## Planning Board votes to eliminate impact fees

## Board sets developer impact fees to zero effective immediately

The Planning Board voted unanimously on Tuesday to set developer impact fees to \$0 effective immediately and directed city staff to draft an ordinance revision that would remove the language of impact fees from the city code. The Planning Board has been discussing impact fees off and on since February of this year.

The City of Dover has previously assessed impact fees for new residential and non-residential developments to support the expansion of capital facilities to meet increased demands for public services generated by the developments as a way to mitigate the unintended consequences of growth. The city can only use impact fees in specific ways as set by state law.

In addition to the Planning Board's review, the City Council's Ad-hoc Committee to Address Community Housing Needs has also discussed impact fees and their effect on housing prices.

City Councilor Fergus Cullen, the Council's Planning Board representative, made the motion to set fees at \$0. In his update to the City Council on Wednesday, Cullen said, "This is a significant signal to developers that Dover is taking a real

serious step to making it easier for developers to add housing to our community and lowering the cost thereof."

## Voter registration event to be held at City Hall Oct. 19

The city's Supervisors of the Checklist will host a voter registration event on Saturday, Oct. 19, 2024 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. in the auditorium of Dover City Hall, 288 Central Ave.

During this session, supervisors will register new voters, record address changes, and make necessary corrections to the voter checklist.

Residents may also register at the City Clerk's Office at City Hall during regular hours, Monday through Thursday, 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., and Friday, 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. The last date to register before the Nov. 5, 2024 election is Monday, Oct. 28. After that date, any voter registration will occur on Election Day at the resident's designated polling place. The city's online <u>interactive ward map</u> helps voters determine the voter's ward and provides its polling location. Voters who have moved from one ward to another in Dover should also update their voter registration.

In New Hampshire, there is no time requirement to live in the state before being allowed to register. Residents may register to vote upon moving into Dover or between city wards. Eligible voters must be at least 18 years old on Election Day, a United States citizen, and domiciled in the Dover ward where they seek to vote. Registering to vote requires proof of identity, age, citizenship, and domicile. This proof can be by presenting documents or signing an affidavit under oath with an election official. Documents that prove identity, age, citizenship, and domicile include a driver's license or non-driver ID from any state that provides proof of identity and age, a birth certificate, a U.S. Passport/Passcard, or a naturalization document that satisfies proof of citizenship.

#### Election officers needed in all wards for General Election

The City of Dover seeks election officers to assist at polling places at the General Election on Tuesday, Nov. 5, 2024. Election workers are needed in all of the city's six political wards.

Election officers are paid positions working under the direction of the Ward Moderator who oversees the election process. Duties include aiding voters, maintaining order, opening and closing the polls, and processing the vote counts. The Ward Moderator will provide any necessary training for election officers who must be at least 18 years old and live in Dover.





The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information located here.

**Oct. 4, 1841** — A severe storm with heavy snow causes significant disruptions and damage.


**Oct. 6, 1842** — The cornerstone of the new Town Hall was laid this day. Speakers included Dover's John Parker Hale, who served as a United States senator. A variety of pamphlets, papers, coins, and other matters were deposited in a box under the cornerstone, including a sketch of Dover, a map of the village, a list of Town Officers, newspapers published in town, and other items. The Town Hall was originally located at the corner of Washington Street and Central Avenue, where the former Masonic building stands today.

**Oct. 5, 1858** — The State Fair was held this year for the second time in Dover, on Ricker Field. The fair attracted record crowds, generating receipts of "\$6,000, a larger sum than ever before taken."

Oct. 6, 1925 — Foster's Daily Democrat in Dover announced it would publish a play-by-play account of the World Series between the Pittsburg Pirates and Washington Senators, which it began at 2 p.m. that day, announcing the game through a megaphone.

Oct. 2, 2004 — Comcast customers in Dover and throughout the region were able to use the cable company's newly unveiled technical marvel on this day: the DVR. The company told customers the DVR (digital video recorder), which allowed the recording of broadcast television without a VCR and tapes, was the "latest product innovation." DVR use

skyrocketed for the next decade but began to taper off with the arrival of streaming services and cloud-based technologies.



## 'Voices From the Cemetery' returns to Pine Hill Cemetery this October

The Woodman Museum will host its annual "Voices From the Cemetery" re-enactment

event at Pine Hill Cemetery from Oct. 12 to 13, 2024.


The event aims to bring local history to life, featuring stories of adventure, tragedy, and triumph spanning several centuries of Dover's past.




Bottles, cans and containers should be clean, dry and free of MOST food waste before you place them in your recycling bin.

Bottles, cans and containers should be clean, dry and free of MOST food waste before you place them in your recycling bin. They do NOT need to be spotless, just clean enough to avoid contaminating other recyclables, like paper. Rinsing them in your dishwater to remove residue is enough.



#### Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) and older adults

Respiratory syncytial virus, or RSV, is a common respiratory virus that infects the nose, throat, and lungs. RSV symptoms make it difficult to distinguish it from the common cold or other respiratory viruses (like the flu or COVID-19). RSV spreads in the fall and winter along with other respiratory viruses and can be dangerous for older adults.

CDC recommends a single dose of an RSV vaccine for everyone ages 75 and older and for people ages 60–74 who are at increased risk of severe RSV. Adults ages 60-74 are considered at increased risk if they have one or more of the following risk factors:

- · Chronic heart or lung disease
- A weakened immune system
- Certain other medical conditions\*, including diabetes with complications and severe obesity
- Live in a nursing home

If you have already gotten an RSV vaccine, you do not need to get another one at this time.

Real-world data gathered during the 2023-2024 RSV season show that RSV vaccines reduced the risk of RSV-associated hospitalization or emergency department visits by 75%-80%. Importantly, these data include populations that are at highest risk for severe RSV, including those ages 75 and older, those who are immunocompromised, and those who live in nursing homes.

Talk to your healthcare provider to find out if the RSV vaccine is right for you.

#### **COAST expanding Route 7**

The Cooperative Alliance for Seacoast Transportation (COAST), more commonly known as COAST, will be adding an additional day of service to its Route 7 On Demand service that operates in Exeter, Stratham, and Newmarket.

Beginning Friday, Oct. 4, the advanced reservation service, which currently runs on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Saturday from 9:30 a.m.- 5:15 p.m., will add Fridays to its regular schedule. The additional day of service is being funded by a grant from a local foundation and will continue until Sept. 26, 2025.
