Citywide mailer to alert residents of proposed TDR, zoning amendments

**Planning Board to hold public hearings on
Sept. 8, Sept. 22**

The City of Dover's Planning Department is [mailing a letter](#) city-wide informing residents and property owners of proposed amendments to the city's zoning ordinance, including proposed revisions of the Transfer of Development Rights (TDR) zoning ordinance.

The letter includes a list of the proposed amendments; the [full text of the proposed zoning amendments](#) is published on the [Planning Department's website](#). The letter also includes the date of the Planning Board's public hearing on the proposed changes, which will occur on Tuesday, Sept. 8, 2026, and Sept. 22, 2026, at 7 p.m. in City Hall's Council Chambers.

Proposed revisions to the Transfer of Development Rights (TDR) ordinance were endorsed by the Planning Board's TDR Subcommittee, which [has met regularly](#) since April 2025, to review and suggest changes to the ordinance. The subcommittee's endorsed language is included in its July 15, 2026 [meeting agenda materials](#). The Planning Department [also has a webpage](#) about the TDR ordinance.

The chair and vice chair of the TDR Subcommittee, Leslie Herd and Jan Nedelka, and Zoning Administrator Paul Crouser, gave an overview to the Planning Board of the

proposed revisions at the Planning Board's July 28, 2026 meeting. [Watch the discussion.](#)

Other, but not all, proposed ordinance changes include:

- Moving computer and data processing from permitted uses in the Innovative Technology zones to a conditional use and creating specific restrictions;
- Updating swimming pool regulations to match the state building code;
- Amending the Customary Home Occupation ordinance;
- Amending a variety of definitions in the code.

Following the Sept. 8, 2026 and Sept. 22, 2026 public hearings, the Planning Board will consider endorsing the amendments. If it does, the endorsed amendments will go to the City Council for ratification. The City Council will also hold a public hearing on any proposed zoning amendments changes before taking a vote to authorize any ordinance changes.

Friday night festival series approaches finale at The Speed of Sound

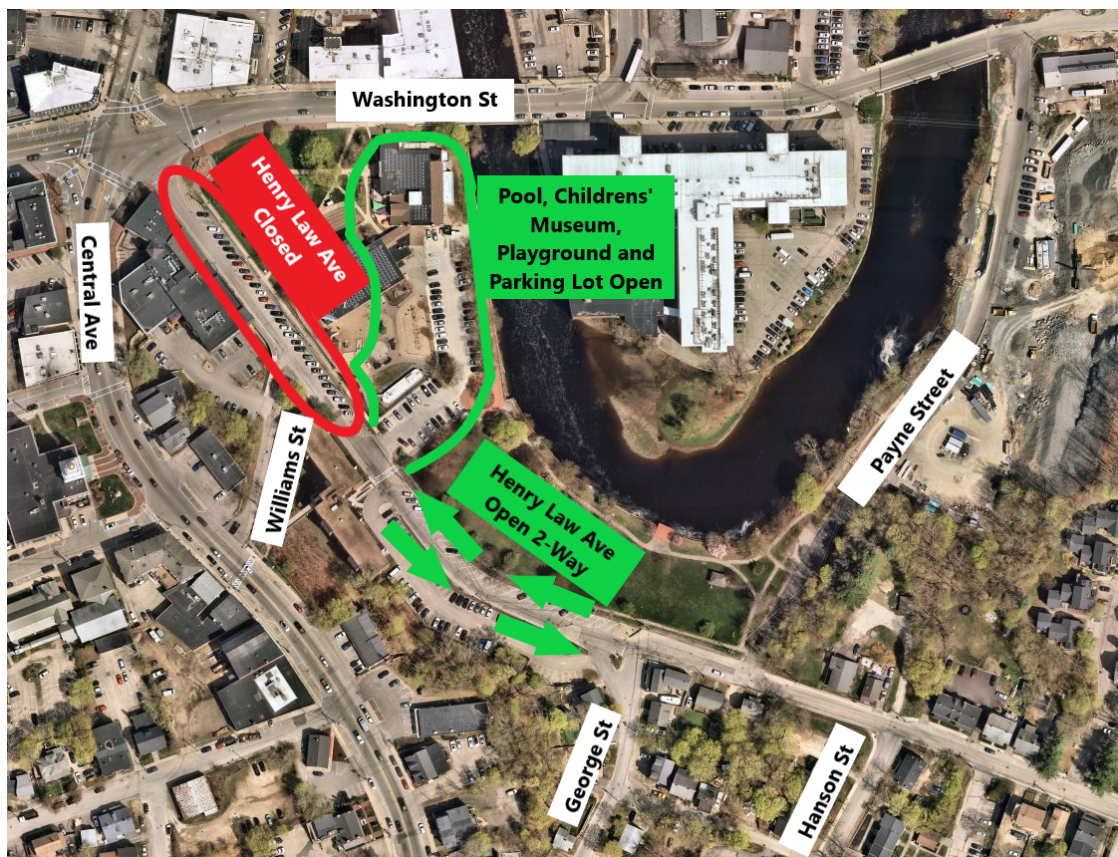

Upper Henry Law Avenue closed to traffic

Access playground, pool, museum and parking from lower Henry Law Avenue

Henry Law Avenue is now closed between Washington Street and the public parking lot as part of the road reconstruction project.

The public parking lot, Dover Indoor Pool, Adventure Playground and the New Hampshire Children's Museum remain open during construction and accessible for lower Henry Law Avenue.

Henry Law Avenue is temporarily a two-way street between George Street and the public parking lot. All parking spaces on the street have been temporarily eliminated during the first phase.

Williams Street will be closed to through traffic and only accessible from the Central Avenue.

The contractor will remove a series of trees near the sidewalk of lower Henry Law Park starting this week. New trees will be planted after work is completed. At the completion, Henry Law Park will have more trees than there are now.

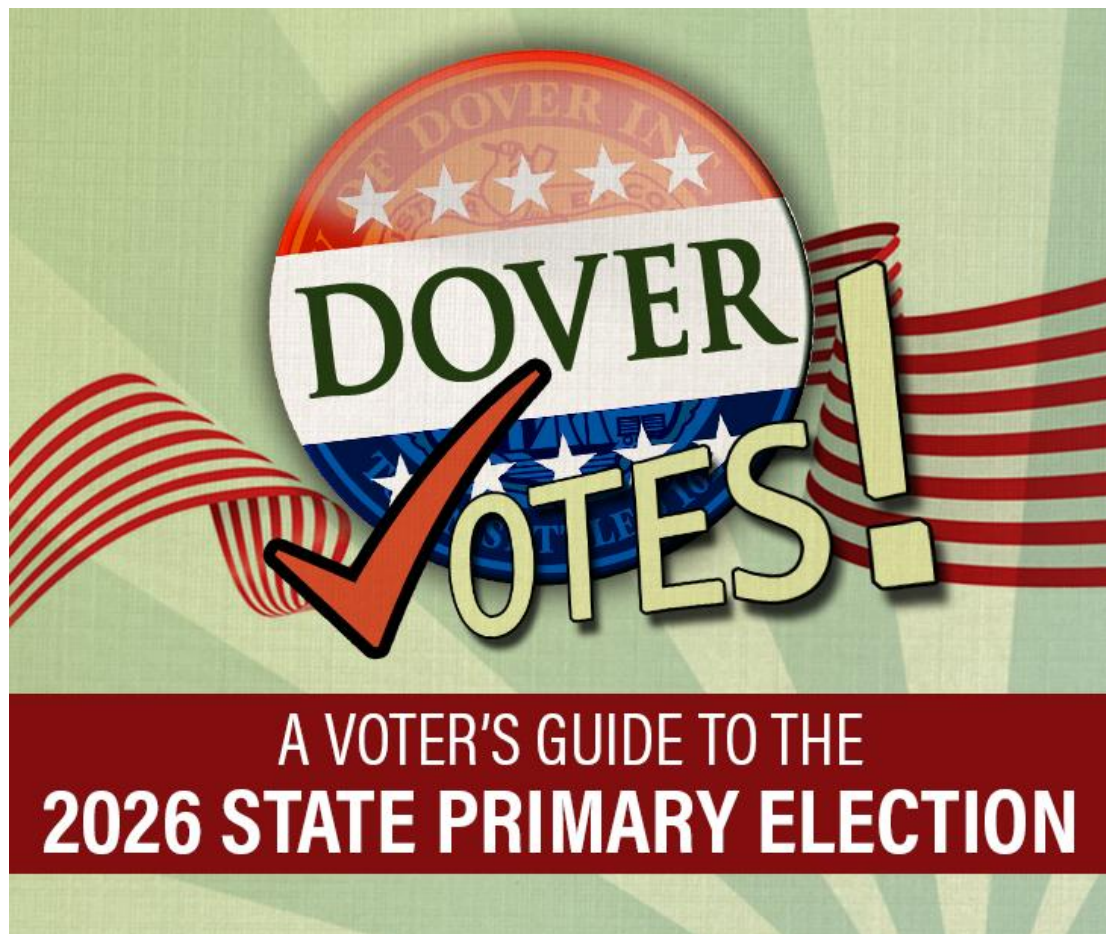
The tree removal is necessary for underground utility work, including the installation of a new drainage system. The grade of the sidewalks will also be raised to the level of Henry Law Avenue. These actions would have killed or severely damaged the trees if left in place.

The project will be completed in three phases. The first two phases include underground utility work on Henry Law Avenue, Payne Street, and Henry Law Park, as well as street reconstructions on Henry Law Avenue and Payne Street. The last phase of the project will impact Washington Street by the lower square.

The first part of the project is replacing the sewer main on Henry Law Avenue between Washington and Williams streets. To do so, the contractor is installing a temporary sewer bypass system.

City election page offers resources for Sept. 8 state primary

The State Primary Election will be held Tuesday, Sept. 8, 2026, and the City of Dover has an online resource to help voters prepare for Election Day.

The city's 2026 State Primary Election [webpage](#) includes sample ballots for all six Dover wards, information and applications for absentee ballots, voter registration information, and other election resources.

The webpage also includes information about the Supervisors of the Checklist session on Tuesday, Sept. 1, from 5:30 to 6 p.m. in the City Clerk's office at City Hall, 288 Central Ave. The supervisors will register new voters, record address changes and make other corrections to the voter checklist. Sept. 1 is the final day to register before the Sept. 8 primary.

Residents who are not registered by Sept. 1 may still register and vote at their polling place on Election Day.

Smoke testing for inflow/infiltration areas of sewer system begins next week

A city contractor will conduct smoke testing in sections of the city in effort to identify areas of [inflow and infiltration](#) of stormwater into the sanitary sewer system. The work is anticipated to occur the week of August 17, weather permitting.

Properties in the affected areas will receive a door hanger alerting them of the smoke testing with contact information. Testing will occur within 1-4 business days of receiving the notice.

Smoke will not enter homes unless there is defective plumbing or dried up plumbing traps. Those who receive the notice are encouraged to dump a gallon of water in plumbing drains, especially those that don't get used often. Defective plumbing may indicate sewer gasses are also entering the building.

When smoke testing occurs, the contractor, Wright-Pierce, will blow non-toxic smoke through a sewer maintenance hole into the sewer pipes. This smoke is similar to what may be used at concerts and theater performances. The field crew then observes where smoke may exit the system. The exiting smoke may indicate that drain maintenance holes, catch basins, roof gutters and/or foundation drains are connected to the sewer system. smoke testing identifies issues for repair, improving the overall efficiency of the sewer system.

The goal of the work is to reduce rain water from entering the sewer system. The work is necessary both for federal and state compliance, as well as ensuring the health and vitality of natural resources like the Great Bay Estuary.

New At Your Service episode focuses on traffic safety and enforcement

The latest installment of DoverTV's "At Your Service" series takes viewers on the road with Dover police officers for a closer look at [traffic enforcement](#), from speeding and distracted driving to the role officers play in making neighborhood streets safer.

Traffic complaints are among the most common concerns received by the Dover Police Department. The department addresses them through a three-part approach: a dedicated traffic enforcement officer, traffic enforcement by uniformed patrol officers and targeted enforcement funded through state-administered highway safety grants.

Viewers ride along as officers conduct speed and hands-free enforcement, including traffic stops for drivers using cellphones. The episode also shows how officers exercise discretion during stops and explains how federally funded grants allow Dover police to dedicate additional patrols to specific concerns such as speeding, distracted driving and impaired driving.

Police say Dover averages roughly three or four crashes a day, underscoring why speeding, distraction and other unsafe driving remain public safety concerns. The department also relies on residents to report problem areas and dangerous driving so officers can better target enforcement efforts.

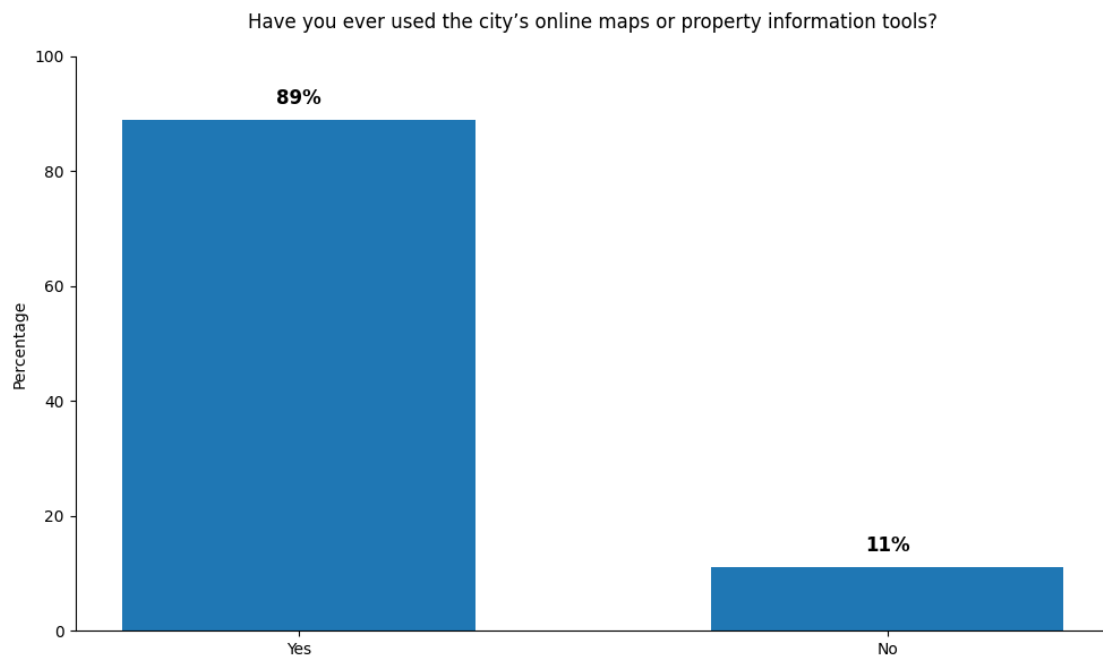

The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also [maintains an online collection](#) of historical information.

Aug. 17, 1925 — The M&M Bakeries, Inc. of Dover inaugurated the first air delivery of fresh baked bread in New England, if not the world, when a speedy plane made the trip of 12 miles as the crow flies, to Portsmouth, in 7 minutes, 12 seconds. The delivery was made in less than 25 minutes of the receipt of a request for extra loaves. The flight and M&M Bakeries was the topic of the Dover Download podcast segment, This Week in history, which can be found wherever you get your podcasts or at <https://bit.ly/4fCUSwJ>.

Aug. 18, 1933 — Insurance companies agree to pay the City of Dover \$151,000 for the loss of City Hall, which burned down on Aug. 3 that same year. It was Dover's third City Hall, built in 1892 at a cost of \$250,000.

Aug. 14, 1955 — Dover began a weeklong centennial celebration to mark 100 years as a city.

Aug. 19, 1997 — Dover's efforts to locate a consolidated \$3.3 million courthouse downtown seemed to be fading fast, despite numerous attempts. The state gave the city until Sept. 7, 1997, to propose an acceptable downtown site, having rejected previous suggestions. Previously considered locations included a parking lot at Chestnut and Third streets, a Portland Street site, and the former Fisher mill building on Main Street. Some supporters, including then-Councilor Wil Boc, argued that keeping the court downtown was vital for economic success.

However, others favored a county site near the Superior Court for consolidation of services. By 1998, the former middle school -- now the McConnell Center -- was the city's preferred location for the court. Both the state and city appropriated funding to move the court to the school. However, by 2001, the former district court on Saint Thomas Street was razed to make way for a new consolidated courthouse at the same site.

The first wrinkle came before the new building was constructed: Durham, Lee, and Madbury fought for an exemption from a major consolidation, arguing their towns, along with the presence of 14,000 University of New Hampshire students, made it necessary to retain a court in Durham.

The New Hampshire Legislature granted the exemption. Somersworth and Rollinsford lobbied for similar exemptions, citing the convenience of the Somersworth District Court, but would lose that bid. After spending a few years in temporary quarters at the middle school -- the McConnell Center -- the new consolidated Dover District Court opened in 2002.

In 2011, Dover District Court became Dover Circuit Court. The 2011 consolidation created the New Hampshire Circuit Court system, which combined the former district courts, probate courts, and family division courts into a single circuit court structure. Under the change, Durham, Lee and Madbury were consolidated into the Dover court.

Deadline to order bricks to be installed by Veterans Day is Aug. 21

The Recreation Department will order another round of engraved bricks for Dover Veterans Park to be added in time for Veterans Day on Nov. 11. The deadline to include bricks in that order is Wednesday, Aug. 21, 2026.

Orders collected after the deadline, through Feb. 28, 2027, will be sent in the next batch for installation in the park by Memorial Day. The cost is \$100 for an 8-inch-by-8-inch brick and \$50 for a 4-inch-by-8-inch brick. The only requirement to have a name engraved is for the person to be a veteran. All bricks are engraved consistently with a full name, military rank and branch, and years of service and/or conflict. Upon request, bricks may also be grouped by family or service time.

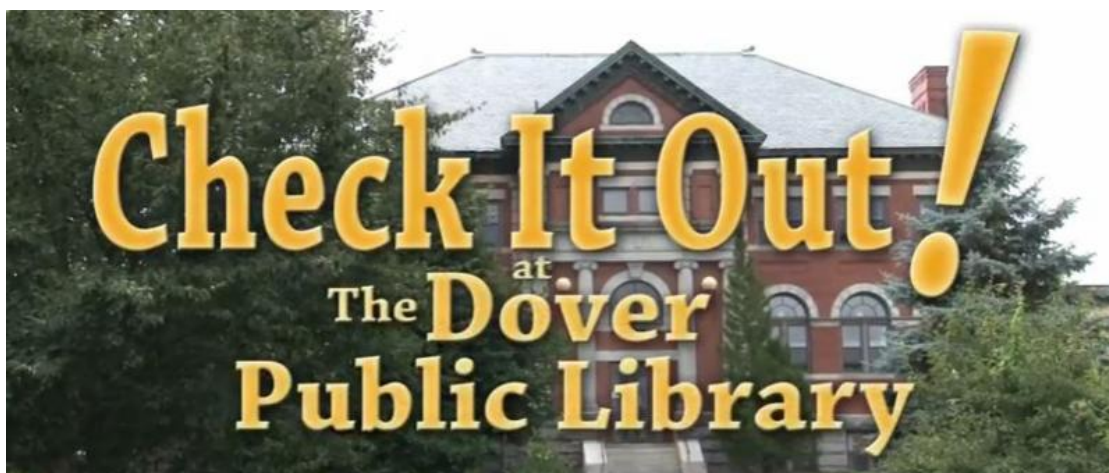

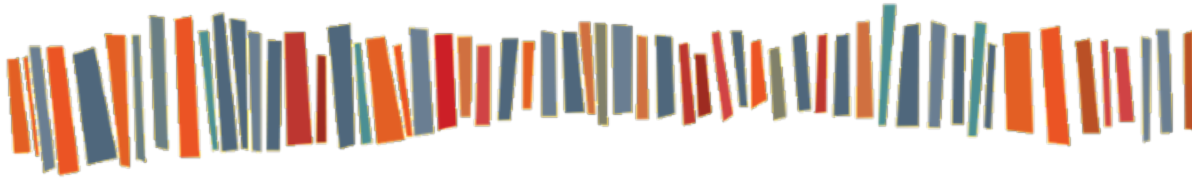

City of Dover to hold Household Hazardous Waste Day Oct. 17

The City of Dover, along with the towns of Rollinsford, Lee and Madbury, will hold a Hazardous Waste Collection Day on Saturday, Oct. 17, 2026, from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., at the City's Community Services facility, 271 Mast Road.

The goal of Hazardous Waste Collection Day is to allow for the proper disposal of household hazardous materials. Residents of the four communities can bring household hazardous waste to Community Services for safe disposal.

The following household waste will be accepted: fertilizer with acids; bathroom cleaners; brush cleaner; pesticides; car waxes/polish; disinfectants; corrosives; fungicides; creosote; furniture polish paint/stain/finish; insect spray; driveway sealers/tar; metal polish (lead and oil-based); lighter fluid; flea powder; mothballs; rust preventatives; pest strips/traps; gasoline; oven cleaners; solvents; pesticides; radiator flush; photo chemicals; thinner/turpentine; poisons; roofing tar; rug cleaner; wood preservatives; pool chemicals; and wood strippers. Empty containers are not hazardous. Please dispose of them in your regular trash.

Explosives, asbestos, batteries, fluorescent bulbs, propane tanks, latex paint, waste oil and antifreeze will not be accepted.

Hazardous Waste Collection Day is for residents only. Proof of residency is required.

Red Cross declares emergency blood shortage

The American Red Cross is declaring an emergency blood shortage as the blood supply fell nearly 25% in June. Blood donors are urgently needed to give now to help ensure patients receive lifesaving medical care without delay.

The shortage comes during the height of trauma season, when hospitals frequently see increased demand for blood due to serious injuries and other medical emergencies, according to the Red Cross.

A steep decline in blood donations since the end of May has created a growing gap between supply and patient need. Currently, Red Cross distributions to hospitals are nearly 3,500 units higher per week than expected. The shortage is especially serious for types O positive and B negative blood. Blood donors are urgently needed to give now to help ensure patients receive lifesaving medical care without delay.
