Drainage, utility work underway at waterfront

The contractor making public improvements to the city's waterfront development site has begun installing the stormwater drainage system and is preparing to begin installing new utilities.

Since work began in June, the contractor, Northeast Earth Mechanics, LLC., has cleared trees and stumps from the eastern slope of the 29-acre site. Workers have also removed overhead utility infrastructure and some existing yet abandoned stormwater, sewer water, and gas utilities. The installation of new utilities will begin this month. Thursday, Saturday: 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. The first part of the project is public improvements, including constructing a new street system for site access and establishing necessary utilities for the upcoming buildings. The project includes a new 3.4-acre public riverfront park, shoreline stabilization, site grading for projected sea-level rise, and a new stormwater management system with green infrastructure. Since much of the work for developing the site for future commercial development involves subsurface work, the public may not see a dramatic change at the waterfront site until the subsurface work is complete.

One priority for the contractor is readying pad site C, where private developer Cathartes plans to begin its work next year. The development plan includes three mixed-use buildings, two multi-family buildings, and three clusters of townhouses. Approved by the Planning Board in June 2022, the waterfront development aims to revitalize the Dover waterfront and introduce approximately 26,000 square feet of commercial space and 418 residential units, comprising both rental and condominium units for sale.

This week, the paddle sports dock was removed for the season. The dock is not likely to be installed until the summer of 2025 to allow crews to do the stabilization work along the river's edge and other work to make the site safe for public access. The city is working to find a temporary site for kayaks and canoes to enter the Cochecho River until the dock is reinstalled. A current public option is to launch from state-owned Hilton Park off Hilton Drive in Dover Point.

The Cochecho Waterfront Development Advisory Committee, which the City Council tasked with overseeing the development, will meet on Tuesday, Sept. 26. to review the progress to date. In addition, the committee will receive a presentation on the park pavilion design plans. The meeting begins at 5:30 p.m. in the McConnell Center's Room 305. Dover Police Chief gives overview of illegal drug issues at Council workshop

At a <u>City Council workshop</u> this week, Dover Police Chief William Breault gave a presentation on the city's illegal drug issues and the police department's strategies to combat them through enforcement, prevention, and outreach assistance.

Chief Breault stated that illegal drug use, particularly of opioids like fentanyl, remains a major problem in Dover and the Seacoast region. He noted that drug overdose deaths statewide increased 11.5% from 2021 to 2022, reaching record highs, with fentanyl being involved in most cases. Dover has seen seven fatal and 35 non-fatal overdoses so far this year.

Chief Breault said the department takes a hardline stance on enforcement, partnering with state and federal agencies on task forces to go after major drug dealers and traffickers. He cited major seizures of drugs, cash, and firearms from these operations. However, he acknowledged challenges like bail reform that quickly put dealers back on the street.

For prevention, Chief Breault highlighted the department's youth programs, media campaigns, and community partnerships aimed at stopping drug abuse before it starts. But he warned that prevention competes against influential pro-drug messaging and the perception that drugs are not dangerous.

Chief Breault stated that outreach assistance for those already trapped in addiction is also crucial. He touted the department's social workers who provide direct aid and connect people with treatment. But again, he noted hurdles like privacy laws between agencies and refusals to accept help.

"Our philosophy is we'd rather provide assistance and offer you a way to get assistance and improve your quality of life, not just continue the quality of life that you have," said Chief Breault.

The Chief made clear that illegal camping is not tolerated but that a humane, progressive enforcement approach is taken. He reiterated that homelessness is not a crime, but the department will continue enforcing laws prohibiting drug dealing, crimes, and trespassing.

Chief Breault reiterated that he and his department welcome input and stressed that drug issues are not unique to Dover but affect the entire state. He said the department constantly works on new solutions but also needs the community's help.

Tropical Storm Warning in effect

Strong winds and rain expected to begin overnight


As Hurricane Lee approaches, the National Weather Service has issued a Tropical Storm Warning along the New Hampshire and Maine coast.

Hurricane Lee is anticipated to enter the Gulf of Maine late tonight or early Saturday. As the storm moves north, it is expected to weaken, but the wind field will continue to expand significantly.

The potential exists for tropical storm conditions to develop by this evening, which may continue tonight through Saturday afternoon. The strongest winds are expected across coastal portions of New Hampshire and western Maine. Large, pounding surf and one to three feet of storm surge will bring the potential for beach erosion and minor to moderate coastal flooding. Heavy rainfall is also possible.

Fire Chief and Emergency Management Director Michael McShane urges the public to prepare for the storm and high winds of 39 to 57 miles per hour, which may down trees and limbs and create power outages. Lightweight outdoor items should be secured in preparation for the storm. Chief McShane urges everyone to have a <u>disaster plan</u>.

Road closures, parking restrictions in place Sunday for Horne Street School 5k

Dover Police Chief William Breault announces the following road closures and parking restrictions for the Frances G. Hopkins Elementary School at Horne Street 5k and Fitness Walk on Sunday, Sept. 17.

Traffic will be closed to through traffic to accommodate the event, which begins at 9 a.m.:

- Sixth Street, northerly, from Grove Street to Whittier Street, 9 to 9:30 a.m.
- Horne Street, from Glenwood Avenue to Redden Street, 8:45 to 10 a.m.
- Whittier Street, from Sixth Street and Glenwood Avenue, 9 to 9:45 a.m.
- Glenwood Avenue, from Sixth Street to Whittier Street from 9 to 9:45 a.m.

Residents should expect detours or delays on Sixth Street, Whittier Street, Horne Street and Glenwood Avenue between 9 and 10 a.m. Dover police personnel and event volunteers will help manage traffic flow on the race route. The event starts and ends at Frances G. Hopkins Elementary School, 78 Horne St.

On-street parking restrictions will be in effect on the entire length of Conifer Commons and portions of Sixth and Horne streets on Sunday morning. Limited event parking is available at the school. Those attending the event are encouraged to park legally on the surrounding neighborhood streets.



Mayor proclaims September as National

Service Dog Month

Dover Mayor Robert Carrier this week presented a proclamation declaring September as National Service Dog Month in the city. The proclamation was accepted by Brendan Madden, founder of the New Hampshire Coalition of Service and Support Dogs (NHCSSD), at the Wednesday, Sept. 13 City Council meeting.

The proclamation highlighted service dogs' vital role in assisting people with disabilities. It noted that approximately 500,000 service dogs in the U.S. provide critical support to those with mobility, visual, hearing, and other impairments. National Service Dog Month honors these dogs and raises awareness about their contributions.

Madden founded NHCSSD after receiving his first service dog, Japhy, in 2005. The organization assists service dog owners and promotes awareness about service dogs' importance. Madden was honored to accept the proclamation on behalf of the service dog community.

Mayor Carrier's recognition of National Service Dog Month underscores the city's commitment to supporting disabled residents and their service animals.

City Council recognizes Constitution Week, DAR, with proclamation

Dover Mayor Robert Carrier recently proclaimed the week of Sept. 17 as Constitution

Week in the city.

At a recent City Council meeting, Carrier presented the proclamation to Christine Down, regent of the Margery Sullivan chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

The proclamation recognizes the 236th anniversary of the drafting of the Constitution on Sept. 17, 1787. It calls on citizens to learn about, understand, and defend the founding document.

Carrier noted that the Constitution became the law of the United States on June 21, 1788, when New Hampshire became the ninth state to ratify it.

The weeklong celebration was first declared in 1956 through a resolution passed by the U.S. Congress and signed by President Dwight D. Eisenhower. The observation aims to encourage the study of the historical events that led to the framing of the Constitution in September 1787.

According to the proclamation, the DAR has been the primary advocate for the awareness, promotion, and celebration of Constitution Week. The nonprofit, nonpolitical volunteer women's service organization has worked to promote patriotism, preserve American history, and secure America's future through educational programs.

Deadline to change party affiliation before the Presidential Primary is Oct. 6

The deadline to change political parties before the New Hampshire Presidential Primary is Friday, Oct. 6, New Hampshire Secretary of State David Scanlan announced this week.

Scanlan also announced that the filing period for the Presidential Primary is from Oct. 11 through Oct. 27. He will announce the Presidential Primary date later this fall.

Dover voters who want to change their party affiliation before the primary should do so at the Dover Clerk's Office in the Customer Service Center on the Ground Floor of City Hall, 288 Central Ave. It is open Monday through Thursday from 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. and Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Registered voters may check their voter information by visiting https://app.sos.nh.gov/viphome.

Undeclared voters can vote in the Presidential Primary, but they must choose either a Democratic or Republican ballot and will become a registered member of that party. Those who wish to return to undeclared status after voting can sign a form to change back to undeclared before leaving the polling place when the Presidential Primary occurs. Only voters registered as undeclared can change back to undeclared at the polling place after voting.



Record summer rains a reminder to improve stormwater management and flood resiliency

With extreme rainfall causing severe flooding and infrastructure damage across New

England this summer, the City of Dover is exploring options to improve stormwater management and flood resiliency. Precipitation in the region was more than twice normal from June to August, with several storms dumping over 5 inches of rain in just hours.

While neighboring communities have suffered millions in property damage, Dover has so far avoided major flooding impacts. However, the frequent deluges underscore the need for sustainable funding to mitigate future flood risks.

A proposed Stormwater and Flood Resiliency Utility could provide a consistent revenue stream to support flood-control projects. A stormwater utility assesses fees based on a property's impervious surface area -- such as driveways, patios, and rooftops -- that generate stormwater runoff.

Residents can learn more at an Oct. 17 public workshop, at McConnell Center, beginning at 5:30 p.m. City officials urge citizens to attend and provide input on building a more flood-resilient city.

The Dover Utilities Commission and the City Council's Ordinance Committee will also discuss the utility at a joint meeting on Monday, Sept. 18, at 6:30 p.m. in City Hall's Council Conference Room. <u>Click here</u> for the complete agenda.

According to Gretchen Young, Dover's Environmental Projects Manager, a stormwater fee would create a more equitable and proportional distribution of cost and is expected to reduce the burden on residential property owners. For example, commercial sites with large parking lots or other impervious cover may have a relatively low assessed tax value but would shoulder more of the cost under stormwater fee scenario, offsetting some of the costs borne by single-family residents.

The City Council aims to vote on a stormwater utility ordinance by the end of this year, with implementation in fiscal year 2024 if approved. Additional public input sessions will be scheduled.



'Voices of Dover' series: Anthony Colarusso. Jr.


Sept. 20, 1853 — Gas lights were first used in Dover this evening, the mills and many stores having been supplied with it by the Gas Co., which was established this year.

Sept. 20, 1853 — A gold medal was presented to Hon. John P. Hale by the sailors of the U. S. Sloop of War Germantown, as a testimonial for his success in procuring the abolishment of flogging in the Navy.

Sept. 18, 1857 — In digging the cellar for a house on Nelson street, the foundations of a chimney and part of a cellar wall were disinterred, which are supposed to be the remains of the garrison house of the son of Peter Coffin, or of that of the first tavern opened in Dover, which it is known stood in that vicinity. Within the abutment were also found human bones judged to be those of a female, and a spoon differing entirely from anything that had been in use for more than 150 years. (Dover Enquirer)

Sept. 17, 1938 — Dover Mayor Dennis McDonough died on this day, while still serving as mayor. Just days before, McDonough had lost his bid to be seek the Democratic nomination for United States Representative.

Sept. 19, 2001 — A memorial service was held at the Unitarian Universalist Church on State Street in Portsmouth for Michael and Kathleen Shearer, who were aboard United Airlines Flight 175 bound for Los Angeles when terrorists hijacked the aircraft and crashed it into the south tower at the World Trade Center on Sept. 11, 2001. The Shearers had recently moved to Dover where they had built their "dream home."
