ON THE AGENDA Coming up at the next City Council meeting

City Council to discuss stormwater grants, attainable housing

The City Council will hold three public hearings on accepting and expending grants at its July 26 meeting, followed by possible adoption.

The first public hearing is on whether to accept and expend a \$100,000 federal grant for the Chapel Street ravine stormwater treatment system property grant. This work builds upon the stormwater treatment study of the ravine, completed in 2022. The study evaluated options to utilize the ravine to treat the stormwater naturally before reentering the closed drainage system at the ravine's southern end near Chapel Street, thereby reducing pollutant loads to the Cochecho River and improving water quality. The next phase to be financed by the grant would be to secure land and/or easements to move the project toward implementation.

Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday: 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. The second public hearing is on the city utilizing a \$65,000 state grant from the New Hampshire Business and Economic Affair's InvestNH program for a regulatory audit. Funds would be used to solicit a contractor to work with Planning Department staff and the Committee to Address Community Housing Needs to assess current land use policies and definitions, identify potential barriers to attainable housing development, and assist in drafting amendment language for review and possible adoption.

The last public hearing on whether the Police Department should utilize a \$33,000 New Hampshire Office of Highway Safety grant. The grant would fund overtime for traffic enforcement patrols funded by the Office of Safety. This includes speed enforcement, patrols, pedestrian and bicycle safety, seat belt, distracted driving enforcement, educational presentations covering operator and pedestrian safety, and the purchase of five new vehicle radar units.

Also on the agenda is a resolution to continue working with the firm providing operation and maintenance to the closed Tolend Road landfill's pump station sewer force main for the coming fiscal year and awarding the contract for tree removal and other tree work services.

Dover's program to launch no later than May 2024

The Community Power Coalition of New Hampshire (CPCNH) Board of Directors announced its new electricity rates that begin on Aug. 1, 2023, where it continues to offer electricity supply options at lower rates than the default electricity provider, including options with higher mixes of renewable energy. At the direction of the Dover City Council, Dover businesses and residents will have the option to join Dover Community Power, similar to other competitive energy suppliers, utilizing the CPCNH rates and services by no later than May 2024.

CPCNH estimates its base electric rate of 10.9 cents per kilowatt-hour, effective through Jan. 31, 2024, will generate \$5.5 million of dollars in savings and \$1.7 million in community financial reserves for its 75,000 customers. In addition to its basic rate, CPCNH offers its customers the choice of 100%, 50%, and 33% renewable power at rates comparable to the default rates provided by the distribution utilities, which in Dover is Eversource. CPCNH's 50% renewable option is still below Eversource's default rate, which only includes 23.4% renewable sources.

In May 2023, the City Council authorized the Dover Community Power program with CPCNH, which allows the city to begin public outreach and prepare for the program's launch by May 2024. The community power program is authorized by RSA 53:E to provide electricity supply service to residents, businesses, municipal operations, and other types of customers on a competitive and voluntary basis, similar to other available competitive energy suppliers. CPCNH's goal is to leverage the combined purchasing power from its participating communities to create savings and new value for customers through individual programs, such as the Dover Community Power program. CPCNH membership has grown to 35 cities, towns, and counties and now represents more than 24% of the population, the organization states.

Community Housing Needs Committee seeks members

The City Council's newly established ad hoc committee seeks members to aid in its charge to investigate and make recommendations to the Council on ways to better meet the housing needs of the city and its residents.

Created through a May 24 City Council resolution, the Committee to Address Community Housing Needs will be comprised of stakeholders that include representation from the City Council, Planning Board, Dover Housing Authority, Community Action Partnership of Strafford County, members of the business and development communities, and Dover residents representing homeowners, renters, and landlords.

The purpose of this group is to build on related actions already taken by the city, assess barriers to affordability from a variety of perspectives, and propose long-term solutions to encourage the creation and preservation of attainable housing options for all. Part of the committee's charge is to deliver a report of its findings and recommendations to the City Council by Sept. 30, 2024, for consideration and possible implementation.

Parking restrictions next week for Hough Street culvert installation


A new culvert will be installed on Hough Street between Horne and Maple streets next week, which will allow the road to reopen once finished.

Precast culvert structures will be delivered on Tuesday, July 25, beginning at 7 a.m. Parking will be prohibited on Hough Street from the failed culvert to Grove Street to allow for delivery. Weather permitting, the structures will be installed from Wednesday, July 26 through Friday, July 28.

Community Services crews worked in the area this week in preparation for the new culvert, as a water main runs through the area. The crews installed water valve gates, so water service will not be affected when the culvert is replaced.

The culvert, which coveys Berry Brook, failed this spring during a rainstorm. City Council authorized the emergency replacement for \$125,012 at its May 24 meeting. The new box culvert's flat bottom will allow a more natural stream bottom in support of aquatic life and habitat.

Planning Board receives update on next phase of the Community Trail

The Planning Board recently received an update on the two design alternatives for the next expansion of the Dover Community Trail that would go through Bellamy Park.

Engineering consultants from the firm Fuss & O'Neill detailed the two alternatives for what's known as the Community Trail's Phase IV. Alternative 2 would utilize the existing pedestrian bridge across the Bellamy River but would conflict with the Bellamy Disc Golf course. Alternative 1 would begin from the high school parking lot and run in the woods between the athletic fields and the river, utilizing an existing trail, and then cross the Bellamy River with a new pedestrian bridge that would avoid the disc golf course. The consultants have recommended using Alternative 1.

The project is still in the preliminary design phase, and the consultants plan to continue work this summer before there is a public meeting where the proposed action will be presented. Construction of the ADA-compliant Community Trail is not expected to happen until Spring

2025 at the earliest. Additional design work would be needed, as well as gathering right-of-way agreements.

The city contracted with engineering consultants Fuss & O'Neill of York, Maine, in 2017 to design the next phase, which is planned to go through Bellamy Park. Last year, the City Council agreed to a change order to fund the design of an alternative crossing of the Bellamy River.

Dover Police to host National Night Out

Dover Police Chief William M. Breault is pleased to announce that the Dover Police Department will be participating in National Night Out on Tuesday, Aug. 1, 2023. The event will take place at the police station, 46 Chestnut St., from 4 to 7 p.m. and is free to the public. National Night Out is a time for community members to meet with police officers, discuss issues, learn what the police do, and unite with the common goal of crime prevention and safety.

The public will be able to take tours of the station and see a variety of displays around the building, including some of the specialized equipment and vehicles that the police use. These will include a police cruiser, a police motorcycle, the crime scene vehicle, and the tactical rescue vehicle. Several officers, including our K9 officer, will be at the event and interacting with the public.

"The Dover Police Department recognizes the importance of getting to know the members of our community and the value of positive police-community partnerships," Chief Breault said. "National Night Out is an excellent opportunity for police officers and community members to meet and interact. This goes a long way toward solving community problems together."

There will also be community organizations on hand to provide literature and other health, safety, and wellness information. Information on drug prevention, treatment and recovery resources, violence prevention, and local mental health resources will be available to the public through various booths at the event. The Loyal Order of Moose Lodge 443 will be outside the station cooking burgers and hot dogs free for the public.

National Night Out is an annual community-building campaign that promotes police-community partnerships to make our neighborhoods safer, better places to live. Dover's National Night Out is an opportunity for citizens to meet and engage with their first responders.



The Governor and Executive Council convened in Dover this week for their July meeting. For those unable to attend the meeting or want to view it again, a video of the meeting is available <u>online here</u>. The meeting is also airing on Channel 22.

The meeting, which took place at the Rotary Arts Pavilion at Henry Law Park, began with special recognition of the Dover400 committee for their work planning this year's anniversary celebration. Kathy Crompton of Dover was also commended for her work with Community Action Partnership of Strafford County. Shelli La Torre of Dover sang the National Anthem, and Revolutionary Councilor John Wentworth of Dover, portrayed by Kevin Collins of the Garrison Players, made an appearance.

The New Hampshire Executive Council, comprising five Councilors elected from across the state, serves as a check and balance to the authority of the Governor by approving all state contracts valued at \$10,000 or more, and confirming all appointments to state agencies, commissions, boards, and judicial appointments. When the military police look for him, Mac hitches a ride with Bob (Robert Ellis), a teenager who takes him home to meet the family, including Bob's sister, Pearl (June Allyson). Mac and Pearl eventually marry, but she worries whenever he sets foot in a plane -- especially when he's chosen as a test pilot for the new Sabre jet. The movie was released in 1955.




The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information <u>located here</u>.

- **July 22, 1765** A vote at the annual meeting in March to hire five school teachers for a sixmonth term was overturned after 33 "free-holders" requested it be reconsidered. No organized school districts were required by statute until after 1800, and, as a result, there were very few schoolhouses and instructors.
- **July 24, 1843** At a town meeting held in the new Town Hall, the town voted to convey to the County of Strafford the use of the Court Room with the necessary rooms for county officers, jury rooms, etc., as long as the Court remained in Dover, upon the payment of \$3,000.
- **July 23, 1849** Dover and the region suffered a great drought and heatwave this summer. The severe weather claimed the lives of several people in the area, all of whom died from sunstroke while at work in their fields.
- **July 21, 1954** Crews working on the steeple at Dover's First Parish Church discovered a secret, sealed box underneath the steeple's weathervane. Inside the metal box were copies of Foster's Daily Democrat from 1901, a history of the city, and other mementos. Who placed the box beneath the steeple remains a mystery.

July 26, 2001 — The City Council reviewed plans by the Police Department to move from the basement of City Hall to the former middle school across the street, now the McConnell Center. That plan was eventually rejected. The Police Department did move to a new facility on Chestnut Street in 2016.

Avoid input fees for permits and licenses by using new online application system

The City of Dover utilizes an online permitting system to streamline the process of applying for and renewing permits and licenses, submitting construction plans, and scheduling inspections.

Available 24 hours a day, the city's portal for permits, plans, and licensing at https://permits.dover.nh.gov allows customers to utilize the system without entering a municipal building. The portal has about 60 applications for permits, plans, and business licenses, ranging from driveway permits to health licenses. Customers can view the status of their application at any time, pay fees online, receive email alerts when a permit or license is issued, and download that permit or license from the site. The online process ensures timely review and processing of incoming permits.

Beginning July 1, 2023, the city now charges a "permit input fee" to cover the administrative cost for customers who seek to have city staff input permit data into the portal. The charge is \$40 an hour, prorated to the actual time to input the information into the system. The fee was instituted by the City Council when it adopted the FY2024 budget and accompanying schedule of fees. Manual entry of permits may extend the review and processing times.
