


Budget adoption schedule and amended term sheet agreement on Council's agenda

The City Council will two hold public hearings at its Wednesday, Aug. 24 meeting. The first is on a proposal to move up the city's annual budget adoption date; the second is on a proposed amendment to the to term sheet agreement on a public-private partnership to develop land on Littleworth Road, which the City Council authorized in February.

Proposed budget adoption date change

The City Council seeks to move the annual budget adoption date from June 15 to April 15. According to the resolution's background materials, "an earlier budget submission and adoption provides better certainty to public employees and Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday: 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. avoids the unnecessary issuance of notices of nonrenewal to teachers." By contract, Dover's public school teachers must be notified that their contract will not be renewed for the next school year by April 15.

With the current budget adoption date of June 15, the School Board may issue a nonrenewal notice to teachers if it's unclear whether cuts to the school budget will be required. However, these notices may be unnecessary once the City Council adopts a final budget. During the interim, the school district says there is employment uncertainty for these teachers, which may harm employee retention. Amendment to public-private partnership term sheet agreement

The City Council, on Feb. 23, 2022, approved a term sheet agreement with business entities Terra Nova, LLC. and Westfield, LLC, authorizing the City Manager to negotiate a detailed development agreement based on the term sheet agreement for two parcels of land on Littleworth Road. Both entities are registered to Dover resident and developer Chad Kageleiry.

Terra Nova Properties, LLC, owns 75 acres at Tax Map, Lot 29. Westfield LLC owns 85 acres of land at Tax Map G, Lot 2. According to the term-sheet agreement approved in February, the two parcels of land "will bring significant tax revenues and jobs" to the city through a "planned mixed-use development with residential, commercial and industrial/manufacturing components." All planned developments would be required to go through the normal planning process and obtain all necessary permits and approvals.

The City of Dover would reimburse the developer for public improvements to the project sites, such as the cost of building a road and needed public utilities, such as water and sewer. Part of the project would be to build a road that connects Crosby Road and Industrial Park Drive. The agreement stipulates the city would not make payments for the public improvements until developments are complete and the owner is contributing property taxes to the city. The term-sheet agreement allows for payments in phases as parts of the project are completed. The city plans to finance the reimbursement costs through bonding, with bonding costs paid from the property taxes generated by the new development.

The proposed amendments to the term sheet agreement would allow the developer to utilize a city-owned lot adjacent to the developer's property located off Tolend Road. The city would convey that parcel, Map G, Lot 19B, to the developer in exchange for an approximate equivalent acreage in conservation buffers and the creation of 80 units priced at or below U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) guidelines, according to background materials. The HUD housing would not be required to be on the parcel but somewhere at the development or Kageleriy's other development at Pointe Place. The buffer would create at least 150 feet of natural vegetated space between the city-owned land to be conveyed and the Wyndbrook neighborhood, which includes Sandras Run and Stocklan Circle. Similar buffers would be provided to Lucy Lane, Wallace Drive and Columbus Avenue.

Another proposed amendment would change the annual bond cost requirement, and the require repayment of public improvements on an accelerated basis in keeping with tax revenues the city receives.

The proposed amendments to the term sheet agreement are included in the City Council's agenda materials, <u>available here</u>, with the meeting's complete agenda.

The meeting will be held at 7 p.m. in Room 306 of the McConnell Center, as the elevator at City Hall remains out of order.

City Clerk mailing notices of polling location changes ahead of Sept. 13 primary

After redistricting, some residents may be changing wards and polling locations

Polling places for Wards 2, 3, 4 and 5 are now at new locations, which will be used starting with the upcoming Primary Election on Tuesday, Sept. 13.

The City Clerk will mail notices to voters affected by polling location changes. Residents' polling location depends on where they live in Dover, as the city is broken into six wards or electoral districts.

- Ward 2 Dover Ice Arena, 110 Portland Ave.

- Ward 4 Garrison School, 50 Garrison Road
- Ward 5 Dover Middle School, 16 Daley Drive
- Ward 6 Hellenic Center, 219 Long Hill Road.

Wards boundaries updated after 2020 Census

In addition to new polling locations, some voters now reside in new wards after the City Council <u>updated ward boundaries by ordinance</u> on Feb. 9, 2022. The ward boundaries were revised following the results of the 2020 Census. The City Clerk previously mailed notices to voters affected by the ward boundary changes.


Information about upcoming elections

The <u>2022 Primary Election</u> will be on Tuesday, Sept. 13, 2022, and the <u>2022 General Election</u> on Tuesday, Nov. 8, 2022. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. on both days.

Sample ballots are posted to the <u>2022 Primary Election webpage</u> for each ward. The sample ballots for the General Election will not be available until a few weeks after the Primary Election.

Absentee ballots for the Primary Election are now available at the City Clerk's Office. Voters may also apply for an absentee ballot for the General Election.

Downtown Central Avenue to be paved in the coming weeks

Work to occur overnight due to traffic

The downtown corridor of Central Avenue will be milled and repaved as part of the city's 2022 paving program, anticipated to occur in September, weather pending. The city will announce the start time once the date is set.

The work will occur overnight and will be noisy. It involves grinding the existing pavement and installing a new layer of pavement.

City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr. <u>updated the City Council about the work</u> at its Aug. 10 meeting and apologized to the residents nearby for the noise and inconvenience of the required night work.

"It truly needs to be done at night because we need to curtail the traffic on the main corridor through the city," Joyal said about the work. "The machinery that will be used would not be safe to operate with heavy volumes of traffic."

The milling and paving on Central Avenue will be from the railroad tracks to Hale Street, adjacent to City Hall. Central Avenue will also be repaved between Glenwood Avenue and Weeks Lane. The City Manager misstated the section of Central Avenue to be repaved during his City Council update.

The following events are from a variety of historical records, sources and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, <u>located here</u>.

Aug. 19, 1788 — A violent hurricane destroyed hundreds of acres of woodland in New Hampshire, including Dover. The hurricane also blew off the roofs of many barns and caused significant damage to other buildings and property. The hurricane had earlier left parts of New York flooded and in ruins.


Aug. 19, 1806 — Mr. Watson, while tinloading a gundalow in the evening, accidentally fell overboard and was drowned.

Aug. 20, 1820 — There was a severe drought this summer, which, in addition to a scourge of grasshoppers, destroyed many crops, including corn and potatoes.

Aug. 19, 1931 — Frank Tuttle, the First Assistant Engineer of the Dover Fire Department (before it was known as Dover Fire & Rescue), was confined to his home after being severely injured when the "chemical" truck on which he was riding to a fire scene, hit a bump that bounced him into the air. Despite injuries to his entire body, he was able to hold onto a guard rail with one hand, preventing what officials said would have likely been a fatal fall.

Aug. 20, 2003 — Coastal Living Magazine features Dover as part of its, "So you want to live

in..." column, showcasing one community in each issue as a desirable place to live. Dover was described as a charming, history-rich, former mill town reborn in a "high-tech makeover." The magazine also stated, "...it's a mill town scrubbed and polished with amenities such as forsythia-lined walkways along the Cocheco."



The Art Center presents 'Images of the Past: The Thom Hindle Collection'

In celebration of the upcoming 400th anniversary of the founding of Dover in 1623, The Art Center is pleased to present "Images of the Past: The Thom Hindle Collection". This insightful, historically significant exhibition is dedicated to the rich history of Dover, New Hampshire and the surrounding areas.

Thom Hindle, the curator of this collection has an avid interest in history and photography. He discovered early photographers work of the city that consisted of glass plate negatives, photographers' notebooks, and antique cameras. In the last 50 years over 100,000 of these objects have been studiously preserved by Hindle and stored in a climate-controlled environment. This immense collection now includes not only images from Dover's past but also Rochester, Farmington, Concord and Massachusetts, as well as Maine, Vermont and New York.

Throughout the month of September, The Art Center will feature photographs never exhibited before. Hindle reproduced these from original glass negatives representing the works of local and Boston area photographers. Focusing this exhibit on the years 1900 through the 1950s, Hindle chose to display a variety of themes. Vintage images of Dover, Rochester and Portsmouth are set along with exquisite "Portraits" including families, children. "Transportation" surges with images of street cars, trains, bicycles, motorcycles and even an old Jenny airplane at Hampton Beach. The 1939 World's Fair, Washington DC in the 1920s, fish shanties at Ogunquit, clam shacks at Joppa Flats and more are explored in "Travel". Early swimming costumes, the original Farragut Hotel in Rye and the Nubble Light and Bell Tower from the 1930s are all in the section "On The Beach". "Camping-Fishing" will be of particular interest to the outdoorsmen and women who want to see how old-fashioned camps were set up and what gear was used by both fishermen and hunters back in the day.

Hindle is also a noted author. "Dover a Century of Change" was published in 1994, "Tri-City Memories" published 2014, "Factory on Fire" published in 2017 and "Dover, N.H. Through Time" which was published in 2020.


An Evening with Thom Hindle Book Signing

Dover's Richard Hutchins earns excellence award from Fish and Game Commission

The New Hampshire Fish and Game Commission recently honored several individuals with the 2021 Commission Awards of Excellence for outstanding efforts in the conservation field in support of the New Hampshire Fish and Game Department's mission.

Among those honored was Richard Hutchins of Dover, who received the Ellis Hatch, Jr. Commission Award of Excellence.

Hutchins has been an active volunteer for over 20 years and involved in many organizations including the Great Bay Chapter of Trout Unlimited, the Three Rivers Stocking Association, NH Fish and Game's Aquatic Resources Education Trout in the Classroom (TIC) Program, and 4H. As the President and founding member of Three Rivers he has spent literally hundreds of hours fundraising and coordinating to provide fishing opportunities on the seacoast of New Hampshire. Hutchins also recently helped Three Rivers partner with Northeast Passage to create a Project Healing Waters Chapter, an organization dedicated to the physical and emotional rehabilitation of disabled active military personnel and veterans through fly fishing and other outdoor activities.

With Great Bay Trout Unlimited he has served on the Board of Directors, worked with schools on raising trout and for release into local stream with TIC, as well as the River Clean-Up Days where GBTU members work to remove trash from local rivers and streams. Hutchins also loves to teach people about fly fishing. He has taught many 4H kids attending summer camp at the University of New Hampshire. He is happy to share his knowledge of fly fishing and love of the outdoors whenever he gets the chance.

Other award winners for 2021 were David Roby, Sr. of Lyme, who received the Habitat Stewardship Award of Excellence; and Jack Dalton of Manchester, who received the Youth Conservationist Award of Excellence.

Public feedback sought on Fifth and Grove project

before work begins on final design

The City of Dover seeks public feedback through a brief survey to help guide design work for the Fifth Street and Grove Street Reconstruction Project.

The survey questions include questions about the layout of sidewalks, trees, use of sump pumps, water ponding issues and whether property owners in the project area seek modifications of their driveway curb cut.

The reconstruction project includes the replacement of water mains and stormwater drainage; repairing or replacing sections of the sanitary sewer line; reconstruction of Fifth Street; restoration of Grove Street; and sidewalks on both sides of the street, among other work.
