School Board to formally name Christine Boston as new superintendent

The Dover School Board will formally approve the nomination of Assistant Superintendent Christine Boston the city's new superintendent beginning July 1, 2025 at its Monday, Aug. 26 meeting.

In her letter to the School Board announcing Boston's nomination, School Board Chair Robin Trefethen said Boston will continue this year as assistant



superintendent and work closely with Superintendent William Harbron, who will retire at the end of the 2024-2025 school year on June 30, 2025. Boston will have a three-year contract pending satisfactory annual performance evaluations, Trefethen said. Her salary for the 2025-2026 school year will be \$176,800.

"Dr. Boston brings a wealth of experience and a deep commitment to educational excellence, and we are confident she will be an exceptional leader for our district," Trefethen said in the letter.

Boston, who received a doctorate in education from Plymouth State University in 2017, has worked for the City of Dover school district since 2008 when she was hired as the Dover Middle School dean of students. Since then, she has served the district as a principal, director of pupil services and assistant superintendent of student services. Since 2022, she has served as assistant superintendent of the district.

Dover Adventure Playground to close for

two weeks next month

Section of pool parking lot also to close

The Dover Adventure Playground at Henry Law Park will be closed for two weeks for maintenance beginning Monday, Sept. 9. A section of the adjacent public parking lot for the Dover Indoor Pool and the Children's Museum of New Hampshire will also be closed at the same time so it can be used as a staging area.

The park closure will allow the completion of numerous maintenance items, including replacing wooden posts with granite, replacing the park's woodchips and replacing the wooden trough and decking at the water pump, repainting the gundalow, and installing a footing for the shade pavilion.

The park and closed parking spaces will reopen once the maintenance work is completed. The closure is expected to last until Friday, Sept. 20, weather and other conditions permitting.

Dover High School gears up for new school year

In a <u>video</u> released this week, Dover High School Principal Peter Driscoll outlined what to expect in the upcoming school year, including key dates and priorities.

Some of the information provided in the video includes:

- The Class of 2028 will attend freshman orientation on Thursday, Aug. 29, from 8 a.m. to noon. During this time, new students will receive schedules, meet teachers and get their Chromebooks.
- Classes for all students begin Tuesday, Sept. 3, running from 7:40 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Driscoll stressed the importance of attendance and punctuality for student success.
- Senior parking permit sales will continue Aug. 27-29. Juniors can apply for parking from Sept. 3-6.
- Fall sports start with football today, Aug. 16, followed by other athletics on Aug. 19.
- Band camp begins Aug. 20.

Driscoll highlighted the district's "<u>Portrait of a Learner</u>" initiative, which focuses on critical thinking, creativity, communication, character, and work habits.


Overnight paving operations continue on Washington, Jenness streets

Weather and other conditions permitting, overnight paving operations will continue on Washington Street, between Tolend Road and Chestnut Street, and Jenness Street on Sunday night, Aug. 18.

The city's paving contractor, Brox Industries, Inc., continues adjusting and replacing road castings, which is expected to take a few more days. The contractor anticipates starting paving on Tuesday night, Aug. 20, beginning with Jenness Street, followed by Washington Street.

Motorists should anticipate lane closure and detours through the work area. Parking is prohibited in the work areas daily from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m. Sunday night through Friday morning. Violators risk being towed.

Detour in place next week for southbound New Rochester Road traffic

Weather permitting, southbound New Rochester Road (Route 108) traffic will be detoured next week between Willand Avenue and Hotel Drive to allow utility work related to the Ember Drive residential development across from Auburn Street. The detour will be in effect from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. from Tuesday, Aug. 20 through Thursday, Aug. 22. Weather may delay the detour route by one or more days.

Southbound New Rochester Road traffic will be detoured around the work area via Willand Avenue, Old Rochester Road, and Hotel Drive. Northbound traffic will travel through the work area on New Rochester Road. Motorists should anticipate brief delays in both directions. Police officers and traffic control personnel will be on hand to help manage traffic flow.





The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information <u>located here</u>.

Aug. 23, 1649 — Local authorities granted William Pomfrett, Thomas Layton, and John Dam permission to build a sawmill at Bellamy Bank. They were also allowed to cut down


1,500 oak and pine trees from the swampy area above the waterfalls. Additionally, Pomfrett and his partners were given the right to cut timber anywhere along the river, as long as it wasn't on someone else's property. For this privilege, they had to pay the town 3 pence for each tree they cut down. In the mid-17th century, colonists were rapidly expanding their settlements and needed lumber for building homes, ships, and other structures. Sawmills were deemed crucial for processing the abundant forests into usable timber. The granting of such privileges was common in colonial times without regard for the indigenous populations.

Aug. 19, 1788 — A violent hurricane destroyed hundreds of acres of woodland in New Hampshire, including Dover, unroofed many barns, and caused other significant damage.

Aug. 17, 1925 — The M&M Bakeries, Inc. of Dover inaugurated the first air delivery of fresh baked bread in New England, if not the world, when a speedy plane made the trip of 12 miles as the crow flies, to Portsmouth, in 7 minutes, 12 seconds. The delivery was made in less than 25 minutes of the receipt of a request for extra loaves. Aug. 18, 1933 — Insurance companies agreed to pay the City of Dover \$151,000 for the loss of City Hall, which burned down on Aug. 3 that same year. It was Dover's third City Hall, built in 1892 at a cost of \$250,000.

Aug. 19, 1997 — Dover's efforts to locate a consolidated courthouse downtown seemed to be fading fast, despite numerous attempts. The state gave the city until Sept. 7, 1997, to propose an acceptable downtown site, having rejected previous suggestions. By 1998, long after the deadline passed, with more rejected locations, the former middle school -- now the McConnell Center -- was the city's preferred location for the court. Instead, in 2001, the former district court on St. Thomas Street was razed to make way for a new consolidated courthouse at the same site. After spending a few years in temporary quarters at the middle school (McConnell Center), the new consolidated Dover District Court opened in 2002. In 2011, Dover District Court became Dover Circuit Court. (For more on this story, listen to next week's episode of the Dover Download podcast.).

Guide to Sept. 10 state primary election available online

The state primary election will be held on Tuesday, Sept. 10, 2024. Polling hours in Dover will be from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The election will determine political party nominees for the general election to be held on Tuesday, Nov. 5, 2024. There are two ballots for the Sept. 10 primary election: one for registered Republicans and one for registered Democrats. Undeclared voters may declare a party at their polling location on Election Day and receive that party's ballot. Voters may

change party status back to undeclared by signing a form at the polls following the vote.

The City of Dover's <u>2024 State Primary Election webpage</u> has sample ballots for the Republican and Democratic primaries for each of Dover's six wards. The page also has the polling locations for each ward.

Supervisors of the Checklist in session Sept. 3

The Supervisors of the Checklist will meet on Tuesday, Sept. 3, 2024, from 5:30 to 6 p.m., at the City Clerk's office at City Hall, 288 Central Ave.

During this session, supervisors will register new voters, make changes to addresses and names, and other corrections to the checklist. Voters cannot change party affiliation during this session, as the deadline was June 4, 2024. September 3 will be the last day voters may register to vote in person in the City Clerk's office. Any voters wanting to register after this date may do so at their polling location on Election Day.

City of Dover, surrounding towns, to hold Household Hazardous Waste Day Aug. 24

The City of Dover, along with the towns of Rollinsford, Lee and Madbury, will hold a Hazardous Waste Collection Day on Saturday, Aug. 24, 2024, from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., at the City's Community Services facility, 271 Mast Road.

The goal of Hazardous Waste Collection Day is to allow for the proper disposal of household hazardous materials. Residents of the four communities can bring household hazardous waste to Community Services for safe disposal.

The following household waste will be accepted: fertilizer with acids; bathroom cleaners; brush cleaner; pesticides; car waxes/polish; disinfectants; corrosives; fungicides; creosote; furniture polish paint/stain/finish; insect spray; driveway sealers/tar; metal polish (lead and oil-based); lighter fluid; flea powder; mothballs; rust preventatives; pest strips/traps; gasoline; oven cleaners; solvents; pesticides; radiator flush; photo chemicals; thinner/turpentine; poisons; roofing tar; rug cleaner; wood preservatives; pool chemicals; and wood strippers. Empty containers are not hazardous. Please dispose of them in your regular trash.

Explosives, asbestos, batteries, fluorescent bulbs, propane tanks, latex paint, waste oil and antifreeze will not be accepted.

Hazardous Waste Collection Day is for residents only. Proof of residency is required.
