



# Waterfront project, park, before Planning Board Tuesday

The long-planned waterfront development takes another step towards reality on Tuesday, June 14, when the Planning Board is set to hear and potentially approve applications from the developer and the City of Dover to develop city-owned land on River Street.

The developer, Cathartes, received the conditional endorsement of the Technical Review Committee (TRC) for its planned project

Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday: 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. on May 5. It also received the endorsement from the Cochecho Waterfront Development Advisory Committee (CWDAC) on May 17. The City of Dover's waterfront park and public improvements also received TRC and CWDAC endorsements.

In its application, the city seeks to subdivide the land to create three new lots and a right of way. It also seeks a conditional use permit and site review. Cathartes' application through its business entity, CPI Management, LLC, also seeks conditional use permits and site review. With the conditional use permits, the developer seeks to increase the allowable height and density of its planned buildings. The subdivision of land allows the city to sell the land for private development to Cathartes as stipulated in the land disposition and development agreement between the developer and the city.

The Planning Board will hold public hearings on the city's and developer's applications at the meeting.

### Dover's George Riordan, killed in Vietnam War, finally awarded Bronze Star

At a ceremony held at Dover City Hall on Friday, June 3, Hospital Corpsman Third Class George "Doc" Riordan, who was killed in the Vietnam War in 1968, was posthumously awarded a Bronze Star Medal for his service. In attendance were military officials, including Portsmouth Naval Shipyard Commander Capt. Michael Oberdorf, Dover Mayor Robert Carrier, family and friends, and Sen. Jeanne Shaheen. George Riordan, a Dover native, was killed in action while serving in Vietnam as a medical specialist in the United States Navy. The medal was presented to George's brother, Martin Riordan, and his siblings at the June 3 ceremony. Sen. Shaheen and her staff worked closely with the Riordan family, as well as George's fellow servicemen, to obtain this medal from the U.S. Secretary of the Navy in 2021.

### School funding topic of Monday's workshop

The focus of the workshop will be on school funding in New Hampshire. The School Board has invited the NH School Funding Fairness Project to have a community conversation about property taxes and education funding in Dover and the state.

The workshop will be held at 6 p.m. in School Board Chambers, Room 306 of the McConnell Center.

In its regular meeting, scheduled to begin at 7 p.m. in School Board Chambers, the board is expected to adopt an updated hiring and advancement policy for adult education professional staff; discuss a memorandum of understanding between the Woodman Park School and the Seymour Osman Community Center; adopt staff and student handbook changes for the Dover Adult Learning Center; and approve updated job descriptions, among other agenda items.

## Planning Board to hold three public hearings on proposed zoning changes

The Planning Board will hold three public hearings on proposed zoning changes at upcoming meetings. The Planning Department recently sent letters to each property owner in the city informing them of the public hearings and a summary of the proposed zoning changes. <u>Click here</u> to read the letter.

The first public hearing is on Tuesday, June 14, at 7 p.m.; the second, on June 28, at 7 p.m.; and the last one one is on Tuesday, July 26, at 7 p.m. The public may also provide feedback through email at <u>Dover-Planning@dover.nh.gov</u> and by phone at 603-516-6338 (MEET).

The proposed amendments were developed with input from the public, Planning Board members and city staff. The full text of the proposed amendments is available in the Planning Department's office at City Hall, and on the Planning Department's webpage www.dover.nh.gov/government/city-operations/planning/.

The proposed changes include:

- Vehicle refueling and recharging stations and auto service stations to clarify signage permitted, screening required, hours of operation, and drive-through services;
- Conditional use permit criteria for self-storage facilities, including hours of operation and that internally accessed facilities shall be considered warehousing;
- Rezoning along certain lots on Fisher Street and Rutland Street from Gateway District (G) to Heritage Residential District (HR), as depicted on <u>this map</u>;
- Amending the Gateway District (G) architectural standards to clarify applicable locations and amending streetscape elements to include a three-story limit on Rutland Street in the Gateway, and limiting development to single family and two-family dwelling units, unless part of a mixed-use building;
- Replacing the term "sub-grade' with "fully below-grade" in the Central Business District's (CBD) building height conditional use permit section, and allowing non-residential requirements to be 20% of the structure or located on the ground floor;
- Adding solar/green roof requirements to the Commercial (C), Commercial Manufacturing (CM), and Innovative Technology (IT) Districts; and
- Fixing an errant reference in the sign ordinance from "Q" to "O".



### Road closures, parking restrictions in effect Saturday and Sunday for citywide events

To accommodate events in Dover this weekend, there will be limited road closures and parking restrictions throughout the city.

### Saturday, June 11

#### Partial closure of Oak Street from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Oak Street will be open one-way from Portland Avenue to Atlantic Avenue from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m, on Saturday, June 11. It will be closed in the other direction. The closure is to allow **Hot Rod City** to host its **annual open house and block party** at 99 Oak St. and have overflow parking along Oak Street.

#### Section of Ash Street is closed from 1 to 9 p.m.

Ash Street will be closed between Mount Vernon Street and Grove Street from 1 to 9 p.m. for a **neighborhood block party**.

### Sunday, June 12

#### New Hampshire Soap Box Derby, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The 78th annual New Hampshire Soap Box Derby will take place on Broadway on Sunday, June 12. The following road closures and parking restrictions will be in effect to accommodate the race:


• Broadway will be closed to all traffic between Oak Street and Hill Street from 8 to 5 p.m. Traffic will be detoured via neighborhood streets, including Park and Hill streets. Oak Street will remain open;

• Parking will be prohibited on Broadway starting at 6 a.m. Residents and businesses with driveways on this section of Broadway, or on Rose Street, will not be able to access their driveways by vehicle during this time and must plan to park on nearby side streets.

To create the framework for a stormwater utility, the City Council tasked city staff to work with the Ordinance Committee and the Dover Utilities Commission. At this kickoff joint workshop, the commission and committee members will review the ad-hoc committee's recommendations, review pending grant funding applications and the staff work's plan.

In August 2020, the Council established the ad-hoc committee to investigate, study, identify and make recommendations to the City Council about funding opportunities for existing needs and future stormwater and flood resilience management planning. Stormwater runoff travels across rooftops, roads, parking lots, and other impervious surfaces that can collect and carry pollution that ends up in local water bodies such as Willand Pond and the Great Bay Estuary and groundwater aquifers used for drinking water.


**June 16, 1852**— Candace Waldron, born enslaved to the Dover family of Thomas W. Waldron in 1781, died on this day. She was 71.

**June 14, 1856** — A silver salver was presented to Hon. John P. Hale by citizens of Dover, as "a token of their approbation of his fidelity to Human Rights."

**June 13, 1921** — The Board of Assessors announced the total inventory valuation of Dover for 1921 as \$13,677,024. This included mills and machinery at \$1,121,621, and 580 horses, 4 oxen, 889 cows, 92 sheep, 55 hogs, 3,913 fowl, 71 vehicles and 4 boats.

**June 10, 1968** — The family of 20-year-old Army Pvt. Gerald Frost, learned on this day that the young man was killed in action during the Vietnam War two days earlier. Frost was the second member of the Dover High School Class of 1966 to be killed in Vietnam, at that time, and one of 11 casualties from Dover during the war.

**June 10, 2002** — Dover Friends celebrate the 234th anniversary of the Quaker meetinghouse in Dover. The current meetinghouse, located at 141 Central Ave., next to Pine Hill Cemetery, is the third meetinghouse constructed by the Dover Friends, also known as Quakers. The original meetinghouse in Dover was raised on June 10, 1768, by men with pikes, gin poles and oxen. The first meetinghouse was located on Dover Neck in 1680. It was disassembled in 1769 and transported to Eliot, Maine, where it was erected at what is the present corner of State and River roads, but is no longer standing. The second structure was built about 1712 at the corner of Locust and Silver streets, which the congregation outgrew, prompting the construction of the current meetinghouse.



### Friends of the Dover Public Library June Book Sale

The Friends of the Dover Public Library are having a book sale beginning on Thursday, June 16 through Saturday, June 18 in the Library Lecture Hall. All leftovers will be free on Monday. June 20. Hours will be Thursday from 9 a.m. to 8:30 p.m., Friday 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., and Saturday 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. There will be hundreds of items for sale including fiction and nonfiction books, biographies, DVDS, CDs, kids' books, cookbooks and more. Prices range from 50 cents to \$3, and all proceeds go to the Friends of the Dover Public Library.

Also at this year's book sale you will be able to grab a piece of history. The Dover Public Library is in the process of replacing the slate roof that was original to the building built in 1904-1905. The Friends are selling the old slate for \$15 each and \$10 for each additional slate shingle, up to 10 slate shingles per person. They are being sold as is and will come with a certificate of authenticity with some history of the library. They all have holes drilled in them so they could make a nice wall hanging, garden decoration, or other repurposed use. The Friends will be selling only 1,500 of these pieces, so purchase one while you can. All proceeds from the sale of the slate goes into the Friends funds which are used to help support the library in many ways. The Friends pay for programs throughout the year, support the Summer Reading Program, purchase all of the museum passes available to patrons, and much more.

### **COVID-19 vaccines and testing**

Vaccines are available at most local pharmacies, including walk-in service at some. For more information, visit vaccines.nh.gov and click on "Find COVID-19 Vaccines".

Tests for active COVID-19 disease are available in locations across New Hampshire and include both the polymerase chain reaction (PCR) test and the rapid antigen test. The PCR test is for persons with or without symptoms of COVID-19. The rapid antigen test is for persons with symptoms and within a specific timeframe after onset of symptoms.

### Self-testing at home or anywhere

Self-tests for COVID-19 give rapid results and can be taken anywhere, regardless of your vaccination status or whether or not you have <u>symptoms</u>.

When to take a self-test:

- If you have any COVID-19 symptoms test immediately.
- If you were exposed to someone with COVID-19 test at least 5 days after your exposure. If you test negative for COVID-19, consider testing again 1 to 2 days after your first test.
- If you are going to an indoor event or a gathering test immediately before the gathering, or as close to the time of the event as possible. This is especially important before gathering with individuals at risk of severe disease, older adults, those who are immunocompromised, or people who are not <u>up to date on their COVID-19 vaccines</u>, including children who cannot get vaccinated yet.
