New parking hours and rates begin Tuesday, Sept. 3

Dover Police Chief William M. Breault announces new public parking hours and rates will take effect Tuesday, Sept. 3, 2019. The changes follow recommendations by the Parking Commission, based on months of public input, and a vote to adopt the changes by the City Council in July.

Beginning Tuesday, Sept. 3, metered public parking hours are Monday through Saturday, 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. The changes include extending the hours of metered parking from 7 p.m. to 8 p.m. and adding Saturday.

In addition, progressive parking rates will take effect Sept. 3 at most public parking locations and surface lots. The first two hours of parking remain unchanged at \$1 per hour. The third and fourth hours of metered public parking will be \$2 per hour. Metered parking after four hours will be \$3 per hour. Progressive pricing does not include the Orchard Street

Public Parking Garage, Chestnut Street lot and the Transportation Center lot, where existing hourly rates will remain in effect.

"Part of the challenge of adding Saturdays was that during the weekday, there was a three-hour time limit," said Parking Manager Bill Simons. "Having a time limit on Saturdays, when the average visit could be much longer, didn't make sense. Combining the need for a longer visit option and a consistent parking policy throughout the week led to the progressive pricing program."

Simons added the changes were partly in response to meetings with downtown business owners. Because downtown employees were parking in front of their respective businesses, fewer spaces remained for customers. Other vehicles were parked in public spaces beginning Friday night and through the weekend. Simons said progressive pricing and Saturday hours are designed to open up additional spaces for visitors and customers, and decrease daylong parking.

"We expect these changes will have no effect on the vast majority people who use on-street public parking, 85 percent of whom stay less than two hours per visit," Simons said. "Those looking to park for more than two hours in one location are encouraged to use the parking garage or seek less expensive, all-day options."

In addition to the on-street meters, there are several convenient payment options for motorists parking in Dover, including EasyPark, which allows for the electronic purchase of parking without the need to visit a meter; permits for long-term and residential parking; discounted tokens; and more. 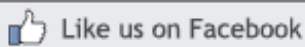

Road closures, parking restrictions in place Saturday for road race

Dover Police Chief William Breault announces the following road closures and parking restrictions for the Cochecho Challenge Half Marathon footrace.

On Saturday, Aug. 31, 2019 at 8:30 a.m., the 3.1 and 13.1-mile footraces will begin simultaneously on Central Avenue, near Silver Street, and will end in the parking lot of First Parish Church. Brief street closures will be in effect on Central Avenue, Silver Street, and Arch Street to accommodate the 8:30 a.m. start. Additional street closures will be in effect on Silver Street, near Arch Street, for the 5K race. Motorists should expect and give way to runners wearing numbered race bibs on any Dover roadway between 8:30 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. These include Washington Street, Tolend Road, Glen Hill Road, County Farm Cross Road, Sixth Street, Glenwood Avenue, Horne Street, Fourth Street, Atkinson Street, and Nelson Street.

Church Street will be closed to all traffic between Locust and

Academy streets between 8 a.m. and 12 p.m.

Parking restrictions will be posted in the following locations on Saturday, Aug. 31:

- Sixth Street, even-numbered side only, between Horne and Grove streets;
- Washington Street, even-numbered side only, between Arch and Atkinson streets;
- Fourth Street, both sides from Grove Street westerly to the Cochecho River;
- Church Street, both sides between Locust and Academy streets.

This event is organized by First Parish Congregational Church, the oldest parish in Dover, and will raise funds to help sustain the church's various charitable programs. The half marathon course is USA Track and Field Certified and includes a footbridge crossing the Cochecho River. Spaulding Turnpike's Exit 6 to close for one day on Wednesday, Sept. 4

The New Hampshire Department of Transportation (NHDOT) announces a temporary one-day closure of the Exit 6 Southbound Off Ramp on the Spaulding Turnpike (NH 16) in Dover.

On Wednesday, Sept. 4, 2019 the Spaulding Turnpike (NH

16) Exit 6 Southbound Off Ramp will be closed to traffic to facilitate the construction of a new drainage pipe across the ramp. Motorists travelling southbound on the Spaulding Turnpike (NH 16) wishing to utilize the Exit 6 Southbound Off Ramp are asked to continue south to the Exit 4 Southbound Off Ramp and reverse direction onto the Northbound Spaulding Turnpike (NH 16) to Exit 6 where they can access U.S. Route 4 via the Exit 6 Northbound Off Ramp.

The ramp will be closed beginning at approximately 9 a.m. and is expected to be re-opened to traffic at 5 p.m.

Adverse weather conditions would delay this work to the next available day.

The work is part of the Newington-Dover 11238Q project. Severino Trucking Company, Inc. of Candia, New Hampshire is the prime contractor for the \$67 million project, which is scheduled to be completed in October 2020.

Public hearings set for state's Ten Year Transportation Plan

First of 20 hearings to be held in Dover

The Governor's Advisory Commission on Intermodal Transportation (GACIT) will hold 20 public hearings across New Hampshire to review and receive input on the update of the State's Ten Year Transportation Improvement Plan (2021-2030). The series of public hearings will begin on Sept. 10 in Dover and conclude on Oct. 28 in Kingston.

The public hearing in Dover will be held at the McConnell Center cafeteria on Tuesday, Sept. 10, at 6 p.m.

The purpose of these public hearings is to receive public comments/testimony on transportation projects and priorities included in the draft 2021-2030 Plan as recommended by the New Hampshire Department of Transportation to GACIT.

Filing period for municipal election opens Sept. 9

Ribbon-cutting ceremony to celebrate solar panel installation at Dover High School

A ribbon-cutting ceremony to celebrate the installation of 2,581 solar panels atop the new Dover High School will be held on Thursday, Sept. 19, from 4 to 5 p.m., at the school, located at 25 Alumni Drive.

ReVision Energy recently completed the installation of the rooftop solar array, the largest in the company's history. The project includes 2,581 solar panels. The project was unanimously approved by the Dover City Council last year.

The solar array has a useful lifespan of 40 years and will generate over 1,000 megawatt-hours of electricity each year, offsetting roughly 40 percent of the school's electric load. The solar power generated by the array is equivalent to offsetting 558 tons of carbon pollution each year or the annual electricity use of 88 homes or the carbon sequestered by 600 acres of forests.

ReVision Energy's agreement with the City of Dover includes an educational initiative aimed at teaching students how solar energy works and exposing students to the various functions involved in the engineering, electrical, and marketing aspects of the project.

According to Dover Energy Commission member Zachary Koehler, "This project has the potential to ignite the imaginations of current and future students. I am hopeful that this array will intrigue students to learn more about this technology and entice them to utilize the educational possibilities they have at Dover High School and the Career Technical Center."

The City of Dover also partnered with ReVision Energy on the installation of rooftop solar arrays at the Children's Museum of New Hampshire and adjacent Dover Indoor Pool. ReVision Energy donated 103 solar panels for the installation, part of a

318-panel solar array at the museum and pool which share a common electricity meter. The rooftop projects installed on the museum and indoor pool are owned by ReVision Solar Impact Partners (RSIPs).

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

Sept. 2, 1812 - A meeting of sundry persons from almost all the towns in the county of Strafford was held in Dover and it was voted "to call a public meeting of the friends of peace who disapprove of the present premature, impolitic and unnecessary war, at Gilmanton, on the 7th of October to take into consideration the present alarming state of our public affairs and to adopt such prudent legal and constitutional measures as will most effectually promote the interests, welfare and honor of the nation. All persons of the foregoing description were requested punctually to attend." The notice was signed by "Moses Hodgdon, Secretary for Com. of Arrangements." The meeting was held at Gilmanton as notified and largely attended, some 3,000 persons being present. Resolutions and an address in opposition to Madison and the war were adopted, and candidates for Presidential Electors and Members of Congress nominated. Among the latter was Daniel Webster, who, with the other candidates on the Federal ticket, was subsequently elected. New Hampshire at this election voted for DeWitt Clinton giving him 8 votes to 0 for James Madison. The vote of Dover was 236 for Clinton, 87 for Madison.




Aug. 31, 1827 - Died at Brunswick, Maine, at the residence of his son, Col. John Waldron, aged 87, a native and life long


resident of Dover. He was a Colonel in the Army of the Revolution, marching his Regiment of 700 men whom he had himself enlisted, to Cambridge when the war broke out. He was prominent also in civil affairs, having served as moderator of town meetings about 30 years in succession, and represented the town and district in both branches of the Legislature.



Aug. 30, 1851 - The Cochecho Railroad was opened from Farmington to Alton Bay, and the steamer Dover, which was built this year, commenced running from Alton Bay to Wolfeboro and Center Harbor.



Sept. 4, 1862 - Died, Col. Andrew Peirce, aged 77. He was born in Portsmouth Dec. 18, 1785, but nearly all his life was a resident of Dover, having filled, during his active and eminently useful life, almost every office in the gift of his fellow citizens. He was Speaker of the Legislature in 1823; Senator of the 5th District in 1825 and 1826; Counselor in 1827 and 1828; and in 1850 was a member of the Convention which was called to revise the Constitution of the State. When Dover was incorporated as a city, Col. Peirce, as an honor especially due him, was elected its first Mayor. For eighteen years he served as Clerk of the Strafford Courts, and for a term of years was Cashier and President of the Dover Bank. Of the First Congregational Church he was a Deacon for 24 years. In politics Col. Peirce was originally a Republican, and with that ardent love for his country which characterized his life and was breathed in his latest prayers, he, as Captain, led his company into the field on the occasion of Portsmouth being threatened in the war of 1812. As a Christian he was earnest and sincere. His Christianity has ever been the operative principle of his public life, which has been characterized by not less ability than purest patriotism and most ardent devotion to the public good. No man can say that as a public officer, or as an agent in any business, he has ever manifested less of interest than in the administration of his own private affairs, or treated himself better than he has treated any other individual. As a neighbor, it is only necessary to say that his neighbors are all mourners, and his name is spoken with affection by the widow and orphan. To say, after all this, that he was the kindest of husbands and fathers, would be to multiply words. Peace to his ashes. When shall we see his like again? (Dover Enquirer)



Sept. 3, 1864 - Died, Michael Read, Esq. aged 86. A native and always a resident of Dover, and taking a lively interest in its local affairs, he was probably more familiar with them than any other person in town. In his boyhood he listened to the preaching of Dr. Belknap who left Dover in 1786; he witnessed the execution of Elisha Thomas in 1788; and attended the sessions of the General Court which sat here in the old Court House in 1793. He could remember when Dover Landing was a Common, covered in part with trees - when the "great house" of the Waldrons occupied Franklin Square in solitary grandeur, and their possessions monopolized all the territory in that part of the town; when the Coffins owned what the Waldrons did not about Cochecho

falls, and when the populous city, which he lived to see grow up around them, contained not much more than a score of houses. (Dover Enquirer)

The Saturday morning walking tours begin at 10:30 a.m. Three different, 90-minute walking tours will be offered throughout the summer, and take place from one of three Dover locations as specified on the tour schedule.

The next tour is Sept. 7. The tour departs from the Woodman Museum and features information about construction, architectural techniques, and the historic significance of those who built or occupied these buildings, the earliest of which was constructed in 1785.

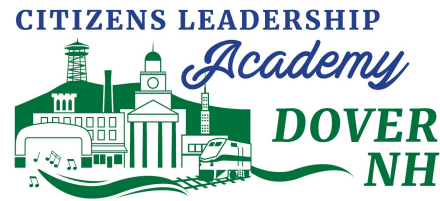

City assessors perform inspections year round

In addition to performing citywide assessments of property during revaluation, assessment inspections of properties occur for a number of additional reasons, including:

- Cycle inspections are conducted on a rotating basis, ensuring the property database is current and accurate. Notices for cycle inspections are sent out prior to the inspections;
- Properties with active building permits, or to follow-up ongoing construction;
- Properties that have sold, and;
- Properties with appointments arranged by the property owner.

When doing general field work, assessing inspectors wear a bright yellow vest and carry City of Dover identification. Assessing vehicles are marked with a magnetic sticker stating Assessor's Office.
