City Council budget deliberations continue

Public hearing on city portion of budget next week precedes final departmental budget presentations

The City Council will hold a special meeting on Wednesday, March 20, at 7 p.m. for a public hearing on the city portion of the proposed FY2025 budget. A public hearing on the school portion of the budget was held Feb. 28.

Immediately following the special meeting, the City Council will hold a workshop to receive the final budget presentations from the Community Services and Recreation departments and the Police Department's Parking Bureau.

The special meeting and workshop will be televised on Channel 22 and online at https://dovernh.viebit.com. They will also be posted on the FY2025 Budget Revealed online resource page, along with any budget documents presented at the meeting and workshop.

8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

The Council will continue budget deliberations at a workshop on Wednesday, April 3. Following the workshop, if the Council is ready, it will call a special meeting to adopt the FY2025 budget. If the Council does not adopt the budget that night, it will do so the following week on Wednesday, April 10.

As the City Council continues to review the proposed fiscal year 2025 municipal budget, the Community Services Department will host a public open house to provide information and answer questions about the budget and the department's operations.

The budget open house will be held on Thursday, March 28, from 5 to 7 p.m. at the Community Services facility, 271 Mast Road. Attendees can tour the facility, speak with staff about department operations, and learn details about Community Services' portion of the fiscal year 2025 budget proposal.

Community Services oversees a wide range of municipal operations and public works functions in Dover. The department's responsibilities encompass areas such as water and sewer operations, facilities maintenance, cemetery

operations, engineering, road repairs, snow removal, stormwater management, parks and grounds, solid waste and recycling, utilities, and more.

The Run Before You Crawl 5k is the 2024 Dover Race Series kick-off and features a new course that includes familiar territory and some new areas. Starting on Fourth Street, in front of Harvest Church, we head towards Washington Street via Snows Court & Prospect Street; connect with Washington and up the infamous Whittier Street hill, down 6th Street, and back to Chestnut.

Once the race is over, head over to the 2024 Restaurant & Pub Crawl. Dover Main Street has teamed up with Sam Adams, Truly, Guinness, and the downtown restaurants and bars to kick off St. Paddy's Day Weekend. Street closures, parking restrictions for Run Before You Crawl 5K

Dover Police Chief William M. Breault announces the following street closures and parking restrictions for the 10th annual Run Before You Crawl 5K event, presented by Dover Main Street. A downtown Dover restaurant and pub crawl will follow the race between 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. Find more information at https://dovermainstreet.org/race/index.php.

On Saturday, March 16, 2024, between 9 and 10 a.m., Chestnut Street will be closed to all southbound traffic from Sixth Street to Third Street. Additional closures will be in effect during brief periods to accommodate the race flow on Fourth, Washington, Whittier, and Sixth streets. Fourth Street will be closed to all traffic from Grove Street to Chestnut Street between 8 and 10 a.m.

The event starts and ends on Fourth Street, between Grove and Chestnut streets. The course will follow a clockwise loop of Fourth, Prospect, Washington, Whittier, Sixth, and Chestnut streets. Dover police personnel and event volunteers will be on hand to help manage the traffic flow along the race route.

Parking restrictions will be posted and in effect on Saturday morning along Sixth Street from Hillside Drive to Chestnut Street, and Fourth Street between Grove and Chestnut streets.

COAST bus service and connections at the Dover Transportation Center, 33 Chestnut St., will remain in effect throughout the race, but some route diversions will be required due to the above-listed street closures. Amtrak Downeaster passenger train service will not be interrupted, but train passengers intending to park at the Transportation Center may need to plan for alternate parking arrangements.

City Hall financial system maintenance to affect some services Tuesday afternoon

Information on property taxes, water/sewer billing affected

Due to the planned maintenance of the City Hall's networking infrastructure, the financial system will be offline on Tuesday, March 19, 2024, starting at 3 p.m. The system will be back online when City Hall reopens at 8:30 a.m. on Wednesday, March 20.

When the system is offline, customers not be able to pay their property taxes and water/sewer bills; City Hall employees will also not be able to tell customers what their balances are due for these items. However, the City Clerk's Office will still be able to process motor vehicle registrations, dog licensing, vital records requests, and voter registrations.

River Street to close in April for summer

Closure related to utility, roadway work for waterfront project

River Street will be closed to through traffic 24 hours a day beginning in April and continuing through the summer. The target closing date is Monday, April 8, which is anticipated to last at least through Labor Day in September 2024.

The closure will allow contractors to install a new water main, stormwater drainage, and electrical duct bank related to the waterfront project and complete other roadway work. Work is also underway to repair the damaged Cochecho River shoreline next to River Street.

When River Street is closed, public parking is also prohibited. However, public parking is available nearby, such as on Henry Law Avenue.

Dover City Council proclaims March as Women's History Month

Mayor Robert Carrier issued a proclamation at the March 13 City Council meeting to recognize March as Women's History Month in Dover.

"Women's History Month provides an opportunity to reflect on the progress made towards gender equality while also acknowledging the ongoing work needed to ensure that all women have equal opportunities, rights, and representation in every aspect of society," the mayor said, reading from the proclamation.

Throughout the proclamation, Carrier highlighted how women have made integral contributions across societies and fields despite facing adversity. He stated that Women's History Month commemorates their "extraordinary accomplishments" and "resilience, leadership and perseverance."

The proclamation also emphasizes that by celebrating Women's History Month, the city reaffirms its "commitment to creating a more inclusive and equitable world where every woman and girl can thrive, free from discrimination and oppression."

At-large City Councilor Linnea Nemeth accepted the proclamation on behalf of the Women's Empowerment Club at Dover High School. She noted that this year's Women's History Month theme is "Inclusion" and plans to present the proclamation to the high school club.

Women's History Month traces its roots to the first International Women's Day celebration in 1911. It became an annual designated month in the U.S. in 1987 after being petitioned by the National Women's History Project.





The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.


March 15, 1831 — A large seal, six feet, eight inches long, and weighing nearly 400 pounds, was caught in the Cochecho, a few miles below the town.

March 17, 1833 — Heavy rainfall and melting snow caused significant flooding throughout the region, including along the Landing in Dover, where several buildings were damaged. Several mills and nearly every bridge in the area were heavily damaged or destroyed.

March 1912 — Col. Daniel Hall is awarded a contract to erect a Soldiers and Sailors Civil War Monument, which he proposed to be presented to the City of Dover and placed on the lawn between the Public Library and high school at the time (now the McConnell Center). The eventual completion of the monument in October 1912, followed several years of community efforts to memorialize those who had served during the Civil War. Col. Hall, a veteran and resident of Summer Street in Dover, donated the funds for the statue. The monument was designed by Lewis J. White of Quincy, Mass., and made with 60 tons of granite from Barre, Vermont. According to some reports, a small, copper time capsule of various artifacts was placed behind the second and third stones behind the letter "V" in Dover. The monument was dedicated in October 1912 to great fanfare. In 2012, a wreath ceremony was held to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the monument. The ceremony can be viewed here.

March 17, 1913 — Dover Police Patrolman Edward Young retired from the force after 15 years of service. He began as a night patrolman in 1898 and, six years later, was promoted to the day force. Young was well-liked and respected in the community, which was evident a few months prior when he was elected Strafford County Sheriff by a wide margin.

March 17, 2004 — Former Dover Schools Superintendent Bernard Ryder started a \$500 scholarship at Dover High School for a graduating senior's college textbooks. Eligible students would be randomly selected, receiving Ryder's semi-autobiographical book with a joke bookmark designed by an art student. The first scholarship was awarded in June 2004, with funds deposited into the winner's college bookstore account. Ryder, who led Dover's school district from 1973-1983, planned to continue the scholarship honoring his late family for 10 years as a way to "give back" after appreciating his time in Dover.

Contamination is a word often mentioned when talking about recycling. What is it? It is when your recycling contains trash. If it's not a bottle, jar, jug or tub with a #1, #2, #5 marking, it's not recyclable.

It's important to know that not all #1, #2, #5 marked plastics are currently being recycled; these include soft plastics such as bags, Styrofoam, hard plastics which are solid color black, blue and brown. Materials must also be clean and free from contaminants such as food, liquids, and plastic bags.

Food, cash donations, and donated bus tickets collected on 'Leap Day' benefit food pantry
