Coming up at the next City Council meeting

Council holds public hearings on Capital Improvement Program

The City Council will hold three public hearings on the proposed FY2027-2032 <u>Capital Improvements Program</u> at its Wednesday, Nov. 12 meeting.

One public hearing is on the six-year planning CIP document itself, which does not authorize or appropriate funding. Another is for authorizing and appropriating \$4,604,492 for proposed FY2027 non-debt finance projects. The third public hearing is for authorizing \$37,093,980 in bonding and appropriating that amount for FY2027 debt-financed projects. The City Council anticipates voting on these resolutions at its Dec. 10 meeting. This week, the City Council held a workshop to review proposed CIP projects.

The City Council will also hold a public hearing on a pending revision to the city's dog ordinance following a change to state law. The ordinance revision will allow the city to require dogs deemed vicious under state law to be muzzled and/or restrained in public, regardless of whether the dog is leashed.

Sunday: 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The City Council will also consider a resolution to forgive interest and late fees for water and sewer billing and miscellaneous service bills for active military and federal employees not receiving paychecks during the federal government shutdown. The waiver does not apply to invoices determined by state statute, such as property tax bills.

Also on the agenda are resolutions that would authorize:

- The contracting with Wright-Pierce for \$682,600 to investigate and analyze infiltration and inflow (I/I) into the city's sewer system and create a technical report with recommendations to reduce I/I in the system;
- Acceptance of a \$10,000 gift for the Dover Public Library from the Carnegie Corporation of New York;
- The purchase of an "easement machine" to clean difficult-to-access sewer mains for \$76,703;
- Replacing the city's broadcast equipment at the end of its lifecycle with a TelVue system for \$37,057;
- Awarding the bid to install a new HVAC system at Griffen Well for \$67,615, to prepare for the reactivation of the well for backup use.

The complete agenda is <u>posted online</u>. The meeting begins at 7 p.m. in City Hall's Council Chambers. It will be televised on DoverTV and <u>online</u>, where it will be available on demand.

Trash pickup and curbside recycling are not affected by the holiday and will follow a regular schedule.




Veterans Day ceremony is Nov. 11

A Veterans Day ceremony will be held on Tuesday, Nov. 11, 2025 at 11 a.m., at Dover Veterans Park.

The ceremony will include an opening prayer, posting of colors, the laying of the wreath, the Dover High School Band, and Dover High School's Navy Junior ROTC. There will also be remarks by various officials, including Mayor Robert Carrier, members of the American Legion, and a guest speaker.

The ceremony is organized by the Dover American Legion, Post 8.



City of Dover to dedicate

Capt. Jack T. Casey Memorial Bridge

The City of Dover will hold a ceremony on Saturday, Nov. 8, to officially dedicate the Washington Street Bridge as the Captain Jack T. Casey Memorial Bridge, in honor of U.S. Marine Corps Capt. Jack T. Casey, a Dover native who lost his life during a training mission in 2024.

The ceremony will begin at 10 a.m. at the Rotary Arts Pavilion Courtyard in Henry Law Park. Following remarks, attendees will walk to the Washington Street Bridge, located between the Washington Street Mills and the Children's Museum of New Hampshire, for the unveiling of a memorial plaque.

Capt. Casey, 26, was a CH-53E Super Stallion helicopter pilot assigned to the 3rd Marine Aircraft Wing at Marine Corps Air Station Miramar in San Diego, California. He was killed along with four fellow Marines on Feb. 7, 2024, during a training flight in the mountains outside San Diego.

A graduate of St. Mary Academy, St. Thomas Aquinas High School, and the Virginia Military Institute, Casey is remembered for his leadership, kindness, and deep pride in his hometown. In June 2025, the Dover City Council unanimously passed a resolution to rename the Washington Street Bridge in his memory.

Municipal Election results available online

The City Clerk has posted election results and voter turnout for this week's election to the 2025 Municipal Election page.

Voters from all wards elected the Mayor, two at-large City Councilors, and one at-large School Board member. In addition, voters in each of the six Dover wards elected a City Councilor and School Board member, as well as election officers, including a Supervisor of the Checklist, Moderator, Selectpersons, and Ward Clerks. All elected positions are for two-year terms that begin in January 2026.

Voter turnout information from City Clerk Jerrica Vansylyvong-Bizier includes votes cast, absentee ballots cast, turnout percentage, and the number of registered voters. There were a total of 5,487 votes cast at the election, for an overall turnout percentage of 24.8% of registered voters casting a ballot. The highest turnout was in Ward 6, with 29.6% of registered voters voting in the election. Ward 3 had the lowest turnout, with 23.4% of registered voters casting a ballot.

Voter turnout was higher than in the previous two municipal elections. In 2023, there was a 21.8% turnout; in 2021, it was 24.6%. Presidential elections have a considerably higher voter turnout. The turnout of registered voters in the 2024 General Election was 82.5%; in 2020, it was 80.1%.

City transitioning to ParkMobile for mobile parking payment

The City of Dover is transitioning its mobile parking payment system to ParkMobile in the coming weeks. Users

are encouraged to download the ParkMobile smartphone app for a seamless transition.

<u>ParkMobile</u>, which is used in Portsmouth, Durham and many other municipalities nationwide, has similar pay-by-phone and pay-by-text options as Dover currently has. ParkMobile is also utilized in some private lots in Dover that operate independently of the city.



Dover's municipal metered lots and on-street parking will still utilize the Flowbird pay-by-phone app until the transition is complete.



The City Council appoints citizens to boards and commissions from recommendations of its Appointments Committee, which meets regularly to review applications.

Residents must empty their bagged leaves, brush at the Recycling Center

Residents bringing bagged leaves and brush to the Recycling Center must dump them on the ground separately at the Recycling Center's leaf and brush sections. They may not be left in their bags. The collected leaf and brush materials go into a composting operation that has no means or mechanism for removing contaminated items.

The change is to ensure bags do not contain household trash, construction debris and hazardous waste, which has occurred in the past.

Fall leaf curbside collection continues through Dec. 5

Fall leaf curbside collection, which began last week, will continue, Monday through Friday, through Dec. 5.

Bagged leaves will be picked up by Waste Management on the same scheduled day as curbside trash and recycling. Please note that pickup is delayed by one day on Thursday, Nov. 27 and Friday, Nov. 28, due to the Thanksgiving holiday.

Leaves must be placed curbside in biodegradable paper leaf bags. No brush will be accepted. Paper bags can be purchased at local hardware or home improvement stores.

Grass clippings, leaves, brush and yard waste are also accepted at the Recycling Center during regular operating hours, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.


Nov. 14, 1656 — The town ordered residents who were behind on their sawmill rent payments to settle their debts. At the time, sawmills were vital to Dover's early economy. Timber from the surrounding forests was a major export, used locally for building homes and ships and shipped to other colonies and England. The town often leased sawmill rights or land to individuals, with rents paid in money, lumber, or labor.

Nov. 13, 1833 — In the early morning hours between 3 and 4 a.m., residents of Dover, and people across much of North America, witnessed an extraordinary meteor shower that lit up the night sky. Thousands of meteors streaked overhead in what became known as "The Night the Stars Fell." This event was later identified as an especially intense occurrence of the Leonid meteor shower, which appears annually when Earth passes through debris left by the comet Tempel-Tuttle. The 1833 display was so vivid and

widespread that it inspired awe, fear, and fascination across the country. Newspapers reported that many believed it signaled the end of the world, while others viewed it as a divine or celestial sign. The shower's spectacle and the attention it received spurred early scientific interest in meteors as astronomical phenomena rather than atmospheric ones, marking a turning point in how people understood and studied meteor showers.

Nov. 12, 1923 — The opening gun in the campaign against Sunday athletics was fired yesterday when the football game scheduled at Guppy Park was prohibited and about 800 persons were sent away disappointed. The action was taken by the police after an objection to the contest had been entered at the police headquarters by the members of the Men's Bible Class at the Washington Street Baptist Church.

Nov. 14, 2004 — On this day, then Gov. Craig Benson nominated Stephen Morrison as Dover District Court's new judge, replacing Robert Cullinane, who would retire in December of that year. Morrison, then 55, had been the associate justice at the court since 1986, when Gov. John H. Sununu appointed Cullinane to full-time status. A special justice works part-time as a judge, while still maintaining a private law practice. A Dover native, Morrison had also been a former prosecutor with the Strafford County Attorney's Office and served as Dover's city attorney. A graduate of St. Thomas Aquinas High School in Dover, as well as Assumption College and Suffolk University Law School, Morrison had been in private practice since 1977. In 1979 Morrison became a partner in Gregoire, Morrison & Indorf. Morrison announced his retirement as Dover District Court judge in 2016, but did remain involved as a senior active judge, meaning he could still hear cases until he turned 70 years old in 2019.

State, NH Food Bank expanding mobile pantries for SNAP recipients

The State of New Hampshire is partnering with the New Hampshire Food Bank to assist Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) recipients affected by the federal government shutdown. The NH Food Bank will provide food for mobile pantries specifically for SNAP participants. The NH Food Bank will also provide more food options to SNAP participants at traditional food pantries.

Gather will distribute boxes of non-perishable food plus bags of apples and oranges from the NH Food Bank at its mobile markets. These can only be distributed to SNAP recipients, and recipients must bring their EBT card or certificate for verification. They do not have to be Gather members.

NH secures additional funding to sustain WIC benefits, services through November

The New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) announced this week that the state has received additional federal funding to sustain the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) during the federal government shutdown. By leveraging this new WIC funding and other existing federal funds DHHS will support WIC families in continuing to receive food benefits and services at local agencies through at least the end of November.

In October, DHHS announced estimated pause dates for WIC <u>food benefits</u> and <u>services</u> <u>at local agencies</u> due to a lack of federal WIC funding. The new and redirected federal funding will extend those timelines, enabling 13,000 WIC participants in New Hampshire to continue receiving food benefits past the Thanksgiving holiday. DHHS support for WIC services at local agencies, including nutrition education, breastfeeding support, and referrals to community resources, will also continue through at least the end of November.

The USDA Food and Nutrition Service has also informed all states that partial funding for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) will be available for November. DHHS is taking action to ensure SNAP recipients are able to access November funding as quickly as possible. Further updates will be shared as soon as they are available. Additionally, the State's partnership with the New Hampshire Food Bank is in place, and food box pickup locations are open for SNAP recipients.

Conservation tips

Residents are encouraged to:

- Limit outdoor watering, especially during the hottest parts of the day.
- Use commercial car washes, which are more water-efficient than washing vehicles

- at home.
- Fix leaks, including faucets and toilets, which can waste thousands of gallons annually.
- Reduce indoor use by shortening showers, turning off faucets while brushing teeth and running dishwashers and washing machines only when full.
