City Council to vote on plan to open warming center this winter

Council also to take up changes to Solid Waste Commission and budget schedule

Recycling Center hours:

Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday: 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. The City Council will consider a resolution that would allow the City Manager to enter into an agreement with the cities of



Rochester and Somersworth to operate a warming center at the Dover-owned facility located at 30 Willand Drive in Somersworth. The agreement would be for one year.

The proposal would allow the operation of the warming center on an as-needed basis during extreme cold weather events, determined by the emergency management directors of the tricities. The agreement would be similar to when the warming center operated during the 2020-2021 winter. Last winter, the three cities agreed to allow the warming center operation to occur daily and contracted with Community Action of Strafford County for operation.

Somersworth passed a similar resolution at its Monday, Aug. 1 meeting, where Mayor Robert Carrier and the mayors of Rochester and Somersworth spoke in support. Strafford County Commission Chair George Maglaras was also in attendance. He noted the commissioners' long-term vision to build a new Riverside Rest Home state-of-the-art nursing facility on county land and turn the current facility into a transitional shelter for those who are unhoused.

Also on the agenda is a public hearing on changes to the Solid Waste Advisory Commission. The proposed changes include making it a committee rather than a commission and expanding the membership of alternates from two to three. The resolution's background material states that the commission has had difficulty holding meetings recently for lack of a quorum.

The City Council is also expected to set public hearings for its Aug. 24 meeting on changing the city's annual budget adoption date and authorizing an amendment to the Terra Nova term sheet agreement approved by the Council in February.

The City Council seeks to move the budget adoption date from June 15 to April 15. According to the resolution's background materials, "an earlier budget submission and adoption provides better certainty to public employees and avoids the unnecessary issuance of notices of nonrenewal to teachers." By contract, Dover's public school teachers must be notified that their contract will not be renewed for the next school year by April 15. With the current budget adoption date of June 15, the School Board may issue a nonrenewal notice if it's unclear whether cuts to the school budget will be required. However, these notices may be unnecessary once the final budget is adopted. During the interim, the school district says there is employment uncertainty for these teachers, which may harm employee retention. The amended Terra Nova term sheet agreement is regarding the City Council's Feb. 23, 2022, <u>authorization of a development agreement</u> between the city and the property owner of parcels off Littleworth Road. The amended term sheet agreement would allow the developer to utilize a city-owned lot adjacent to the developer's property in exchange for an approximate equivalent acreage in conservation buffers and the creation of 80 units priced at or below U.S. Department of Housing and Urban

Development (HUD) guidelines.

Gulf of Maine Council honors Dover's Gretchen Young with visionary award

The Gulf of Maine Council on Marine Environment recognized Community Services' Gretchen Young last week with a 2022 Visionary Award for her "outstanding accomplishments as Environmental Projects Manager for the City of Dover."

The Gulf of Maine Council highlighted Young's work in facilitating the City Council's Committee to Study Stormwater and Flood Resilience Funding, which earlier this year recommended the City Council create a stormwater utility to fund existing and future stormwater infrastructure needs. The City Council accepted the recommendation and declared its intent to create a stormwater utility, which is currently underway.



"We particularly appreciate your proactive efforts to reduce stormwater pollution by partnering with the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services and the Piscataqua Region Estuaries Partnership to bring residents, developers, and non-profit organizations together to develop innovative stormwater funding strategies," Gulf of Maine Council Coordinator Joan LeBlanc wrote notifying Young of the award. "Thanks to your leadership and personal dedication, Dover is at the forefront of sustainable efforts to fund stormwater programs in coastal New Hampshire."

Last week at a Portland, Maine, awards ceremony, NHDES Coastal Program Administrator Steve Couture presented Young with her award.

"Gretchen is a visionary leader whose personal commitment and professional dedication have helped improve Gulf of Maine waters by reducing pollution from stormwater runoff," Couture said. "Gretchen's visionary leadership and personal commitment have made a lasting positive impact on sustainability in New Hampshire and the broader Gulf of Maine watershed."

In her remarks, Young said she was thankful to work for a city that supports innovation and environmental stewardship. While she noted there wasn't always agreement between the diverse members of the stormwater committee, in the end, the committee voted unanimously to recommend the stormwater utility, which would be the first in New Hampshire.

"We still have some work to do, but I'm proud of what we've done so far," Young said.

The Gulf of Maine Council is a Canadian-American regional partnership that provides collaborative leadership on cross-border, including ecosystem conditions, water quality, and climate change within the Gulf of Maine watershed. Its mission is to maintain and enhance environmental quality in the Gulf of Maine to provide sustainable resource use by existing and future generations. Its annual Visionary Awards "recognize innovation, creativity, and commitment to protecting the marine environment."

Last year, Community Services Director John Storer received a visionary award from the Gulf of Maine Council.



Work begins on Whittier Street sidewalk project

Preparation work began this week on the project to install a new sidewalk on Whittier Street between Glenwood Avenue and Sixth Street. The project will connect existing sidewalks on Glenwood Avenue, Sixth Street and lower Whittier Street. The work will also improve drainage on the street.

Work this week mainly focused on project layout. The contractor, GW Brooks & Son, Inc., will continue work next week with drainage work. It is expected the project will be complete by mid-September.

Why is some of the new pavement on Whittier Street being ripped up?

Earlier this season, Whittier Street was reclaimed with a base pavement layer installed as part of the city's annual street pavement program. A final coat of pavement will be installed next year following the project completion, and after a winter freeze and spring thaw allow soils to settle.

Reclaiming includes grinding the existing pavement in place and mixing it with the existing base gravel material to improve the strength of the base. In the case of Whittier Street, reclaiming also provided an opportunity to reestablish the roadway cross-slope to improve the drainage, which is critical to the long-term success of the project.

Reshaping the roadway and installing a base pavement layer before the sidewalk work is beneficial to establish the correct elevations of the drainage structures to promote drainage and establish the correct top of sidewalk elevations to achieve the required curb reveal.

The limits of the base coat of pavement on the east side of Whittier Street take into account the sidewalk project to minimize impacts to the new pavement as much as practicable. The city strongly discourages excavation within a newly paved roadway. Therefore, some residents are replacing private sewer services before the top coat of pavement in the spring; this private work is separate from the city's project. Excavated areas will settle over the winter, and the top coat

of pavement in the spring will be applied to provide a smooth riding surface.

Voters may also request an absentee ballot for the Tuesday, Nov. 8 general election. Absentee ballots for the general election will not be available until early October.



Trash and recycling pickup tips

Community Services Director John Storer reminds the public of the following trash and recycling regulations:

- All trash for pickup is required to be wholly contained in Dover trash bags, secured and tied;
- 15-gallon bags have a 20-pound limit;
- 30-gallon bags have a 35-pound limit;
- All recycling is to be contained in Dover recycling bins;
- Cardboard must be broken down and flat;
- Recycling plastics are limited to #1, #2 and #5;
- Bulky waste, such as furniture, toilets, mattresses, box springs, couches, chairs, and other large, nonmetal items, must have a Dover bulky tag to be picked up. Bulky tags are available where Dover trash bags are sold;
- Owners are responsible for cleaning up any remaining debris from trash pickup.



The following events are from a variety of historical records, sources and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, <u>located here</u>.

- **Aug. 7, 1661** Dover and Portsmouth discussed the lack of a sufficient bridge for horse and foot traffic over the Cochecho River. The Court ordered a committee be formed by the two towns to determine if it was necessary to construct a bridge.
- **Aug. 7, 1826** From the Dover Enquirer: "A very heavy thunder shower, during which the house of Moses Hodgdon, Esq. on Silver street, was struck by lightning. A beautiful sycamore tree in front of the house received the electric fluid, an immense body of which ran down the trunk, ripping off the bark, a portion of the lightning entering the house by a limb of the tree. The house of Mr. John Evans, about 50 rods distant, was struck at the same instant: a man was struck to the floor, but recovered in a few minutes. About the same time, a barn belonging to Mr. Benjamin Kielle, about 2 1/2 miles from the village, was struck and considerably injured."
- **Aug. 8, 1828** The "Dover Society for the Promotion of Temperance" was formed, the members of the new group pledging themselves to abstain entirely from the use of "ardent spirits," except for medicinal purposes. It was the first society of its kind in Dover.
- **Aug. 7, 1908** A severe lightning storm, accompanied by heavy rains, is blamed for the derailment of a Boston & Maine passenger train at the railroad yard in Dover. Passengers on the train, which was en route from Boston to Portland, were taken by carriage to the railroad station and boarded onto other trains. The train was travelling at a slow speed when it derailed at the washout. No one was injured. The heavy rains and lightning were described as some of the heaviest experienced in Dover in many years. Lightning struck a home on School Street and a barn on the outskirts of the city, both of which were lost to fire. The storm also forced the Atlantic Shore Line railroad and the Dover, Somersworth and Rochester street railroad offline for several hours.
- **Aug. 7, 2004** The years-long effort to open an aquarium in Dover or on the Seacoast changed its name to Friends of the Earth, Sea and Space Center. The aquarium's backers had proposed and aquarium complex in Dover since 2000, including a 55,000-square-foot aquarium and science center on the city's waterfront parcel on River Street. That plan was rejected by the Dover Economic Development Corp. in February 2002 when an extension to lease the site was not granted. The group, according to its website, is still seeking to construct the complex in Dover.


