


Dover kicks off Public Works Week with Open House and proclamation

The City of Dover will kick off National Public Works Week with a Community Services Open House and Touch-A-Truck event on Saturday, May 17, from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. at its headquarters at 271 Mast Road.

This free, family-friendly event will give residents a hands-on

look at the equipment and services that support Dover's public infrastructure. Attendees can explore public works vehicles, enjoy free ice cream, participate in the popular Paint-A-Plow activity, and take guided tours of the city's state-of-the-art Pudding Hill Water Treatment Facility. Additional displays will include vehicles and equipment from the Dover Police and Fire departments, MB Tractor & Equipment, Moore's Crane Rental, and Rochester Motor Sports.

"There's a lot more to public works than just roads and plows," said City Engineer Ken Mavrogeorge. "Our department touches almost every aspect of daily life, from clean water to parks, to facilities and infrastructure maintenance. This event helps connect the public to the people who make that possible and shows how public works contributes to our quality of life."

Mayor Robert Carrier and the City Council also recognized Community Services and Public Works Week with a [proclamation](#) during their May 15 meeting. The proclamation highlights the essential role public works professionals play in building and maintaining resilient communities, and the importance of educating citizens, especially young people, about the field.

"These infrastructure, facilities, and services could not be provided without the dedicated efforts of public works professionals," Mayor Carrier said, reading from the proclamation. "I urge all citizens to join in activities designed to pay tribute to these individuals and recognize the substantial contributions they make to our community."

Mavrogeorge further discussed the city's plans for Public Works Week and the open house on the latest episode of the Dover Download podcast. The episode is available at <https://www.dover.nh.gov/services/online-services/dover-download/>.

National Public Works Week, observed this year from May 18 through May 24, is sponsored by the American Public Works Association. It recognizes the tens of thousands of men and women in North America who provide and maintain public infrastructure, promoting awareness of the profession and celebrating those who work behind the scenes to keep communities safe, clean, and running smoothly.

City Council, School Board and athletic fields JBC hold joint workshop on DHS athletic field project May 21

The City Council, School Board and the Dover High Athletic Complex Joint Building Committee will hold a joint workshop on Wednesday, May 21, where JBC members will review the project and its report and recommendations.

Councilor Fergus Cullen, chair of the JBC, [discussed the workshop](#) during the City Council's Committee Reports at its May 14 meeting. He noted the [JBC](#) would seek funding authorization next month. If approved, the authorization would allow the preparation of construction bid documents over the summer to advertise the project for bidders in the fall. Work would begin in 2026, with the fields ready for play in the fall of 2026.

The workshop will be held in the Council Conference Room in Dover City Hall starting at 6 p.m. It will be televised on Channel 22 and online at <https://dovernh.viebit.com>, where it will be available on-demand.

Road closures, traffic restrictions in place Sunday for Spirit of Recovery 5K

Dover Police Chief William M. Breault announces the following road closures for the Spirit

of Recovery 5K run/walk event on Sunday, May 18, which starts at 9 a.m. The event, part of the Dover Race Series, begins and ends at the Triangle Club at 120 Broadway.

Between 9 and 10 a.m. Broadway will be closed to through traffic in both directions from Saint John Street to Oak Street. Parking will be restricted where posted along Portland Avenue and portions of Broadway.

Motorists should also expect brief but additional delays on:

- Oak Street, between Broadway and Portland Avenue
- Portland Avenue, between Oak and Chapel streets.

The course includes Hill, East Concord, Baker, Everett, Ham, Dover, Park, Pearl, and Florence streets, so residents in those areas may experience brief delays. Dover Police and event volunteers will help manage traffic flow at key intersections. Event parking will be available in the parking lot at the corner of Broadway and Oak Street.

All roads will reopen to traffic by 10 a.m.

All proceeds from the 15th annual Spirit of Recovery benefit The Triangle Club's mission to promote the spiritual, physical and mental health of people in recovery from addiction to alcohol and other substances, and to provide a safe place for those who acknowledge that staying substance-free is of primary importance. Chestnut Street bridge work set for Wednesday, May 21

Parking restricted to maintain two-way traffic

City crews will repair a bridge joint on the Chestnut Street Bridge on Wednesday, May 21,

weather and other conditions permitting.

Parking along the Chestnut Street Bridge will be prohibited during working hours to allow for lane shifts. City staff anticipate maintaining two-way traffic during repairs; however, traffic may occasionally be reduced to one lane, with flaggers alternating flow to ensure safe working conditions.

Chestnut Street parking permits will be honored in the Transportation Center lot and on the top floor of the municipal parking garage on May 21.

This bridge joint was not included in the rehabilitation work completed on the Chestnut Street Bridge in 2023.

Broadway, Oak Street water main replacement to begin next month

A water main on Broadway and Oak Street will be replaced in a project that begins next month, which will improve infrastructure reliability.

The 12-inch water main dating to 1929 will be replaced with a 16-inch cast iron pipe on Broadway from the Florence Street intersection to Oak Street, and on Oak Street from Broadway to Highland Avenue. The project also involves connecting the water main from Highland Avenue to the Garrison Hill water storage tank. In total, 3,000 feet of new water piping will be installed in an area where numerous significant water main breaks have occurred in recent years.

The work is expected to begin in earnest on Monday, June 9, a day after the annual Soap Box Derby on Broadway. Work is anticipated to be completed in early November. There may be some tree clearing work in preparation for the project before June 9.

The City Council on April 9 authorized awarding the construction contract to S.U.R. Construction, Inc. of Rochester for \$1,457,625, following a competitive bid process.

The project will include at least two nights of overnight work at key locations to minimize water use and traffic disruption. Currently, night work is planned in the areas of Florence Street, Broadway, Pearl Street and Oak Street, though no specific date has been set yet. The overnight work will allow crews to install water valves to isolate work areas. Some of the properties on Oak Street will be connected to a temporary water system to facilitate the project.

Access to driveways and businesses will be maintained during construction. The contractor will notify property owners in advance if access will be temporarily blocked. The city will provide regular email updates to the public to help plan for any disruptions. City Council honors Dover celebrity Chef Evan Hennessey with proclamation

The City of Dover recognized one of its culinary stars Wednesday evening as Mayor Robert Carrier presented a formal proclamation to Chef Evan Hennessey during the May 14 City Council meeting.

Hennessey, joined for the presentation by his parents, Barry and Janis, and wife Michelle, was honored for his culinary contributions to Dover and his acclaimed restaurant, Stages.

"Stages has redefined what is possible for fine dining in small towns, proving that world-class cuisine and thoughtful hospitality can thrive beyond the borders of major metropolitan centers," Carrier said, reading from the proclamation.

The recognition highlights Hennessey's deep roots in Dover and his restaurant's impressive achievements, including being named a James Beard Award Semifinalist and earning a spot on the Opinionated About Dining Top 100 Restaurants of North America list for eight consecutive years.

"I'm just so proud to be doing what I do in this community that I grew up in, and to have the opportunity to continue to give back," Hennessey said.

The chef's commitment to Dover extends beyond Stages. Hennessey recently revealed plans for a new venture on the city's waterfront, currently under construction. Hennessey will open a new restaurant called "Topolino," meaning "little mouse" in Italian, at the site. Unlike Stages, Hennessey has described the new venture as "casual Mediterranean, very community-based."

The City Council's proclamation also acknowledged Hennessey's partnerships with local producers like Fox Point Oysters and New Hope Farm, as well as his dedication to mentoring young chefs and creating sustainable collaborations with community organizations.


May 21, 1814 — During the War of 1812, British warships were frequently spotted off the New Hampshire coast, raising fears of an attack on the important port city of Portsmouth. In response to these repeated alerts, Gov. John Taylor Gilman called up the state militia to help defend the region. Dover's militia company, led by Capt. Andrew Peirce and consisting of 66 enlisted men, was mobilized on May 21, 1814. The unit remained on active duty until July 3. Although there were no major battles in New Hampshire during this time, one notable skirmish was reported in the Dover Sun on June 4, 1814. According to the account, a British barge from a nearby frigate, carrying between 40 and 50 sailors, pursued an American coastal vessel into Rye Harbor. Unbeknownst to the British, a small group of 15 local militiamen lay hidden behind a stone wall, their muskets loaded with both bullets and buckshot. As the British barge approached, the militia opened fire at close range, reportedly delivering a devastating volley that forced the enemy vessel to retreat quickly to its ship. The militiamen continued firing as the barge withdrew, their aim described as "sportsmanlike." Later, a Mr. Haley, who had been aboard the British frigate, claimed that an officer told him the barge had lost 16 men in the encounter.

May 18, 1825 — A public meeting was held at Ela's Tavern to discuss the possibility of building a canal or railroad linking Lake Winnepesaukee to the tidal waters of the Piscataqua River. This idea had gained traction after the New Hampshire Legislature approved a charter for such a project during its fall 1824 session. The meeting drew a large and diverse crowd, including business and civic leaders from Portsmouth, Dover, and numerous towns around the lake. Attendees saw the potential for greatly improved transportation and commerce by creating a navigable route between the lake region and the seacoast. The group appointed several committees to begin surveying possible routes and to draft plans for raising the necessary funds by selling stock in the proposed company. Preliminary estimates placed the cost of constructing a canal—deep enough to accommodate boat traffic and connecting the lake's outflow to the Cochecho River in Dover—at approximately \$700,000, a massive sum at the time. In the end, the ambitious project never came to full fruition.

May 19, 1915 — In her will, read on this day, Sarah C. Woodman, left \$10,000 to First Parish Congregational Church for the care of the poor in the parish. She also left \$5,000 to the Dover Public Library for the purchase of books.

May 21, 1925 — From the Boston Globe: "Daredevil Smith, a professional 'human fly,' who in the presence of a large crowd scaled the side of the Kennedy Building on Franklin Square last evening, going from the sidewalk to the roof, was fairly outclassed, in the opinion of witnesses, by Albert Dionne, a 12-year-old Dover boy, who climbed the roof over the same route in about half the time taken by Smith. The lad's clever act brought applause from the crowd."

May 23, 1999 — During a retirement party for outgoing Superintendent of Schools Gerald Daley, then City Councilor Bob Berry read a resolution that named the access road to the new Middle School as Daley Drive. The new middle school was also given an address of #16, representing the superintendent's year of service. Daley retired from the school district in August of that year.

Gather seeks community support to help combat hunger across the Seacoast

Gather, a Seacoast-based nonprofit working to address hunger and food insecurity, is asking for year-round support from individuals, businesses and organizations across the region to help meet a growing need for food assistance.

While food drives are traditionally popular during the holidays, Gather emphasizes that food insecurity persists throughout the year. With limited resources to purchase staple items, the organization relies on community food drives and private donations to meet emerging needs.

Gather, which has served the Seacoast since 1816, operates a pantry in Portsmouth and a robust Mobile Market program that delivers food directly to communities, including Dover, Somersworth, Rochester, Portsmouth, Hampton, Seabrook, Hampton Falls and Farmington.

Local businesses are encouraged to participate by sponsoring food drives, collecting monetary donations, sharing information about Gather's programs, or adopting a target month outside the traditional holiday season.

Curbside weed control spraying begins first week of June

Deadline to opt out is May 28

The city's contracted and licensed weed control applicator is expected to begin operations the first week of June, at targeted locations throughout Dover.

The city will utilize organic weed treatments in most locations but will target specific streets with a one-time application of Esplanade, a non-glyphosate pre-emergent weed control.

Property owners who do not want the Esplanade treatment area may opt out of its application by contacting Community Services at 603-516-6450 by Wednesday, May 28, 2025, at 4 p.m.

The City of Dover is utilizing the following weed control strategies for 2025:

- Esplanade: a non-glyphosate pre-emergent weed control that will be applied once in specific areas;
- Finalsan: an organic post-emergent weed control that will be applied multiple times as needed in specific areas;
- Curbside sweeping: Crews will utilize a street sweeper attachment designed specifically for weed removal.

The city continues to seek the most cost-effective, environmentally-friendly pre-emergent herbicides, as weed removal is much more expensive than preventing them from growing. Weed control continues to be monitored and evaluated for how well it works, cost-effectiveness, and adverse environmental impacts.

The city's curbside weed control vendor is Municipal Pest Management Services, Inc., of Newington.

Rain or shine, the sale will take place at 8 Newmarket Road in Durham. Cash and checks will be accepted.

Proceeds from the plant sale support School Gardening Grants, Library Book Grants, and Community Gardening Projects, including Bedrock Gardens, Great Bay Services, Hyder Family Hospice House, Joe B. Parks Riverwalk Public Gardens, Milne Nature Sanctuary, Outside the Lines, Wagon Hill Community Garden, and Woodman Museum Gardens..

City of Dover reminds residents of Pine Hill Cemetery guidelines

As the Memorial Day holiday approaches, the City of Dover would like to remind residents and visitors of the guidelines in place at Pine Hill Cemetery to preserve its beauty, serenity, and safety. By following these guidelines, the community can ensure that the cemetery remains a respectful and peaceful space for all who come to remember and honor their loved ones.

The City of Dover asks residents to adhere to the following guidelines for floral displays and personal items at Pine Hill Cemetery:

- Flowers may be placed on lots starting seven days before May 26 and must be removed no later than seven days after May 26.
- Planting flowers directly into the ground is not permitted.
- To ensure safety, the use of glass or breakable containers on lots is prohibited.
- Flat, ground-level foot markers should be kept free of any items.
- Lots featuring monuments with extended bases on the sides are allowed to hold flowers longer than seven days after May 26.
- Items not in accordance with these guidelines (e.g., solar lights, remembrance lights, wooden signs, shepherd hooks, personal items, etc.) will be removed and disposed of by the Cemetery Department.
