Revised waterfront plan before committee on Tuesday

Follows two meetings with Technical Review Committee

The Cochecho Waterfront Development Advisory Committee (CWDAC) meets Tuesday, May 17, to vote on whether to recommend approval of the revised waterfront development site plan.

The developer, Cathartes, received the conditional endorsement of the Technical Review Committee on May 5, allowing Cathartes to bring the plan CWDAC for its endorsement and to the Planning Board for site review approval.

CWDAC will also discuss with its consultants the site plan for the public improvements portion of the project, review park design

Municipal Alliance for Adaptive Management authorizes innovative septic system retrofit pilot study to reduce nitrogen in Great Bay

At its May 12 meeting, the Municipal Alliance for Adaptive Management's Executive Board authorized expending \$45,000 on an innovative pilot project to retrofit a handful of septic systems in the Great Bay watershed to study the feasibility of implementing a more comprehensive program to reduce nitrogen levels.

The Conservation Law Foundation brought forth the pilot project to the Executive Board for its consideration. The \$45,000 authorized for the project was set aside from the cities of Rochester, Dover, and Portsmouth as part of its 2021 settlement agreement with the CLF to fund a small pilot project to evaluate innovative approaches to reducing nonpoint and

stormwater pollution. The project will be managed by a stakeholder committee convened by the CLF's Great Bay-Piscataqua Waterkeeper.

According to the draft proposal submitted to MAAM's Executive Board, the nitrogen concentration in a typical septic system effluent is many times higher than in wastewater treatment facilities. "Given that there are tens of thousands of septic systems in the Great Bay watershed communities, the collective impact of better technology and more stringent regulations could be substantial," the proposal states. "The outcome of this pilot project could help municipalities better evaluate whether septic system retrofit technology could be used at scale to reduce nonpoint nitrogen loads in the Great Bay estuary, and how the cost and feasibility compares on a per-pound basis of nitrogen reduction."

The study seeks to learn: how many homeowners would be willing to install for the device to reduce nitrogen loads; how much they would be willing to spend to purchase it and pay for maintenance upkeep; how much oversight is necessary to ensure the products are working as designed; and what is the average cost per pound of nitrogen reduced from septic system retrofit technologies.

The Municipal Alliance for Adaptive Management is a collaboration of communities and stakeholders within the Great Bay, working to create a framework to improve water quality and reduce total nitrogen in the Great Bay estuary. It was founded by the cities of Rochester, Dover and Portsmouth, and its membership includes Newington, Exeter, Rollinsford and Milton. The Municipal Alliance is open to all communities in the Great Bay watershed.



Driver shortage forces COAST to modify and suspend routes

Due to an acute shortage of CDL-qualified operators, COAST regrettably has announced that they must suspend Saturday service on all fixed routes, ADA paratransit, and other demand response services, and must reduce the weekday frequency of service on Routes 40/43 (Portsmouth/Newington) and Routes 1/33 (Dover/Somersworth/Berwick). Saturday Route 7 On Demand service will shift to Tuesdays for the time being.

These changes will take effect beginning Saturday, May 21.

"We sincerely apologize for this inconvenience and want to reassure everyone that we are doing everything in our power to resolve the situation," remarked Rad Nichols, COAST Executive Director. Nichols added, "Like many of the other businesses and nonprofits in our communities, COAST's ability to fulfill our mission is being impacted by economy wide staffing shortages. We are intently focused on regaining control of this situation as quickly as possible so that we can fulfill our promise to the communities, businesses, non-profits, and people we serve. We appreciate the region's patience and loyalty."


City Council approves technical correction to FY2023 budget

The Dover City Council voted 8 to 1 at its May 11 meeting to approve a technical correction to the FY2023 budget the Council adopted last week.

City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr. told the Council that he made a calculation error during the Council's special meeting to adopt the budget on May 4 when the Council approved a bottom line budget number of \$180,064,718 across all funds. That amount was \$8,600 more than the actual amount, Joyal said. The technical correction approved by the Council on May 11 brings the bottom line budget number to \$180,056,118.

Joyal told the Council the changes do not affect the budget, tax impact or the estimated tax rate.

Art exhibit to open at the McConnell Center

The Dover Arts Commission announced this week that the artwork of Maura Sullivan will be on exhibit in the cafeteria of the McConnell Center beginning next week. The show will run from May 16 to July 17, 2022.

Sullivan, who lives in Lee, has undertaken an incredible endeavor over the last few years.

Sullivan is sight challenged and deaf as a result of treatment for NF2, which was diagnosed 30 years ago. Despite the diagnosis, she challenged herself to learn how to paint with guidance from her support person, Meg Jones, of Community Partners.

Sullivan paints to support charities of importance to her. Having lost her mother to Parkinson's, her initial contributions went directly to Dartmouth Hitchcock Foundation for Parkinson's, for which she raised \$3,000.

She currently is supporting the Hyder House Family Hospice in Dover, which took care of her mother in her last days.

Initially, the subjects used for her learning were family, family pets, and places of interest. Sullivan is from Waterbury, Conn., and she was passionate about painting scenes and buildings of her hometown.

Upon receiving paintings her family and friends began reaching out to their friends and soon she was on her way to painting commissions regularly and has enjoyed its therapeutic attributes.

Sullivan requests an email (best way to communicate, as she is deaf) containing a photo of what one would like her to paint. Jones assists in transferring the image onto the paint board and together they work diligently on the painting and personally deliver the painting to the donator.

Sullivan also has traveled to local seacoast towns with Jones and, using photographs of her outing, she paints acrylics of historical buildings and sights from each town. Local libraries have

supported her endeavor and her art of their town has graced their walls. An article published recently in Seacoast Bark featured her work. Some of her paintings are on display at the Brass Mall in Waterbury as part of a Positive Expression Exhibit.

Dover Fire & Rescue honors its EMS providers as part of National EMS Week

Dover Fire and Rescue honors and celebrates its dedicated emergency medical service (EMS) providers who keep Dover's residents and visitors safe during the 47th annual National EMS Week that begins May 15.

Dover's EMS personnel consists of emergency medical technicians (EMTs), paramedics, dispatchers, educators, emergency nurses, and emergency physicians, who provide life-saving care to those in need 24 hours a day, seven days a week. They play critical roles in the "chain of survival" that dramatically improves the survival and recovery rate of those who experience sudden illness or injury.

EMS providers have committed to hundreds of hours of training, with continued education annually, to ensure Dover's residents and guests receive the best possible care. This training allows Dover Fire & Rescue's emergency responders to respond to and handle any emergency or request for service. These responders continue to assist those in need with the added challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic, the ongoing opioid crisis, and the increased calls for mental health assistance with excellence and professionalism.

"Our EMS providers are core components of Dover's public safety and committed to fulfilling the city's medical needs, often going beyond just emergency medicine," said Dover Fire and Rescue Chief Michael McShane. "A week of celebrating them and their courageous work is a small token of appreciation for their dedication to saving lives in our city."

McShane also expressed appreciation and thanks to regional partners, such as Wentworth-Douglass Hospital, the freestanding Dover Emergency Room, and EMS mutual aid providers.

Donate blood and help Dover rise to the challenge

Last month, the municipal leaders of Dover, Durham and Newmarket challenged each other in a friendly competition to see which of the three communities can donate the most blood to help shore up blood reserves for the American Red Cross. The community is off to a great start, but more donors are needed to put Dover ahead.

Dover's blood drive will be held Wednesday, May 25, from 12 to 5 p.m. in the McConnell Center. Schedule a time to donate at https://www.redcrossblood.org/give.html/drive-results?zipSponsor=DOVERWINS.

As a thank you, American Red Cross will raffle three prizes at each community blood drive with the first prize of \$250, second prize of \$100 and third prize of \$50. Everyone who donates will be automatically entered into a raffle.

The American Red Cross is facing a national blood crisis, its worst blood shortage in a over a decade, which is posing a risk to patient care. Now more than ever, these blood drives in Dover, Durham and Newmarket are needed to help save lives.

American Red Cross will determine the challenge winner by calibrating which municipality gets the best "capacity utilization" on the day of blood donations. Capacity utilization means that if a city/town's target collection amount set by American Red Cross in advance was X units, and it collected X units, it achieved 100% capacity utilization. If it collects less than X units, then that percentage is what will be used in comparisons. The American Red Cross is the judge and the jury to determine which community is the winner. The winning community leader will be taken out to lunch and have his lunch paid for by the other two community leaders.

The following events are from a variety of historical records, sources and texts about the history of Dover.


May 15, 1732 — The State Assembly voted that Oyster River in Dover be a Parish by the name of Durham, and the act was approved by Gov. Belcher on this day.

May 18, 1825 — A meeting was held at Ela's Tavern to consider the expediency of constructing a canal or railway from Winnipesaukee Lake to the tide waters of the Piscataqua River, a charter for which had been obtained at the fall session of the Legislature in 1824. The meeting was largely attended, gentlemen being present from Portsmouth and Dover, and from many of the towns bordering on the Lake, and resulted in the appointment of committees to obtain the necessary surveys and prepare plans for procuring the stock of the company to be taken up. The cost of a canal, connecting the waters of the Lake with the streams running into the Cochecho at Dover, of sufficient depth for boat navigation, was estimated at about \$700,000.

May 13, 1892 — The total valuation for Dover was reported this day as \$9,093,256, an increase of \$205,279 over the previous year. The citywide valuation for the most current fiscal year (FY2022), 130 years later, is \$4,589,687,130.

May 15, 1959 — Dover Police Chief John Murphy, then 75 years old, announced this day that he would retire later that same year, in July.

May 14, 1997 — In anticipation of the dredging of the Cochecho River by the Army Corps of Engineers, the City Council this day approved \$40,000 in capital funding for the project. The money was intended to pay for a small dredging of a 60-foot channel along River Street, the site of a former boat landing, which was scheduled to be dredged later that fall to coincide with a larger dredging project by the Army Corps of Engineers. The dredging was seen as a key part of preparing for the redevelopment of the historic waterfront. The Cocheco River had last been dredged about 100 years prior, when Dover had a flourishing sea port. The larger dredging project didn't begin until 2004.




Garrison Players Arts Center presents 'Once Upon a Mattress' beginning May 13
