

Arctic blast of cold arrives for weekend

A blast of Arctic cold air arrives today, Friday, Feb. 3, and will linger through Saturday, bringing with it dangerous wind chills. A Wind Chill Warning is in effect for Dover from 10 a.m. today to 1 p.m. on Saturday. Wind chills at times could reach 40 degrees below zero, according to the <u>National Weather Service</u>.

Dover Fire Chief Michael McShane urges everyone to take the necessary precautions to keep themselves and their loved ones safe.

"It's important to be aware of the dangers these cold temperatures can bring and to take the necessary steps to stay safe," said Chief McShane. "Never leave a child or pet unattended in a car in the cold, and if you can, stay inside to avoid the cold and wind chill. If you must go outside, make sure you are dressed appropriately and cover your hands and face."

Dover Fire and Rescue recommends that to stay safe in the cold weather, people should be aware of the following:

- Be aware of the dangers of frostbite and hypothermia and know the signs and symptoms
- Check on your family and friends during the cold weather,

- especially high risk populations such as the elderly and children
- Follow home fire safety and space heater safety measures

McShane said that it's especially important to be mindful of safety when trying to keep your home warm during extreme cold weather.


"We want to keep our citizens safe and warm during this cold weather," said Chief McShane. "It's important to keep in mind home heating safety measures such as never using a stove or oven to heat your home, making sure you have a smoke detector and carbon monoxide detector on each floor, and never plugging space heaters into extension cords or power strips." McShane said frostbite and hypothermia are dangerous conditions that can happen fast in extreme cold weather. He said people at the highest risk of frostbite and hypothermia include older adults with inadequate food, clothing, or heating; babies sleeping in cold bedrooms; people who remain outdoors for long periods; and people who drink alcohol or use illicit drugs.

He said the signs of frostbite and hypothermia in adults are:

- Shivering
- Exhaustion or feeling very tired
- Confusion
- Fumbling hands
- Memory loss
- Slurred speech
- Drowsiness

McShane added that signs and symptoms of hypothermia for babies include bright red and cold skin, and very low energy.

Willand Warming Center opens today

The Warming Center of Strafford County at 30 Willand Drive in Somersworth will be activated today, Friday, Feb. 3, at 5 p.m. and will remain open until 9 a.m. on Sunday, Feb. 5. Due to the extremely cold temperatures expected tonight and Saturday, the Warming Center will remain open the entire day on Saturday.

Reservations/pre-registrations are not needed; access is walk-in only. The Warming Center welcomes anyone in need of a warm space.

Access Willand Drive via Route 108 (New Rochester Road) or Commercial Drive from High Street in Somersworth. The two nearest COAST Bus stops are High Street: Holy Trinity Church/Bernier Street (Route 1) and Midway Buick/Coastal Neurology (Route 12). Tickets/bus passes are required. In addition to buses, tickets are available at SOS Recovery Organization's 4 Broadway, Dover and 14 Signal St., Rochester locations during weekday hours. Find bus schedules at <u>coastbus.org/schedules</u>.

COAST Bus does not run after 3 p.m. on Saturdays or all day Sundays. On Saturday and Sunday nights, SOS operates a shuttle that picks people up at SOS's 4 Broadway Office in Dover, and the Dover Transportation Center at 33 Chestnut St., at 5 and 6 p.m. SOS will also pick people up at 5:30 and 6:30 p.m. at the COAST bus stop near the Rochester Public Library on South Main Street.

People who need help getting to the Warming Center can also call 603-742-2709 between 5 p.m. and 9 a.m. for assistance when the center is activated.

In addition to the Willand Warming Center, SOS, located at 4 Broadway in Dover, will be open Saturday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Community Action Partnership of Strafford County's drop-in center will be open during the day on Saturday. City facilities serve as warming centers

Several City of Dover facilities serve as warming centers during cold weather.

Dover's warming centers include the McConnell Center, the Public Library and City Hall. These specific public buildings are accessible and welcome those seeking relief from the cold during regular business hours.

The Police Department's lobby at 46 Chestnut St. is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week, with chairs for those who need a respite from the weather. Additionally, the three fire stations are always open: Liberty North End Fire Station is located at 262 Sixth St; Central Fire Station is located at 9-11 Broadway; and the South End Fire Station is located at 25 Durham Road.

Need emergency assistance?

The City's Public Welfare Department is available to coordinate services for those who need and want emergency assistance, including shelter, food and medical care.

Curbside collection of storm debris begins next week

Residents can submit collection requests online

The City of Dover is contracting with an arborist to help clear public rights-of-way from lowhanging and downed branches and limbs from last week's storm. The contractor will also collect and process limbs and branches from Dover properties placed curbside as time allows. Work is anticipated to begin Wednesday, Feb. 8.

Submit curbside collection requests through Community Services' Service Request Portal at <u>service.dover.nh.gov/RequestPortal</u>, which can also be accessed through the city's home page, <u>www.dover.nh.gov</u>, by selecting the "Contact Us" button on the upper right-hand corner. Submissions create a trackable digital work order.

Curbside collection will be focused on City of Dover-owned public streets. Community Services will consider curbside collection of woody debris on private roads contingent on obtaining an indemnity release from the homeowner's association that governs the private road. The curbside collection is a one-time event to help clear the destruction of last week's storm.

Service Request Portal instructions

To submit a service request:

- Go to <u>service.dover.nh.gov/RequestPortal;</u>
- Enter your name and email;
- Select "Public Works Streets" from the drop-down menu of the "Select an Issue Category" field;
- Select "Trees" from the drop-down menu of the "Select an Issue" field;
- Enter your address;
- In the "Optional Description" field, please provide a brief description of what is being picked up and the quantity to ensure crews respond appropriately.

For those needing assistance with the Service Request Portal or have other questions, call Community Services at 603-516-6450.

The Service Request Portal can also be utilized for all non-emergency public works or infrastructure issues, such as reporting a pothole or a street light out.

Curbside collection instructions

To ensure curbside collection:

- Stack branches as neatly as possible, placing "cut ends" facing the roadway; crews may not be able to collect a mish-mashed pile;
- Separate all limbs 15 inches in diameter or larger. The smaller material will be chipped on site; the larger limbs will be hauled away for further processing.
- Only place woody debris from last week's storm at curbside; other materials will not be collected.

The arborist completing the work is SavATree/Urban Tree Service of Rochester.

School Board adopts revised FY2024 operating budget

The School Board adopted a revised School Department fiscal year 2024 budget at a special meeting on Monday, Jan. 30. The meeting was held immediately following a budget workshop.

The School Board adopted the School Department's FY2024 budget on Jan. 17 but scheduled further budget discussions for Jan. 30.

In a 6-1 vote at the Jan. 30 special meeting, the board approved a bottom-line budget of \$84,614,778, a 0.6% increase from the current FY2023 budget. The budget calls for \$52,383,727 to be raised by local property tax, exceeding the estimated tax cap calculation by \$538,373. The revised budget reduced the amount over the city's estimated tax cap by \$587,290 from the original Jan. 17 adopted budget. School Board member Maggie Fogarty voted against the resolution.

The budget will be included in the City Manager's city-wide budget that will be presented to the City Council later this month. A public hearing on the school portion of the budget will be held at a Council meeting in March.

Council to consider city resilience plan

Adopting a citywide resilience plan and joining a statewide public transportation coalition are among the agenda items on the City Council's agenda for its Wednesday, Feb. 8 meeting.

The resilience plan, Resiliency for All, was presented and unanimously endorsed by the Planning Board at <u>its Jan. 24 meeting</u>. The plan seeks to position the city to be able "to respond to adversity in the face of environmental, social and economic stressors," it states in the resolution background materials. "The core purpose of the citywide resilience plan is to publicly establish a work plan for the city to equitably increase its resiliency, in fiscally responsible ways, across a variety of categories including public outreach, energy, food systems and ecosystem management."

The statewide public transportation coalition is part of an effort by the Cooperative Alliance for Seacoast Transportation, better known as COAST Bus, and the New Hampshire Transit Alliance to start "a meaningful statewide dialogue on increasing state operating support for public transportation in New Hampshire," the resolution background material states. The coalition seeks to increase public transportation funding in the state budget. "Without increased

State support, public transit agencies and the services provided will need to be cut by 2025," the background materials state.

Also on the agenda are resolutions to:

- Award a bid for the purchase of a bucket truck for Community Services for \$98,944;
- Authorize an additional scope of work for \$124,284 to the firm awarded the consulting design services contract for the Downtown Pedestrian and Vehicular Access Improvements;
- Authorize the acceptance and expenditure of an anonymous \$13,000 donation made through the Residents Supporting Community First program. The donor seeks to put \$10,000 into the food and fuel assistance fund, \$2,000 for the Community Trail, and \$1,000 for the Dover 400 celebration. The Council will also hold a public hearing on this resolution.

The Council will also set public hearings for its Feb. 22 meeting on proposed ordinance changes that would:

- Change the Ad-Hoc Committee for Racial Equity and Inclusion from an ad-hoc to a standing committee;
- Expand the number of alternates for the Energy Commission;
- Create a permanent permit process to allow restaurants to have outdoor dining on public streets and sidewalks.

Presentation on downtown access improvements slated for Feb. 13

The Transportation Advisory Commission will hold a special meeting on Monday, Feb. 13, for a public presentation Downtown Pedestrian and Vehicular Access Improvements Project,

originally scheduled for Jan. 23 but postponed due to the winter storm.

The meeting will now occur in Council Chambers at City Hall and begin at 6 p.m.

The presentation is on bringing the <u>2015 Downtown Pedestrian and Vehicular Access and</u> <u>Streetscape Study</u> into design and ultimately creating construction plans.

Staff from the city's Planning and Engineering divisions and design consultant Greenman-Pederson, Inc., will provide a brief presentation at the meeting. Their overview will discuss current conditions in the Central Business District, the recommendation from the 2015 study to change the traffic flow on Central Avenue and Main Street, and why that change would be advantageous to pedestrians, motorists and downtown businesses.

After the presentation, the public will be invited to review representations of the proposed design at different stations in the City Hall auditorium next to Council Chambers. Each station, operated by a member of the project team, will include plans, alternative designs, streetscape renderings, and a list of the pros and cons. There will be sticky notes and pens available so the public can comment and/or directly mark areas of concern. The project team will also be available to answer questions, address concerns and solicit feedback.

Further public meetings are planned during the design phase of the project. The city will also provide email updates as the project develops. Do your part and 'scoop the poop'

Rain or snow runoff can carry pet waste directly into waterways or storm drains, which usually empty without any treatment into a stream, river, or estuary. Untreated fecal matter can be a source of harmful bacteria and nutrients. Just as we don't want human sewage in our water, it is important to prevent pet waste from being carried into our waterways.

It isn't just water quality that can suffer. Leaving pet waste on the ground, especially in public areas like parks or playing fields, may pose a risk to children, adults, and even pets.

Pet waste carries disease causing organisms such as Giardia and Salmonella which can make water unsafe for drinking or swimming; to protect the public from illness, swimming beaches and shellfish beds can be shut down due to bacterial contamination, and pet waste can be a cause of that contamination.

The following events are from a variety of historical records, sources and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information <u>located here</u>.

Feb. 5, 1658 — It was agreed by residents that 20 pounds per year should be raised for a


schoolmaster to teach all the children in town. Subjects would include reading, writing, Latin and basic bookkeeping.

Feb. 8, 1853 — A very mild winter with very little snow leads to ice on the Cochecho River breaking up this day, many weeks early.

Feb. 5, 1918 — Downtown traffic was blocked for several hours following a train wreck on the Boston and Maine Railroad's Portland line in Dover. A dropped brake beam caused several train cars to veer off the rails, four of them toppling over. It would take most of the day to clear the wreckage. Rail lines in Dover and throughout the region were also significantly affected at the same time by extreme cold and wind-whipped snow that made some rail lines impossible to cross. The weather was also responsible for the derailment of trains in Concord and Claremont.

Feb. 7, 1924 — About 3,000 people attend the opening of the new 1,000-foot-long toboggan chute at Garrison Hill. The event included a torchlight parade and bonfire. At 8 p.m. Mayor Waldron and Park Commissioner Richardson switched on the park lights. Council President A.C. Wentworth and William Penn Tuttle, president of the Chamber of Commerce winter sport committee, rode the first toboggan down the chute, about 600 feet into a field at the bottom of the slide.

Feb. 6, 2002 — The Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce hosted a new event this day intended to let newly elected City Councilors and School Board members get to know one other better in an informal setting. The event was held at the former Firehouse One Restaurant, now Ember. The Chamber said the casual event was also a way for elected officials to meet with local businesses and other officials. Then-Mayor Alex Nossiff introduced the City Council to those in attendance. "In my view, the heart and soul of the community is the downtown," Nossiff said. "The progress over the last 10 years is remarkable." Nossiff added that the waterfront was a "critical component" to the city's revitalization. Then-School Board Chairman Nick Skaltsis was also on hand to introduce the newly elected School Board.




