'Attainable housing' topic of upcoming Council workshop

City Council, City Manager goals also on agenda

The City Council will hold a workshop on "attainable housing" and InvestNH on Wednesday, Sept. 7, at 7 p.m.

Attainable housing refers to housing priced at fair or below market values based on the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) guidelines.

InvestNH is a recent state initiative administered by the Division of Economic Development using \$100 million of federal funds "to accelerate the approval and construction of affordable workforce housing in New Hampshire," according to the <u>InvestNH website</u>.

According to the website, the funds are for multifamily rental housing affordable to individuals and families at or below 80% of the area median income. Other municipal programs under InvestNH will provide grants to communities that approve these projects, grants to update or review zoning, and dilapidated building demolition grants.

Also on the workshop agenda is a review of City Council goals and a discussion on updating City Manager goals.

City administrative offices closed Labor Day

City administrative offices, including City Hall, will be closed on Monday, Sept. 5, 2022, for Labor Day. Regular hours will resume on Tuesday, Sept. 6, 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. The Public Library is closed Saturday through Monday for the Labor Day holiday weekend.

Recreation facilities at the McConnell Center, the Dover Community Senior Center at the McConnell Center, and the Indoor Pool are closed on Labor Day. The Jenny Thompson Outdoor Pool and the Ice Arena are open on Labor Day.

Trash pickup and curbside recycling will be delayed by one day all week for the holiday.

Labor Day is a "parking holiday." Metered parking is free on parking holidays, except for the Orchard Street Parking Garage, which requires paid or permit parking at all times.

Strafford County Legislative Delegation to meet, vote on new nursing home bond

The Strafford County Legislative Delegation is scheduled to meet Tuesday, Sept. 6 at 7 p.m. in Courtroom II of the Strafford County Superior Court to review and approve plans for constructing a new county nursing home.

The meeting will also include a vote to approve bonding for the estimated \$170 million project cost. The vote would require the approval of two-thirds of the members present for the meeting. The legislative delegation met on Aug. 24, where the motion for bonding did not achieve the two-thirds vote needed to pass it, according to a report in Foster's Daily Democrat.

Strafford County Commissioner Chair George Maglaras told the Dover City Council last month that if a new nursing facility was built, the commissioners' goal is to turn the current nursing facility into a transitional shelter for the unhoused.

Scaffolding at City Hall nearly complete; radio antenna to be removed soon

Locust Street entrance to be closed when antenna is removed

Scaffolding around City Hall's clock tower is nearly complete, allowing rehabilitation work to begin.

Once the scaffolding work is complete, the former police station radio tower will be removed from the roof of City Hall. That work is currently anticipated to occur the week of Sept. 12. The removal will require City Hall's back entrance to the Customer Service Center to be closed to allow the operation of a crane and the safe removal of the antenna. The plan is to remove the antenna in pieces.

When the Locust Street entrance is closed, the Customer Service Center will be accessible through City Hall's other doors, including the ADA-accessible entrance on Hale Street. Elevator service to City Hall's upper floors should also be back in operation at that time. The elevator has been out of order since mid-August to allow the installation of a new hydraulic pipe for

elevator operation, which involved more work than initially anticipated.

The clock tower restoration work includes repairing and restoring the gold leaf dome, copper roofing, metal sheeting and clock faces. It also includes repair or replacement of bell tower horizontal slats (louvers), repair of wiring within the bell and clock tower and replacement of internal wooden bead board ceiling. Lastly, the work includes the restoration of the exterior dome, repairing clock hands and mechanisms, replacing clock glass on the clock face in front of the building, replacing the roof access door for the clock tower and painting all exterior surfaces. The clock hands and existing copper roofing will be removed in the coming weeks to allow other rehabilitation work.



Downtown Central Avenue paving work targeted to start Sept. 11

Overnight work will be loud and require parking, traffic restrictions

Weather pending, paving operations for the downtown corridor of Central Avenue are set to begin the night of Sunday, Sept. 11. Central Avenue from the railroad tracks to Hale Street will be milled, followed by an overlay of new pavement.

Milling work will involve grinding 1 to 1.5 inches of existing pavement, so the new pavement will maintain the current pavement-to-curb height, called "curb-reveal." Milling operations will take about three nights to complete, and the work will be loud. O

Once the milling work and the adjustment of any road structures, such as stormwater drain grates and maintenance hole covers, are complete, the contractor will begin paving operations. Weather pending, the goal is to finish all paving operations by Tuesday, Sept. 20.

The milling and paving must occur at night because traffic has to be restricted on the city's main corridor to allow the work to be safely completed.

Parking restrictions and traffic restrictions

Parking will be prohibited on Central Avenue between the railroad tracks and Hale Street when paving operations occur. Traffic will also be curtailed through the project area. More details of the parking and traffic restrictions will be released next week.

Copies of "Dover, New Hampshire Through Time: Volume II," by local historian and photographer Thom Hindle, are available for sale at the City Clerk's Office.

The 128-page book features over 325 photographs and illustrations of Dover's past and present, as well as recognition and information on some of Dover's early photographers. Photos from the past are reproduced from original negatives, printed in sepia tone and presented in full color. The book also includes early invoices and trade cards. Many of the photographs in the book, some dating back to 1860, appear in print for the first time.

Thom Hindle is a commercial photographer, local historian and former trustee-curator at the Woodman Museum. He has preserved over 100,000 original negatives taken by New England photographers from the early 1900s to the present.

Signed copies are available at Dover City Clerk's office at City Hall or at the Greater Dover Chamber of Commerce Visitor Center. The book costs \$26. Copies of "Dover, New Hampshire Through Time," the first volume in the series, also remain available.

An in-person book signing with Hindle for "Dover, New Hampshire Through Time: Volume II" will be held on Saturday, Sept. 10, 2022, at the Art Center at One Washington Center, in Dover.

The following events are from a variety of historical records, sources and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information, <u>located here</u>.

Sept. 4, 1838 — Due to a great scarcity of water, Dover's mills were required to shut down for half of the day.

Sept. 4, 1862 — Died, Col. Andrew Peirce, aged 77, Dover's first mayor. From the Dover Enquirer: "He was born in Portsmouth Dec. 18, 1785, but nearly all his life was a resident of Dover, having filled, during his active and eminently useful life, almost every office in the gift of

his fellow citizens. He was Speaker of the Legislature in 1823; Senator of the 5th District in 1825 and 1826; and in 1850 was a member of the Convention called to revise the Constitution of the State. When Dover was incorporated as a city, Col. Peirce, as an honor especially due him, was elected its first Mayor. For 18 years he served as Clerk of the Strafford Courts, and for a term of years was Cashier and President of the Dover Bank. Of the First Congregational Church he was a Deacon for 24 years. In politics Col. Peirce was originally a Republican, and with that ardent love for his country which characterized his life and was breathed in his latest prayers, he, as Captain, led his company into the field on the occasion of Portsmouth being threatened in the war of 1812. As a Christian he was earnest and sincere. His Christianity has ever been the operative principle of his public life, which has been characterized by not less ability than purest patriotism and most ardent devotion to the public good. No man can say that as a public officer, or as an agent in any business, lie has ever manifested less of interest than in the administration of his own private affairs, or treated himself better than life has treated any other individual. As a neighbor, it is only necessary to say that his neighbors are all mourners, and his name is spoken with affection by the widow and orphan. To say, after all this, that he was the kindest of husbands and fathers, would be to multiply words. Peace to his ashes. When shall we see his like again?"

Sept. 3, 1864 — Michael Read died this day at 86 years old. From the Dover Enquirer: "A native and always a resident of Dover, and taking a lively interest in its local affairs, he was probably more familiar with them than any other person in town. In his boyhood he listened to the preaching of Dr. Belknap who left Dover in 1786; he witnessed the execution of Elisha Thomas in 1788; and attended the sessions of the General Court which sat here in the old Court House in 1793. He could remember when Dover Landing was a Common, covered in part with trees — when the "great house" of the Waldrons occupied Franklin Square in solitary grandeur, and their possessions monopolized all the territory in that part of the town; when the Coffins owned what the Waldrons did not about Cochecho Falls, and when the populous city, which he lived to see grow up around them, contained not much more than a score of houses."

Sept. 3, 1911 — Over 400 cars crossed the Dover Point Toll Bridge on this day, setting a new record. The bridge, which linked Dover and Newington, had been built in 1874. In 1918, half the bridge was swept away by a large sheet of ice. The bridge was replaced by the General Sullivan Bridge in 1934.

Sept. 4, 2001 — Then Mayor Wil Boc announced that he and his wife, Carol, would host a Former Mayor's Reception. "It's an idea I've had for a long time," Wil Boc said to Foster's Daily Democrat at the time. "We haven't done anything in an official capacity." The Bocs tracked down 20 living former mayors or descendants, and invited them to the function. The event was planned for September of that year at the former Firehouse One Restaurant, now Ember.

COAST announces new bus tracking mobile app

The Cooperative Alliance for Seacoast Transportation (<u>COAST</u>) is thrilled to announce that our new bus tracking mobile app will officially go live on Tuesday, Sept. 6. Passengers can download Passio GO! to their smartphones to view arrival times and bus locations in real time. This app is free to download from the Google Play or App Store. The current mobile app used for tracking COAST buses, DoubleMap, will no longer track the locations of COAST buses as of September 6.

With this technology upgrade, Greater Seacoast public transit riders can access Information about individual COAST routes, schedules, and stops. Riders can also set bus arrival alerts and tag favorites, saving time and reducing wait times at bus stops. Additional alerts for route changes or delays serve to keep all riders informed.

"As was the case with the rollout of our previous bus tracking mobile app, there may be a break-in period for our staff as we integrate the new technology into our day-to-day operations," remarked Rad Nichols, COAST Executive Director. "We are very excited to move to this new platform and expect that our passengers will be pleased with the new app. The convenience of being able to see how our bus system is operating in real time on your phone or computer makes a real difference for public transit users."

NH DHHS expands monkeypox vaccine eligibility, vaccination locations, including Dover

The New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) announces that individuals at a high risk of infection for monkeypox are eligible for the vaccine, in addition to those who have known exposure to someone with confirmed monkeypox. DHHS also announces that individuals eligible for JYNNEOS, the monkeypox vaccine, can access the vaccine at eight ConvenientMD locations.

The monkeypox virus continues to spread primarily through sexual networks among persons who identify as gay, bisexual, and other men who have sex with men.

"We recommend that anybody who has been exposed to the monkeypox virus and anybody who is at high risk for being exposed gets vaccinated as soon as possible," said NH State Epidemiologist Dr. Benjamin Chan. "The JYNNEOS vaccine is safe and effective at preventing monkeypox. However, because it takes time for vaccine protection to develop and because no vaccine is 100% effective, people should continue taking steps to reduce their chance for exposure and limit their number of sex partners."

The JYNNEOS vaccine is distributed through city health departments and participating provider clinics. Patients should first contact their health care provider for a referral to a participating clinic. For individuals who do not have a health care provider, you can now call one of the eight Convenient MD locations providing vaccination. These locations are in, Belmont, Concord, Dover, Keene, Littleton, Manchester, Nashua, and Portsmouth. To be eligible for a vaccine in the State, individuals must live, work, or have a primary health care provider in New Hampshire.

COVID-19 vaccines and testing

Vaccines are available at most local pharmacies, including walk-in service at some. For more information, visit <u>vaccines.nh.gov</u> and click on "Find COVID-19 Vaccines".

Tests for active COVID-19 disease are available in locations across New Hampshire and include both the polymerase chain reaction (PCR) test and the rapid antigen test. The PCR test is for persons with or without symptoms of COVID-19. The rapid antigen test is for persons with symptoms and within a specific timeframe after onset of symptoms.
