Coming up at the next City Council meeting

City Council begins funding process for DHS athletic project

Vote to occur June 25 following public hearing, School Board recommendations

The City Council meets for its second regular meeting of the month on Wednesday, May 28, where two funding resolutions are expected to be introduced as part of the Dover High School Athletic Complex project. No action would be taken until at least June 25, following recommendations from the School Board and a public hearing.

Earlier this week on May 21, the City Council, School Board, and its Joint Building Committee met to receive the JBC's

Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday: 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. report and recommendations for the field project at the high school, which the JBC has been investigating since the committee was created in January 2024. The JBC's report, which includes a history of the fields and why action is needed, provides two base options for the School Board and City Council to consider, with numerous options to increase or decrease the scope of work and cost of either base option.

Base Option A is estimated to cost \$11,614,000. This would replace Dunaway Field, track, grandstands, lights, and concession shacks.

Base Option B, recommended by the JBC, includes all of Base Option A, plus shifting Dunaway Field. This allows the rotation and expansion of the baseball field to create a second lighted multi-sport field. The JBC also recommends converting both fields to synthetic turf to accommodate current and future athletic demands. The JBC estimates this option to cost \$20,037,000.

City Manager J. Michael Joyal, Jr., at the joint meeting, explained that the City Council would introduce a Capital Improvements Program debt-authorization resolution for the full cost of rehabilitating both fields for \$20,037,000 at its May 28 meeting, which can be reduced based on the School Board and City Council's final recommendations. But the amount can't be increased without restarting the debt authorization requirements. Joyal said authorizing debt requires three meetings: one meeting (May 28) to introduce the resolution, a second (June 11) for a public hearing, and a third (June 25) to vote on the debt authorization.

Joyal said this will provide ample time for the School Board to meet, deliberate, and make their recommendations to the City Council for the project. The JBC's goal is to have a final decision by June 25 to begin preparing final construction documents based on what the School Board and City Council decide. Construction would occur in calendar year 2026, being ready for play in the fall of 2026.

The City Council would also introduce an accompanying FY26 School Department budget amendment to accommodate the debt service for the project, as the fields are on school grounds and maintained by the school district.

Also on the agenda are public hearings and accompanying resolutions for:

- The dissolution of prior years' capital project funds into the General Fund
- FY25 General Fund unassigned fund balance transfer to special revenue and capital project funds to address fund deficits
- Acceptance of the FY26-30 Community Development Block Grant Consolidated Plan and the FY26 action plan and expenditures for FY26 CDBG entitlement funds.

There are also resolutions to authorize:

· Replacing parking meters

- · Amending welfare guidelines
- · Downtown lighting improvements
- Beginning the process to regulate parking in the waterfront development site ahead of the building's opening to the public later this year

The **Jenny Thompson Outdoor Pool** will be open on Monday, May 26, from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. The **Indoor Pool** will be closed on Monday, May 26.

There is no **trash pickup and curbside recycling** on Monday, May 26, 2025. Trash and recycling pickup will be delayed by one day the week of May 26.

Memorial Day is also one of several parking holidays each year, during which time motorists are not required to pay for parking, except for the Orchard Street Parking Garage and Transportation Center parking lot, which are paid parking at all times.

Memorial Day ceremony to be held at Pine Hill Cemetery on Monday

A Memorial Day ceremony will be held on Monday, May 26, 2025, beginning at 11 a.m. at Pine Hill Cemetery and hosted by Dover's Woodman Museum.

The event will include a flag presentation by the University of New Hampshire ROTC, the National Anthem, opening remarks by Woodman Museum Executive Director Jonathan Nichols, a Memorial Day address by Dover Mayor Robert Carrier, a wreath-laying ceremony, the playing of Taps, and a special presentation about a restored and recently installed veteran marker by the American Legion.

The ceremony will be held at Veterans Circle, which can be accessed from the East Watson Street entrance to New Pine Hill Cemetery.

The Woodman Museum will also lead a walk from the museum to Pine Hill Cemetery, beginning at 10:45 a.m. For those wishing to participate in the walk to the cemetery, please arrive at the museum beginning at 10:30 a.m. Museum staff will lead those participants back to the museum at the conclusion of the ceremony, at noon.

Pine Hill Cemetery guidelines for memorials

As the Memorial Day holiday approaches, the City of Dover would like to remind residents and visitors of the guidelines in place at Pine Hill Cemetery to preserve its beauty, serenity, and safety. By following these guidelines, the community can ensure that the cemetery remains a respectful and peaceful space for all who come to remember and honor their loved ones.

The City of Dover asks residents to adhere to the following guidelines for floral displays and personal items at Pine Hill Cemetery:

- Flowers may be placed on lots starting seven days before May 26 and must be removed no later than seven days after May 26.
- Planting flowers directly into the ground is not permitted.
- To ensure safety, the use of glass or breakable containers on lots is prohibited.
- Flat, ground-level foot markers should be kept free of any items.
- Lots featuring monuments with extended bases on the sides are allowed to hold flowers longer than seven days after May 26.
- Items not in accordance with these guidelines (e.g., solar lights, remembrance lights, wooden signs, shepherd hooks, personal items, etc.) will be removed and disposed of by the Cemetery Department.

Road closures, traffic restrictions in place Sunday for inaugural Captain Jack Casey Memorial 5K

Dover Police Chief William M. Breault announces the following road closures for the inaugural Captain Jack Casey Memorial 5K on Sunday, May 25.

The race begins at 9 a.m. at St. Thomas Aquinas High School, 197 Dover Point Road; it ends at the same location. Event parking is available at the school.

Between 9 and 10 a.m., the following street closures will be in effect:

- Spur Road between New Bellamy Lane and Nute Road
- Royer Lane and Ayers Lane
- New Bellamy Lane westerly from Dover Point Road to Spur Road

Residents of Royer Lane, Ayers Lane, Bristol Lane, and Nute Road may experience delays during this time. Dover Police and event volunteers will be on hand to help manage the traffic flow. All roads should reopen to traffic by 10 a.m.

Marine Capt. Jack Casey, born and raised in Dover and a 2015 St. Thomas Aquinas graduate, was a CH-53E helicopter pilot who was killed with four other Marines while on active duty on Feb. 7, 2024. Proceeds from the 5K will help fund scholarships for local high school seniors and cadets at the Virginia Military Institute in Lexington, Virginia, where Capt. Casey graduated in 2019.

Payne Street closed weekdays through June for waterfront work

Daytime closure needed for utility and road work

Payne Street (formerly River Street) will be closed between Henry Law Avenue and Washington Street from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday — excluding holidays — through June 2025 to allow road and utility work related to the city's waterfront

construction project.

Payne Street will reopen each day after work is complete. When the road is closed, the contractor will post road closure signs on Central Avenue at Hanson Street, Main Street at Washington Street, and Henry Law Avenue at Hanson Street to help inform motorists.

The closure allows workers to safely complete the installation of the stormwater treatment area, street curbing, and sidewalks, along with other related road work.

Blue Crab returns to Henry Law Park after student-led restoration

A downtown fixture is back in place. The whimsical blue crab sculpture was returned to its perch at Henry Law Park, just outside the Children's Museum of New Hampshire, on Monday, May 19, thanks to the efforts of the city's Community Services crews and a partnership with local students and the Dover Arts Commission.

The large metal sculpture, originally created in 2010 by artist Nathan Walker from scrap metal, was hoisted and reinstalled after undergoing a full restoration led by students from Dover High School's Career and Technical Center (CTC). The project gave students in the Welding and Automotive Collision Technology programs hands-on experience, as they stripped the crab of paint, repaired and rewelded it, and applied a fresh coat of bright blue paint, pinstriping, and a clear protective finish.

The restoration was aided by a community fundraising effort. Chris Guerrette, owner of Lickee's & Chewy's Candy & Creamery, spearheaded a GoFundMe campaign that raised \$2,963, including \$500 from Dover Main Street, with \$2,700 going directly to the CTC for materials. The Dover Arts Commission, which coordinated the project, noted that remaining funds will go toward a commemorative plaque.

As the crab settles back into its familiar spot, residents are now invited to help choose its name. Voting is open through May 31 at the Children's Museum, the Dover Public Library Children's Room, and Lickee's & Chewy's. The winning name will be announced June 7 during the 2025 NH Maker Fest at the museum.

been named a 2025 National STEM Scholar, one of just 10 middle school science educators selected nationwide for the prestigious program.

The National STEM Scholar Program, created by the National Stem Cell Foundation in partnership with The Gatton Academy of Mathematics and Science at Western Kentucky University, recognizes middle school teachers who bring innovation and inspiration to science, technology, engineering and math education. Scholars are chosen based on a proposed "big idea" classroom project designed to have a lasting impact on student engagement and learning.



Slavitz, a Hampton Falls resident, will travel to Bowling Green, Kentucky, later this month for a week of advanced training and collaboration with fellow scholars on WKU's campus. Scholars will receive funding and support to implement their challenge projects in their classrooms and are expected to share what they learn with colleagues in their schools and districts.

"Our current world problems are going to be solved by multiple types of thinkers, creatives and innovators working together," Slavitz said. "The ability to maximize the creative energy between unique students across varied disciplines is where magic happens."

Now in its 10th year, the National STEM Scholar Program has impacted more than 190,000 middle school students. The program aims to inspire STEM learning at a critical time, as nearly half of U.S. eighth graders lose interest in STEM subjects — discouraging future participation in the high-demand fields of science and technology.





The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.



May 30, 1679 — The colonial Court issued an order to the County Court scheduled to convene in Dover. The directive was clear: the Court must ensure the collection of unpaid taxes, referred to as "public rates," from residents across the region, including those living on the Isles of Shoals. This order came in the wake of recent military conflicts, likely referring to King Philip's War (1675–1678), a brutal and costly conflict between Native American tribes and English colonists throughout New England. The war had strained local resources, and many residents had either served in the militia or contributed supplies at great personal expense. The Court emphasized that these individuals were owed payment for their service and sacrifices. The taxes collected were intended to repay those who had defended the colony or supported the war effort financially, what the Court described as a matter of equity and obligation.

May 31, 1775 — The town of Madbury was officially incorporated, marking its full and final separation from Dover. At the time of its incorporation, Madbury had a population of 677 residents. This milestone was the result of a process that had been unfolding for several years. Back on May 27, 1768, the New Hampshire General Assembly passed an act granting Madbury — then still a parish within Dover — full town powers and privileges. This legislation represented the formal and legal separation of Madbury from its parent community, allowing the parish to govern itself independently. However, while the 1768 act gave Madbury self-governing authority, it wasn't until 1775 that it was formally "set off" and incorporated as its own town. Madbury's journey to independence was part of a broader pattern across colonial New England, where outlying parishes and settlements gradually gained enough population and resources to sustain independent town governments. These separations often followed years of shared history, and in Madbury's case, deep agricultural and religious ties to Dover.

May 28, 1863 — Dr. Noah Martin, a respected physician and former Governor of New Hampshire, died suddenly at the age of 62. At the time of his death, he had been in his usual good health, passing away unexpectedly from apoplexy, what we now understand as a stroke. Dr. Martin had a distinguished career in both medicine and public service. As a physician, he was highly regarded for his skill and dedication, building a large and successful medical practice in Dover. His professional success allowed him to accumulate considerable wealth, and he was well known in the community not only for his medical work but also for his leadership. In politics, Martin was a loyal and principled member of his party. He earned the trust of his peers and was honored with its highest office, serving as Governor of New Hampshire in 1852 and 1853. Throughout his career, he held various other positions in state government. Martin is buried at Pine Hill Cemetery in Dover.

May 27, 1913 — Newspapers report that City of Dover Tax Collector Harry A. Morrison received a check from the United States Treasury Department for 35 cents, a settlement in the city's claim against the federal government for removing three brown-tail moth nests from a tree on the Post Office lot in March. The claim was settled after it had been referred to the U.S. Treasury Department by the Dover postmaster, who had no authority to pay the bill. The settlement was reported to be the smallest claim made upon the federal government by a municipality at that time.



Broadway, Oak Street water main replacement to begin next month

A water main on Broadway and Oak Street will be replaced in a project that begins next month, which will improve infrastructure reliability.

The 12-inch water main dating to 1929 will be replaced with a 16-inch cast iron pipe on Broadway from the Florence Street intersection to Oak Street, and on Oak Street from Broadway to Highland Avenue. The project also involves connecting the water main from Highland Avenue to the Garrison Hill water storage tank. In total, 3,000 feet of new water piping will be installed in an area where numerous significant water main breaks have occurred in recent years.

The work is expected to begin in earnest on Monday, June 9, a day after the annual Soap Box Derby on Broadway. Work is anticipated to be completed in early November. Tree-clearing work in preparation for the project may begin before June 9. There will be trees cut in the utility easement on Garrison Hill for water main installation.

The City Council on April 9 authorized awarding the construction contract to S.U.R. Construction, Inc. of Rochester for \$1,457,625, following a competitive bid process.

The project will include at least two nights of overnight work at key locations to minimize water use and traffic disruption. Currently, night work is planned in the areas of Florence Street, Broadway, Pearl Street and Oak Street, though no specific date has been set yet. The overnight work will allow crews to install water valves to isolate work areas. Some of the properties on Oak Street will be connected to a temporary water system to facilitate the project.

Access to driveways and businesses will be maintained during construction. The contractor will notify property owners in advance if access will be temporarily blocked. The city will provide regular email updates to the public to help plan for any disruptions. Curbside weed control spraying begins first week of June

The city's contracted and licensed weed control applicator is expected to begin operations the first week of June, at targeted locations throughout Dover.

The city will utilize organic weed treatments in most locations but will target specific streets with a one-time application of Esplanade, a non-glyphosate pre-emergent weed control.

Property owners who do not want the Esplanade treatment area may opt out of its application by contacting Community Services at 603-516-6450 by Wednesday, May 28, 2025, at 4 p.m.

The City of Dover is utilizing the following weed control strategies for 2025:

- Esplanade: a non-glyphosate pre-emergent weed control that will be applied once in specific areas;
- Finalsan: an organic post-emergent weed control that will be applied multiple times as needed in specific areas;
- Curbside sweeping: Crews will utilize a street sweeper attachment designed specifically for weed removal.

The city continues to seek the most cost-effective, environmentally-friendly pre-emergent herbicides, as weed removal is much more expensive than preventing them from growing. Weed control continues to be monitored and evaluated for how well it works, cost-effectiveness, and adverse environmental impacts.

The city's curbside weed control vendor is Municipal Pest Management Services, Inc., of Newington.
