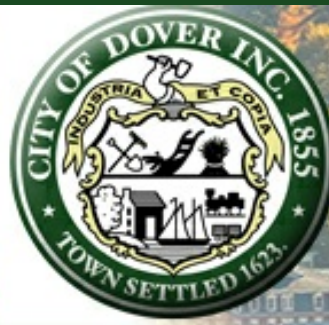

Coming up at the next City Council meeting

Paraeducators contract before City Council

Council to hold public hearings on stormwater system, emergency water interconnection

The City Council will meet for a regular meeting on Wednesday, Aug. 9, where it will hold three public hearings and consider authorizing the Dover School Department's paraeducators contract.

The School Board approved the three-year Dover Paraeducators' Association contract at a July 24 special meeting. If approved by the Council, the contract would be in effect from Sept. 1, 2023, through Aug. 31, 2026. According to the background materials, the agreement would not increase appropriations for fiscal year 2024 for the first year of the contract.

The three public hearings are on the following topics:

- Amending Chapter 145 Waste Management ordinance of the city codes to state that garbage left for private trash pickup may not be put curbside within the public right-of-way. The requested change, supported by the Solid Waste Advisory Committee, is due to city staff having

difficulty regulating curbside trash placed for private contractors, including instances where collection by private contractors interfered with snow removal and other activities.

- A resolution that appropriates \$3.5 million for an FY2024 Capital Improvements Program for the Henry Law Park Stormwater Best Management Practices planning project. The resolution would also authorize the city to finance this amount through the state's Clean Water State Revolving Fund. The project would construct a stormwater treatment system within Henry Law Park to provide pollutant removal and flow mitigation for the highly urbanized downtown area while also preparing for sea-level rise impacts and extreme high tide events. The construction of the system will be below grade to preserve open space in the heavily used park. The authorization requires a two-thirds majority vote, which will occur on Aug. 23, 2023.
- A resolution to allow additional bonding for the cost of the emergency water interconnection between the cities of Dover and Portsmouth, which would allow the New Hampshire Department of Transportation to move forward on a bid to replace the General Sullivan Bridge. The cities are planning for the interconnection during the bridge construction. For the interconnection to be included, the cities must show the NHDOT it has the authorization to pay for the estimated cost of the connection of \$2,376,627, the amount of bonding the City of Dover seeks through the resolution. The bonding is contingent on an executed cost-sharing agreement with the City of Portsmouth. The cities are planning for a federal grant to pay for the cost of the interconnection to improve regional water system resiliency. Dover City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr., told the Council on July 26 that the cities must show the NHDOT authorization of funding for the project to move forward; however, he noted the cities may choose not to go forward with the project at a later date. This authorization also requires a two-thirds majority vote, with a vote to occur on Aug. 23, 2023.

Registration now open for the 15th annual Apple Harvest Day 5k

The Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce announced this week that registration is open for the 2023 Apple Harvest Day 5k. Now in its 15th year, the Apple Harvest Day 5k will take place

on Saturday, Oct. 7, at 8:30 a.m., beginning and ending on St. Thomas Street in front of the Dover Circuit Courthouse. The USA Track and Field certified course winds through historic downtown Dover and is perfect for advanced runners, beginners, and families.

This year's race underwriter is Wentworth-Douglass Hospital, with support from Breezeline, Portsmouth Regional Hospital's Dover Emergency Room, Martel Plumbing and Heating, NEMO Equipment, and Northeast Delta Dental. Additional sponsorship opportunities are available.

Registration fees are \$30 for adults 21 and over and \$20 for runners under the age of 21. To register, visit dovernh.org/5k. Online registration closes on Oct. 4, and in-person registration will be available at the Chamber until Oct. 6 or on the day of the race at the start line. Fees after Oct. 4 are \$35 for runners 21 and over and \$25 for runners under 21. Cash prizes are awarded to the top finishers.

Before and during the race, runners and spectators can enjoy free coffee courtesy of New Hampshire Coffee Roasters. After the race, runners over the age of 21 will receive two complimentary pours of North Country Hard Cider, with non-alcoholic apple cider available for minors. Non-runners can purchase cider tokens for \$5 each.

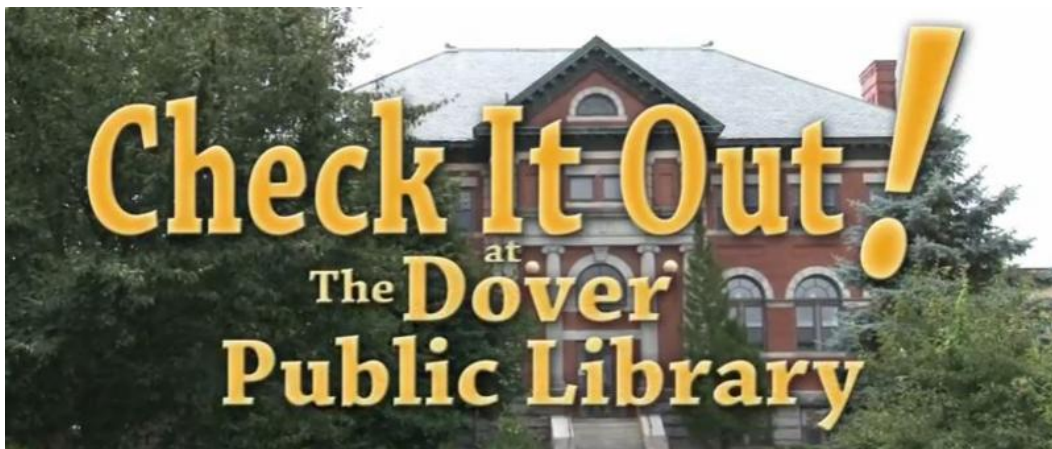
Aug. 7, 1661 — The Court ordered a committee be chosen from Dover and Portsmouth to determine the need for a bridge over the Cochecho River, suitable for horse and foot.

Aug. 7, 1826 — "A very heavy thunder shower, during which the house of Moses Hodgdon, Esq. on Silver street, was struck by lightning. A beautiful sycamore tree in front of the house received the electric fluid, an immense body of which ran down the trunk, ripping off the bark, a portion of the lightning entering the house by a limb of the tree. The house of Mr. John Evans, about 50 rods distant, was struck at the same instant: a man was struck to the floor, but recovered in a few minutes. About the same time, a barn belonging to Mr. Benjamin Kielle, about 2 1/2 miles from the village, was struck and considerably injured." A news report from the time

Aug. 8, 1828 — "Dover Society for the Promotion of Temperance" was formed on this day, the members pledging themselves to abstain entirely from the use of "ardent spirits, except for medicinal purposes." It was the first organization of its kind in Dover.

Aug. 6, 1940 — More than 400 workers at the rayon division of the Pacific Mills, who had been on strike for a week, voted to return to work on this day. More than half of the mills 800 workers, members of the Dover Independent Textile Workers, had been on strike for a week, claiming the mills had violated their union agreement by employing nonresidents. In announcing the return to work, the union's president, George Shery, said the union and management had struck a deal to provide more training to local workers.

Aug. 5, 1999 — A new Dover public schools superintendent, Armand LaSelva, started on this day. La Selva had previously served as superintendent of schools in Essex, Mass. LaSelva remained as Dover's superintendent until 2004.



WDH to host advance directive event at the Library

Wentworth-Douglass Hospital is hosting a free event to assist those interested in drafting an advanced directive.

The event will be held Wednesday, Sept. 20, from 1-4 p.m. at the Dover Public Library. Attendees will receive a 30-minute appointment with a social worker, who will assist in creating the document.

An advanced directive, commonly referred to as a living will, is a legal document that specifies what actions should be taken if a person can no longer make decisions for themselves – often because they have become seriously ill or otherwise incapacitated.

Those attending should bring their license, a list of proxies they would like to represent them, and contact information for all parties involved.

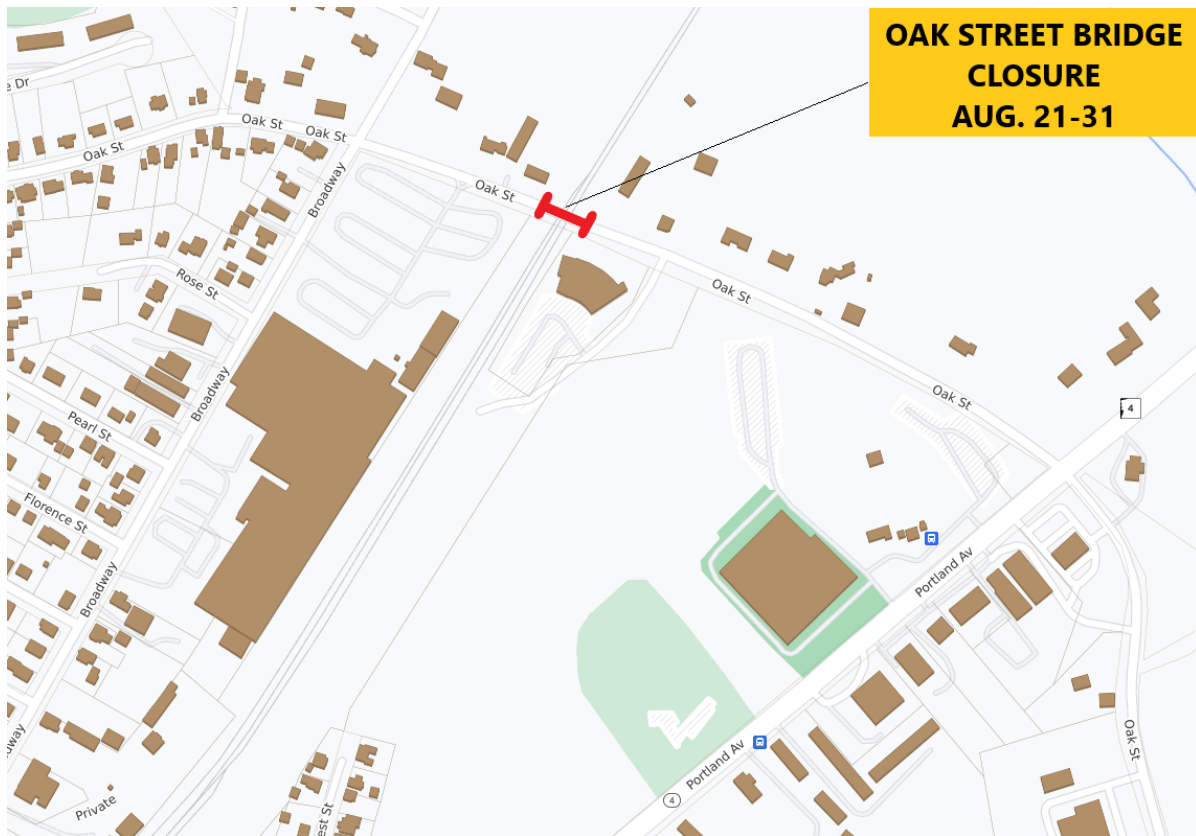

REMINDER: Oak Street railroad bridge to close for nearly two weeks later this month

The New Hampshire Department of Transportation will close the Oak Street bridge that crosses the railroad tracks between Portland Avenue and Broadway to all traffic for 11 days this month to make bridge repairs.

The NHDOT has scheduled the closure from Monday, Aug. 21, to Thursday, Aug. 31. Only the bridge will be closed. All nearby residents will retain access to their homes; access will also be available to Salmon Falls Stoneware. NHDOT began installing signage about the closure this week.

The repairs will allow the bridge to be used until it's replaced, currently scheduled for fiscal year 2027, according to the NHDOT's 2023-2032 Ten-Year Plan.

City of Dover and surrounding towns to hold Hazardous Waste Collection Day

The City of Dover, along with the towns of Rollinsford, Lee and Madbury, will hold a Hazardous Waste Collection Day on Saturday, Aug. 26, 2023, from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., at the City's Community Services facility, 271 Mast Road.

The goal of Hazardous Waste Collection Day is to allow for the proper disposal of household hazardous materials. Residents of the four communities can bring household hazardous waste to Community Services for safe disposal.

The following household waste will be accepted: fertilizer with acids; bathroom cleaners; brush cleaner; pesticides; car waxes/polish; disinfectants; corrosives; fungicides; creosote; furniture polish paint/stain/finish; insect spray; driveway sealers/tar; metal polish (lead and oil-based); lighter fluid; flea powder; mothballs; rust preventatives; pest strips/traps; gasoline; oven cleaners; solvents; pesticides; radiator flush; photo chemicals; thinner/turpentine; poisons; roofing tar; rug cleaner; wood preservatives; pool chemicals; and wood strippers.

Empty containers are not hazardous. Please dispose of them in your regular trash.

Explosives, asbestos, batteries, fluorescent bulbs, propane tanks, latex paint, waste oil and antifreeze will not be accepted.

Hazardous Waste Collection Day in Dover is for household residents only. Proof of residency is required.

Avoid input fees for permits and licenses by using new online application system

The City of Dover utilizes an online permitting system to streamline the process of applying for and renewing permits and licenses, submitting construction plans, and scheduling inspections.

Available 24 hours a day, the city's portal for permits, plans, and licensing at <https://permits.dover.nh.gov> allows customers to utilize the system without entering a municipal building. The portal has about 60 applications for permits, plans, and business licenses, ranging from driveway permits to health licenses. Customers can view the status of their application at any time, pay fees online, receive email alerts when a permit or license is issued, and download that permit or license from the site. The online process ensures timely review and processing of incoming permits.

Beginning July 1, 2023, the city now charges a "permit input fee" to cover the administrative cost for customers who seek to have city staff input permit data into the portal. The charge is \$40 an hour, prorated to the actual time to input the information into the system. The fee was instituted by the City Council when it adopted the [FY2024 budget](#) and accompanying [schedule of fees](#). Manual entry of permits may extend the review and processing times.

Accredited organic land care training this fall now open for registration

In partnership with Non-Toxic Portsmouth and Non-Toxic Dover, the Northeast Organic Farming Association's Organic Land Care Program is offering a four-day, in-person course on the principles and practices of organic land care. The course provides 30 hours of instruction and site visits led by expert practitioners and leads to certification as an accredited organic land care professional (AOLCP) after meeting all attendance and testing requirements.

Topics include:

- Site analysis
- Soil health

- Organic amendments
- Planting and plant care
- Organic turf management
- Stormwater management
- The business of organic land care

The training will be held at the Portsmouth Historical Society located at 10 Middle St., Portsmouth, Monday, Oct. 30 through Thursday, Nov. 2, from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The cost is \$600 for early registration before Sept. 15, 2023, after which the price increases to \$650.
