City seeks community input in search for next Chief of Police

The City of Dover is seeking input from residents as it begins the process of selecting the city's next Chief of Police. The community survey will help ensure the next leader of the Dover Police Department reflects the city's values, priorities, and expectations.

Chief William Breault, who has served the city for more than 20 years, including eight as chief, will retire later this year. The city is committed to building on his leadership and continuing to advance the department's mission of professionalism, service, and community trust.

"Selecting a new Chief of Police is not just a personnel decision, it's a community decision," City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr. said. "The survey gives residents a direct opportunity to share what qualities, experience, and leadership attributes they believe are most important in our next chief."

The survey takes about 10 minutes to complete and is anonymous.

State approves delivery rate increases for

all energy customers

Eversource, Community Power electricity rates also increased

Dover's energy customers will see their delivery rates for electricity increase as of Aug. 1, 2025, regardless of energy supplier. Eversource and Community Power customers will also see their electricity supply rates increase on Aug. 1.

The New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission approved Eversource's petition (<u>Docket # 24-070</u>) to increase distribution rates in the PUC's <u>July 25, 2025, 81-page order</u>. The fixed residential delivery customer charge will increase 43%, from \$13.81 to \$19.81, which applies to all residential customers. The PUC ordered Eversource to raise this delivery rate \$2 annually on Aug. 1, "until otherwise ordered by the (PUC)." The PUC order provides an 8.2% increase in distribution rates and a total bill increase of 2.5%.

Eversource's default electric supply rate is increasing to \$0.11196 (11.196 cents) per kilowatt hour (kWh). Community Powers' supply rate is increasing to \$0.13419 (13.419 cents) per kWh for the "Granite Basic" option for residential and small commercial customers.

Dover's energy customers may choose which firm supplies their electricity, including Dover Community Power, third-party options, and the utility provider, Eversource. The New Hampshire Department of Energy has a webpage to help customers shop for competitive energy power suppliers.

To opt in, out, or select a Community Power option with more renewable energy content, customers can:

Please note that it may take one to two billing cycles to reflect the change. To complete the change, customers will need their Eversource account number.

Downtown ash trees are dying, will be replaced in coming years

Join public tree walk Thursday evening and learn how to spot emerald ash borer infestations

The invasive emerald ash borer beetle is actively killing Dover's downtown ash trees, requiring the removal of more than 50 trees in the next 1-2 years. The effects of the invasive insect can be spotted throughout downtown (and around the region) in ash trees' dead limbs.

Planning Department staff are hosting downtown walks to inform the public about the issue; the next one is Thursday, Aug. 21, at 6 p.m., starting at City Hall. The walk lasts about an hour, concluding at Franklin Square.

Lindsay Watkins, Strafford County Forester with the University of New Hampshire's Cooperative Extension, leads the public walk, pointing out the ash trees that line many areas of downtown, how to identify an infestation of the invasive emerald ash borer, and how an infestation nearly always means the tree will die within a few years and become a safety hazard. Watkins will also discuss the history of the emerald ash borer infestation in the United States that began in the Midwest earlier this century and has quickly migrated east. The emerald ash borer beetle is native to northeastern Asia.

Part of the walk includes the characteristics of a successful street tree, how conditions for street trees differ from forest trees, and why native species don't always make the best street tree. City staff are creating a tree replacement plan and seek the public's input on the downtown's tree canopy through an online survey.

The invasive insect has spread across New Hampshire since 2013, feeding on ash trees beneath the bark, disrupting water and nutrient flow. Early signs include canopy dieback, bark splitting, woodpecker damage, and small D-shaped exit holes. Once symptoms appear, damage is typically irreversible, and dying ash trees become brittle, posing public safety hazards. Community Services' crews have been proactively pruning affected trees, but most of the 54 ash trees will still need to be removed within a couple of years.

"Once you see it, you can't un-see it," said Deputy City Manager Christopher Parker about the ash tree's dead limbs downtown on this week's Dover Download <u>podcast on the topic</u>, where he interviews Watkins and Assistant City Planner Makayla Edgecomb about this critical issue facing Dover's downtown ash trees.

Dover Arts Commission celebrates "Reaching Across" sculpture at ribbon-cutting

The Dover Arts Commission held a ribbon-cutting ceremony this week on Monday, Aug. 11, to officially unveil the Reaching Across arch, a new addition to downtown Dover at the entrance to the Joe B. Parks Riverwalk Public Gardens on Central Avenue.

The event was attended by artist Markus Weinfurter, who designed and created the sculpture, members of the Arts Commission, Mayor Robert Carrier, and Deputy Mayor Dennis Shanahan.

Made entirely from recycled metal, Reaching Across is an abstract sculpture, symbolizing the interconnectedness of nature, humanity, and technology. Featuring fluid lines and 36 handcrafted copper flowers, the piece was designed to transition visitors from the urban streetscape to the garden's natural setting.

The project began in early 2024 when the Arts Commission sought artwork to serve as a landmark. Weinfurter, based in Durham, was selected for his innovative approach to working with reclaimed materials. With help from local scrap yards, Dover High School's Career Technical Center welding program, and city staff, the sculpture was fabricated and installed in July.

"When we started, we were like, we don't know if we can raise that much money, can we really do it, and Markus gave us the confidence," said Jane Hamor, Dover Arts Commission co-chair. "The Arts Commission has never done anything like this before, and it was really, really heartwarming for how the community came together and helped us to make this possible."

Co-chair Cliff Blake added, "We're a group of 11 volunteers that try to make Dover a more beautiful and lovely place to live. And this is a great example of how that all comes together."

For Weinfurter, the project's success reflects a shared creative spirit.

"It might seem that the work of art is the work of an individual, but it really isn't," he said. "It really takes a village and a lot of other artists who do what they do and keep inspiring each other. We need each other's inspiration. I wouldn't be able to do all this if I didn't see that other artists do this all the time. It's a privilege to be an artist. It's a challenge and it's a privilege. Everybody keep doing what you're doing. We need to inspire each other."



The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information <u>located here</u>.

Aug. 20, 1820 — New England experienced a severe drought that, combined with an infestation of grasshoppers, devastated local agriculture. Farmers across Dover and the surrounding region lost much of their corn, potato, and other staple crops. Such conditions posed serious risks to food supplies and livelihoods in a time when most families relied on local harvests for survival. Crop failures could mean months of hardship, higher food prices, and increased dependence on imported goods, no small challenge in an era before modern transportation or refrigeration.

Aug. 17, 1925 — From Foster's Daily Democrat: "Last Saturday morning, the M&M Bakeries, Inc. of Dover inaugurated the first air delivery of fresh baked bread in New England, if not the world, when a speedy plane made the trip of 12 miles as the crow flies, to Portsmouth, in 7 minutes, 12 seconds. The delivery was made in less than 25 minutes of the receipt of a request for extra loaves."

Aug. 19, 1931 — Frank Tuttle, First Assistant Engineer of the Dover Fire Department, years before the agency adopted its current name of Dover Fire & Rescue, was seriously injured while responding to a fire. Tuttle had been riding on the department's "chemical" truck, a firefighting vehicle equipped with chemical tanks used before modern pump engines became standard. As the truck raced to the scene, it struck a bump, throwing Tuttle into the air. He managed to cling to a guard rail with one hand, a move officials later said likely saved his life. Even so, he suffered injuries across his entire body and was confined to his home to recover.

Aug. 20, 2003 — Coastal Living Magazine features Dover as part of its "So you want to live in..." column, showcasing one community in each issue as a desirable place to live. Dover was described as a charming, history-rich, former mill town reborn in a "high-tech makeover." The magazine also stated, "...it's a mill town scrubbed and polished with amenities such as forsythia-lined walkways along the Cocheco."

Aug. 17, 2014 — Former longtime Dover attorney Alfred (Fred) Catalfo Jr. published his autobiography, "Undefeated: Scored On Once". The book recounts his journey from leaving school after eighth grade to help support his family, to returning at age 19 speaking little English, excelling in academics and athletics, serving as a U.S. Navy pilot in World War II, and building a distinguished legal career. Catalfo was Strafford County attorney, Democratic state chairman, and a delegate to the 1960 Democratic National Convention for John F. Kennedy. Known for his expertise in criminal law, he remained an active member of the New Hampshire and Tennessee bars into his 90s. Catalfo died in 2016 at the age of 99.

City of Dover, surrounding towns, to hold Household Hazardous Waste Day Aug. 23

The City of Dover, along with the towns of Rollinsford, Lee and Madbury, will hold a Hazardous Waste Collection Day on Saturday, Aug. 23, 2025, from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., at the City's Community Services facility, 271 Mast Road.


The goal of Hazardous Waste Collection Day is to allow for the proper disposal of household hazardous materials. Residents of the four communities can bring household hazardous waste to Community Services for safe disposal.

The following household waste will be accepted: fertilizer with acids; bathroom cleaners; brush cleaner; pesticides; car waxes/polish; disinfectants; corrosives; fungicides; creosote; furniture polish paint/stain/finish; insect spray; driveway sealers/tar; metal polish (lead and oil-based); lighter fluid; flea powder; mothballs; rust preventatives; pest strips/traps; gasoline; oven cleaners; solvents; pesticides; radiator flush; photo chemicals; thinner/turpentine; poisons; roofing tar; rug cleaner; wood preservatives; pool chemicals; and wood strippers. Empty containers are not hazardous. Please dispose of them in your regular trash.

Explosives, asbestos, batteries, fluorescent bulbs, propane tanks, latex paint, waste oil and antifreeze will not be accepted.

Hazardous Waste Collection Day is for residents only. Proof of residency is required.

Planning Department mailing letter about proposed zoning ordinance amendments

Planning Board holding public hearings on Aug. 26 and Sept. 9

The City of Dover's Department of Planning and Community Development is mailing <u>a</u> <u>letter to property owners</u> this week, alerting them to <u>proposed zoning ordinance</u> <u>amendments</u> and two Planning Board public hearings where the public can voice their opinions.

There are 44 proposed amendments to Chapter 170 Zoning developed with input from the public, Planning Board members, Planning Department staff and state legislation. The text of the proposed zoning ordinance amendments is posted on the Planning Department's homepage https://www.dover.nh.gov/government/city-operations/planning/.

The Planning Board's first public hearing will be at its Tuesday, Aug. 26, 2025, meeting; the second will be at its Tuesday, Sept. 9, 2025, meeting. Following the public hearings, the Planning Board will consider endorsing the amendments and sending them to the City Council for review and a final vote. The City Council will also hold a public hearing before voting on the proposed amendments.
