# Council to hold budget workshop Wednesday

Executive, Finance, Recreation, Welfare, DoverNet, and Library department budgets on tap

The City Council will hold its first of five budget workshops this Wednesday, March 1.

At the March 1 workshop, the City Council will receive budget presentations from the Executive, Finance, Recreation, Library, and Information Technology (DoverNet) departments.

Budget workshops are also scheduled for March 8, 15, 29, and April 5. The Council will hold a public hearing on the school portion of the budget on March 15 and the rest on March 22. All meetings/workshops occur on Wednesdays; see a detailed schedule below.

The City Manager presented his proposed fiscal year 2024 budget to the City Council on Feb. 15. It totals \$183,821,915 across all funds, an increase over the previous year of \$4,125,089, or 2.3%. The General Fund portion of the budget, funded primarily through property taxes, is \$146,705,670, an increase over the previous year of \$6,930,771, or 5%. As proposed, the budget exceeds the tax cap by \$483,092 and

would require a two-thirds majority vote of the City Council to adopt.

## Waterfront committee elects new chair, reviews new bid process

The Cochecheo Waterfront Development Advisory Committee elected Norm Fracassa as its new chair, replacing Dana Lynch, who stepped down from committee chair after leading it, in his latest stint, since 2018. Lynch, who has been part of the effort to develop the city-owned waterfront for decades (see This Week in Dover History below), will remain on the committee.

Fracassa has been CWDAC's vice chair for the past few years. Following Fracassa's appointment to chair, CWDAC elected Sean Fitzgerald as vice chair.

CWDAC then received a report from its Parks Subcommittee on its Feb. 15 meeting with CJ

Architects, the firm the City Council awarded the bid to in January for architectural design services for the waterfront park building.

CDWAC also received an update on the <u>bid process</u> for public improvements for the waterfront development, due on March 9. This is the second bidding for the public improvements. The <u>first bid</u> released in September received no proposals from the four pre-qualified firms submitted due in large part to the deadline for shoreline work set by the Army Corps of Engineers permit. The city has since received a new permit from the Army Corps of Engineers that extends the deadline. City staff also revised the bid in response to questions raised by the potential bidders.

### Tips for curbside trash and recycling pickup

Community Services Director John Storer reminds the public of the following trash and recycling regulations:

- All trash for pickup is required to be wholly contained in Dover trash bags, secured and tied;
- 15-gallon bags have a 20-pound limit;
- 30-gallon bags have a 35-pound limit;
- All recycling is to be contained in Dover recycling bins:
- Cardboard must be broken down and flat;
- Recycling plastics are limited to #1, #2 and #5;
- Bulky waste, such as furniture, toilets, mattresses, box springs, couches, chairs, and other large, nonmetal items, must have a Dover bulky tag to be picked up. Bulky tags are available where Dover

trash bags are sold;

• Owners are responsible for cleaning up any remaining debris from trash pickup.

The following events are from a variety of historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

**March 2, 1860** — Abraham Lincoln of Illinois addresses the Republicans of Dover on the politics of the day.


March 1, 1896 — "Dover's Black Day" began with a record-breaking rainfall on March 1, 1896, which tore through the downtown. The Central Avenue bridge was swept away by torrents of rushing water and ice floes; several stores and offices in the Bracewell Building were destroyed. Merchants occupying the southern portion of the building included Fred Foss' stationery store, Roberts Bros. Boots and Shoes, the Misses Flynn millinery shop, Drew and Boomer photography studio, and the law offices of William Roberts. Combined, their losses totaled over \$23,000. Building owner, Col. John Bracewell, estimated additional structural damage of at least \$20,000 more. The bridge began to sink at 4 p.m. on March 2 when immense ice cakes from upstream continually hit its piers. At 4:55 p.m., two spans, 30 feet wide, went down. Not five minutes before, the bridge was filled with spectators gawking at the destruction. They were removed by the City Marshall just in time. The Bracewell Block caved in at precisely 8 p.m. with "crashing glass, snapping of timber, and a cloud of plaster and lime." Debris flowed swiftly over the dam. Electric poles then fell into the streets with live wires sparking. Lots of merchandise and equipment from these Dover businesses were found in Portsmouth the next day: "everything from lead pencils to fine bonnets to brogans." (Adapted from "Faces of Dover")

**March 1, 1912** — The 300 employees of the Sawyer Woolen Mill, then owned by the American Woolen Co, were informed on this day that they would all receive an increase in pay of 5%, effective the following week.

Feb. 28, 1996 — Dana Lynch, then chair of the Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce Waterfront Committee, addressed the City Council on this day about ongoing plans to promote the development of city-owned waterfront property off River Street. In 1996, work was underway to prepare the waterfront process for future development, including removing the city's former Public Works facility on the site. Then chair of the Dover Chamber, Jack Story, said preparing the waterfront parcel for development was similar to other projects that provided an economic benefit to the city, including the extension of Sixth Street, which led to the announcement of Liberty Mutual's plans to construct a \$25 million campus off Sixth Street; and the preparations in the early 1990s to develop the city-owned Enterprise Park. Lynch now serves on the Cochecho Waterfront Development Advisory Committee, which operates under the Dover Housing Authority. The committee is overseeing the development of the waterfront parcel by Cathartes. The current plan, which was approved by the Planning Board last year, includes three mixed-use buildings, two multi-family buildings, and three clusters of

townhouses. The buildings include 418 residential units and approximately 26,000 square feet of commercial space. The residential units include a mixture of rental and for-sale condominium units. Utility work and site preparation is expected to begin soon.


**Feb. 25, 2010** — The Tewksbury, Massachusetts School Committee on this day approved a three-year contract with John O'Connor as that district's new superintendent of schools. At the time, O'Connor was serving as Dover's superintendent, a position he had held for six years. Overall, he had spent 20 years in the Dover School District. O'Connor had first been a teacher and assistant principal in Lawrence, Mass., until 1980, when he left to work in Saudi Arabia for 10 years at schools operated by Saudi Aramco. He joined Dover in 1990, and for the next 14 years served as a principal at the elementary, middle, and high school levels, before accepting the superintendent position in 2004.

Liz Tentarelli has a career spanning over 30 years teaching high school and college students, including 19 years at Merrimack College in North Andover, Mass. Although history was not her field, women's history has been a long-time interest and avocation.

organization, for more than 25 years and president of the state League since 2009. The League is a direct descendant organization of the women's suffrage movement.

## Deadline to order Veterans Park bricks in time for Memorial Day is Tuesday, Feb. 28

The Recreation Department will order another round of engraved bricks for Dover Veterans Park to be added for Memorial Day on May 30. The deadline to have bricks included in that order is Tuesday, Feb. 28, at 4 p.m.

Orders collected after the deadline through Aug. 31, 2023, will be sent in the next batch to be installed in the park by Veterans Day. The cost is \$100 for an 8-inch by 8-inch brick and \$50 for a 4-inch by 8-inch brick. The only requirement to have a name engraved is for the person to be a veteran. All bricks are engraved consistently with a full name, military rank and branch, and years of service and/or conflict. Upon request, bricks may also be grouped by family or service time.

The Dover Literary Laureate is tasked with broadening community involvement in all forms of literary expression by developing and executing projects funded by the Dover Arts Commission with activities intended to enrich the quality of life for Dover citizens.

Eligible projects may include, but are not limited to, performances, workshops, exhibits, poetry readings, adult and youth after-school writing programs and other creative endeavors that engage the literary arts for the benefit of the community.

The application period is open through 5 p.m. on March 15, 2023. The appointment period will be from July 1, 2023, to June 30, 2025.


