Dover Night Out is Tuesday

Chief William M. Breault of the Dover Police Department is pleased to announce that the Dover Police Department will participate in National Night Out on Tuesday, Aug. 6, 2019 in Henry Law Park. The event will take place from 4:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. and is free to the public. National Night Out is a time for community members to meet with police officers, discuss issues, learn what the police do, and unite with the common goal of crime prevention and safety. The public will be able to see some of the specialized equipment and vehicles that the police use on a daily basis. These will include a police cruiser, the police motorcycle, the crime scene and mobile command vehicles along with our tactical rescue vehicle. Several officers including the mounted patrol and our K9 officer will be at the event and interacting with the public. National Night Out will also feature firefighters and fire apparatus from the Dover Fire and Rescue Department.

"The Dover Police Department recognizes the importance of getting to know the members of our community and the value of positive police-community partnerships," said Chief Breault. "National Night Out is an excellent opportunity for police officers, firefighters and community members to meet and interact. This goes a long way toward solving community problems together."

There will also be community organizations on hand to provide literature and other information related to health, safety, and wellness. Information on drug prevention, treatment and recovery resources, and violence prevention will be available to the public through various booths at the event. Chestnut Street closure in effect Monday and Tuesday

On Monday, Aug. 5 and Tuesday, Aug. 6, between 7 a.m. and 5 p.m., Chestnut Street will be closed in the northerly direction between Locust and Washington streets. Northbound traffic will be diverted to remain on Locust Street. Chestnut Street will still be open in the southbound direction.

Northbound traffic seeking access to Saint Thomas Street, the McConnell Center north entrances, and the District Court will be required to detour around the block to approach from the southbound direction.

The closure will allow SUR Construction and Fulcrum Construction to prepare the Chestnut Street sidewalks on Monday and pour concrete on Tuesday. The work is in connection with the Orpheum Apartments development project.

Dover, surrounding towns to hold Hazardous Waste Collection Day

The City of Dover, along with the towns of Rollinsford, Lee and Madbury, will hold a Hazardous Waste Collection Day on Saturday, Aug. 24, 2019, from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., at the City's Community Services facility, 271 Mast Road.

The goal of Hazardous Waste Collection Day is to allow for the proper disposal of household hazardous materials. Residents of the four communities can bring household hazardous waste to Community Services for safe disposal.

The following household waste will be accepted: fertilizer with acids; bathroom cleaners; brush cleaner; pesticides car waxes/polish; disinfectants; corrosives; fungicides; creosote; furniture polish paint/stain/finish; insect spray; driveway sealers/tar; metal polish (lead and oil based); lighter fluid; flea powder; mothballs; rust preventative; pest strips/traps; gasoline; oven cleaner; solvents; pesticides; radiator flush; photo chemicals; thinner/turpentine; poisons; roofing tar; rug cleaner; wood preservatives; pool chemicals; and wood strippers.

Empty containers are not hazardous. Please dispose of them in your regular trash.

Explosives, asbestos, latex paint, oil (new or used) and antifreeze will not be accepted.

Hazardous Waste Collection Day in Dover is for household residents only. Proof of residency is required.

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, located here.



Aug. 2, 1644 - It was ordered by the Court that Elisabeth, wife of Mathew Giles, be whipped or redeemed with a fine of 20 shillings for reviling words against some of the members of the church.

Aug. 5, 1793 - Last Wednesday evening, at 8 o'clock a fiery meteor of uncommon size was seen in Dover and neighboring places. Its apparent diameter when first observed was small but increased until it appeared larger than the sun.



Aug. 3, 1829 - James G. Avery, a young man in the employ of the Manufacturing Company, fell from the Dry House, a distance of about 40 feet, surviving the accident but a few hours.

Aug. 4, 1858 - The City Council appointed a committee to confer with the Manufacturing Co. respecting a lease to the city of their land on Cochecho River, known as the "Grove," for a public park; the city to lay out walks and ornament it with shrubbery, etc.

The next tour is Aug. 3 and departs from the Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce parking lot. Take a guided stroll down Central Avenue and the Central Business District, learn all about the rise and fall of the textile industry and Dover's Black Day while hearing personal tales of Dover's history.

Dover resident to speak about his new book on Seacoast area history

The Dover Public Library is pleased to announce that Dover author, Terry Nelson will be speaking at the library about his history book about the New Hampshire Seacoast area on Tuesday, Aug. 6 at 6:30 p.m. The New Hampshire Seacoast has a wealth of overlooked history. Some remnants are hidden in plain sight, and others are just plain hidden. Meet the minister and early religious founder who was involved in an armed confrontation in Dover with another preacher in 1640. Find out how a onetime high



school assistant principal in Rochester became a worldfamous business leader and ended up meeting President Grover Cleveland. Discover the story of "ghost" racetracks in Somersworth before they disappear, as well as the "pile of rocks" that stopped a multimillion-dollar building project in Windham. Author Terry Nelson reveals some of New England's most fascinating history, from Durham and Madbury to North Hampton and Portsmouth.

Terry Nelson was an educator for 40 years. His last position before retiring was as an assistant principal for Southside Middle School in Manchester. He is a member of the Manchester Historical Association; Woodman Museum; New Hampshire Archeological Society; and the Council for British Archaeology. He and his wife, Barbara, live in Dover with their little dog, Ellie.
