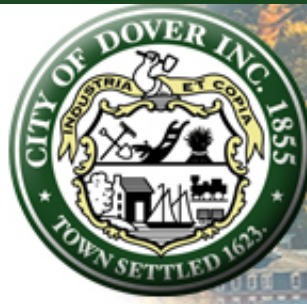

Garrison Hill

The City of Dover will launch its annual fireworks display from Garrison Hill on Thursday, July 2, at dusk, around 9:15 p.m. The rain date is Friday, July 10.

The best fireworks viewing will be at locations with a direct line of sight to Garrison Hill and Garrison Hill Tower. Some areas, such as Henry Law Park, have blocked sightlines.

Before the fireworks, the 39th Army Band will play at Henry Law Park at the Rotary Arts Pavilion from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m.

Central Avenue to be reduced to one lane Monday and Tuesday near Bradley Commons

As part of the Central Avenue Urban Core Water Improvements Project, a city contractor will be excavating on Central Avenue near Bradley Commons at 577 Central Ave. during the day on Monday, June 15, and Tuesday, June 16. The work is in preparation for overnight work on Tuesday, June 16.

At times, Central Avenue will be reduced to one lane of alternating traffic. Motorists should expect delays through the area. The contractor will maintain two lanes of traffic whenever possible, but lane closures are expected.

Traffic and parking restrictions in place Sunday for Garrison School event

Dover Police Chief David Terlemezian announces the following road closures for Garrison School's Color Run/Walk on Sunday, June 14, 2026. The Color Run/Walk is a 2-mile run/walk course through the surrounding neighborhood streets to promote wellness, community and school spirit. Participants are encouraged to wear white or light-colored shirts and will be doused with "color" at certain points along the course.

On Sunday, June 14, Garrison Elementary School, 150 Garrison Road, Dover, will host the annual Color Run/Walk event, starting and finishing at the school. The race begins at 9 a.m.

Between 9 and 10 a.m., there will be brief closures of Garrison Road and Shaws Lane to accommodate the event. On-street parking will be restricted where posted along Shaws Lane and Garrison Road on Sunday morning until after the event concludes.

Motorists and residents should expect brief delays on neighborhood streets, including Birch Drive, Linda Avenue, Riverdale Avenue, Arbor Drive, Hemlock Circle, Morningside Drive and Meridian Drive. Dover police and event volunteers will be on hand to help manage the flow of traffic. All roads will reopen to traffic by 10 a.m.

Parking for the event will be available in the Shaws Lane ballfields parking areas.

Temporary lane closures in place Tuesday on Spaulding Turnpike in Dover

The New Hampshire Department of Transportation will conduct system maintenance on the all-electronic tolling lanes of the Spaulding Turnpike in Dover on Tuesday, June 16, from 6:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.

To accommodate the work, lanes will be closed one direction at a time. Northbound lane closures will occur first, followed by southbound lane closures after the morning commute.

The closure is necessary to safely perform routine maintenance on the overhead toll equipment. Drivers will be guided by signs and traffic cones during the lane closures.

Drivers should remain alert and obey all posted signs.

Real-time traffic information is available at newengland511.org. Travelers can also sign up for My511 alerts for incidents and construction work.

Henry Law Avenue and Payne Street reconstruction to begin this summer

Project will disrupt use of lower Henry Law Park, along with travel, parking restrictions

The reconstruction of Henry Law Avenue, Payne Street and Henry Law Park will begin this summer. Work is anticipated to begin in the summer of 2026 and continue for a couple of years. A neighborhood meeting will be scheduled before work begins. A date has not been set, but it is anticipated to be in mid to late July.

The section of Henry Law Avenue to be reconstructed runs from Washington Street to Payne Street. Work will also include some utility work in Lower Square at the intersection of Central Avenue, Washington Street, and Henry Law Avenue.

The project consists of constructing new storm drainage pipe, structures, and an underground stormwater management system; relocating above-ground utilities underground; sanitary sewer reconstruction and rehabilitation; sidewalk construction; curbing installation; and surface restoration of affected areas, including mill/overlay and full-width roadway.

The City of Dover has contracted with Northeast Earth Mechanics, LLC, following a competitive bid process, for a project cost of \$12,836,873. The project will utilize \$3,500,000 from the Clean Water State Revolving Loan Fund and \$800,000 from Congressional Directed Spending.

Mayor leads ceremony to raise Pride flag at City Hall

The City of Dover raised the Pride flag in front of City Hall on Wednesday, June 10, during a ceremony led by Mayor Dennis Shanahan, who also read a proclamation recognizing June as LGBTQ+ Pride Month.

The ceremony was attended by city officials and community members, including City Councilors Bret Carmichael, Richard Robison and April Richer; Committee for Racial Equity and Inclusion members José Feliciano, who read Dover's land acknowledgment, and Maggie Fogarty, who also serves on the School Board; School Board member Elizabeth Goldman; state Rep. Alice Wade; and Zoning Board of Adjustment member Jackson Brown.

The proclamation recognizes Pride Month as a time to reflect on the history and contributions of the LGBTQ+ community and to reaffirm Dover's commitment to being an inclusive and welcoming community for all.





Public meeting to discuss future of Morningside Park on June 30

The City of Dover will host a community meeting on Tuesday, June 30, at 6 p.m. at Garrison Elementary School to help plan future improvements to Morningside Park.

At the meeting, city staff will discuss options being considered at Morningside Park and other city parks, as well as how the city budgets for park improvements. Staff will also discuss the former amenities at Morningside Park and why they were removed in 2024 for safety concerns.

The meeting will be held in the gymnasium at Garrison Elementary School, 50 Garrison Road. Morningside Park is located at 29 Riverdale Ave.

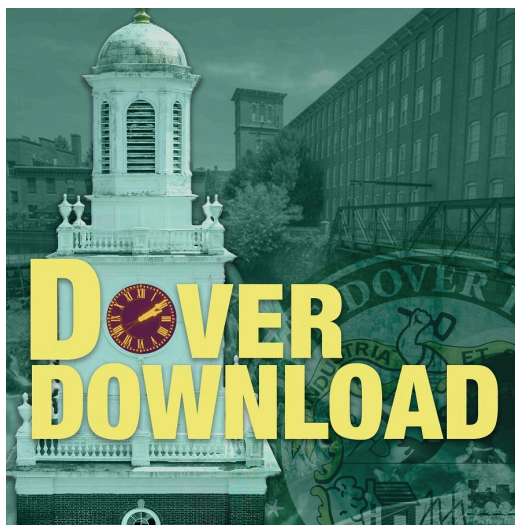

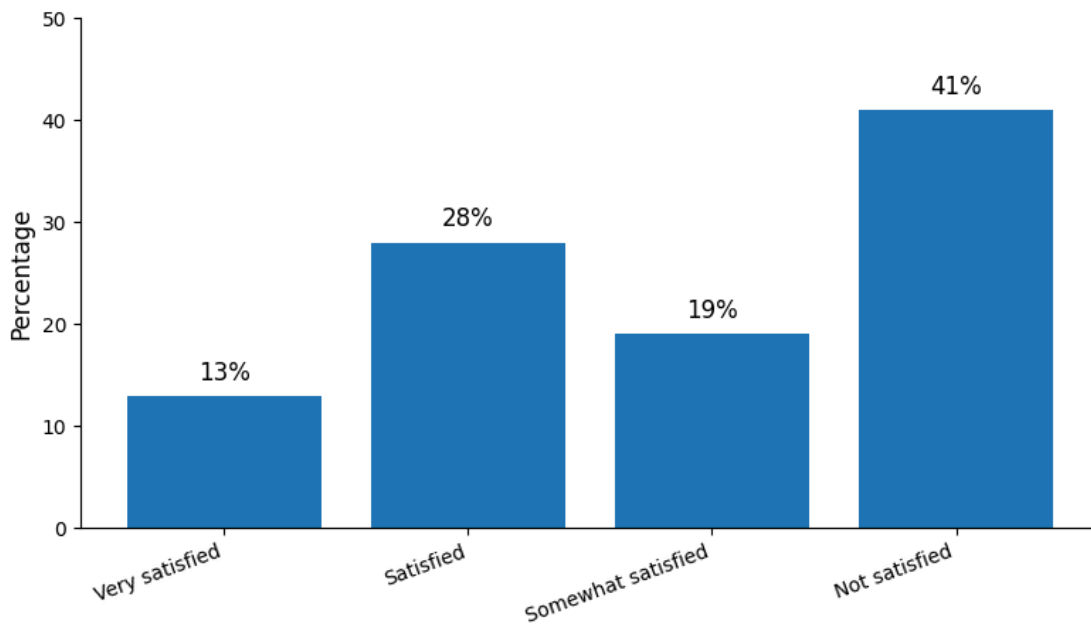

The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

June 16, 1852— Candace Waldron, born in Dover in 1781 as a slave to the family of Thomas W. Waldron, died on this day at 71 years old. Candace was born near the end of the American Revolution, at a time when New Hampshire and the new nation were beginning to speak more forcefully about liberty and independence. But for enslaved people, those ideals did not immediately bring freedom. In 1790, the first federal census recorded 158 enslaved people in New Hampshire, along with hundreds of free Black residents. By the mid-1800s, slavery had largely disappeared from daily life in New Hampshire, though the state did not formally abolish it until 1857, five years after Candace Waldron's death. In Dover, the issue remained present in public life. In 1850, just two years before Candace died, women from Dover petitioned the federal government to abolish slavery and the slave trade in the District of Columbia.

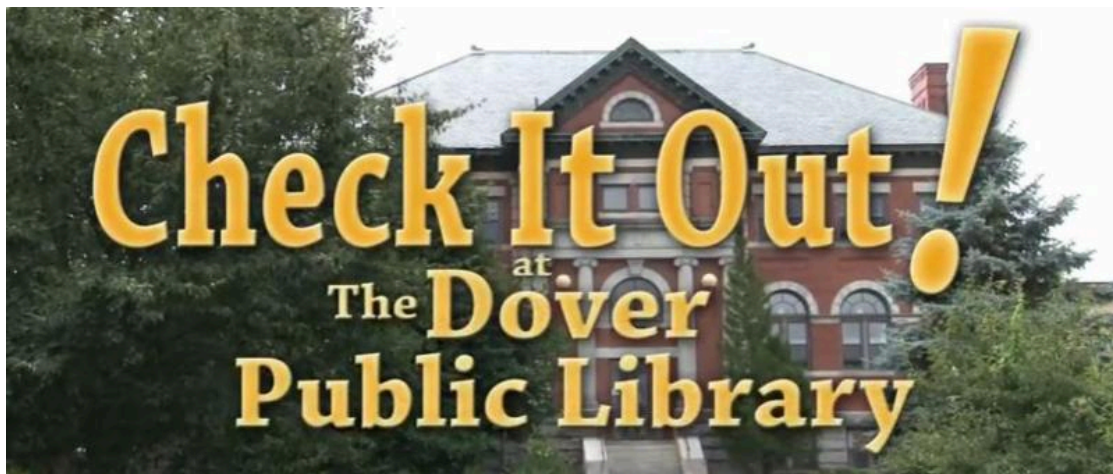
June 14, 1856 — A silver salver was presented to the Hon. John Parker Hale by the citizens of Dover as "a token of their approbation of his fidelity to Human Rights." A salver is a decorative serving tray, and in this case it was more than a formal gift. It was a public statement of support for one of Dover's most prominent citizens and one of the nation's leading antislavery voices. Hale was born in Rochester in 1806, studied at Phillips Exeter Academy and Bowdoin College, and was admitted to the New Hampshire bar in 1830. He soon opened a law practice in Dover, where he built both his professional life and his political career. He later purchased the Central Avenue home now known as the John P. Hale House, part of the Woodman Museum campus. Hale served in the New Hampshire Legislature and in the U.S. House of Representatives before entering the U.S. Senate in 1847. His opposition to slavery put him at odds with many in his own party, especially after he opposed the annexation of Texas because it would expand slave territory. That stand cost him politically, but it also helped make him a national figure in the antislavery

movement. By the time Dover citizens honored him in June 1856, the nation was deeply divided over slavery. The Kansas-Nebraska Act had reopened the question of slavery's expansion, violence had erupted in Kansas, and the country was moving closer to civil war. In that moment, Dover's presentation of the silver salver was a visible tribute to Hale's willingness to take unpopular stands in defense of human rights. Hale later served again in the Senate, became associated with the Free Soil and Republican movements, and was appointed minister to Spain by President Abraham Lincoln. He died in Dover in 1873 and is buried in Pine Hill Cemetery.

June 16, 1862 — A heavy frost destroyed the corn in many places in Dover.

June 12, 1921 — The Dover Board of Assessors announced the total inventory valuation of the City for 1921 as \$13,677,024. This included mills and machinery at \$1,121,621, and 580 horses, 4 oxen, 889 cows, 92 sheep, 55 hogs, 3,913 fowl, 71 vehicles and 4 boats.

June 12, 1999 — Merrimack-based PC Connection, which also operated a call center out of a 16,000-square-foot space in the Cocheco Falls Millworks, announced it was expanding its space in the mills to 32,000 square feet and would employ more than 200 people. PC Connection, now known as Connection, no longer operates out of the Dover mill complex. The Cocheco Falls Millworks were purchased by Eric Chinburg and partners in January 2012 and is now called Cocheco Mills.



Learn to decipher American Revolution portraits in virtual lecture with Dover Public Library

It wasn't easy convincing George Washington to sit for a portrait, but when Gilbert Stuart finally convinced him in his last year of presidency, the artist had an important task on his hands: how do you depict the leader of a new nation? With hidden images of hope and references to the Roman Republic, of course!



Explore American portraits painted and sculpted during the years leading up to, and the decades after, the Revolution in the virtual lecture "Portraits of a Revolution" with Art Historian Inez McDermott. The program, in partnership with Tewksbury Public Library, takes place on Wednesday, June 17, at 7 p.m. [Register](#) to receive a link to the livestream.

In the talk, McDermott will examine portraits of founding "fathers" and "mothers", as well as of lesser-known individuals, showing how these artworks are documents that can be read like texts. She will show how the ideals, values, and virtues expressly stated in the

foundations are easily identifiable in these portraits. Audiences will be introduced to art analysis skills, practice them, and learn how artworks can reveal so much about a culture. They will also study the tradition of portraiture and the influences of earlier art movements, artists, and artifacts that informed these American portraits.

McDermott, Professor Emerita of art history at New England College, has been teaching art history and curating art and history exhibitions in New Hampshire since 1986. In her classes and research, she explores how art can contribute to social engagement, participatory democracy, and activism. Her specific research interests focus on historical and contemporary New Hampshire art and artists, with a particular focus on 19th-century photography.

- A browse collection of books for all ages, featuring items purchased within the past six months.
- Pickup of books on hold. Patrons may place holds only on browse books while the temporary location is in operation.
- Four computers for public use, with printing capabilities.
- Magazines and newspapers.
- Museum passes.
- Homebound delivery and the off-site All Abilities Club.
- Interlibrary loan services to borrow books from other libraries.

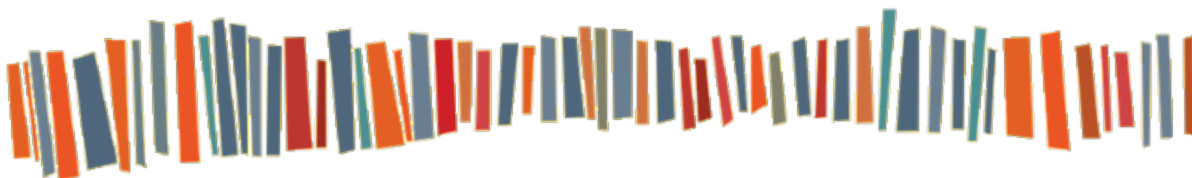

Winning design receives \$200 in Dover Dollars and \$150 for supplies

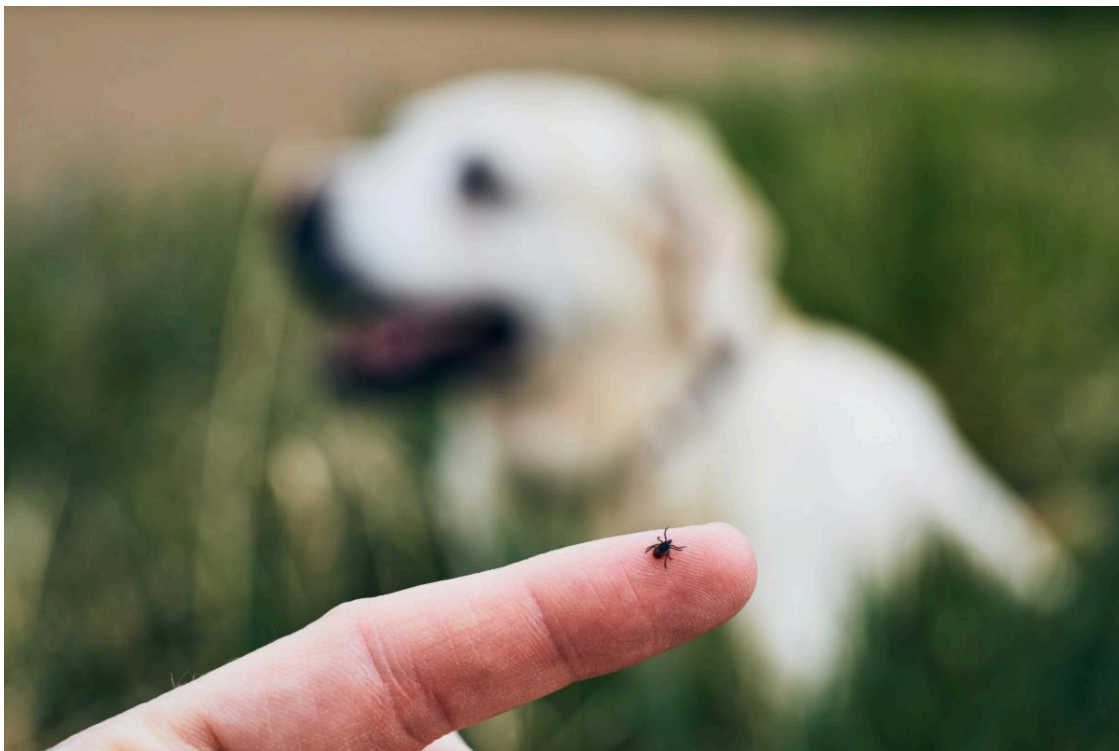

DHHS reminds Granite Staters to prevent tick and mosquito bites

The New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), Division of Public Health (DPH) encourages residents and visitors to stay safe from tick and mosquito bites.

“As weather gets warmer and tick and mosquito activity increases, the risk of tick and mosquito bites rises,” said State Epidemiologist Dr. Benjamin Chan. “Multiple diseases can be spread through bites, and there are simple steps people can take to enjoy the outdoors and stay healthy.”

The most common infections in New Hampshire spread through tick bites are Lyme disease, anaplasmosis, babesiosis, Powassan virus, and hard-tick relapsing fever (*Borrelia miyamotoi*). Mosquitoes in New Hampshire can spread illnesses such as Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE), West Nile Virus, and Jamestown Canyon Virus.

Ticks are typically most active from April to November, with tick encounters peaking in May and June. New Hampshire is already experiencing an active tick season, although the risk of tick bites exists year-round.

Warmer weather also brings mosquitoes, and the risk of mosquito-borne diseases begins in the spring and continues throughout the summer and into the fall. DHHS partners with municipalities across the state to trap and test mosquitoes from June through October, using test results to inform communities of local risk for diseases carried by mosquitoes.

There are steps everyone can take to prevent tick and mosquito bites, as well as the diseases they can cause:

- Protect yourself from tick and mosquito bites. Apply [insect repellents](#) to exposed skin and treat clothing with [permethrin](#), an insecticide, before going outside. When outdoors, wear protective clothing such as socks, long-sleeved shirts, and long pants. Wear light-colored clothing, which makes it easier to spot ticks.
- Check yourself for ticks. After being outside, check your body for ticks. You should also check your clothing, gear, and pets for any ticks. Wash and fully dry your clothes on high heat after coming indoors, which can help kill any ticks attached to clothing that you might not see.

- Promptly Remove Ticks. If you find a tick that has bitten you, remove it as soon as possible with a pair of tweezers to lower your risk of illness. Consider using the [Tick Bite Guide](#) to help you decide when to contact your healthcare provider. Shower as soon as possible after coming inside to get rid of any ticks that haven't bitten yet.
- Reduce the number of ticks around your home. Clear leaf litter, tall grass, or brush around your home and mow the lawn frequently to minimize tick habitats and reduce the chances of ticks coming in contact with people and pets.
- Reduce the number of mosquitoes in and around your home. Remove or cover outdoor items that contain standing water, where mosquitoes lay their eggs. Even small items filled with water can attract mosquitoes. Install or repair window and door screens to prevent mosquitoes from entering your home.
