Exit 5 on Spaulding Turnpike to close permanently Sept. 11

The New Hampshire Department of Transportation (NHDOT) announces the planned permanent closure of the Exit 5 northbound on-ramp on the Spaulding Turnpike (NH 16) in Dover to facilitate the reconstruction of the Spaulding Turnpike between the Little Bay Bridge and the Dover Toll Plaza.

On Tuesday, Sept. 11, 2018. the Spaulding Turnpike Exit 5 northbound on-ramp will be permanently closed to vehicular traffic for the construction of the new northbound lanes of the Spaulding Turnpike. This permanent closure is part of the overall planned improvements to the Spaulding Turnpike corridor to allow for the safe flow of traffic from the northbound Spaulding Turnpike onto the new Exit 6 northbound off-ramp that will be opened in the fall of 2018.

Motorists seeking to access the Spaulding Turnpike northbound from Boston Harbor Road, Dover Point Road, and Wentworth Terrace will be required to take the Exit 6 southbound on-ramp onto the southbound Spaulding Turnpike, continue south to Exit 4, and reverse direction via Shattuck Way and the Exit 4 northbound on-ramp.

This work is part of the Newington-Dover improvement project on the Spaulding Turnpike. Severino Trucking Company, Inc. of Candia, New Hampshire is the prime Discover Dover with Peek at the Week

Help shape the future by participating in architectural design guidelines survey, online or in person

The City of Dover is seeking community feedback to help develop Architectural and Urban Design Guidelines for the Central Business District.

The Department of Planning and Community Development, along with the project's consultant, Resilience Planning LLC, kicked off a public engagement process recently with a Visual Preference Survey. A Visual Preference Survey allows citizens to rate visual concepts of building designs, landscape characteristics, architectural styles, streetscape features, and more. The feedback collected helps the city understand what the public envisions for the Central Business District.

Participating in the survey is one way for the public to help shape the future look of Dover, the design of public streets, open spaces, and site development of the Central Business District, and to offer input for future design guidelines. The online survey, which should take between 5 and 10 minutes to complete, is available until Monday, Sept. 17. The survey is available here: <u>https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/DoverVPC</u>.

In addition, a convenient mobile office is now open downtown at 93 Washington St., in the former Brown and Brown Insurance building, where the public can also take the survey.

The results of the survey will be revealed Saturday, Oct. 6 at Apple Harvest Day, where a booth will be set up.



Night paving resumes Sunday

Night paving will resume Sunday evening, Sept. 9. Paving operations begin at 8 p.m. each day and conclude by 6 a.m. the following day.

The schedule is as follows:

Sunday, Sept. 9:

- **Central Avenue**, from the Stark Avenue and East Watson Lane intersection to Mill Street and Exit 7S intersection, including the Locust Street and Burger King intersection.
 - Traffic restrictions include lane shifts and/or alternating traffic flow to accommodate the work. Motorists should expect significant delays and avoid this area if possible.

Monday, Sept. 10:

- Continue paving **Central Avenue**, from the Stark Avenue and East Watson Lane intersection to Mill Street and Exit 7S intersection, including the Locust Street and Burger King intersection.
 - Traffic restrictions include lane shifts and/or alternating traffic flow to accommodate the work. Motorists should expect significant delays and avoid this area if possible.
- Time permitting, crews will also begin paving **Oak Street**, between Portland Avenue and Broadway. This segment of Oak Street will be closed to all through traffic. Traffic detours will be in place via Portland Avenue, Chapel Street, Saint John Street and Broadway.

Open Lands Committee to host kayak tour Sept. 16



The Children's Museum of New Hampshire and SEED will share proceeds from the Dover Ducky Derby.



The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. Sept. 10, 1777 - It was voted that "thirty dollars be given to each soldier who enlists for the Continental Service until the last of November next, and that the Selectmen pay each soldier said sum when mustered."

Sept. 13, 1797 - Voted that the land for a burying place on Pine Hill be laid out and a plan be returned to the Town Clerk. Pine Hill had been occupied as a burying ground from the time, probably, of the erection of the meeting house there in 1713, and in 1731 one and a half acres were by vote of the town, ordered to be laid out for that purpose. The action of the town at this time would indicate that the previous order had not been complied with, or no return thereof had been made.




Sept. 7, 1863 - The Cocheco Manufacturing Co., after a year's suspension, recommenced work.



Sept. 8, 1844 - Thomas W. Waldron, aged 30, the United States Consul and Naval Agent at Canton, died at Hong Kong, China. He was son of Daniel Waldron, late of Dover, the last possessor of the Waldron Homestead.


Sept. 9, 1851 - Incendiary fires being very prevalent at this time, a town meeting was held at which the selectmen were authorized to offer suitable rewards for the apprehension of the incendiaries, and to appoint a night watch and committee of vigilance.

Dover's water quality reports available online

Each year, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requires community water systems to deliver a Consumer Confidence Report -- also known as an Annual Drinking Water Quality Report -- to their customers. These reports, which are mailed out to water customers by July 1, provide information about their drinking water quality including a summary of detected contaminants from the previous year, compliance, and educational information.
