The City Council will hold its next budget session on Wednesday, March 29, where it will review the fiscal year 2024 budget proposal for Community Services.

The budget meeting will be held in Council Chambers at City Hall. The Community Services budget presentation will follow an update on bids for site work related to the development of the waterfront project, which begins at 6 p.m.

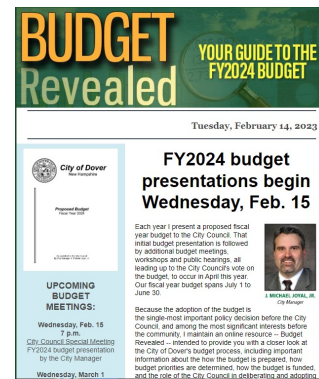

Council to hold special meeting on bids for waterfront public improvements

The City Council will hold a special meeting on Wednesday, March 29, at 6 p.m. to review the bids received for the public improvement portions of the waterfront project and hold a first reading on a resolution to authorize bonding and FY2024 capital improvements appropriations for the waterfront public improvements.

The resolution would be referred to a public hearing at the Council's April 12 meeting, followed by a vote at its April 26 meeting. The resolution requires a two-thirds majority vote by the City Council to be authorized.

Last week, the city received two bids for waterfront site improvements: Severino Trucking Co., Inc. and NorthEast Earth Mechanics, LLC. Severino Trucking's base bid is \$19,215,000; NorthEast Earth Mechanics is \$18,136,000. The two other firms pre-qualified by the city, S.U.R. Construction, Inc., and Sargent Corporation, did not submit proposals. City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr., said at this week's City Council meeting that bid prices were higher than anticipated.

Public improvements include constructing a new street system to provide site access and the utilities necessary to serve the proposed buildings. Other improvements include the construction of a new 3.4-acre public riverfront park, stabilizing the Cochecho River shoreline, grading the elevation to account for projected sea level rise, and installing a stormwater management system with green infrastructure.

As part of the Land Development Agreement between the City of Dover and Cathartes, the developer selected for private developments to the site, the city agreed to fund public improvements that would be repaid through tax guarantees. The city's debt service would be paid utilizing funds from the waterfront tax increment finance district.

Cathartes plans to build three mixed-use buildings, two multi-family buildings and three clusters of townhouses. The buildings include 418 residential units and approximately 26,000 square feet of commercial space. Carthartes site plan and the city's public improvements have received Planning Board approval.

Resident raising money for Arts Commission-endorsed Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles commemorative marker

Dover resident James Lane is raising money to create a permanent commemorative marker that honors the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles (TMNT) birthplace, with original custom artwork donated by co-creator Kevin Eastman.

Co-creators Eastman and Peter Laird lived at 28 Union St. in Dover, where they founded Mirage Studios and created the popular ninja turtle comic in 1983. The project, endorsed by the Dover Arts Commission, would install a specialized maintenance hole cover on the sidewalk near where Eastman and Laird's house once stood, as it has since been demolished.

"As a lifelong TMNT fan who lives in the neighborhood, I'd often walk my dogs past the spot and think about how it deserves recognition," Lane [writes in his pitch on the Indieogogo fundraising website](#). "In November 2020, I came up with this project idea and decided I could make it happen. Since then, I have been working with various municipal committees and

departments, researching vendors and manufacturing processes, and developing a strategy. To my great joy, original creator Kevin Eastman has offered to donate new custom artwork!”

Lane’s original vision was to utilize a maintenance hole on the street in front of where 28 Union St. stood; however, he has agreed with the city’s safety suggestion for installing the unique marker on the sidewalk instead.

Lane’s fundraiser is not through the City of Dover. Instead, he will raise money and donate it to the city for the TNMT commemorative marker. Lane estimates the total cost is \$13,000. All funds raised beyond the expenses directly related to this project will be donated to the following turtle-related registered nonprofits:

- The Seacoast Science Center in Odiorne State Park, in Rye, New Hampshire
- Turtle Rescue League, in Southbridge, Massachusetts
- Turtle Conservancy, in Ojai, California

Separately, the Dover Arts Commission and the city’s Planning Department are working with the New Hampshire Division of Historical Resources and the Department of Transportation to install a historical highway marker honoring the TMNT’s birthplace at the intersection of Union Street and Central Avenue (State routes 9 and 108). Lane, the Arts Commission and the city plan to unveil the markers during Dover’s 400 celebrations and TMNT’s 40th anniversary.

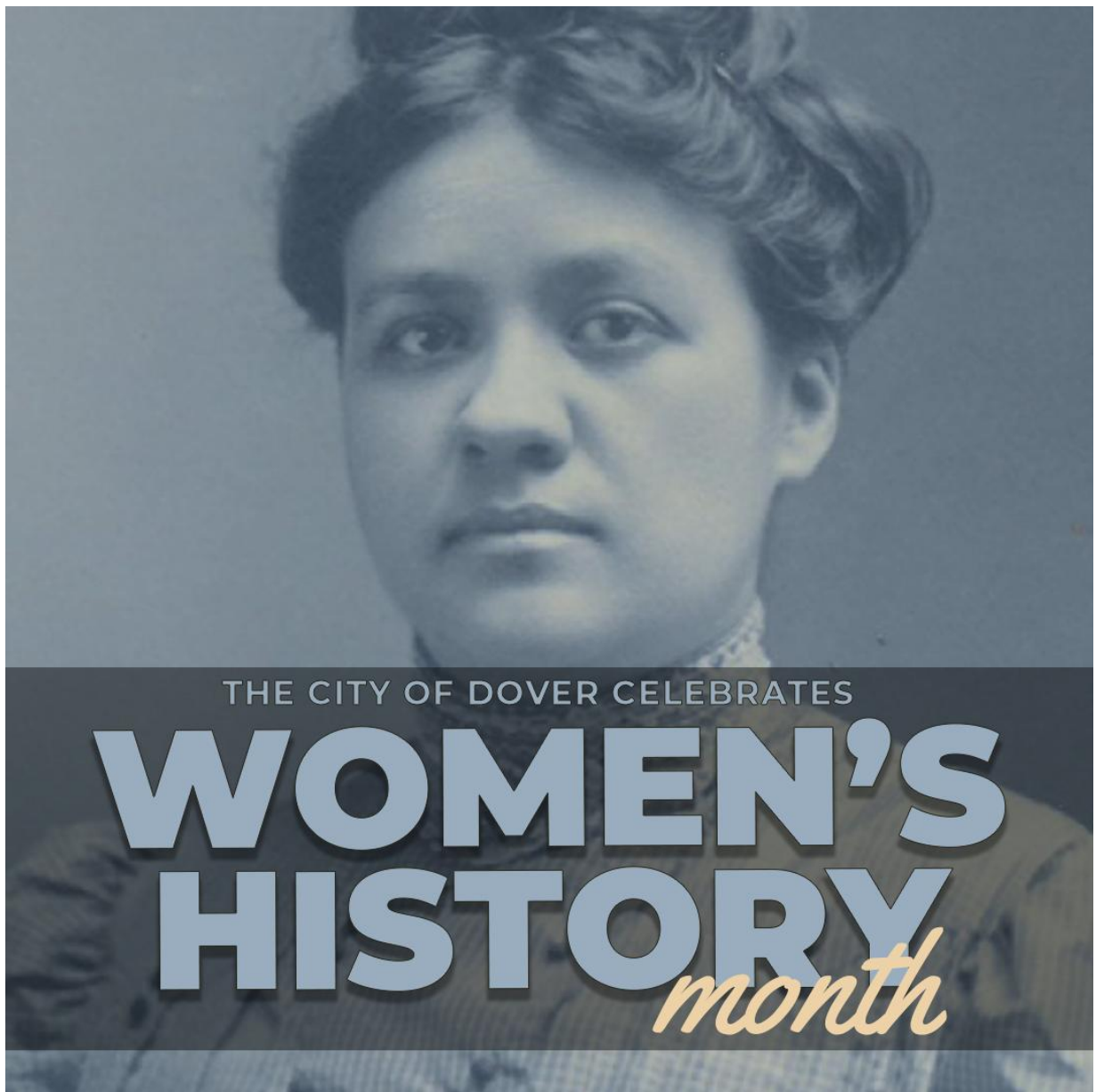
City Council proclamations recognize Dover High School Hockey Team and Cheerleaders



The Dover High School Varsity Cheerleading Squad, pictured above, was honored by Mayor Robert Carrier at the City Council meeting this week after winning the Division I state championship earlier this month. In his proclamation to the team, Carrier said they “demonstrated an unwavering commitment to excellence in cheerleading, exemplifying the best qualities of teamwork, dedication, and sportsmanship.”



Mayor Robert Carrier and the City Council honored the Dover High School Boys Hockey Team, which won the Division II state championship on March 11, beating Merrimack 4-2. In a proclamation to the team, Carrier said the hockey players “exhibited exceptional skill, determination, and sportsmanship throughout the season” and demonstrated an “unwavering commitment to excellence, both on and off the ice, inspiring and uniting the community in their pursuit of victory.”



Nellie Brown Mitchell could 'lift every voice'

Dover native Nellie Brown Mitchell was an African-American concert singer and music educator who trained as a singer at the New England Conservatory of Music, earning her diploma in 1879.

Mitchell was a popular singer in churches in New England and was at one point the lead soprano at four white churches in Boston. She gave concerts throughout and beyond the New England region. In 1874 she gave a concert at Steinway Hall in New York City.

In the 1880s, Mitchell toured with the Bergen Concert Company. She also formed her own company, the Nellie Brown Mitchell Concert Company. From 1879 to 1886, she was the musical director at Bloomfield Street Church in Boston. She sang at the first meeting of the National Negro Business League, in Boston in 1900.

Mitchell was head of the vocal department at Hedding Academy in New Hampshire. In 1876, she conducted a group of 50 girls in a cantata, Laila, the Fairy Queen, as part of the Centennial Musical Festival in Boston. After she retired from touring, she taught voice techniques to African-American women students in Boston.

In 1909, Mitchell organized and hosted the first meeting of the Chaminade Musical Club, for “the leading women musicians” of Boston, named for French composer Cécile Chaminade. Mitchell also invented the “phoneterion”, a device meant to help train proper tongue position for vocal students.

Nellie E. Brown married Charles Lewis Mitchell, a disabled veteran of the American Civil War, having lost a foot as a member of the 55th Massachusetts Infantry Regiment. He was also one of the first two African-American members of the Massachusetts legislature, along with Edward G. Walker. Nellie Brown Mitchell was widowed in 1912 and died in Roxbury, Mass. on Jan. 5, 1924, at 78 years old.

In recognition of her contributions to music and her community, the Black Heritage Trail of New Hampshire had her headstone at Pine Hill Cemetery engraved for Mitchell last year, which had remained blank since her death.

Mitchell’s legacy lives on through her music and the impact she had on those around her. Her story serves as an inspiration to all and a reminder of the important contributions made by women throughout history.

City and contracted crews resume storm debris cleanup

City public works crews along with a contracted arborist, are resuming woody debris cleanup left from the January winter storm.

Winter storms in February and March had pulled city personnel off tree debris cleanup to focus on storm cleanup and other priorities. The work is expected to take several weeks to finish, as weather conditions and work priorities allow. Crews are not accepting new work orders for debris pickup.

Residents are encouraged to bring woody debris to the Recycling Center for free disposal. It is open Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

State seeks input from New Hampshire residents and tourism industry members

New Hampshire residents are being asked to participate in an online survey aimed at helping inform the future of tourism in the state. Tourism is the state's second-largest industry and a vital economic engine. The survey is one part of the research being gathered to help in the development of a five-year statewide tourism strategy and an aligned implementation plan.

The Division of Travel and Tourism Development (DTTD) is collaborating with Jones Lang Lasalle Americas (JLL), a national leader in destination strategies, on the tourism development strategy.

The survey should take about 15-20 minutes. Questions include how residents view New Hampshire, perceptions of people traveling to the state, views on tourism, and also how the state is marketed outside of New Hampshire.

As part of the information-gathering process, members of the state's tourism industry are also being asked to participate in a stakeholder survey. That survey asks questions such as: what are the state's strengths as a destination? What are its weaknesses? What are opportunities to improve the state's tourism and hospitality industry? Tips for curbside trash and recycling pickup

Community Services Director John Storer reminds the public of the following trash and recycling regulations:

- All trash for pickup is required to be wholly contained in Dover trash bags, secured and tied;
- 15-gallon bags have a 20-pound limit;
- 30-gallon bags have a 35-pound limit;
- All recycling is to be contained in Dover recycling bins;
- Cardboard must be broken down and flat;
- Recycling plastics are limited to #1, #2 and #5;
- Bulky waste, such as furniture, toilets, mattresses, box springs, couches, chairs, and other large, non-metal items, must have a Dover bulky tag to be picked up. Bulky tags are available where Dover trash bags are sold;
- Owners are responsible for cleaning up any remaining debris from trash pickup.

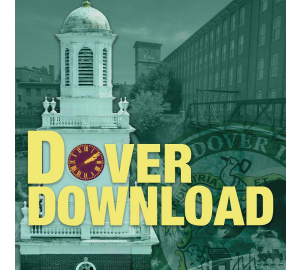

The following events are from a variety of historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information [located here](#).

March 26, 1759 — At a public town meeting held at the old meeting house on Pine Hill, it was

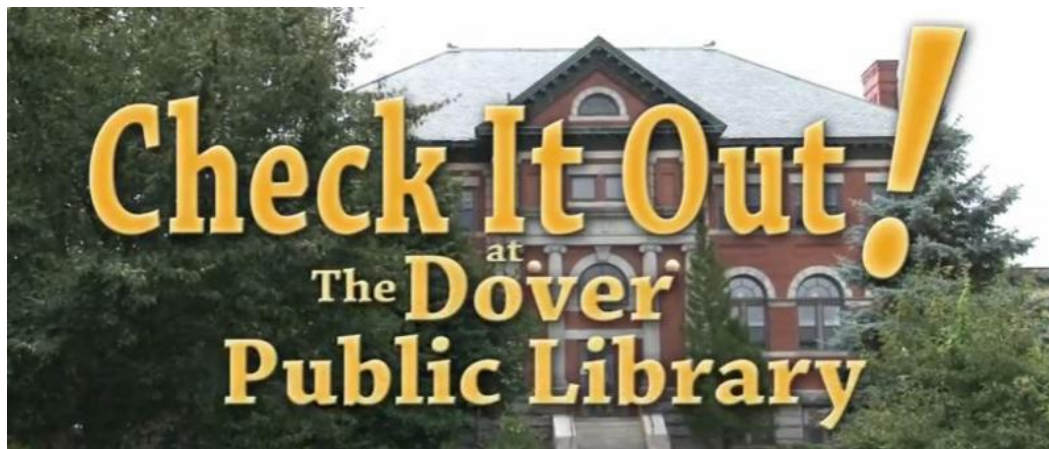
voted to have two schools in town, exclusive of a grammar school and the school in the Madbury, which was still a parish of Dover.

March 25, 1765 — The town voted to have five schools for a term of six months, increasing the number from that required by law, which appears to have been three including Madbury, which was still a parish of Dover.

March 31, 1827 — The net amount of postage paid at the Dover Post Office for the year ending March 31, 1827, was \$819.70, the second largest amount in the state after Portsmouth.

March 25, 1856 — The first organization of Dover's new government as a city occurred on this day. The Hon. Andrew Pierce, the mayor-elect, took the oath of office. Dover was incorporated as a city the previous year, in 1855. Listen to next week's [Dover Download podcast](#) for more information about Dover's transition from town to city.

March 24, 1909 — Police arrested two boys, ages 14 and 15, for attempting to blackmail two local merchants, including Frank Williams, the wealthy owner of the I.B. Williams belt factory. The boys had allegedly threatened the merchants with death if they didn't leave two bags containing \$50 each in the doorways of their respective businesses. Police arranged to leave decoys at the locations, and when the boys arrived to pick up the bags, they were arrested. Both boys were held on bail and faced possible jail time of up to 10 years.
