School Board to receive FY27 budget presentation

Presentation kicks off budget review workshops

The School Board will begin crafting its FY2027 budget at a special meeting on Monday, Nov. 17, at 6 p.m., where School Board members will receive a budget presentation. The meeting will be held in City Hall's Council Chambers.

The School Board will continue its budget review at a Monday, Nov. 24 workshop, which will include departmental budget presentations. The School Board will also have budget workshops on Dec. 1, Dec. 8 and Jan. 6 – all Mondays.

If ready, the School Board will vote to adopt its budget on Monday, Jan. 12, with a backup date of Tuesday, Jan. 13. By city ordinance, the School Board's budget is due to the City Manager annually by Jan. 15.

The School Board's adopted budget will be presented to the

City Council during its review process, tentatively scheduled for Wednesday, Feb. 18. The City Council will hold a public hearing on the School Board's adopted budget, tentatively scheduled for March 4.

The overall city budget is to be adopted by the City Council annually by April 15.

The City Council and School Board are tentatively scheduled to meet on Wednesday, Dec. 6, as they do annually to discuss the upcoming budget and receive the preliminary FY27 tax cap calculation.

Warming Center begins operation

The Emergency Warming Center on Willand Drive in Somersworth begins its as-needed winter operations on Saturday, Nov. 15, continuing through April 15, 2026, during the overnights of life-threatening winter weather.

The warming center at 30 Willand Drive will also be open during the day on upcoming holidays: Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's Day.

Strafford County and the cities of Dover, Rochester and Somersworth have again contracted with East Coast Evolution Leadership, LLC to operate the warming center for the 2025/2026 winter season for \$250,000, with Strafford County administering the contract. Rochester and Dover are contributing up to \$75,000 for operations, Somersworth is providing in-kind emergency services, and Strafford County is using funds from the state's cold weather shelter program.

The City of Dover owns the emergency warming center property, which it purchased in 2020 with grant funds to be used during the COVID-19 pandemic during emergency cold weather events.

Volunteer and donations

The Warming Center operator welcomes donations and volunteers to help make a successful season. They've created a <u>list of supplies</u> needed for those interested in helping keep the center stocked. They will hold training sessions for volunteers in the coming weeks.

Dover dedicates Captain Jack T. Casey Memorial Bridge

The City of Dover formally dedicated the Washington Street Bridge on Saturday, Nov. 8, as the Captain Jack T. Casey Memorial Bridge, honoring a hometown Marine who died in a 2024 training accident.

The ceremony began at the Rotary Arts Pavilion at Henry Law Park and concluded with the unveiling of the new bridge sign over the Cochecho River.

"Today, we honor a son of Dover, a young man whose courage, kindness and love for his country and community left a mark that will never fade," Mayor Robert Carrier said. "This bridge, connecting both sides of our city, reminds us that Jack was someone who built connections, who lifted people up, who made every place he touched a little stronger and a little better."

Gov. Kelly Ayotte told the Casey family that the state stands with them in gratitude and remembrance.

"Captain Casey represented the very best of New Hampshire," Ayotte said. "Every person who crosses this bridge will see his name and be reminded that we are only free as a country because of men and women like Captain Jack Casey, those willing to serve our country and something bigger than themselves."

Other speakers included William Shaheen, on behalf of U.S. Sen. Jeanne Shaheen; U.S. Rep. Chris Pappas; and American Legion Post 8 Commander Wayne Gower.


During the ceremony, Carrier read an official city proclamation designating Nov. 8, 2025, as Captain Jack T. Casey Day, following the City Council's unanimous vote earlier this year to rename the bridge in Casey's honor.

At the conclusion of remarks at Henry Law Park, the group moved onto the bridge, where the mayor unveiled the new Captain Jack T. Casey Memorial Bridge sign.

Jack's mother, Cathy Casey, thanked the city and community for their support and said her son never stopped being proud of his hometown.

"I can't say enough about how Jack loved this community," she said, adding that wherever he went, "there wasn't a person that he came across that didn't know the state motto of 'Live Free or Die.' He appreciated this community so very, very much."

Diseased ash trees removed from Waldron Court

New trees to be planted in the spring

The City of Dover removed six of the eight diseased ash trees in Waldron Court infected by the invasive emerald ash borer beetle.

The trees in Waldron Court were cut last week; the stumps were removed this week. The granite posts were temporarily removed but have since been reinstalled.

The areas where stumps were removed were filled for the winter, with new street trees to be planted in the spring. There will also be new street lights installed in the courtyard in the coming weeks, as well as pedestrian improvements near Waldron Court's entrance on

Central Avenue.

The state historical marker, "Native Retribution Against Maj. Waldron," was also installed this week in Waldron Court. The marker was previously located on Central Avenue across from Second Street.

Typically, once an ash tree is infested with the <u>invasive emerald ash borer</u>, native to northeastern Asia, it will die within a few years. The beetle larvae feed beneath the ash tree's bark, disrupting its water and nutrient flow, with early signs including canopy dieback, bark splitting, woodpecker damage, and small D-shaped exit holes.

Once symptoms appear, damage is typically irreversible, and dying ash trees become brittle, posing serious safety risks in busy areas. City workers have been pruning dead limbs from affected trees for safety; however, more than 50 downtown ash trees will need to be removed within the next couple of years.



The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information located here.

Nov. 18, 1755 — A local diarist recorded that "at about four o'clock in the morning, there was a severe earthquake, nearly as strong as the one on Oct. 29, 1727, though not as loud." His brief note reflects what many in New England experienced that morning: a powerful jolt that shook homes, startled families from sleep, and stirred widespread fear. In the days that followed, the event drew the attention of scholars and clergy across the


region. John Winthrop Hollis, a professor of mathematics and philosophy at Harvard College, gave a lecture in the college chapel describing the "great earthquake which so lately spread terror and threatened desolation throughout New England." At the time, earthquakes were poorly understood, and such shocks were often interpreted as warnings or signs of divine displeasure.

Nov. 22, 1824 — The town voted to give \$5,000 towards the building of a new stone jail provided the same should be erected in Dover.

Nov. 19, 1856 — Two young men, George S. Clark, 26, and John Foss, 23, were killed when a cannon they were firing on Garrison Hill exploded prematurely. The men were taking part in local celebrations following the election of President James Buchanan.

Nov. 20, 1930 - The keys to the new National Guard Armory in Dover were turned over to Battery B on this day. It was formally opened to the public on Nov. 25.

Nov. 18, 2001 — More than 100 members of the congregation of the St. George Maronite Catholic Church commemorated its 53rd anniversary on this day, joined by then Gov. Jeanne Shaheen and her husband, Bill, and Alex Nossiff, who had weeks before been elected mayor. The St. George Maronite Society was founded in 1939 and made up of about 50 members, according to the history of the parish. In 1941, the society purchased Lothrop Memorial Hall, the former gymnasium for the city of Dover, and renovated it into the present church. In 1948, the Rev. Roukas Najjar was appointed the first Maronite priest for the church.



Video tour of Library renovation project

A <u>video of a recent tour</u> of the Dover Public Library renovation project was released this week, highlighting the many changes occurring inside and outside the historic building.

The library has been closed since January 2025 for a significant renovation project that will add accessible entrances and programming space. The historic front façade of the building will remain unchanged, as will its detailed woodworking throughout.

The new addition on the parking lot side of the library will create two entrances: One for the Children's section on the ground floor and another for the main library section on the first floor.

During the renovation project, library operations have been moved to the McConnell Center. Adult services are located in the cafeteria, and Children's services are in Room 305. Library events occur in Room 306.

Understanding Your Electric Bill

Your electric bill has two parts:

- 1. **Supply:** The actual cost of the electricity you use each month, based on kilowatt hours (kWh); and
- 2. **Delivery:** The cost to bring electricity to your home (system maintenance, transmission, and public policy). This cost doesn't change based on how much you use.

Understanding Your Electric Bill

Your electric bill can sometimes feel confusing, but it essentially breaks down into two main categories: supply and delivery.

Supply covers the actual cost of the electricity you use. Your usage is measured in kilowatt hours (kWh), which you can track in the "Monthly kWh Use" table on page two of your bill. The supply charge is calculated by multiplying your electric rate by the number of kWh you consumed.

Delivery refers to the cost of bringing electricity to your home. Unlike supply, this charge doesn't change based on how much electricity you use. Delivery funds essential services in three areas:


- Distribution, operations, and service: Maintains local infrastructure and supports utility staff.
- Transmission: Covers the regional system that delivers electricity from power generators to the network.
- Public policy: Supports programs required by state and federal regulations, such as energy efficiency initiatives, financial assistance, and incentives for solar and electric vehicles.
