City Council endorses resolution to increase hours, services at Warming Center

At its <u>meeting on Wednesday, Nov. 10</u>, the Dover City Council approved a resolution to amend the tri-city agreement regarding the use and staffing of the Strafford County Emergency Extreme

Recycling Center hours:

Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday: 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Cold Weather Warming Center (Warming Center). The amended resolution would expand operations from an as-needed basis to daily use from Nov. 29, 2001, through April 1, 2022. To take effect, the city councils of Somersworth and Rochester must also approve the amended resolution, which has not occurred yet.

The City Council <u>executed an agreement</u> on Aug. 25, 2021, with Somersworth and Rochester to operate the Warming Center as needed during extreme, life-threatening weather situations from Nov. 29 to April 1. Changes to the agreement require the approval of each of the tri-cities.


The resolution and background material can be found <u>online</u> <u>here</u>, including the amended agreement and budget estimate. The resolution was added to the council's agenda Tuesday and not included in the agenda and background materials <u>posted to the website</u> Friday, Nov. 5.

According to the background materials, the Warming Center would operate daily Monday through Friday from 5 p.m. to 8 a.m., and all day and night on the weekends, holidays and winter storm days. There is no proposed cost increase to the tri-cities in the amended agreement. As in the current operations agreement, the cities of Dover and Rochester would each expend up to \$49,433.50 to support operations, and Somersworth would provide in-kind services, such as medical, fire and police services.

The estimated cost to operate the Warming Center with the expanded is schedule is \$276,015.40, according to the budget estimate. As with the current agreement, the Community Action Partnership of Strafford County (CAPSC) would staff and operate the Warming Center. CAPSC would utilize a \$92,250 New Hampshire Emergency Rental Assistance grant from New Hampshire Housing Finance Authority to cover increased staffing and other costs. The \$92,250 estimates \$30 per bed per night for the season. As in the current agreement, the City of Dover would continue to pay utility and property services, such as electricity, internet, snow and trash removal, heat and hot water, and professional cleaning services. The budget estimate also anticipates that two meals a day at \$10 each would be provided through donations, an estimated \$75,600 cost over the season, or \$4,200 a week.

The Warming Center is located at 30 Willand Drive in Somersworth. The City of Dover owns the building and property it purchased last year with grant funds for an emergency warming center.

Dover Energy Commission to host electric vehicle show on Saturday

Members of the Dover Energy Commission will host an electric vehicle (EV) show on Saint Thomas Street by the McConnell Center on Saturday, Nov. 13, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Come see the vehicles, speak with dealers and owners about their experiences, and hear from experts about what Dover and New Hampshire are doing to aid the transition to electric vehicles.

Auto dealers, private owners, and the City of Dover will display EV, plug-in hybrid-electric vehicles (HEV), and electric bikes (e-bikes) at the show. Vehicles will range from an electric cargo bike to a Porsche Taycan. Saint Thomas Street from Locust Street to Atkinson Street (between the McConnell Center and the district court) will be turned into a walking mall for the event. The goal is to help inform the community of available EV, HEV and e-bike options and why they should consider owning one.

EV charging installers will be on hand to provide information about installing residential and/or commercial charging stations, including options powered by solar energy. Local and state officials will also discuss EV infrastructure. In the morning, City of Dover's Resilience Coordinator Jackson Kaspari will share the City of Dover's plans for extending charging station infrastructure within Dover. In the afternoon, state Sen. David Watters will discuss EV bills he has filed this legislative session. Department of Environmental Services Administrator Rebecca Ohler will speak to the state's support of EVs and charging stations.

Organizers ask those driving to the event to park in the McConnell Center/Dover Public Library parking lot at 73 Locust St.

Twenty-three bricks added to Dover Veterans Park this week

The latest batch of engraved bricks honoring veterans was installed Thursday morning at Dover Veterans Park in time for the Veterans Day ceremony.

The Dover Veterans Park was dedicated four years ago on Veterans Day 2017. The 23 new bricks added this week brings the total number of bricks honoring veterans to well over 800,

said Recreation Director Gary Bannon, who oversees the park. He said there is still plenty of capacity to add bricks to honor veterans, emphasizing the veterans do not need to be from Dover to be included in the park.

"It's for veterans," said Bannon of the park. "If you served in the military, you've qualified in being a veteran."

Many bricks honoring veterans are grouped by family or service time. "It's a nice statement of camaraderie and unity," Bannon said.

Bricks are not added on a rolling basis. Instead, Bannon places two orders a year: one ahead of Memorial Day and the other ahead of Veterans Day. Because the production takes about two months, Bannon placed the Veterans Day order at the end of August, and the new bricks just arrived last week. He'll make the next order at the end of February 2022 to be ready for Memorial Day in May.

The cost is \$100 for an 8-inch by 8-inch brick and \$50 for a 4-inch by 8-inch brick. All bricks are engraved consistently with a full name, military rank and branch, and years of service and/or conflict.

Early this year, a new kiosk was installed in the park that lists and provides locations for nearly all veterans-related monuments and plaques in Dover.

Central Avenue water project to complete water main installation, begin individual connections

The Central Avenue North Water Improvements project contractor will have crews working near the Central Avenue intersections of Old Rollinsford Glenwood Avenue beginning Monday, Nov. 15.

At Glenwood Avenue, workers will tie in the new water main with the existing one. When this work occurs, both directions of Central Avenue and Glenwood Avenue will be open for travel, though motorists should anticipate lane shifts. As it was this week, outbound traffic from Shaw's plaza at Glenwood Avenue will be detoured to Morin Street.

In the Old Rollinsford Road area of Central Avenue, a crew will be cutting the road preparing for individual connections to the new water main. The southbound traffic will be detoured around the work area via Lowell Street, Mount Vernon Street, and Ash Street when this work occurs. Northbound Central Avenue traffic will proceed through the work area. Motorists should anticipate lane shifts.

COVID-19 vaccines for children and teens

CDC recommends everyone ages 5 and older get a COVID-19 vaccine to help protect against COVID-19. Widespread vaccination for COVID-19 is a critical tool to best protect everyone, especially those at highest risk, from severe illness and death. People who are fully vaccinated can safely resume many activities that they did prior to the pandemic. Children ages 5 years and older are able to get an age-appropriate dose of Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine.

Who is eligible for a COVID-19 booster shot?

Certain people are now eligible to receive a COVID-19 booster shot, including those who received Moderna and Johnson & Johnson/Janssen COVID-19 vaccines. Eligible individuals may choose which vaccine they receive as a booster dose. CDC's recommendations now allow for this type of mix and match dosing for booster shots.

For individuals who received a Pfizer-BioNTech or Moderna COVID-19 vaccine, the following groups are eligible for a booster shot at 6 months or more after their initial series:

- 65 years and older
- Age 18+ who live in <u>long-term care settings</u>
- Age 18+ who have <u>underlying medical conditions</u>
- Age 18+ who work or live in <u>high-risk settings</u>

For the nearly 15 million people who got the Johnson & Johnson COVID-19 vaccine, booster shots are also recommended for those who are 18 and older and who were vaccinated two or more months ago.

Additional populations may be recommended to receive a booster shot as more data become available.

Holiday celebrations

There are several ways to enjoy holiday traditions and protect your health. Because many generations tend to gather to celebrate holidays, the best way to minimize COVID-19 risk and keep your family and friends safer is to get vaccinated if you're eligible.

Safer holiday tips include:

- Wear a mask in public indoor settings if you are not fully vaccinated, have a weakened immune system, or if you are in an area with substantial to high transmission.
- Avoid crowded, poorly ventilated spaces.
- If you are sick or have symptoms, don't host or attend gatherings.
- Delay travel until you are fully vaccinated. If you are considering traveling for a holiday or event, visit CDC's Travel page to help you decide what is best for you and your family.
- Get <u>tested</u> if you have symptoms of COVID-19 or have a close contact with someone who has COVID-19.

COVID symptoms or need to confirm you aren't infected? Get tested

Many health insurance plans cover COVID-19 tests without a copay, coinsurance, or deductible for persons with symptoms of COVID-19. Locations throughout the state offer COVID-19 tests,



including hospitals, pharmacies, primary care offices, urgent care centers.

Tests for active COVID-19 disease are available in locations across New Hampshire and include both the polymerase chain reaction (PCR) test and the rapid antigen test. The PCR test is for persons with or without symptoms of COVID-19. The rapid antigen test is for persons with symptoms and within a specific timeframe after onset of symptoms.

The federal government has contracted with Walgreens and Rite Aid pharmacies to offer COVID-19 tests at no additional costs for persons without insurance with symptoms of COVID-19. Visit the website of these pharmacies or contact your local Walgreens or Rite Aid pharmacy to learn more about their free testing program.

Persons who do not have insurance or have a health insurance plan that does not fully cover the cost of tests may also have testing paid for by a New Hampshire Limited COVID-19 Testing Benefit. Atlantic Broadband's citywide installation underway

Cable television and internet provider Atlantic Broadband continues to install conduit underground around the City of Dover that will be used to provide services to residents and businesses.

The work to install the infrastructure comes after the City Council approved a franchise agreement with Atlantic Broadband at its July 28, 2021 meeting.

Residents around the city may see small flags on the side of the road and spray paint markings on the road. These markings are to help Atlantic Broadband identify underground utilities before excavation begins.

Alan Dews of Community Services said the department has issued to Atlantic Broadband all necessary excavation permits. It is anticipated that Atlantic Broadband will be digging trenches in the public rights-of-way on the side of the road to install conduit. Dews said the Atlantic Broadband's goal is not to dig up driveways in the right-of-way to install conduit; instead, it plans to bore underneath driveway entrances.

The following events are recorded in "Notable Events in the History of Dover, New Hampshire: From the First Settlement in 1623 to 1865," by George Wadleigh, and several other historical sources.

For more on the history of Dover, settled in 1623 and the oldest European permanent settlement in New Hampshire and seventh oldest in the country, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street; and the Woodman Museum, Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, <u>located here</u>.

Nov. 14, 1818 — Joseph Cushing is born.

Joseph Cushing was born on the family farm on the Dover Point Road on November 14, 1818. The farm included land along the Bellamy River from St. Mary's New Cemetery down to the Varney Brook, and the lane leading into the farmhouse is now called Cushing Road. The house is still standing and dominates a landscape of modern ranch and cottage style homes. Joseph got his education in Dover Schools; probably over at the nearby Upper Neck District Schoolhouse near the end of Tuttle Lane, and then up at the Pine Hill Schoolhouse in Dover.

When he was twenty years old, he left the farm and went to Gloucester, Massachusetts, to work in a fish market, but only stayed there a short time. A circus came to Gloucester and Joseph knew that that was what he wanted. He joined as a roustabout, but saved his wages and soon bought the lemonade concession. He later added the candy business. He was on his way then and became part owner, with the side shows under his control. He learned the circus business thoroughly and eventually bought out the whole show, and it became Cushing Circus of Dover, N.H.

Circuses in those days were transported by team from town to town as booking had to be made within ten to fifteen mile radius, what with gravel and clay roads and possible rainy weather. The equipment had to be struck each night, but the performers lodged in rooming houses and traveled by day.

Mr. Cushing was a great publicity man and believed in side show freaks to up his attendance records. He was always on the lookout for exceptional exhibits and it is said that he taught P.T. Barnum and other circus greats some on their come-on stunts. Some of their odd people wintered in Dover and were seen around our streets during the off season. One of the Colonel's publicity gimmicks was a team of 40 matched cream colored horses drawing his band wagon through the streets and driven by a single pair of reins and one driver. What a stunt.

As success continued, Mr. Cushing, or Colonel Cushing as he got to be known, toyed with the idea of taking his show to Europe but could not finance it alone, so he took in a partner, a Mr. Seth Howe; and they charted a steamship The South Hampton, put aboard their forty acts of animals and all went to England. They were very successful and stayed over there three years-the first American circus to ever tour England. On Friday, May 17, 1858, they gave a command performance before Queen Victoria, Prince Albert and their guests. The velvet gown that Mrs. Cushing wore at that performance is now on exhibition at our Woodman Institute.

Eventually the circus property was sold at auction in London and Colonel Cushing returned with one hundred thousand dollars – a fortune in those days. But the Colonel was not ready to retire yet, so in 1861 he got another show together and toured the South and Southwest. He was again successful and his restless nature drove him to a new venture. This time he got his friends to back him and chartered another ship The North Star, and took the whole show to South America. Everything went fine with this venture, as far as business was concerned but things went wrong suddenly when the treasurer disappeared with all the funds. The Colonel

came back to Dover in 1877 and retired to the farm where he lived until his death in 1884 at the age of 66. But the circus world did not forget him and many circus people came to visit him in his retirement. The famous midget General Tom Thumb visited him many times. There was a story our Dad told about Tom Thumb contracting a cold while visiting the Colonel and our grandpa Dr. Jefferson Smith was called in to treat him. We have heard many more stories from father's generation about the town boys going down to the Cushing farm to see the lions and tigers in their winter quarters. Also there was the one about the orangutan that the Colonel allowed in the house and could wear clothes and eat with knife and fork.


From Rambles About the Dover Area 1623-1973, by Daniel J. Smith, 1973.

Nov. 13, 1833 — Meteoric shower of stars observable, between 3 and 4 o'clock in the morning, which attracted much attention throughout the country.

Nov. 12, 1845 — All the necessary preparations for the execution of Andrew Howard this day, were made. The gallows was erected in the Dover jail yard, and there was a collection of several thousand persons to witness the execution, when the reprieve of the prisoner to the 8th of July, 1846, was announced.

Nov. 15, 2004 — The Cochecho Waterfront Development Advisory Committee holds a hearing to solicit public input on how the city's 35-acre waterfront parcel off River Street should be developed. More than 70 people attended the session, which was held at the Public Library. At the hearing, committee members introduced a design charette, as well as a set of development guidelines established in 1996 and updated in 2004. The Cochecho Waterfront Development Advisory Committee was formed in April 2004 by the City Council to help guide development of the land. Earlier this year, the committee this year gave conditional approval to a developer to move forward with the development of the site. The developer, Cathartes, is currently in the process of seeking approval by the Planning Board.









In 1918, a new influenza virus emerged. During this same time period World War I was taking place. The conditions of World War I (overcrowding and global troop movement) helped the 1918 flu spread. Historian Mark Leno revisits Dover's war years in Dover400's November lecture

Dover400, a committee of residents organizing Dover's 400th anniversary, continued its virtual lecture series this week with an online presentation about Dover's service during the two World Wars.

"We Can Do It: The Garrison City Goes To War - Over There and on The Home Front",

explored many true tales of Dover citizens who fought in World War I and World War II, plus stories about those serving on the home front.

The presenter was Mark Leno. Mark retired from the Dover Police Department in 2010 after serving 26 years and is the author of several Dover-related history books including the history of the Dover Police Department, the history of the Dover Housing Authority, and Factory on Fire, a history of the Cocheco Mill Fire of 1907. He has also helped to research, write, and act in several of the Dover historical Reveal events benefitting Dover Main Street and the Woodman Museum. He is a former Board member of the Woodman Museum and is presently writing a book on the history of The Mount Washington Hotel and tourism in Crawford Notch, New Hampshire.
