City Manager to present proposed Fiscal Year 2026 budget Feb. 12

City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr. will present the proposed fiscal year 2026 budget at the City Council meeting on Wednesday, Feb. 12.

The City Manager's budget will incorporate the School Board's recommended budget for the School Department, which the School Board approved on Jan. 6. The city-wide budget will also include the first-year projects in the latest sixyear Capital Improvements Program adopted in December.

Once the budget is introduced, a digital version will be available on the <u>FY2026 Budget Revealed webpage</u>, which will also include video recordings of budget meetings and workshops and any accompanying documents. A physical copy of the budget will also be available for review at the Dover Public Library and the City Clerk's office. School Board budget documents and video recordings are already posted on the page.

The introduction of the budget begins two months of budget review by the City Council. In subsequent weeks, the City Council will hold workshops to review each department's budget. The Council will also hold two public hearings: one for the public education component of the budget, and one for all other city departments. The City Charter requires the City Council to adopt the annual budget by April 15.

New Community Power rate change effective March 3, 2025

The Community Power Coalition of New Hampshire's Board of Directors voted to increase its default "Granite Basic" electricity supply rate for residential and small commercial customers by 0.8 cents to 9.7 cents per kilowatt-hour effective March 3, 2025 through July 31, 2025.



The 9.7 cents per kWh rate replaces the previously announced rate of 8.9 cents per kWh starting on March 3, 2025. The 8.9-cent rate remains in effect from Feb. 1, 2025 to March 2, 2025.

A failed agreement with an in-state power generator led to the increase. This required the CPCNH to purchase replacement power during a period of increased prices driven by the

recent cold temperatures and high demand. In announcing the revised rates, CPCNH said its goal is to provide the lowest possible rates while covering costs and maintaining financial stability.

CPCNH's updated rate is slightly higher than Eversource's 8.929-cent kWh default rate. The Dover Energy Commission notes this will be the first time Community Power's Granit Basic rate will exceed Eversource's rate. Based on a typical monthly usage of 650 kWh, a Dover Community Power customer would see a \$5 increase monthly increase compared to the Eversource default rate through July 31, 2025. Since it began, Dover Community Power has saved the average residential customer about \$110 compared to the Eversource rate, said William Baber, chair of the Dover Energy Commission and Dover's CPCNH member representative.

The Dover City Council launched the Dover Community Power program with the assistance of the Dover Energy Commission in the fall of 2023, as part of its commitment to making Dover a more resilient city. Dover Community Power allows customers to choose up to 100% renewable energy options.

Baber notes recent New Hampshire Public Utilities Commission rulings provide utilities a perceived advantage over Community Power programs and other competitive suppliers. The ruling encourages utilities to purchase a significant percentage of their power in the spot market. This appears to be leading to optimistic default utility rates and a price fluctuation shift of risk onto customers. If a utility sets prices lower than its costs, it can recover the loss from its customers in subsequent rate increases. Further, the PUC has indicated that these loss recoveries might be spread across all customers, including third-party suppliers like CPCNH, not just the utility's customers, Baber said.

In a recent <u>news release</u>, New Hampshire Consumer Advocate Donald Kreis expressed concerns about electricity utilities "reliance on purchases of wholesale power from the ever-fluctuating real-time wholesale market, rather than via long-term" and "forcing all customers – including those relying on community power aggregation – to make up any shortfalls" if the default rate through July 31 does not cover the utilities' wholesale costs, which Kreis noted is "entirely possible."

Changing energy suppliers

Dover electricity customers may choose between default service, Dover Community Power, and other third-party, when available, for power supply. The New Hampshire Department of Energy created a <u>website</u> to help customers shop for competitive energy power suppliers.

Switching between the default energy supplier and Dover Community Power, or switching between Community Power's renewable energy options takes only a couple of minutes online, and can be done anytime. Please note that it may take one to two billing cycles to reflect the change. To begin, visit <u>https://www.communitypowernh.gov/granite-basic</u>. Scroll to the bottom of the page to the heading, "To get started." Select Eversource as the utility, and follow the instructions. To complete the change, customers will need their Eversource account number. Customers may also change energy options by calling Community Power customer service at 1-866-603-7697.

About Community Power

The Community Power program is authorized under state law RSA 53:E. It allows municipalities and counties to aggregate retail electric customers to "access to competitive markets for supplies of electricity and related energy services" on a voluntary basis. The program is self-funded through revenues generated by participating customers and does not use taxpayer funds to cover program expenses.

Since launching in early 2023, Community Power has introduced more competition and product options to an increasing number of electric customers in New Hampshire. Customers can easily choose from options including 33%, 50%, or 100% renewable energy on a month-to-month basis and can move between Community Power, utility supply options, and third-party providers.



Citywide parking ban in Dover begins Saturday night at 8 p.m.

Due to the forecast of snow beginning Saturday, Feb. 8, 2025, a citywide parking ban will be in effect beginning Saturday at 8 p.m., and concluding Sunday, Feb. 9 at 6 a.m. The ban will be in effect downtown on Sunday, Feb. 9, from 1 a.m. to 6 a.m. only. While in effect, parking is prohibited on:

- City streets, sidewalks or adjacent public parking areas.
- Third Street and Belknap parking lots, and the Orchard Street lot's public parking spaces.

While in effect, limited parking is allowed on:

- The Fourth Street lot s outside spaces only.
- The two outermost rows of the Library lot, facing either the Greek Orthodox Church or Atkinson Street.
- The first two floors of the Orchard Street Parking Garage, which require paid parking at all times, at \$1.25 per hour. Use Flowbird pay-by-phone app to extend parking time remotely. The top three floors of the garage are reserved for permit parking only.
- If the parking garage is at capacity, the Transportation Center lot is available for offstreet parking. The Transportation Center parking lot requires paid parking at all times. Please note that the Transportation Center lot may be full in advance of Saturday's storm, and motorists are urged to seek other options in advance of the storm and parking ban.

In addition to snow removal, the parking ban allows Community Services crews to treat the roads with salt and sand, and keep areas open for safe travel. Parking bans may also be declared after a storm to facilitate snow removal.

According to the National Weather Service, Dover may receive 5 to 10 inches of snow from Saturday evening into Sunday morning.

Avoid getting ticketed/towed during winter parking bans

318 parking tickets issued, 74 vehicles towed through three storms

The City of Dover urges the public to sign up for winter parking ban alerts to help them know when city-wide winter parking bans are in effect. When a parking ban is in effect, all vehicles must be off public ways and specific parking lots to avoid being ticketed and towed.

The city has issued 318 parking tickets and had 74 vehicles in the three winter parking bans of 2025.

Alerts are issued by phone, text and email. The City of Dover also utilizes its website, social media accounts, Channel 22, and press releases to local news media to notify residents about parking bans. The public can also call 603-516-PARK (7275) to check the parking ban status.

The city utilizes winter parking bans as needed to clear the streets of snow. Parking bans can occur during a storm or afterward for cleanup.

Be a hydrant hero

Help clear one of the 1,250 city hydrants to be ready when seconds count

With recent snow and ice, and more storms on the way, you can help Dover Fire and Rescue firefighters by becoming a hydrant hero. It doesn't take too long and may save a life or a home.

Crews from Dover Fire and Rescue and Community Services shovel out fire hydrants after each snowstorm to prepare them for an emergency. But with more than 1,250 city fire hydrants, this process takes considerable time.

During an emergency, time spent by firefighters searching for and clearing hydrants buried in deep snow, drifts, plowed snow, or covered in ice is precious time lost that could be spent saving a victim's life or extinguishing a spreading fire. A fire can double in size every 30 seconds, and it can take firefighters minutes to fully clear hydrants for use when every second is vital to a positive outcome.

Consider adopting a nearby fire hydrant to clear when it snows and be an unsung hydrant hero. Here are some hydrant-clearing essentials:

- Always wear highly visible clothing, such as a safety vest, to be seen by motorists.
- Clear at least 3 feet in all directions around the hydrant and shovel a path to the street.
- Clear any accumulated snow or ice from the hydrant by hand; hand tools could damage the hydrant.
- Pace yourself and be sure to take frequent breaks. If you experience shortness of breath or chest pain, stop immediately; call 911 or seek medical attention.
- If you observe any hydrant damage, such as water or ice coming from any opening, notify police dispatch at 603-742-4646.


Traffic signal inspection begins next week

A city consultant will begin a service inspection of the city's traffic signals on Monday, Feb. 10. The work includes a visual inspection of the traffic signals and accompanying structures from the sidewalk utilizing binoculars.

The firm, John Turner Consulting, will conduct the inspection to Federal Highway Administration standards to find any deficiencies, such as deterioration of coatings, cracking or wearing. Once the inspection is complete, the firm will provide a technical memorandum that includes any maintenance recommendations and estimated costs.





The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.



Feb. 14, 1792 — A new publication, "The Phoenix" appears in Dover, a month after the printing office of Eliphalet Ladd, burned down and caused the suspension of his former paper. His new title, "The Phoenix," begins on Feb. 14, and contains communications reflecting upon citizens for delinquency in not assisting in extinguishing the flames. His criticism continues until in the paper of Feb. 29, when the editor says: "Several pieces are received respecting the fire, but as there has been too much already published concerning that accident, we forbear troubling our readers with anymore on the subject — as it has become too personal and abusive to be admitted."

Feb. 12, 1844 — One of Dover's most notable sea captains, William Flagg, died on this day at 74. In early life he was an officer in the naval service of his country, for which he received a pension at the time of his death. He was afterwards an enterprising shipmaster, and long enjoyed the respect and confidence of his fellow citizens.

Feb. 16, 1920 — A large ice floe swept away the pilings of four spans of the Dover Point Bridge. The railroad section of the bridge was damaged significantly by the impact of the ice. This section of the bridge had been rebuilt only two years earlier after it had also been swept away by ice.

Feb. 9, 1999 — 105-year-old WWI veteran Damon Hall, a former Dover resident, received France's highest honor, the Legion of Honor, for his service on French soil during the war. Hall served as a railroad engineer and was among the first to hear the war had ended. At a ceremony in New Hampshire, the French Consul-General presented Hall with the award as several New Hampshire congressmen honored him with statements. Hall was the first in the state to receive this honor reserved for WWI veterans.
