# School Board meets Tuesday to review high school athletic field proposal

### School Board's recommendation due to City Council by June 25

The School Board will hold a special session on Tuesday, June 17 at 6 p.m. to review the <u>Joint Building Committee's</u> Dover High School Athletic Complex proposal. The School Board may also make its project recommendation to the City Council at the meeting, which is due to the Council by June 25.

School Board members Craig Flynn and Michelle Clancy, who are on the JBC, will give a presentation to the School Board, Flynn said at the board's meeting on Monday.

Last month, the City Council held a joint meeting with the School Board and the JBC to review the JBC's report and receive the committee's recommendations.

Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday: 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Subsequently, the City Council <u>introduced resolutions</u> on May 28 to fund the project and make necessary budget adjustments to the already adopted fiscal year 2026 budget. At its June 11 meeting this week, the City Council <u>held a public hearing</u> on the resolutions. The City Council will vote on them at its June 25 meeting.

At the May 21 joint meeting, the JBC proposed two base options for the School Board and City Council to consider, with numerous alternatives to increase or decrease the scope of work and cost of either base option.

Base Option A is estimated to cost \$11,614,000. This would replace Dunaway Field, track, grandstands, lights, and concession shacks.

Base Option B, recommended by the JBC, includes all of Base Option A, plus shifting Dunaway Field. This allows the rotation and expansion of the baseball field to create a second lighted multi-sport field. The JBC also recommends converting both fields to synthetic turf to accommodate current and future athletic demands. The JBC estimates this option to cost \$20,037,000.

## Dover's Gina Cruikshank named Citizen Planner of the Year

Longtime citizen volunteer and Planning Board Chair Gina Cruikshank was named the

2025 Citizen Planner of the Year by the New Hampshire Planners Association on June 6. The Citizen Planner of the Year award recognizes individuals who have demonstrated outstanding leadership and commitment to their community through volunteer planning service.

"Gina exemplifies the very best qualities of civic leadership, volunteerism, and forward-thinking community development," wrote Planning Director Donna Benton to the NHPA in her letter nominating Cruikshank. "Her presence as the leader on the Planning Board has demanded a respectful, professional, fair, and efficient planning process."

Cruikshank served on the City Council during its 2010-2012 term and was appointed to the Planning Board in December 2013. Her peers elected her as the board's vice chair from 2017-2018, and as chair in 2019 and annually since then. She has also served on Master Plan steering committees, dedicating "countless hours and nights to Dover's planning process," the planning director wrote.

Benton <u>announced the award</u> at the Planning Board's June 10 meeting, expressing her admiration for Cruikshank's "excellent leadership."

Mayor Robert Carrier and the City Council <u>honored Cruikshank</u> at the June 11 City Council meeting with a proclamation, expressing their gratitude for her "steadfast dedication to excellence and exceptional service to the community."

"Gina Cruikshank's tireless efforts have consistently aimed to protect property rights, promote responsible growth, and set an exemplary standard for professional conduct, courtesy, and respect," Carrier said, reading from the proclamation. "(Her) contributions are marked by exemplifying thoughtfulness, fairness, and a remarkable ability to articulate well-reasoned and pertinent insights; her diligence and dedication serve as a beacon of inspiration to fellow volunteers."

Cruikshank expressed gratitude to family, friends and colleagues for their support over the years as she accepted the proclamation. She gave a special thank you to former City Councilor and Planning Board member Dennis Ciotti, who first encouraged her to join the Planning Board. She also thanked Benton and Christopher Parker, the previous department director and current deputy city manager, for having an open door and being available to the Planning Board and the public for questions and discussions.

"When you receive an award like this, you never earn it by yourself," she said. "I have more support than I ever could've imagined."

# Traffic restrictions, road closures in place Sunday for Father's Day 5K road race

Dover Police Chief William M. Breault announces the following:

On Sunday, June 15, 2025, at 9 a.m., the 15th annual Father's Day 5K Run/Walk event will be held at Margaritas at 23 Members Way. This event is part of the Dover Race Series and benefits the Greater Seacoast Community Health network.

The following road closures and traffic restrictions will be in place:

- **Sixth Street** will be closed in the northerly direction at Indian Brook Drive between 9 and 9:15 a.m. to accommodate the early portion of the race.
- Indian Brook Drive will be closed in the westerly direction at Margaritas between 9 and 9:15 a.m. to accommodate the early portion of the race.
- Venture Drive will be closed to all traffic from 9 to 10 a.m.

Motorists should also expect lane shifts and brief delays on Indian Brook Drive and Sixth

Street between 9 and 10 a.m.

Police officers will help motorists access Homewood Suites and Lighthouse Credit Union on Members Way, but some delays should be expected. Parking for the event will be at the medical office park at 10 Members Way, with overflow parking at the adjacent New England Equine Center at 15 Members Way.

The course follows an out-and-back route utilizing Indian Brook Drive, Sixth Street, and Venture Drive.

# City of Dover announces summer sign clean-up

The City of Dover's Department of Planning and Community Development will conduct a clean-up of off-premise signs the week of June 16, 2025. The effort will target signs placed without permission, including those affixed to trees, utility poles, or within the public right-of-way.

In Dover, temporary signs are allowed only in certain commercial zoning districts and must meet specific size and liability requirements. With limited exceptions, temporary signs not located on the property of the owner—also known as off-premise signs—are prohibited throughout the city.

Sign clean-ups are conducted to remove unauthorized signs, such as those often found along roadways or attached to poles and trees. These signs can create safety hazards for motorists and pedestrians and contribute to visual clutter that detracts from the city's appearance.

Donna Benton, director of Planning and Community Development, said the clean-up also supports organizations that comply with city rules.

"Dover's sign regulations were created to balance the need for identification, advertising and communication with the need to protect public safety and maintain the city's visual appeal," Benton said. "Removing illegal signs helps ensure that those who follow the rules and obtain permits know their efforts are respected."

Property owners are advised to remove any unpermitted signs before the clean-up begins. Confiscated signs will be held at City Hall for 30 days before being recycled or discarded, unless claimed by the owner. Repeat violations may result in prosecution and fines.

The city's focused enforcement of the off-premise sign ban began in 2010. The Zoning Ordinance, <a href="Chapter 170">Chapter 170</a>, <a href="Section 170-50">Section 170-50</a>, outlines the city's sign rules. Information on political sign placement is governed by state law, <a href="RSA">RSA</a></a> <a href="664:17">664:17</a>, "Placement and Removal of Political Advertising."

# Refurbished "Butt-lers" return downtown to help curb cigarette litter

Fourteen refurbished cigarette disposal containers, known as "Butt-lers," have been reinstalled in downtown Dover after being restored over the winter.

Originally managed by Dover Main Street, the program is now overseen by the volunteer-led group Don't Trash Dover. Deb Clough, a longtime volunteer who formed Don't Trash Dover, spearheaded the effort to restore the neglected containers.

"I noted how bad they looked," Clough said, recalling how she spotted the weathered butlers while working on other downtown beautification efforts.

Over the winter, Clough stripped off the faded stickers, cleaned and polished the containers to restore their brushed-aluminum finish, and applied new decals. With help from Dover's Community Services Department, the butlers were recently reinstalled on municipal sign posts and light poles throughout the downtown.

Each of the 14 "Butt-lers" has been assigned to a Don't Trash Dover volunteer who empties it weekly. The group also maintains the containers and is working with Breathe New Hampshire to recycle the collected cigarette butts.

While the butlers are placed on city-owned fixtures and are not available for private businesses, Clough said their locations are intended to be convenient for pedestrians throughout the downtown area. Additional units may be installed in the future.

The refurbishment and reinstallation effort is part of Don't Trash Dover's ongoing mission to beautify the city. In addition to managing the "Butt-ler" program, the group organizes monthly cleanups and maintains flower plantings across the city.

Clough said she hopes the revived butler program will encourage proper cigarette disposal and reduce litter on sidewalks and streets.

# Dover Rotary, Dover Police to present program on how to avoid scams

Dover Rotary and the Dover Police Department offer residents an opportunity to learn how to protect themselves and their loved ones from fraud, phishing, and other scams targeting the Dover area. This free public forum is Tuesday, June 24, 2025, 5:30 to 7 p.m., at the Dover Police Department on Chestnut Street.

Dover Rotary President Harry Cheney said the club chose the topic of fraud/scam based on an increasing number of scams in the area.

"Scammers are getting very clever," Cheney said, "and we hope to provide the information necessary to prevent the potential loss of personal and financial information."

The Dover Police Department hosts public events, such as this, all year long, according to Lieutenant Alex Mitrushi of the Community Outreach Bureau. They range from big events like National Night Out on August 5th at the PD that bring in hundreds of visitors to station tours that could be a one-on-one citizen and officer.

"We refer to them as "Breaking Barrier" events and the hope is to strengthen the relationship between the police and the public," Mitrushi said.

The June 24 event will feature Mitrushi and Detective Lt. Mark Nadeau of the Special Services Bureau, followed by a question-and-answer period about the topic or other police related questions. A light meal will be provided. Registration is not required.

# Payne Street closed weekdays through June for waterfront work

Payne Street (formerly River Street) will be closed between Henry Law Avenue and Washington Street from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday — excluding holidays — through June 2025 to allow road and utility work related to the city's waterfront construction project.

Payne Street will reopen each day after work is complete. When the road is closed, the contractor will post road closure signs on Central Avenue at Hanson Street, Main Street at Washington Street, and Henry Law Avenue at Hanson Street to help inform motorists.

The closure allows workers to safely complete the installation of the stormwater treatment area, street curbing, and sidewalks, along with other related road work.







The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information located here.

June 16, 1852 — Candace Waldron, a formerly enslaved woman who was born in 1781 in Dover, died on this day at the age of 71. Candace was born into slavery in the household of Thomas Westbrook Waldron, a prominent member of one of Dover's most influential colonial families. The Waldrons were wealthy landowners and public officials, and like many elite families of the era, they enslaved Black individuals as part of their domestic and


agricultural labor. Although slavery was gradually abolished in New Hampshire by the early 19th century, people like Candace lived much of their lives under bondage and often remained with the households that once enslaved them even after emancipation. Records suggest Candace continued to live in Dover following the end of her enslavement, though little is documented about her personal life or whether she had any family of her own.

June 14, 1856 — The citizens of Dover presented a silver salver -- a decorative serving tray -- to Hon. John P. Hale as a symbol of their appreciation for his unwavering commitment to human rights. The inscription recognized Hale's "fidelity to Human Rights," a reference to his prominent role in the fight against slavery. Hale, a U.S. senator from Dover, was one of the nation's leading abolitionist voices in the mid-19th century. He was among the first senators to openly oppose the expansion of slavery and became a key figure in the emerging anti-slavery movement. A gifted orator, Hale used his platform to challenge the Fugitive Slave Act and denounce the Kansas-Nebraska Act, which threatened to extend slavery into new territories. The 1856 presentation came at a time of intense national division over slavery. Just weeks earlier, violence had erupted in Kansas between pro- and anti-slavery factions, and Massachusetts Sen. Charles Sumner had been brutally attacked on the Senate floor for his anti-slavery stance. In this volatile climate, Dover's tribute to Hale underscored the city's support for abolition and its pride in Hale's principled stand during one of the most turbulent periods in American history.

June 17, 1912 — Dover High School held its baccalaureate ceremony at First Parish Congregational Church, a tradition marking the beginning of graduation week. The Class of 1912 included 58 seniors, 30 of them young women, the largest graduating class in the school's history at the time. This milestone reflected both the growing population of Dover and the expanding role of public education in the early 20th century. It also highlighted the increasing presence of women in secondary education during a time when high school graduation was still a notable achievement, especially for young women.

June 15, 1999 — Dover Recreation officials finalized a study revealing strong local demand for a second sheet of ice at the Dover Arena. At that time, ice-time was so scarce that youth hockey teams were practicing as early as 4 a.m. The report by VSC Sports Consultants estimated the cost would be about \$3.5 million, stating the new rink would easily sell out prime slots. Then-Recreation Superintendent Gary Bannon and city leaders planned to propose a bond, potentially offset by funding commitments from local leagues and schools. The project did move forward, and by the following year, in 2000, Dover's second sheet of ice was open to the public. The new rink was named after Robert H. Foster and Charles E. Holt.

June 20, 2003 — Foster's Daily Democrat reported on this day that Dover Marine, located on New Rochester Road in Dover, received an early morning phone call for a special order that needed to be filled immediately. The order was for a 225-horsepower Mercury Optimax, then one of Mercury's biggest motors, at a cost of \$16,000. It turned out the motor was needed for then-President George W. Bush, who was spending Father's Day weekend with his family, including his father, former President George H. W. Bush, at their compound in Kennebunkport, Maine. One of the outboard motors on the family boat had broken down and Dover Marine was the closest location with a replacement. According to the report, Dover Marine workers removed the motor from another boat and had it ready and open for inspection when a group of people identifying themselves as Secret Service agents arrived. The motor was loaded into a truck and arrived in Kennebunkport by noon the same day.


