Contractor clearing trees in utility corridor for water main project

Garrison Hill Park will be closed at all times for a week starting Tuesday, June 3, to allow a contractor to remove trees in the utility corridor for the Broadway and Oak water main replacement project.

The new water main will connect from the water reservoir on Garrison Hill to Oak Street and Broadway via the utility corridor.



Fire Chief, City Council recognize Dover Fire and Rescue for barn fire response

Members of Dover Fire and Rescue were recognized at the May 28 City Council meeting for their response to a devastating barn fire earlier this spring.

Fire Chief Perry Plummer presented the recognition, detailing the crew's response in the early morning hours of March 24, following a 24-hour stretch that included 52 calls for service during a late-season nor'easter.

At 5:59 a.m., firefighters responded to a fully involved barn fire in a remote area on Tolend Road, with no nearby hydrants and animals trapped inside. Upon arrival, they found a second barn also catching fire and heard the cries of frightened horses still in their stalls.

"Despite limited manpower, treacherous conditions, and exhausted resources, our firefighters sprang to action," Plummer said. "They led five panicked, frightened horses to safety, an incredible feat under such demanding circumstances."

While two horses were lost, most animals were saved and half of the second barn was preserved. One firefighter sustained a minor injury during the rescue.

Plummer said the department's success was the result of training, strategic rural water operations, and a coordinated command.

The firefighters recently received a unit citation from the New Hampshire Fire Service Committee of Merit. Each member also received a plaque and an award pin.

Not all honorees could attend the recognition at City Hall as several were dispatched on a call just before the presentation.



Dover Rotarians update hardscape, plant flowers at Henry Law Park

Payne Street closed weekdays through June for waterfront work

Payne Street (formerly River Street) will be closed between Henry Law Avenue and Washington Street from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday — excluding holidays — through June 2025 to allow road and utility work related to the city's waterfront construction project.

Payne Street will reopen each day after work is complete. When the road is closed, the contractor will post road closure signs on Central Avenue at Hanson Street, Main Street at Washington Street, and Henry Law Avenue at Hanson Street to help inform motorists.

The closure allows workers to safely complete the installation of the stormwater treatment area, street curbing, and sidewalks, along with other related road work.





The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.


June 2, 1766 — The town voted to build a house, stable, ferry landings, and other facilities at Hilton Point to better serve travelers passing through the area. A committee was formed to fund the project by gathering private donations. The decision highlights a common practice of using local subscriptions, or community donations, to fund public improvements in colonial towns.

June 3, 1775 — The town established a Committee of Safety and voted to follow the guidance issued by the Provincial Congress. Residents were urged to strictly adhere to these recommendations as tensions with British forces escalated. This action came just weeks after the Battles of Lexington and Concord in April 1775, which marked the start of the American Revolutionary War. Committees of Safety were local governing bodies formed throughout the colonies to coordinate resistance against British rule. The Provincial Congress was New Hampshire's revolutionary governing body, having replaced the British-appointed government.

June 5, 1822 — At the request of officers in the 2nd Regiment, the New Hampshire Legislature approved the creation of a new military unit, the 39th Regiment, comprising men from Rochester, Farmington, and neighboring towns. The 2nd Regiment was restructured to include only the towns of Dover and Somersworth. Supporters of the division argued that Dover and Somersworth alone had 631 enrolled men and that Rochester, where the full regiment typically assembled, was too far for many to travel. For some, attending a muster meant walking 10 to 12 miles each way, often taking up the better part of three days. During that time, soldiers were typically given just one meal of beef and bread and a single drink of rum, provided by their home towns. Before the establishment of a formal standing army, these state-regulated militias were responsible for mustering able-bodied men for training, defense, and, if necessary, military service.

June 1, 1996 — A debate brewed over the naming of Exit 6 on the Spaulding Turnpike as state officials considered removing "Dover" from the sign in favor of "Somersworth." The sign at the time read, "Dover-Rochester-Conway." The proposed change followed a request by former Rep. and Somersworth Mayor Dana Hilliard and the Greater Somersworth Chamber of Commerce to boost visibility for the Hilltop City and change the sign to "Somersworth-Rochester-Conway." While many agreed Somersworth deserved recognition, some in Dover feared the change would confuse motorists and increase traffic on Dover Point Road. Local leaders, including Dover's former police chief Charles Reynolds, who was a state representative at the time, and Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce Director Jack Story, pushed for clarity, noting Dover's multiple access points at Exits 7, 8, and 9. State traffic officials promised to work with both cities, hinting at a possible compromise on signage. The first sign for Exit 6 today reads, "Durham."

June 2, 2004 — School officials from Dover and Barrington met on this day to address overcrowding at Dover High School, which was projected to exceed its capacity due to rising enrollments from both communities. Barrington's study committee explored alternatives, including sending students to other nearby schools, but concluded that maintaining the existing partnership with Dover was preferable. Dover officials affirmed their commitment to the enrollment contract and emphasized ongoing collaboration. The meeting also highlighted Dover's Freshman Academy, credited with reducing failure and dropout rates by providing structured support for ninth graders. To accommodate a growing student population and modern educational needs, Dover initiated the construction of a new high school and career technical center in 2016. The \$88 million, 310,000-square-foot facility opened in September 2018, featuring expanded academic and vocational spaces, an 850-seat theater, and updated athletic amenities.



Crusading against vice: The history of American anti-profanity leagues

In the early 1900s, a group of reformers launched a surprising crusade: to eliminate swearing and "vulgar" language across the United States.

The Dover Public Library will host a presentation titled "Crusading Against Vice: American

Anti-Profanity Leagues and Their Legacy" on Wednesday, June 11, at 6:30 p.m. The talk will be led by University of New Hampshire student Evan Christensen and held in Room 306 of the McConnell Center.

Christensen will explore the history of the Anti-Profanity League, a national movement rooted in concerns about morality, civility and public behavior. One of its most vocal leaders was Roland D. Sawyer, a Congregational minister from Kensington, New Hampshire, who later served as a state legislator in Massachusetts. Sawyer believed that refining American speech could help uplift society. Through figures like Sawyer, Christensen will examine how this little-known campaign fits into the broader story of American reform and what it reveals about enduring debates over language and values.

Christensen is a first-year student at the University of New Hampshire, majoring in genetics with minors in history and anthropology. His research on Anti-Profanity Leagues was developed as part of his award of the Roland D. Sawyer Scholarship, presented by the UNH Library. The scholarship is awarded to a graduate or undergraduate student whose research draws on primary sources from the Sawyer Papers, housed in the Milne Special Collections and University Archives.




NH Maker Fest is Saturday, June 7

Broadway, Oak Street water main replacement to begin next month

A water main on Broadway and Oak Street will be replaced in a project that begins next month, which will improve infrastructure reliability.

The 12-inch water main dating to 1929 will be replaced with a 16-inch cast iron pipe on Broadway from the Florence Street intersection to Oak Street, and on Oak Street from Broadway to Highland Avenue. The project also involves connecting the water main from Highland Avenue to the Garrison Hill water storage tank. In total, 3,000 feet of new water piping will be installed in an area where numerous significant water main breaks have occurred in recent years.

Tree clearing work will begin on Garrison Hill starting on Tuesday, June 3. Street work is anticipated to begin in earnest on Monday, June 9, a day after the annual Soap Box Derby on Broadway. Work is anticipated to be completed in early November.

The City Council on April 9 authorized awarding the construction contract to S.U.R. Construction, Inc. of Rochester for \$1,457,625, following a competitive bid process.

The project will include at least two nights of overnight work at key locations to minimize water use and traffic disruption. Currently, night work is planned in the areas of Florence Street, Broadway, Pearl Street and Oak Street, though no specific date has been set yet. The overnight work will allow crews to install water valves to isolate work areas. Some of the properties on Oak Street will be connected to a temporary water system to facilitate the project.

Access to driveways and businesses will be maintained during construction. The contractor will notify property owners in advance if access will be temporarily blocked. The city will provide regular email updates to the public to help plan for any disruptions.
