Coming up at the next City Council meeting

City Council to consider plan to rehabilitate Garrison Hill water storage tank

The City Council will consider authorizing a \$2.9 million contract with the Sargent Corporation for the rehabilitation of the Garrison Hill water storage tank at its Wednesday, Jan. 29 meeting. If approved, the work will begin later this year.

The project includes draining the 1968 tank to allow a full inspection and treating and sealing any cracks. Sections of plumbing will be replaced, and a mixing system will be installed to ensure consistency of water quality. New SCADA components will be added to allow for real-time level monitoring. To prepare for the rehabilitation, the city installed the Smith Well Road water tank, allowing the Garrison Hill tank to be taken offline. The Council will also consider a related \$264,000 contract with Underwood Engineering for

Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday: 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. construction oversight of the water tank project. The city had previously contracted with Underwood Engineers to design the tank improvements.

There are two other related resolutions that reprogram unexpended Capital Improvement Program appropriations and unexpended bond proceeds to the Garrison Hill storage tank project. The Council held public hearings on those resolutions at its Jan. 15 meeting.

Also on the agenda is a resolution that would authorize the firm Eckhardt & Johnson to design and build a new heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) unit for the Community Services garage at 271 Mast Road for \$833,000. The current system is failing and needs to be replaced.

The Ethics Commission has submitted a recommendation report that will be brought up by the Council during its Council Correspondence agenda item. The report follows an ethics complaint filed by Dover resident Caitlin Wilkie against City Councilor Fergus Cullen. The Ethics Commission held a hearing on the complaint at its Jan. 2 meeting, with further deliberation at its Jan. 15 meeting.

The Dover Public Library will suspend its curbside service next week to allow the packing and transit of books to the McConnell Center where it will reopen on Monday, Feb. 3. The last day for curbside pickup is tomorrow, Saturday, Jan. 25.

Any books collected for holds or interlibrary loans will be available starting Monday, Feb. 3 when the library reopens in the McConnell Center.



When the Library reopens in the McConnell Center, Adult services will be located in the cafeteria, and Children's services will be in Room 305. Library events are already being held in Room 306.

Book returns remain open but do not return 'Library of Things' items

Dover Library's book drops remain open during its temporary closure; however, staff requests patrons not to return any 'Library of Things' items through the book drops, as they can be damaged. Keep them until the Library reopens in the McConnell Center.

Main library closed for a year

The 1905 Carnegie Library was closed for renovations earlier this month. The \$7 million renovation project will enhance the library by adding accessible entrances and

programming space, including additional meeting rooms. The historic front façade of the building will remain unchanged, as will its detailed woodworking throughout. The new addition on the parking lot side of the library will create two entrances: One for the Children's section on the ground floor and another for the main library section on the first floor.

Angle Street water main, stormwater drain replacement begins this month

The City of Dover will replace the water main and stormwater drain on Angle Street later this month. The project is slated to start on Monday, Jan. 27 and continue through mid-March.

Angle Street will be closed to through traffic during project work hours, Monday-Friday from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Angle Street residents may experience delays getting their vehicles in and out of the driveway during this time. Crews will give residents advance warning when their driveway will be blocked for utility work.

Parking on the street will be prohibited at all times until the project is finished – including nights and weekends. Other parking restrictions may be posted nearby if necessary.

At the beginning of the project, there will be a water shutoff affecting Angle and Academy street residents so workers can install a shutoff valve on the water main. This will allow crews to install the new main without affecting water service. Once the new main is installed, there will be brief water shutoffs to connect properties to it. City staff will provide at least 24-hour notice before the shutoffs occur.

The Angle Street closure is not anticipated to directly impact dropping off or picking up students at Saint Mary's Academy.





The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.


Jan. 28, 1761 — A group of Quakers from Dover, represented by Joseph Austin, Thomas Tuttle, and Samuel Austin, submitted a petition to the colonial Assembly. Acting on behalf of their community and under the directive of their monthly meeting held in Cochecho (modern-day Dover) in December 1760, they appealed to the Assembly to be exempted from a tax used to fund military enlistments. The Quakers, as pacifists, objected to being financially burdened by military-related expenses, a stance consistent with their religious

principles. In response, the Assembly scheduled a hearing and instructed the Quakers to notify the town's selectmen and the commanding officer of the local militia regiment. The selectmen and the officer were given an opportunity to argue why the exemption should not be granted. Notably, the Quakers were required to bear the cost of serving these notices themselves.

Jan. 28, 1825 — The New Hampshire Turnpike, from Portsmouth to Concord and passing through Dover, was surrendered by the proprietors to the State for the purpose of establishing a free highway.

Jan. 26. 1907 — Known as the Great Blaze, Mill #1 of the Cocheco Manufacturing Company was nearly destroyed by fire on this day. The alarm was given at 6:33 Saturday morning for a fire that broke out in the middle of the fourth story of the building. Some of the operatives in the fourth and fifth stories were cut off by smoke from the stairways, and there was only one fire escape on the back side of the mill. They became panic-stricken. Two jumped from the fourth-story window and were seriously injured—a dozen men slid down a rope that had been made fast inside a window, burning and horribly lacerating their hands by the friction, and some found their way to the fire escape. All those injured were sent to the Wentworth Hospital as quickly as possible. Streams of water were played from the engines on Washington Street, but the pressure of the water service was very poor, and very little water reached the flames. The Portsmouth Fire Company, The Cocheco Company, and the Williams Belt Factory gave assistance. The automatic sprinklers in all the stories save the fourth worked perfectly, and this, with the fire doors. no doubt, was the means that prevented the spread of the flames in the lower part of the mill. After the fire had been burning for nearly an hour, four men were discovered with their heads outside of a window in the fifth story on the back side, calling for rescue. The firemen at once put up ladders that lacked 20 feet of reach to the window. An extension ladder was added, and still, there was a lack of 10 feet. Lieutenant Bradlev of House 1 volunteered to lift a pole and lash it to the top of the ladder. The other end was lashed to the window sill by the men. Bradley stood at the top of the ladder, receiving the men as they slid down the pole. He did a most daring and heroic piece of work in rescuing them. No. 1 mill was erected by the Cocheco Manufacturing Company in 1877 for \$640,000. Five hundred hands were employed. The machinery cost upwards of a million dollars. The machinery on the three upper floors was ruined while that on the first and second was damaged only by water. This fire showed the need for additional fire apparatus. Soon after, 2,000 feet of hose and a fire net were purchased, with other appliances, to ensure greater safety for the firemen and to facilitate the discharge of their duties. In his last inaugural, Mayor White said the exhibition of bravery by the firemen that day stamped them as real heroes and won for them the lasting gratitude of our citizens.

January 1910 — Under a new New Hampshire law, effective Jan. 1, 1910, the auto registration fee was raised to \$10, and the speed limit in Dover raised from 8 to 10 mph and in rural areas from 20 to 25 mph. Later that same month, many complaints about horses raced on Sixth Street were raised. The mayor declared to end the sport. A speedway, wide enough for four or five horses, was to be prepared on Silver Street, starting at Arch Street. But local horsemen, not satisfied with the speedway, convinced the mayor to create a new speedway through Torr's Woods on Durham Road, starting near the location of the current high school.

Dover Senior Center plans trip to Block Island June 17-18, 2025



Do you know how to recognize warning signs of

suicide?

The Dover Mental Health Alliance and Dover High School are partnering with NAMI New Hampshire to offer free "Gatekeeper" suicide prevention training in February and May.

DMHA works with authorized NAMI NH Connect trainers to deliver the three-hour curriculum to school groups, organizations, businesses, and community members 18 and older throughout Strafford County. The program offers an integrated community approach to reduce suicide among youth ages 10-24 and adults.

Participants learn to identify warning signs and connect individuals with appropriate resources.

- Thursday, Feb. 6, 5-8 p.m., Dover High School library
- Thursday, May 8, 5-8 p.m., Dover High School library

"Our region is fortunate to have these organizations working together to provide mental health and suicide prevention education," said DMHA Co-founder Suzanne Weete. "It takes all members of a community to be engaged to end stigma and prevent suicide. These training opportunities are an invitation for community members to be part of the solution."

Trainers include community members, parents, first responders, teachers, administrators, prevention coordinators and case managers. The training is designed for anyone wanting to learn about suicide risk factors and warning signs. Coaches, teachers, faith leaders, business people, first responders, parents and young adults are encouraged to participate.
