Waterfront committee to meet as building construction begins

Panel to discuss potential ground lease with Great Bay Rowing, review proposed boathouse design

The Cochecho Waterfront Development Advisory Committee meets next Tuesday, Sept. 17 at 5:30 p.m. in the McConnell Center's Room 305.

At the meeting, the committee will discuss and potentially vote to endorse a proposed 40-year ground lease with Great Bay Rowing, which would allow them to construct a 5,400-square-foot boathouse on the waterfront property. Any lease would require City Council approval before going into effect. Great Bay Rowing will also present a proposed design of the boathouse, a privately funded building that would not use any city funds. The ground lease calls for an annual rent of \$12,000, which would increase by \$1,000 per month every 10 years, with Great Bay Rowing responsible for operation and maintenance costs. The lease also calls for Great Bay Rowing to develop programs with the Recreation Department to educate the public about paddle sports.


CDWAC will also receive updates on the public and private construction elements at the waterfront. Construction of the new waterfront buildings continues at a rapid pace, with foundations constructed throughout the River Street loop

road. The site will see more workers in the coming weeks to continue the vertical construction of the new buildings. Construction of the public parks pavilion building is getting closer to reality, with the city expected to release the construction bid as early as next week.

Portland Avenue opens to two-way traffic as retaining wall work nears completion

Alternating one-way traffic occurs as needed for remaining project work

The temporary traffic signals on Portland Avenue by Cochecho and Chapel streets were removed Wednesday, allowing the resumption of two-way traffic as the work on the retaining wall project nears completion. However, motorists should anticipate a single lane of alternating one-way traffic within project limits, which will occur as needed to complete the project.

The remaining work includes pouring the remaining concrete sidewalk, which is anticipated to be completed early next week. However, the new sidewalk section will be closed until the safety railing is installed, which is not expected for weeks or more due to product availability. Milling and paving Portland Avenue within the project limits is projected to occur around the end of the month.

Work began earlier this year to rebuild the critical retaining wall supporting Portland Avenue. It was built to allow a new sidewalk section along the wall between Chapel and Cochecho streets and includes new street lights.



The USATF-certified course winds through historic downtown Dover and is perfect for advanced runners as well as beginners and families. Registration fees are \$30 for adults 21 and over and \$20 for runners under the age of 21. To register, visit dovernh.org/AHD5k. Online registration closes on Oct. 1, and in-person registration will be available at the Chamber until Oct. 4 or on the day of the race at the start line. Fees after October 1 are \$35 for runners 21 and over and \$25 for runners under 21. Cash prizes are awarded to the top finishers.

Before and during the race, runners and spectators can enjoy free coffee courtesy of New Hampshire Coffee Roasters. Following the race, each runner over the age of 21 will receive two complimentary pours of North Country Hard Cider, with non-alcoholic apple cider available for minors. Non-runners can purchase cider tokens at a cost of \$5 each.

The 40th Apple Harvest Day Festival kicks off at 9 a.m. on Oct. 5 with 300 vendors, two entertainment stages, children's amusements, and two food courts. Road closures, parking restrictions in place Sunday for Horne Street School 5k

Dover Police Chief William Breault announces the following road closures and parking restrictions for the Frances G. Hopkins Elementary School at Horne Street 5k Run and Fran's Fitness Walk on Sunday, Sept. 15.

To accommodate the event, which begins at 9 a.m., the following road closures are in place:

- Sixth Street: northerly direction from Grove to Whittier Street (9 to 9:30 a.m.);
- Horne Street: both ways between Glenwood Avenue and Redden Street (8:45 to 10 a.m.);
- Whittier Street: both ways from Sixth Street and Glenwood Avenue (9 to 9:45 a.m.)
- Glenwood Avenue: easterly direction from Sixth to Whittier Street (9 to 9:45 a.m.)

Residents should expect detours or delays on Sixth Street, Whittier Street, Horne Street and Glenwood Avenue between 9 and 10 a.m. Dover police personnel and event

volunteers will help manage traffic flow on the race route. The event starts and ends at Frances G. Hopkins Elementary School, 78 Horne St., Dover.

Parking will be prohibited on Conifer Commons and portions of Sixth and Horne streets Sunday morning. Event parking is available at the school and nearby neighborhood streets.

Dover honors 9/11 victims and first responders in City Council ceremony

In a tribute to the victims and heroes of Sept. 11, 2001, the Dover City Council held a remembrance ceremony during its meeting on Wednesday, Sept. 11, 2024. The event, marking the 23rd anniversary of the terrorist attacks, brought together city officials and first responders to reflect on the tragic day.

Dover Mayor Robert Carrier opened the ceremony by inviting members of Dover Fire and Rescue and the Dover Police Department to the podium. The solemn occasion served as a reminder of the sacrifices made by first responders and the enduring impact of 9/11 on the community.

Interim Fire Chief Perry Plummer, who spent 24 years with the department and previously served as the state's director of Homeland Security, recalled the events of Sept. 11, 2001.

"It's been 23 long years since America's darkest day," Plummer said. "I remember it like it was yesterday."

Plummer emphasized the importance of remembering not only the lives lost but also the heroic actions of first responders.

"Let's remember that firefighters and police officers saved over 20,000 people before giving their own lives," he said.

Police Chief William Breault read the names of the Dover residents who perished in the

attacks: Kathleen Shearer, Michael Shearer, Douglas Stone, and David Scott Suarez.

Deputy Fire Chief Craig Chabot explained the significance of the bell-ringing tradition in firefighting history.

"The signal was a sign of honor and respect for all firefighters who had made the ultimate sacrifice, and it's become a time-honored tradition," Chabot said.

Following Chabot's explanation of the tradition, Dover Fire and Rescue Division Chief Keith Irwin and Dover Police Capt. David Terlemezian performed the ceremonial tolling of the bell. The five measured dashes, repeated three times, echoed through Council Chambers, honoring not only the fallen first responders of 9/11 but also military members who have lost their lives in the subsequent War on Terror.

The ceremony concluded with Chief Plummer expressing gratitude to the Dover police officers and firefighters for their ongoing service to the community.

"The acts of selflessness will be building blocks for a better community and a better world," he said.

Mayor Carrier closed the remembrance by thanking all attendees for their participation and for keeping the events of 23 years ago in their hearts.

State Primary Election results available online

The New Hampshire State Primary Election was held this week on Tuesday, Sept. 10, 2024. Election results for Dover are available online here.

The primary election allows voters to select their party's nominees for various offices to appear on the general election ballot. This year, Dover voters cast their ballots for several key races. Republicans and Democrats chose their respective nominees for United States Congress, Governor, Executive Council, State Senator, and State Representatives. Additionally, Strafford County positions such as County Commissioner, County Attorney, County Sheriff, County Treasurer, Register of Deeds, and Register of Probate were on the primary ballots.

According to the election data, voter turnout for the primary was 28% across all six wards in Dover. The total number of ballots cast was 5,608 out of 20,223 registered voters. Ward 4 saw the highest turnout at 32%, while Ward 1 had the lowest at 24%. Absentee voting played a role in the primary, with 305 absentee ballots cast out of the total 5,608 votes.

Citywide hydrant flushing begins Sept. 22

The City of Dover Community Services' Utilities Division will begin its seasonal flushing of select fire hydrants throughout the city starting Sunday, Sept. 22. Hydrant flushing will occur daily overnight from 8 p.m. through 6 a.m. from Sunday night to Friday morning for an estimated four to five weeks.

The city's flushing program is critical for maintaining water quality and pressure throughout the distribution system. During the flushing, crews open select hydrants to move water through the system with enough velocity to scour the pipes and remove the buildup of any naturally occurring sediment and minerals. Water flushing also ensures fire hydrants are operational and allows public works to asses water pressure and flow for firefighting purposes. Flushing locations are indicated by the presence of city vehicles with flashing lights.

No water service disruption is expected, though there may be brief times of lower water pressure. Hydrant flushing can result in discoloration in tap water, but the water remains safe to drink. To remove discoloration, run the tap for several minutes until clear. If discoloration persists, customers can create an <u>online service request</u> anytime or contact Community Services during regular business hours, Monday through Friday, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., at 603-516-6450.





The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information located here.

Sept. 18, 1724 — The town selected Capt. Paul Gerrish and Capt. Benjamin Wentworth to act as representatives or lawyers for the town. Their job was to handle any legal cases involving people illegally using the town's common land, including both ongoing and future cases. They were also given the authority to hire other lawyers if needed.


Sept. 14, 1821 — The commissioned and non-commissioned officers of the Dover military companies formed a volunteer association under the title of "Soul of Soldiery," and under command of Capt. Brewer made their first public appearance that day in uniform. (Strafford Register)

Sept. 21, 1843 — The new Freewill Baptist Meeting House on Washington Street was dedicated on this day. The building no longer exists.

Sept. 20, 1853 — Gas lights were first used in Dover on this day. The lights had been installed in the mills and many stores by the gas company, which had opened earlier that year.

Sept. 18, 1857 — While digging the cellar for a house on Nelson Street, workers uncovered the foundation of a chimney and part of a cellar wall. These were believed to be the remains of either the garrison house belonging to the son of Peter Coffin or the first tavern in Dover, which was known to be in that area. Along with the foundation, human

bones, thought to be from a woman, were found, as well as a spoon that hadn't been used for more than 150 years. (Dover Enquirer) (To learn more about this story, tune in to next week's Dover Download podcast.)

American Legion Post 8 donates \$4,000 to Dover Toy Bank

The American Legion Post 8 in Dover presented a \$4,000 check to the Dover Fire Toy Bank on Friday, Sept. 6, helping to restock toys destroyed in a recent flood.

The donation comes after a water line break in early August flooded the downtown mill building where the toy bank was housed, ruining the entire supply of gifts meant for children in need during the upcoming holiday season. The Dover Fire Toy Bank, operated by the Dover Firefighters Charitable Association, has been assisting families in need for over 40 years, typically helping more than 100 families annually.

Wayne Gower, commander of American Legion Post 8, presented the check to Dover Fire and Rescue representatives during a ceremony at the Legion hall.

"Dover Fire, they truly are the heroes for us every day," Gower said. "We're very honored as the American Legion family to present the Dover Firefighters Association with a check from the Post 8 family with \$4,000 to help with the toy bank recovery."

Gower also thanked Legion members for their generosity and hard work in fundraising, emphasizing the organization's commitment to community service.

"These are the things that we do as an organization that allows us to give back to our community," he said. "And that's all because of the hard work that all of you do here and the hard work on the weekends raising money."

Daniel Furman, vice commander of Post 8, emphasized the Legion's commitment to supporting the community's youth.

"One of our pillars, one of the highest initiatives, is children and youth," Furman said. "We're trying to do as much as we can to continue making things good for the kids."

Dover firefighter Michael Kilday expressed gratitude for the Legion's support and the community's overwhelming response.

"It's awesome to see the community all come together and help us out," Kilday said. "The

fire department usually doesn't ask for help. So when we do, it definitely shows how great this community and the city of Dover is, helping us out."

EPA SepticSmart Week Sept. 16-20

Is your septic tank due for a pump?

Is your septic system working as it should, and are you using it properly? Is it due for a pump? A significant source of groundwater pollution is from failed septic systems.

Next week is the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's SepticSmart Week, an annual event to remind septic users of the importance of proper use and maintenance. One in five U.S. homes have septic systems, according to the EPA. If your septic system is not properly maintained you may be risking your family's health, hurting the environment, and flushing thousands of dollars down the drain.



When household wastewater exits the septic system, it seeps into the ground where it joins the groundwater and then travels to our streams, rivers, lakes, and drinking water aquifers. A properly designed and functioning septic system treats this effluent and eliminates harmful bacteria before it leaves the septic system.

Pumping, inspecting and maintaining your septic system will help keep it functioning properly and avoid environmental and financial catastrophes. Regular maintenance will

help prevent wastewater from backing up or overwhelming the leach field, which would turn a yard into a soggy, expensive mess. A septic tank pump ranges from \$250-\$500 and should be done every three to five years. Compare that to a leach field replacement, which may cost upwards of \$20,000.
