Hazardous Waste Collection Day for Dover, surrounding towns is Saturday

The City of Dover, along with the towns of Rollinsford, Lee and Madbury, will hold a Hazardous Waste Collection Day this Saturday, Aug. 26, 2023, from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., at the City's Community Services facility, 271 Mast Road.

The goal of Hazardous Waste Collection Day is to allow for the proper disposal of household hazardous materials. Residents of the four communities can bring household hazardous waste to Community Services for safe disposal.

The following household waste will be accepted: fertilizer with acids; bathroom cleaners; brush cleaner; pesticides; car waxes/polish; disinfectants; corrosives; fungicides; creosote; furniture polish paint/stain/finish; insect spray; driveway sealers/tar; metal polish (lead and oil-based); lighter fluid; flea powder; mothballs; rust preventatives; pest strips/traps; gasoline; oven cleaners; solvents; pesticides; radiator flush; photo chemicals; thinner/turpentine; poisons; roofing tar; rug cleaner; wood preservatives; pool chemicals; and wood strippers.

Recycling Center hours:

Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday: 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Empty containers are not hazardous. Please dispose of them in your regular trash.

Explosives, asbestos, batteries, fluorescent bulbs, propane tanks, latex paint, waste oil, and antifreeze will not be accepted.

Hazardous Waste Collection Day in Dover is for household residents only. Proof of residency is required.

Paving operations on Old Garrison Road to begin Monday

Weather permitting, the city's paving contractor, Continental Paving, Inc., will begin paving operations on the Class V section of Old Garrison Road on Monday, Aug. 28. The Class V section runs from Rabbit Road to near the driveway entrances of 289 and 293 Old Garrison Road. The Class VI section of the road will remain unpaved.

The contractor will begin with scarifying the road, followed by grading. City personnel will be onsite to monitor and ensure proper drainage will be maintained along the roadway. The intent is to keep a consistent paved width of 14 feet along the entire stretch of road, closely matching the current travel surface, said Community Services Director John Storer.

Depending on weather conditions, the contractor could begin paving as early as Tuesday, Aug. 29, and finish by Wednesday, Aug. 30. Only the structural binder-course of pavement will get installed this year. City staff will monitor conditions over the winter to see if any settlement occurs and if any shimming or drainage issues need to be addressed. A final surface course will be applied in either spring or summer of 2024.

The City Council voted 6-3 at its Aug. 23 meeting to authorize paving on Old Garrison Road, designated a Scenic Road by the City of Dover. Click here to watch the Council's discussion.

City upgrading parking meters to pay-byplate system

Users no longer have to display receipts in their vehicles

The city is switching its on-street parking meters to a pay-by-plate system, where paper receipts on a vehicle dashboard are no longer needed in most instances.

"This makes the parking system easier, especially on snowy or rainy days," said Parking Manager Bill Simons. "You don't have to put your receipt back in the car. You just pay for your parking time and head to your destination."

About 25% of the city's parking meters have been switched to the new system, where users enter their vehicle's license plate number into the parking meter. The remaining ones, including ones in the downtown core of Central Avenue, will be switched over in the next couple of weeks. Pay-by-plate meters have a bright yellow sign on the top reminding users that they need to enter their license plate. The only time when a dashboard receipt is required is when there is a cell tower issue. In that case, the parking meter kiosk will notify the user to display the parking receipt on the vehicle's dashboard.

In addition to not displaying a receipt, the pay-by-plate system also allows users to extend their parking time – as long as the parking meter where they are adding time is on the same street as their vehicle. Motorists using the Flowbird pay-by-phone app can enter and extend their parking time anywhere.

The parking meters accept coins and credit cards. They do not accept dollar bills.

ROAD CLOSURES NEXT WEEK

Section of Glenwood Avenue to be closed Monday and Tuesday

Glenwood Avenue will be closed at Smith Well Road next week to allow a city contractor to complete utility work in the intersection. Motorists will be detoured around the work area.

The shutdown is Monday, Aug. 28, and Tuesday, Aug. 29, from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Traffic will be detoured around the work area via Horne Street and Glencrescent Avenue.

Daytime water shutoff for Smith Well Road residents on Monday

To allow utility work, water service is scheduled to be shut off to Smith Well Road and Barry Street on Monday, Aug. 26, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The utility work is related to the construction of the Smith Well water tank.

Southbound New Rochester Road traffic detour on Tuesday

On Tuesday, Aug. 28, at 7 a.m., southbound New Rochester Road (Route 108) traffic will be closed between Willand Avenue and Hotel Drive to allow utility work excavation related to the Copper Drive residential development. The actual point of excavation is near 36-38 New Rochester Road.

Depending on conditions, the closure will continue all day and may extend through 7 p.m.

Southbound New Rochester Road traffic will be detoured around the work area via Willand Avenue, Old Rochester Road, and Hotel Drive. Northbound traffic will travel through the work area.

Motorists should anticipate brief delays in both directions. Traffic control personnel will be stationed to help assist the flow of traffic.

This continuation of work began on Wednesday but had to be suspended due to unforeseen issues during excavation.



'Voices of Dover' series: Mark Leno

Dover400's "Voices of Dover" oral history video series continues this week with an interview with retired Dover Police Officer and historian Mark Leno. Leno shares insights into the city's history and his experiences serving 26 years on the police force.

In his interview, Leno discusses Dover's textile mill history, urban renewal efforts in the 1960s and 1970s, and his passion for researching and writing books about local history. He also reflects on his time walking the beat downtown as a new officer in the 1980s and helping launch community policing efforts.

Produced by the Dover400 Committee to celebrate the city's 400th anniversary in 2023, the "Voices of Dover" series features interviews with residents reminiscing about Dover's past and present. The interviews aim to preserve local history and residents' connections to the community.

The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information located here.

Aug. 27, 1761 — The town voted to build a new bridge over the Cochecho River in place of the old one, the latter "not being fit to repair on any account so as to be passable for man or horse." Three thousand pounds were raised to build the bridge.


Aug. 28, 1797 — Dover voted to allow Dr. Jacob Kittredge to open a hospital to innoculate for smallpox, and that the selectmen, with Dr. Ezra Green and William Hale, be a committee to oversee when it should be opened and closed.

Aug. 28, 1830 — John Parker Hale of Dover was admitted to practice as an attorney on this

day. Hale would later become a prominent politician and vocal opponent of slavery. As a politician, Hale initially represented the Democratic Party in the U.S. House of Representatives (1843–1845) and later became a U.S. Senator (1847–1853, 1855–1865) as a member of the Free Soil Party and subsequently the Republican Party. One of Hale's defining moments was his break with the Democratic Party over the issue of slavery. This made him the Free Soil Party's presidential nominee in 1852. Though he didn't win, his candidacy signified a crucial shift in the American political landscape for the abolitionist movement. Throughout his political career, Hale consistently advocated for the abolition of slavery, demonstrating a commitment to human rights and the principles of freedom.

Aug. 25, 1846 — The shock of an earthquake was felt in many places throughout Dover. To those indoors, it sounded "like a carriage driven violently over the ground, or the departure of a heavy train of railroad cars, for which it was at the time by many mistaken."

Aug. 26, 1997 — The Dover Planning Board voted to approve a 35,000-square-foot expansion by Cramer Fabrics Inc. on Venture Drive at Enterprise Park. Cramer Fabrics, an industrial fabric producer whose parent company is in Europe, began operations at the Venture Drive plant in 1994. The company still operates at its Venture Drive facility in Dover.



'The Bear' by Andrew Krivak is New Hampshire's Big Read Book

A discussion of The Bear, by Andrew Krivak, will be led by NH Humanities scholar Kiki Berk. Berk is an associate professor of philosophy at Southern New Hampshire University. She received her Ph.D. in philosophy from the VU University Amsterdam in 2010. Her current research interests include value theory (especially happiness), analytic existentialism (especially the meaning of life), and the philosophy of death.

Deadline approaching to order bricks for Dover Veterans Park in time for Veterans Day

The Recreation Department will order another round of engraved bricks for Dover Veterans Park to be added for Veterans Day on Nov. 11. The deadline to have bricks included in that order is Thursday, Aug. 31, at 4 p.m.

Orders collected after the deadline through Feb. 28, 2024, will be sent in the next batch to be installed in the park by Memorial Day. The cost is \$100 for an 8-inch by 8-inch brick and \$50 for a 4-inch by 8-inch brick. The only requirement to have a name engraved is for the person to be a veteran. All bricks are engraved consistently with a full name, military rank and branch, and years of service and/or conflict. Upon request, bricks may also be grouped by family or service time.
