Removal of Gen. Sullivan Bridge begins

Temporary trestles will aid in structure removal in 2026

Contractors are beginning the process to remove the General John Sullivan Memorial Bridge that crosses Little

In recent weeks, tall cranes have made their way to the Dover and Newington sides of the bridge to help construct temporary trestles on either side of the navigational. Once completed, crews will begin removing the rusted bridge named for the area's Revolutionary War hero, which is expected to start in the spring of 2026.


In October, the New Hampshire Executive Council <u>authorized</u> <u>contracting</u> with Reed & Reed, Inc., of Woolwich, Maine, for \$28.5 million to remove the superstructure. The removal of the bridge is anticipated to take place between March and October 2026. As part of the process, the navigational channel under the bridge will be closed for up to seven days, currently estimated to occur in early to mid-July 2026. Once the superstructure is removed (the piers will remain), the contractor will remove the temporary trestle between November 2026 and March 2027. The contract's final completion date is June 25, 2027.

During a May 2025 General Sullivan Bridge <u>update to the Dover City Council</u>, before the contractor was selected, Bob Landry of the New Hampshire Department of Transportation discussed closing a lane on the Spaulding Turnpike southbound Ruth L. Griffin Bridge from March to October 2026 to assist in the bridge removal. However, the contractor does not plan to utilize any long-term lane closures or lane shifts for the removal, according to NHDOT. Most of the work will occur from the temporary trestles. There may be some short-term closures during the time the middle span is removed in early to mid-July.

When the Spaulding Turnpike was expanded last decade, NHDOT had planned to rehabilitate the General Sullivan Bridge. However, due to the extensive deterioration, NHDOT found rehabilitation to be too expensive and sought its replacement. When bids for the replacement came in much higher than expected, the NHDOT pivoted to just removing the bridge, with replacement to occur at a later date.

The General Sullivan Bridge was completed in 1934 and carried two lanes of vehicular traffic across Little Bay. The bridge transitioned to a bicycle and pedestrian bridge in 1984 with the opening of the Capt. John F. Rowe Bridge, now the northbound Little Bay crossing of the Spaulding Turnpike. The condition of the General Sullivan Bridge continued to deteriorate and was closed to pedestrian traffic in 2018. Pedestrian traffic has been rerouted to a protected lane on the northbound Rowe bridge since 2019.



The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.



Jan. 2, 1643 — At a town meeting, Dover's residents adopted a rule to maintain order and support local authority. Anyone who harassed, argued with, or interfered with town-appointed officials while they were carrying out their lawful duties would face escalating penalties. The first offense would result in a formal warning, the second in a fine of five shillings, and the third in a fine of one pound for each violation.

Dec. 26, 1810 — Around 9 p.m., residents were startled by cries of fire as a major blaze broke out in a large downtown building owned by printer Samuel Bragg Jr. The fire began in the bindery on the lower floor, which was filled with books and loose paper. The upper floor housed Bragg's printing office and bookstore, while other parts of the building were occupied by shopkeeper Philemon Chandler and shoemaker Jesse Varney. The fire spread with extraordinary speed. By the time the alarm could be fully raised, flames had already engulfed the stairway to the printing office. Despite the rapid response of townspeople and local fire crews, the entire structure was soon consumed. Nearby buildings also caught fire, including the home of Samuel Bragg Sr. and a small house owned by Mrs. Marshall, both of which were destroyed. Another nearby building, occupied by Horace Parmele and his family, was heavily damaged during desperate efforts to prevent the fire from spreading further. Remarkably, no lives were lost. However, nearly all property in the printing office and bookstore was destroyed. The fire prompted appeals for charitable assistance to help the affected families rebuild.

Dec. 26, 1812 — John Wheeler issued a notice calling the proprietors of the Dover Cotton Factory to meet on Jan. 19, 1813, at 5 p.m. The meeting was to be held at the home of Lydia Tibbetts and was intended to formally organize the company under its recently granted act of incorporation. Incorporated in 1812 with a capital investment of \$50,000, the Dover Cotton Factory marked the town's first serious effort at large-scale manufacturing. Because the lower falls of the Cochecho River were already occupied by sawmills and gristmills, the factory was built about two miles upriver. It became known for many years as the "Upper Factory." Like many early industrial ventures, the enterprise achieved only limited success in its early years. John Williams served as the company's agent.

Dec. 29, 2015 — Dover received the first snowfall of the season on this day, the second-latest snowfall ever recorded in New Hampshire, according to the National Weather Service in Gray, Maine. Dover received a messy mix of snow and rain.

COAST to host public meeting on proposed ADA paratransit eligibility changes

The Cooperative Alliance for Seacoast Transportation (COAST) will host a public meeting at 3:30 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 6, to discuss proposed changes to the evaluation process for new Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Paratransit applications.

The meeting will take place at Community Action Partnership of Strafford County, 577 Central Ave., Suite 10, Dover. All members of the community are invited to attend and offer feedback. Remote attendance options are available by emailing info@coastbus.org

COAST's ADA Complementary Paratransit service provides origin-to-destination sharedride transportation for individuals whose disabilities prevent them from independently using the agency's fixed-route bus system, as required under the ADA. Eligibility for this service currently involves an application and functional evaluation process.

The proposed changes, which do not affect the status of existing ADA-approved clients, are intended to refine how future applicants are assessed and to ensure that paratransit resources are allocated efficiently while continuing to meet the needs of riders with disabilities. Details of the revisions will be discussed at the meeting.
