

Recycling Center hours: Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Central Avenue Bridge to Orchard Street. In addition, eight parking spaces on the bridge will be unavailable. These traffic and parking restrictions are necessary for crews to move and store equipment, and will remain in place for the duration of the restoration work. Sidewalks and crosswalks in the area will remain open.

The contractor, George R. Cairns and Sons, Inc. of Windham, expects to conclude work sometime in March.

The City Council recently approved the \$1.1 million project, which addresses safety concerns related to the wall's condition and integrity. The large granite blocks, which have shifted over time, date back to the early 1800s. The blocks were originally the foundation of a former mill building and not intended to serve as a retaining wall.

The restoration work will involve removing the granite blocks and replacing them with interlocking, precast concrete blocks. The concrete blocks will be able to withstand additional pressure.

Crews will mobilize beginning Jan. 2. Work on site, including demolition of the wall, will begin the week of Jan. 7. More than 2,000 cubic yards of material will removed from the site and trucked away. That work will continue throughout January.

In February, the contractor anticipates laying the new foundation, with the new wall being in place sometime in March.

Crews will return in the spring for landscaping work.



State to hold public hearing in Dover on privatization of bus terminals, Spaulding Turnpike service area

The State of New Hampshire's Public-Private Partnership Infrastructure Oversight Commission will hold a second public hearing on Wednesday, Jan. 9, 2019 at 6:30 p.m. at the Dover City Hall Auditorium, 288 Central Ave., on proposed projects for the privatization of the Dover and Portsmouth bus terminals, and the development of the Spaulding Turnpike Service Area.

The public is invited to attend and provide comments on whether the public-private partnership is the appropriate procurement method.

The agenda is as follows:

- 6:30 p.m.: Public hearing to receive public comment on proposed privatization of the Dover and Portsmouth Bus Terminals.
- 7 p.m.: Public hearing to receive public comment on proposed development of the Spaulding Turnpike Service Area.

The regular meeting of the Public-Private Partnership Infrastructure Oversight Commission will immediately follow the public comment sessions.

If the hearing is postponed, it will be rescheduled to Wednesday, Jan. 16, 2019 at 6:30 p.m., Dover City Hall Auditorium.

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. Jan. 2, 1643 - At a town meeting it was ordered that if any turbulent person shall molest any of the Townsmen appointed, or quarrel with them, or contest against any of their lawful actions, done according to town order, he shall be first admonished, and the second time fined 5 shillings, and the third time 1 pound, for every such offense.

Dec. 30, 1823 - The Dover Bank, incorporated at the June session of the Legislature, this year, commenced business in its new building near Dover Landing.



Dec. 31, 1829 - The new Brick Meeting House, erected by the First Parish, was dedicated. The Rev. Mr. Winslow, the pastor, delivers a sermon.



Dec. 29, 1859 - Belknap Church is dedicated. The cost of the new house of worship is \$15,000.

Dec. 29, 1910 - At about 5:30 p.m., a man steals a 27pound turkey from E.A. Gowen & Son's Grocery on Locust Street. A police pursuit begins, with police chasing the suspect up Washington and Atkinson streets, and over to Silver Street, where they lose sight of him. While on Silver Street, on their way back toward Locust Street, they spot a man with a large, suspicious bundle under his coat. Police tackle the man but soon realize he's a mailman and the bundle is a large mail bag. The following day, a woman reports to police that she purchased a turkey for \$1.50 from a man who knocked on her front door. The bird is returned to Gowen's Grocery and the woman is given \$1.50.
