Dover 400th Committee unveils logo

Dover's 400th Anniversary Committee recently unveiled the logo to be associated with Dover's 400th birthday celebration, in 2023. The art work was conceived by Deborah Ballok, Dover resident and retired visual arts teacher. The logo will be used on anniversary collateral and merchandise to help raise revenue to offset the costs of the celebration.



Dover was the first permanent settlement in New Hampshire, established in 1623 and the 7th settlement in the United States colonies. The City Council formed the "Ad-Hoc Dover's 400th Anniversary Committee" in 2018 to help plan and oversee the 400th anniversary celebration, which will include historical re-enactments, fireworks and parades, school involvement, and more throughout the year.

"It's important to have residents and businesses work side by side in the planning and the celebration, itself," said Committee Chair Kevin McEneaney. "This is a significant community milestone to be celebrated."

The Committee's first order of business was creating a visual representation to use on collateral and goods. Ballok presented the committee with nine sketches which were narrowed down to three. Through the revision process, they landed on two images which were ultimately accepted and copyrighted.

"When I was accepted onto the 400th Anniversary Committee one of the first items discussed was need for a logo design," said Ballok. "I was excited to use my skills and expertise to recognize such a special date in our City's history."

Ballok graduated from Southern Connecticut State University with a Bachelors of Science in Visual Arts Education. She worked as a visual arts teacher for 35 years, twenty years at Hudson Memorial Middle School, and another fifteen at Alvirne High School before moving to Dover.

The Dover 400th Anniversary Committee is comprised of seventeen members. Eversource and NH PUC offer ways to avoid recent phone scams

The New Year is in full swing and so are scams targeting utility customers across the country and right here in New Hampshire. Already this year, customers in many towns around the state have been approached by scammers, either on the phone or at their door. To warn customers, Eversource and the New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission (NHPUC) are teaming up to ensure that people know the tell-tale signs of scams, so they can avoid becoming a victim.

"The scammers, often sounding legitimate and quite convincing, threaten to shut off electric service immediately unless instant payment is made," said Eversource Senior Vice President and Chief Customer Officer Penni Conner. "These scammers can be relentless but they're only successful if they catch our customers off-guard and scare them into making a payment. We remind customers, if something doesn't sound right or feel right, trust your gut, and don't pay."

"One similarity in many utility scams is a sense of urgency, with scammers often convincing consumers that payment must be made immediately," says Amanda Noonan, Director of Consumer Services and External Affairs for the NHPUC. "The more we educate consumers on the basic red flags of a scam, the less likely they are to become victims."

Tips to help avoid becoming a victim:

- Eversource representatives never demand instant payment over the phone, require the use of pre-paid debit cards or request customers meet at a payment center to make the payment.
- Never provide personal financial or account

- information to any unsolicited person on the phone, at the door or online, even if they seem legitimate.
- Beware, some sophisticated scammers can manipulate their caller ID to say the caller is with Eversource.
- Customers who are scheduled for disconnection due to nonpayment receive a written notice that includes information on how to maintain their service.
- Customers can verify they are speaking with an Eversource representative by asking for some basic information about their account like the name on the account, the account address, and the exact past due balance.

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, <u>located here</u>.



Feb. 5, 1658 - It was agreed that 20 pounds per year be raised for the maintenance of a schoolmaster for teaching

all the children of the town, he having the privilege of all strangers out of the town; reading, writing, Latin and casting accounts to be taught as the parents should require.

Feb. 6, 1722 - The Provincial Council having heard that there were a considerable number of Indians at Dover whose words and actions gave just grounds of suspicion of an ill design against that town, requested the Governor to cover the inhabitants there with 50 men for six days and ordered that the Treasurer supply them with 300 pounds of bread.

Feb. 4, 1846 - Mr. Plumer Hayes was killed by his head coming in contact with a circular saw in Davis's steam mill.

Feb. 1, 1889 - The schooner Zimri S. Wallingford, built by the Dover Navigation Company in 1882, arrives in Palatka, Florida. The Z.S. Wallingford was one of five schooners constructed by the Dover Navigation Company to accommodate the growing mercantile needs of Dover's mills. The Dover Navigation Company, despite a slow start, became a great commercial success. The schooners generated significant interest among the residents of Dover, who followed daily accounts of the schooners' location and payloads in the local newspapers. Feb. 7, 1924 - About 3,000 people attend the opening of the new 1,000-foot-long toboggan chute at Garrison Hill. The event included a torchlight parade and bonfire. At 8 p.m. Mayor Waldron and Park Commissioner Richardson switched on the park lights. Council President A.C. Wentworth and William Penn Tuttle, president of the Chamber of Commerce winter sport committee, rode the first toboggan down the chute, about 600 feet into a field at the bottom of the slide.





"Creativebug" database available through Dover Library

The Dover Public Library has added a wonderful new database called Creativebug to its online offerings. Creativebug is a collection of more than 1000 video classes, free to library patrons with their borrower card number, covering a wide variety of creative topics. Classes range from three minutes to more than six hours long. Topics include: drawing, painting, doodling and journaling, lettering, printmaking and textiles, sewing, quilting, ceramics, paper crafts, book binding, cards and gift wrap, collage and decoupage, flowers, knitting, crochet, baking, cake decorating, canning and preserving, upholstering, furniture restoration, home décor, jewelry, holiday and parties, and kids' crafts.

Creativebug's renowned instructors are top designers, artists, and leaders in their fields. Beginner to advanced classes are included. Each class specifies a list of materials needed, and shows the process step by step. There are also free downloadable patterns, templates, and recipes, and new classes are released every day.

Is there a technique you have always wanted to learn? Or are you just curious about how something is made? Creativebug will help you unlock your creativity.
