

City Council to receive FY27 proposed budget

**Sign up for Budget Revealed newsletter to
stay up to date**

City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr. will introduce his proposed fiscal year 2027 budget at the City Council meeting on Wednesday, Feb. 11.

The City Manager's budget will incorporate the School Board's adopted budget for the School Department, which the School Board approved on Jan. 12. The city-wide budget will also include the first-year projects in the latest six-year Capital Improvements Program adopted in December.

Once the budget is introduced, a digital version will be available on the [FY2027 Budget Revealed webpage](#), which will also include video recordings of budget meetings and workshops and any accompanying documents. A physical copy of the budget will also be available for review at the Dover Public Library and the City Clerk's office. School Board budget documents and video recordings are already posted on the page.

The introduction of the budget begins two months of budget review by the City Council. In subsequent weeks, the City Council will hold workshops to review each department's budget. The Council will also hold two public hearings: one for the public education component of the budget, and one for all other city departments. The City Charter requires the City Council to adopt the annual budget by April 15.

Willand Pond milfoil grant on Council agenda

Resolution would allow acceptance of grant funds for alternative mitigation strategies if amended during the Council meeting

At its [Jan. 28 meeting](#) following a public hearing, the City Council voted 5-3 in favor of accepting the \$19,535 grant for controlling milfoil at Willand Pond, which requires a 50% match from the city. The motion failed as a two-thirds majority is required by city charter to make appropriations that were not included in the fiscal year's adopted budget. While the motion failed, there was consensus among the City Council that action must be taken; the disagreement was on the use of the ProcellaCOR aquatic herbicide recommended by the NHDES.

At its [upcoming meeting](#) on Feb. 11, the City Council is expected to again take up the same resolution that would allow the city to accept and expend a state grant that would be used to combat the invasive milfoil infestation. The City Council may amend resolution to allow the city to pursue an alternative mitigation strategy other than the herbicide recommended by the New Hampshire Department of Environmental Services.

City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr., in an email to City Council this week, wrote, "NHDES has advised that Dover remains eligible for the matching grant funds and those funds can be applied for alternative remediation efforts, including manual weed removal, should that prove viable." The deadline for the city to accept the grant is Friday, Feb. 13, 2026.

The Conservation Commission [will discuss](#) the Willand Pond mitigation strategies at its Monday, Feb. 9 meeting, and potentially make a recommendation to City Council. That meeting begins at 5:30 p.m. in City Hall's Council Conference Room.

The City Council will also hold public hearings on:

- Reprogramming unexpended bonds from the Fifth and Grove Reconstruction Project to the Horne Street Reconstruction Project
- Reprogramming unexpended bonds from the Elm/Summer/Belknap Reconstruction Project to the Lower Central Avenue Reconstruction Project
- Adoption of the residential anti-displacement and relocation assistance plan related to recovery housing
- Authorizing to apply for a Dover Housing Authority Grant to establish a recovery house on Avon Avenue

The City Council will also consider adopting its goals for the 2026-2027 term.

Mayor Dennis Shanahan will hold monthly office hours at City Hall, offering the public an opportunity to stop by and speak directly with the mayor.


The office hours will take place in the Council Conference Room on the second floor of City Hall and will last approximately 90 minutes. Residents are welcome to attend during the scheduled time.

Central Avenue work begins next week

Work will require traffic restrictions, including lane closures

A city contractor will begin upgrading the Waldron Court pedestrian crossing at Central Avenue next week. Work next week will be preparing area for construction. No work will occur on Friday, Feb. 13.

Work will begin in earnest on Monday, Feb. 16 and continue Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. though mid-April.

During construction, motorists should anticipate delays through the project area during construction hours with lane shifts; flaggers will be present to assist with traffic flow. Parking will also be restricted in the project area. Waldron Court and sidewalks in the area are expected to be open for the duration of the project, except for brief closures for the installation of lighting infrastructure.

This project will construct curb bump-outs to reduce the crossing distance on Central Avenue, improving pedestrian visibility in a high-traffic area. New lighting will also be installed to enhance visibility, as well as new drainage infrastructure. The pedestrian crossing at Waldron Court will be shifted slightly to align with Waldron Court. Parking spaces will also be adjusted slightly, with two spaces being permanently eliminated.

City Council [awarded the project bid](#) to S.U.R. Construction, Inc. for \$169,595 after a competitive bid process. The project will utilize funds from the Community Development Block Grant. The project is the first of a multi-phase effort to improve downtown pedestrian crossings.




Volunteer boards help keep Dover vibrant






The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

Feb. 9, 1893 — Late on a snowy Wednesday night, a devastating fire swept through the Strafford County Asylum in Dover, killing 41 people and becoming the deadliest tragedy in the city's history. The blaze was discovered around 10 p.m. by a night watchman, but firefighters traveling by horse-drawn wagons did not arrive until nearly midnight. By then, the two-and-a-half-story wooden building was already in ruins. With barred windows and no safe exits, most of the residents were trapped inside. Only three people survived. A marker commemorating the tragedy stands behind the Strafford County House of Corrections.

Feb. 10, 1897 — According to the Dover Enquirer, a man and a young woman from Durham narrowly avoided serious injury after a sleigh accident on Central Street in Dover. As they were heading home in the evening, their sleigh became caught in an electric streetcar rail in front of St. Mary's Convent. The sudden stop threw both occupants from the sleigh, with the woman landing in a puddle of icy water. Her companion managed to hold onto the reins and was dragged a short distance before a passerby, identified as Mr. Austin, was able to stop the horse. Aside from minor bruises and some shaken nerves, the pair were unharmed and continued their journey home.

Feb. 7, 1924 — About 3,000 people attended the opening of the new 1,000-foot-long toboggan chute at Garrison Hill. The event included a torchlight parade and bonfire. At 8 p.m., Mayor Waldron and Park Commissioner Richardson switched on the park lights.

Council President A.C. Wentworth and William Penn Tuttle, president of the Chamber of Commerce winter sport committee, rode the first toboggan down the chute, about 600 feet into a field at the bottom of the slide.

Feb. 8, 1925 — Dover Fire Chief James Smith was instantly killed after striking a match while searching for a gas leak in the cellar of the Strafford Bank building. A janitor in the building at the time was injured. This event is detailed in the video, [The Tragic Death of Dover Fire Chief James Smith](#).

Dover Community Power: How to opt out or "opt up"

New electricity rates for Dover Community Power take effect on Feb. 1, 2026. While eligible residents are automatically enrolled in the standard Community Power plan, participation is entirely voluntary. Residents have the right to change their electricity supplier at any time with no penalty.

The process to change is straightforward. Using your current Eversource account number, you may opt out and return to Eversource's default supply service, or switch to a third-party competitive supplier through the [online portal](#) or by phone.

Additionally, Dover Community Power offers choices for cleaner energy. You can "opt up" to a plan with significantly higher percentages of renewable or green energy than standard utility plans.

Regardless of who supplies your power — [Dover Community Power](#), Eversource, or [another provider](#) — Eversource will continue to deliver electricity to your home and send you one single monthly bill.






Sally Snowman, the last keeper of Boston Light

What began with George Worthylake in 1718 ended with Sally Snowman in 2023.

For over 300 years, Boston Light lit the way with a lightkeeper by its side. When Snowman became the 70th lighthouse keeper in 2003 she made history as its first woman caretaker, but also the last lighthouse keeper in the United States.

Boston Light, located on Little Brewster Island in Boston Harbor, Massachusetts, was the first established Light Station in colonial America and began lighting the way for safe navigation in 1716. In Snowman's presentation, she will provide photos of Boston Light's 307 years of history and a few photo anecdotes of her experiences as a 21st century keeper. She will also be joined by her husband Jay Thomson and Lighthouse Historian Jeremy D'Entremont.

By the 1990s most lighthouses were automated, but Boston Light remained manned. Snowman was hired in 2003 by the Coast Guard as a civilian lighthouse keeper with her jobs including keeping the lighthouse clean, checking mechanical equipment, and overseeing all the tours (while adding her own personal touch of wearing period accurate dress.)

By 2023, the age of the lighthouse keeper came to an end when Snowman retired at age 72, but her love of the lighthouse still remains. The lighthouse, with Fresnel Lens and fog signal apparatus, continues to remain active as a Coast Guard maintained aid-to-navigation.

Snowman's love of lighthouses began as a child seeing her father work with the Coast Guard Auxiliary. She struggled in school, barely passing, and would eventually discover that she had undiagnosed dyslexia and attention-deficit disorder. This led her to gravitate towards caretaking jobs like childcare, elderly care, and work with the disabled. She would go on to earn a BS at Bridgewater State College, Masters in Education at Curry College, and a PhD in Neurolinguistics from Walden University (simply because she was curious how a brain operates with a learning disability). But throughout her many jobs and degrees, she always fell back to the sea — the one constant that brought her comfort. It was through her 30 years volunteering with the Coast Guard Auxiliary that she not only became involved with Boston Light but also met her civil engineer husband.

His vice presidency was the only time the president and vice president were from different parties. He was the first president of the United States to live in the White House; and he never enslaved anyone. Do you want to know more about John Adams?

In 2026, journey through Rogers's sketchbooks as she shares her favorite tidbits, doodles, observations, and resurrection stories about the first 12 presidents. Rogers isn't a historian, an academic, or an impartial storyteller, but she has read more than one book about every U.S. president. She was dubbed "America's Preeminent Presidential Doodler" by one of her favorite biographers and she's been repeating it ever since. When she's not reading or doodling history books, she's a freelance graphic designer, illustrator, and content creator.

To keep her interest during her project, Rogers filled hundreds of sketchbook pages doodling her way through presidential biographies. Doing so heightened her curiosity and turned her into an insufferable presidential nerd. Along the way, she discovered unexpected threads connecting seemingly unconnected people, times, and events. She can't get enough of the weird trivia, coincidences, and quirks. Like the fact that English wasn't the first language of the first president born in the U.S. Or that a three-part plan was proposed to bring George Washington back to life. Don't even get her started on William Henry Harrison — he was only president for a month, but she could talk about him for hours.

How to stay informed about parking bans

The City of Dover utilizes winter parking bans as needed through the winter season to clear the streets of snow.

Parking bans can occur during a storm or afterward for cleanup. When a parking ban is in effect, all vehicles must be off public ways and specific parking lots to avoid being ticketed and towed.

Seasonal winter parking restrictions

In addition to winter parking bans, several streets have seasonal winter parking restrictions in place from Dec. 1 to April 1, regardless of the current weather conditions. These streets have signs posting restrictions that prohibit parking at any time, day or night, between Dec. 1 and April 1.
