in their Wolfeboro studio (26 Glendon St., across from Rite Aid) and on Sept. 15 in their Dover studio (The McConnell Center, Suite 239, entrance #8).

The following times are the same for both studios: 2-2:30 p.m., 3-5 year olds; 2:30-3 p.m., 6-8 year olds; 3-3:30p.m., 9-11 year olds; 3:30-4 p.m., 12-14 year olds on pointe; 4-4:30 p.m., 12-14 year olds not on pointe; 4:30-5 p.m., 14-plus on pointe (including adults); 5-5:30p.m., 14-plus not on pointe (including adults).

New parking hours, rates in effect

New public parking hours and rates are now in effect. Metered public parking hours are Monday through Saturday, 9 a.m. to 8 p.m.

In addition, progressive parking rates are in effect at most public parking locations and surface lots. The first two hours of parking remain unchanged at \$1 per hour. The third and fourth hours of metered public parking will be \$2 per hour. Metered parking after four hours will be \$3 per hour. Progressive pricing does not include the Orchard Street Public Parking Garage, Chestnut Street lot and the Transportation Center lot, where existing hourly rates will remain in effect.

In addition to the on-street meters, there are several convenient payment options for motorists parking in Dover, including EasyPark, which allows for the electronic purchase of parking without the need to visit a meter; permits for long-term and residential parking; discounted tokens; and more. Public hearings set for state's Ten Year Transportation Plan

First of 20 hearings to be held in Dover

The Governor's Advisory Commission on Intermodal

Transportation (GACIT) will hold 20 public hearings across New Hampshire to review and receive input on the update of the State's Ten Year Transportation Improvement Plan (2021-2030). The series of public hearings will begin on Sept. 10 in Dover and conclude on Oct. 28 in Kingston.

The public hearing in Dover will be held at the McConnell Center cafeteria on Tuesday, Sept. 10, at 6 p.m.

The purpose of these public hearings is to receive public comments/testimony on transportation projects and priorities included in the draft 2021-2030 Plan as recommended by the New Hampshire Department of Transportation to GACIT.

Ribbon-cutting ceremony to
celebrate solar panel installation at
Dover High School

A ribbon-cutting ceremony to celebrate the installation of 2,581 solar panels atop the new Dover High School will be held on Thursday, Sept. 19, from 4 to 5 p.m., at the school, located at 25 Alumni Drive.

ReVision Energy recently completed the installation of the rooftop solar array, the largest in the company's history. The project includes 2,581 solar panels. The project was unanimously approved by the Dover City Council last year.

The solar array has a useful lifespan of 40 years and will generate over 1,000 megawatt-hours of electricity each year, offsetting roughly 40 percent of the school's electric load. The solar power generated by the array is equivalent to offsetting 558 tons of carbon pollution each year or the annual electricity use of 88 homes or the carbon sequestered by 600 acres of forests.

ReVision Energy's agreement with the City of Dover includes an educational initiative aimed at teaching students how solar energy works and exposing students to the various functions involved in the engineering, electrical, and marketing aspects of the project.

The City of Dover also partnered with ReVision Energy on the installation of rooftop solar arrays at the Children's Museum of New Hampshire and adjacent Dover Indoor Pool. ReVision Energy donated 103 solar panels for the installation, part of a 318-panel solar array at the museum and pool which share a common electricity meter. The rooftop projects installed on the museum and indoor pool are owned by ReVision Solar Impact Partners (RSIPs).

Poetry Out Loud registration open for schools, school groups

"He lives to learn," wrote John Greenleaf Whittier in his poem "In School-days," one of thousands of classic poems students may choose to learn as part of the 2020 New Hampshire Poetry Out Loud program.

The N.H. State Council on the Arts, which facilitates the program in New Hampshire, has opened registration for this year's competition to time with the start of the new school year. There are only 45 spots for high schools and high school groups available for the 2020 round, which will mark the program's fifteenth year.

As many as 10,000 New Hampshire students are expected to participate, starting at the classroom level. Classroom winners advance to school competitions, which are followed by in-state regionals and the state championship in March. The state winner will advance to the national finals in Washington, D.C.

While there is a competitive element to Poetry Out Loud, the program's major goal is to help participants learn about great poets, poetry and literary history as they sharpen their presentation and public speaking skills. Students involved in the program say that it is an experience that has long-lasting, positive impact on their lives.

There is no cost to students or schools to participate in Poetry Out Loud, which is organized on the national level by the National Endowment for the Arts and the Poetry Foundation.

History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

Sept. 10, 1777 - It was voted that "thirty dollars be given to each soldier who enlists for the Continental Service until the last of November next, and that the Selectmen pay each soldier said sum when mustered."



Sept. 6, 1834 - Honors to the memory of the illustrious Lafayette were paid by the citizens of Dover, the Hon. Caleb Gushing of Newburyport, delivering an eloquent eulogy on the deceased, the Governor of the State with his staff, and other distinguished guests attending and marching in procession. The Rockingham Guards of Portsmouth, the Great Falls Rifle Co. and the Strafford Guards being the escort.



Sept. 8, 1844 - Thomas W. Waldron, aged 30, the United States Consul and Naval Agent at Canton, died at Hong Kong, China. He was son of Daniel Waldron, late of Dover, the last possessor of the Waldron Homestead.



Sept. 9, 1851 - Incendiary fires being very prevalent at this time, a town meeting was held at which the selectmen were authorized to offer suitable rewards for the apprehension of the incendiaries, and to appoint a night watch and committee of vigilance.



Sept. 7, 1863 - The Cocheco Manufacturing Co., after a year's suspension, recommenced work.

The Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce is again hosting walking tours of historic Dover through September.

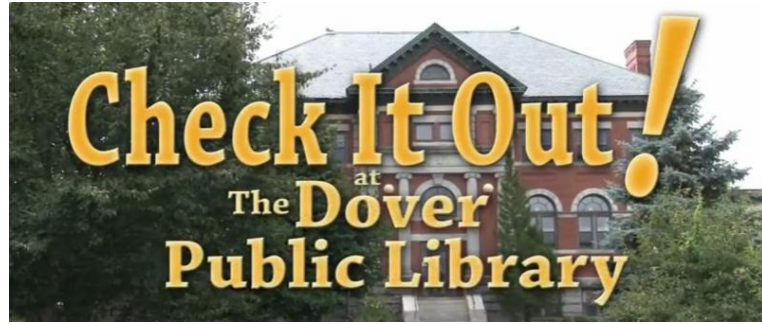

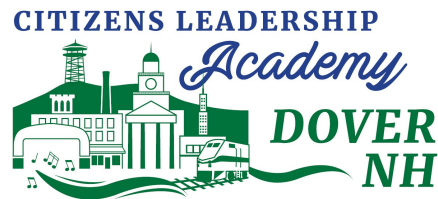
