Coming up at the next City Council meeting

Purchase of shipping containers for public safety training structure before City Council

The City Council is expected to authorize the purchase of used shipping containers for Dover Fire and Rescue to create a joint public safety training structure at its Wednesday, Sept. 10 meeting.

The project would stack and join 12 40-foot shipping containers to form a three-story structure with a peaked roof for vertical and elevated entry training. The training structure would be a joint effort of Dover Fire and Rescue, Dover Police Department and the Strafford County Regional Tactical Operations Unit, commonly referred to as the SWAT team. It would provide training for search and rescue drills utilizing firefighters' self-contained breathing apparatus, joint police-fire threat simulations, the tactical unit's forcible entry, stairwell and room-clearing drills, and provide an area for student training for Dover High School's firefighter program.

Also on the agenda is a resolution to authorize the

abatement of outstanding charges and accrued interest previously invoiced to the Cocheco Friends for the Dover Holiday Parade traffic details.

Additionally, there are resolutions that would authorize contracting for laboratory testing services, the purchase of a wheeled excavator and approving amendments to the Dover Business and Industrial Development Authority operating rules.



Next phase of downtown light replacement project begins Monday

Central Avenue lights from train tracks to Second Street to be replaced

Workers will begin replacing 22 downtown streetlights on Monday, Sept. 8, as part of the second phase of the downtown light replacement project. The work will require parking restrictions and lane shifts.

The lights will be replaced along both sides of Central Avenue from the rail crossing to Second Street on the eastern side and Chapel Street on the western side. It also includes replacing two lights in the traffic island where southbound Central Avenue traffic turns left onto Chapel Street. The goal is to reuse the buried electrical conduit to minimize the need for excavation.

Work will begin at the rail crossing on Sept. 8 and work south towards Second Street. Crews will work Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. The goal is to complete the project before Apple Harvest Day on Saturday, Oct. 4.

Parking restrictions will be in place around the work area. Between Third Street/Broadway and the rail crossing, all spaces will be blocked off. For the remainder of the project, the city anticipates only blocking the two parking spaces near the light they are replacing.

The first phase, completed earlier this year, replaced lights at the Central/Third/Broadway intersection and within the adjacent Franklin Square median. The upgrades are part of an overall project to improve downtown lighting, including around crosswalks, for improved visibility and pedestrian safety. Many of the lights being replaced were installed in the late 1970s.

Liberty Mutual campus redevelopment plan before Planning Board Tuesday

Developer seeks to establish Residential Commercial Overlay District and site plan approval for Phase 1

A real estate developer will appear before the Planning Board on Tuesday to seek a conditional use permit and Phase 1 site plan approval for the redevelopment of the Liberty Mutual property on Sixth Street, which will also include a public hearing on the plan.

Manchester-based Brady Sullivan Properties, led by Shane Brady and Arthur Sullivan, seeks to convert the 350,000 square foot office building at 150 Liberty Way into a mixed-use building with residential and commercial uses. Brady Sullivan has a purchase and sales agreement with Liberty Mutual for the site.

If granted by the Planning Board, the conditional use permit would establish a Residential Commercial Mixed-Use Overlay district over the 218-acre property, which is zoned Innovative Technology. The conditional use permit would allow them to develop their master plan for the property.

The project narrative included in the application states that Brady Sullivan has a three-phase development plan. Phase 1 would convert the 350,000-square-foot building at 150 Liberty Way into a mixed-use building with 37,000 square feet of commercial space and 245 residential apartments with a mix of one, two, and three-bedroom apartments, according to the application. The site plan application before the Planning Board is only for this phase.

Phase 2 would entail converting existing office space in the building at 100 Liberty Way into additional residential units. Phase 3 proposes constructing a new, mixed-use building. Each phase requires a site review plan to be reviewed and approved by the Planning Board.






The following events are from various historical records, sources, and texts about the history of Dover.

For more on the history of Dover, visit the Dover Public Library, Locust Street, and the

Woodman Museum on Central Avenue. The Public Library also maintains an online collection of historical information located here.

- Sept. 8, 1844 Thomas W. Waldron, 30, a Dover native and son of Daniel Waldron, the last owner of the Waldron Homestead, died while serving overseas as the United States consul at newly British Hong Kong and as a U.S. naval supply agent for China trade. A veteran of the U.S. Exploring (Wilkes) Expedition, Waldron had been appointed by President John Tyler in 1843 as the first American consul in Hong Kong, a post created after the Treaty of Nanking opened the port to Western commerce. He died within a year of taking office during official travel; Dover sources record the date and place as Sept. 8 in Hong Kong, while U.S. diplomatic histories report Sept. 18 in nearby Macau, likely from cholera. He is buried in Macau's Old Protestant Cemetery. His service was honored by Secretary of State Hillary Clinton during an American Foreign Service Association memorial ceremony in 2009.
- **Sept. 9, 1851** Dover, like many towns in New England at the time, was troubled by a wave of suspicious fires. Known at the time as incendiary fires, these were blazes deliberately set, often destroying homes, barns, or mills. The problem had become so widespread by 1851 that Dover's residents convened a special town meeting on this day. At that meeting, the town's selectmen were granted authority to offer cash rewards for the capture of those responsible. They were also directed to establish a night watch and to form a committee of vigilance to maintain a constant lookout for suspicious activity.
- **Sept. 6, 1861** On this day, proclaimed by President Abraham Lincoln as a National Day of Fasting, Dover joined communities across the country in prayer and reflection during the early months of the Civil War. Local clergymen delivered sermons suited to the solemn occasion, and that evening, townspeople, setting aside party politics, gathered in City Hall for a large public meeting. The hall was filled as speakers offered patriotic and stirring addresses, reflecting both the gravity of the war and the unity felt in Dover at that moment.
- **Sept. 8, 1999** George J. Kay, a longtime figure in Dover's schools and civic life, died at the age of 78. Born on Sept. 9, 1920, Kay devoted more than four decades to the Dover school system, serving as Dover High School principal, assistant superintendent, and coordinating construction projects at several schools. He also led McIntosh College until 1979 and later took on interim leadership roles in Rochester and Hampton. In 1985, Kay briefly served as Dover's interim city manager.
- **Sept. 11, 2011** On the 10th anniversary of the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks, the Dover fire and police departments gathered with the community at Henry Law Park for a solemn commemoration. The Dover Fire and Rescue Honor Guard tolled the station's bell in honor of the 343 firefighters who died that day, a tradition once used to signal a firefighter's death in the line of duty. The Rev. Susan Garrity and Mayor Dean Trefethen reminded those present that, like the memories of Pearl Harbor or President Kennedy's assassination, 9/11 marked a generation-defining moment. Fire Chief Richard Driscoll spoke of the fire service as a family bound together by sacrifice, underscoring the vow to "never forget." The ceremony concluded with firefighter Brendan Driscoll's moving bagpipe performance of "Amazing Grace."




A true crime lover's guide to New England

Along with a brief overview of some of the major crimes committed in New England, Barclay will tell you where to find the best crime and ghost tours, which hotels and restaurants are former jails, courthouses, or harbor paranormal activity; where infamous criminals are/were



jailed, and which venues and attractions might feed your fancy for murder and justice. Let Barclay help you traverse New England's criminal landscape in an organized and entertaining way!

Barclay is a veteran travel trade reporter who has served as senior or contributing editor on several magazines, including Travel Agent, Travel Life, Travel Market Report, and, most recently, Insider Travel Report. Her book, "Traveling Different: Vacation Strategies for Parents of the Anxious, the Inflexible, and the Neurodiverse", considered the autism travel bible, won the Lowell Thomas Gold Award in 2023 from the Society of American Travel Writers Foundation. It also won Honorable Mention from ASJA's Arlene Awards for Books that Make a Difference, and took first place in the Maxy Awards (inspirational/self-help category.) When not writing about travel, Barclay pens psychological/domestic/romantic suspense and edits crime fiction anthologies as D.M. Barr.

Lecture reveals history of 'forever chemicals'

Discover the story of how PFAS, a set of toxic chemicals many people are unfamiliar with, spread across the entire country.

Join the Dover Public Library virtually on Thursday, Sept. 18, at 6 p.m. for "Poisoning the Well: How Forever Chemicals Contaminated America" with award-winning Journalist

Sharon Udasin. The program is in partnership with the Nashua Public Library. Register to receive a link to the live stream.

Based on original reporting in four highly contaminated towns and incriminating documents, Udasin traces a history of corporate greed and devastation of human lives. The talk is based on the book of the same name Udasin co-wrote with Journalist Rachel Frazin.

PFAS, also known as "forever chemicals", are found in everyday products, from cooking pans to mascara, and are estimated to be in the bloodstream of 97% of Americans. In this talk, Udasin shares evidence that the makers of forever chemicals may have known for decades about the deadly risks of their products, which their own scientists have been documenting since the 1960s.

Udasin is an environment reporter, based in Boulder, Colo., who has been delving into water contamination and conservation issues for 15 years. She was a Ted Scripps Fellow in Environmental Journalism at the University of Colorado Boulder and has reported for The Hill, The Jerusalem Post, and The New York Jewish Week.
