Coming up at the next City Council meeting

Council sets public hearings for additional school funding, stormwater management loan, and inspection fees

The City Council will hold three public hearings meetings at its 7 p.m., Wednesday, Sept. 13 meeting on pending resolutions, which will be voted on at the Council's Sept 27 meeting.

The first is authorizing an FY2024 Capital Improvements Program expenditure for the Henry Law Park Stormwater Best Management Practices capital project and financing the \$3.5 million cost through the Clean Water State Revolving Fund. The project's goal is to construct stormwater treatment system features and structures within Henry Law Park to reduce stormwater pollutants and aid in stormwater flow mitigation.

The second is on a resolution to amend the FY2024 Schedule of Fees for Inspection Services, clarifying the penalty for starting work before a permit is issued. This would include permits for building, plumbing, electrical, fire suppression, and blasting, among others. Saturday: 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. The last public hearing is on a resolution to increase the School Department's FY2024 budget appropriations based on the additional \$3,642,497 it will receive from the state in education funding. These unanticipated funds are from the state's adopted biennial budget that was recently published. The School Board, at its Aug. 21 meeting, voted on amending its budget, which would appropriate \$3,408,069 of the aid, with the rest to reduce the property tax levy. The School Board requests the City Council to adopt its amended budget.



Filing period for City of Dover Municipal

Election opens Monday, Sept. 11

City Council, Mayor, School Board among elected positions to be decided in November

The filing period for the City of Dover municipal election begins at 8:30 a.m. this Monday, Sept. 11, 2023, and concludes at 4 p.m. on Friday, Sept. 22, 2023.

Candidates seeking the office of Mayor, City Council, School Board, Supervisor of the Checklist, Moderator, Selectperson, and Ward Clerk must file a written declaration of candidacy with the City Clerk during the filing period.

The municipal election is Tuesday, Nov. 7.

At the election, voters from all wards will elect the Mayor, two at-large City Councilors, and one at-large School Board member. In addition, voters in the six Dover wards will elect a City Councilor, a School Board member, and election officers, including a Supervisor of the Checklist, a Moderator, a Ward Clerk, and three Selectpersons. All elected positions are two-year terms that begin in January 2024.

Candidates seeking an elected position must be duly qualified voters in the city. For Mayor and City Council positions, candidates must have lived in Dover for at least one year preceding the election. Candidates seeking a specific ward position must live in that ward. A description of elected duties and compensation is posted on the city's <u>2023 Municipal Election page</u>.

City Council seeks to appoint Ward 2 moderator ahead of 2023 municipal election

The City Council seeks nominations to appoint a Ward 2 election moderator to oversee the ward's election during the 2023 Municipal Election on Tuesday, Nov. 7. The current Ward 2 moderator has informed the city that they will be unable to perform moderator duties for the Nov. 7 Municipal Election.

Eligible candidates must live in Ward 2 and be duly qualified voters in Dover. Moderators are responsible for overseeing the Election Day process at the polling place of the ward in which they reside. Moderators also ensure all applicable laws and procedures are carried out and followed by all participants at the polling place, and report any occurrences that may have a direct or indirect impact on the election. Moderators are elected positions, except when a permanent vacancy occurs, and they are appointed by the City Council. They are compensated \$185 per Election Day.

Nominations must be filed in person at the City Clerk's Office, located in the Customer Service Center on the ground floor of City Hall, 288 Central Ave. It is open through Thursday, from 8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., and on Fridays, from 8:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.


Court Street emergency sewer replacement update

Contractors have replaced the failed sanitary sewer on Court Street; however, work continues to replace a small section of sewer main on Back Road at the intersection with Court Street and Middle Road. This part was added to the project due to its unexpected interference with the force main that runs from the River Street Pump Station to the Waste Water Treatment Plant. Work is ongoing and is expected to be completed by the end of next week.

To facilitate this work, Back Road will be closed between Samuel Hanson Avenue and Court Street. Traffic will be detoured around the work area.

Once completed, the road will receive a base coat of pavement, which will also require traffic restrictions. A paving date has not yet been set. The old sewer still needs to be filled with concrete, but that is not expected to affect traffic.

Oak Street railroad bridge to close for nearly two weeks later this month

Closure was originally planned for August

The New Hampshire Department of Transportation will close the Oak Street bridge that crosses the railroad tracks between Portland Avenue and Broadway to all traffic for 12 days this

month to make bridge repairs.

The NHDOT has scheduled the closure from Monday, Sept. 18, through Friday, Sept. 29. Only the bridge will be closed. All nearby residents will retain access to their homes; access will also be available to Salmon Falls Stoneware. This work was originally scheduled to occur in August but had to be postponed.

The repairs will allow the bridge to be used until it's replaced, currently scheduled for fiscal year 2027, according to the NHDOT's 2023-2032 Ten-Year Plan.



'Voices of Dover' series: Andy Galt

The Voices of Dover oral history series, a project documenting the lives and memories of longtime Dover residents, continues this week with the release of an interview with Andy Galt.

Galt, whose family has been in Dover for several decades, sat down with Dover400 to share stories about growing up in Dover, his family's deep roots in the community, and his varied career path from computer programmer to solar energy entrepreneur to City Councilor and Mayor.

In his interview, Galt vividly brings to life 20th-century Dover, from his father's medical practice making house calls to families all over the city to Galt's own time in local politics in the 1980s.

The Voices of Dover series is an initiative of the Dover400 Committee. The video interviews showcase the rich history of Dover through the personal recollections of its lifelong residents. More interviews will be released in the coming months as the city continues to celebrate 400 years since Dover became the first permanent European settlement in 1623.


Sept. 9, 1738 — In the Assembly, it was ordered that the clerk send notice to Dover and Exeter representatives absent during that term's session to appear the following Monday at his Majesty's service.

Sept. 13, 1797 — It was voted on this day that land be set aside for a burying place at Pine Hill and that a plan be laid out and returned to the Town Clerk.

Sept. 14, 1821 — "The commissioned and non-commissioned officers of the Dover military companies formed a volunteer association under the title of "Soul of Soldiery," and under the command of Capt. Brewer made their first public appearance this day in a neat uniform. The numerous maneuvers performed were principally of the Light Infantry Drill, and were executed with a correctness and rapidity highly gratifying to the numerous spectators: their firing in line, in square, and in chain, were admirably well done, considering this was their first effort in public." (Strafford Register)

Sept. 9, 1822 — Stagecoach service between Dover and Portsmouth began on this day, operating three days a week.

Sept. 9, 1851 — Incendiary fires being very prevalent at this time, a town meeting was held at which the selectmen were authorized to offer suitable rewards for the apprehension of the incendiaries, and to appoint a night watch and committee of vigilance.



Ghost Stories of the Granite State featured in upcoming Dover Library event

Roxie Zwicker of New England Curiosities will present "Spirits of the Granite State," a program on New Hampshire legends and ghosts, at the Dover Public Library on Wednesday, Sept. 13 at 6:30 p.m.

The in-person event will also be livestreamed for virtual attendees. Registration on the library's website is required to receive a link to the livestream.

Zwicker's presentation will feature ghost stories and superstitions across New Hampshire, including the White Mountains and Seacoast region. She will discuss unusual local occurrences and recommend sites to explore paranormal activity.

Zwicker has presented her unique ghost tales in New England since 1994 through her Portsmouth-based company. She has been featured on the History Channel's "Psychic History" and the Travel Channel's "Destination America." Zwicker is the author of eight books on New England's ghost stories and folklore. Zwicker travels throughout the northeast for speaking engagements on haunted history. She has co-hosted the Portsmouth Holiday Parade since 2016.

Dover Public Library will host "The Great Regeneration: A Conversation with Author Dorn Cox" on Thursday, Sept. 14 at 6 p.m. in the Lecture Hall. The free program, presented in a hybrid format, will feature a conversation between Cox and Living on Earth host Steve Curwood.

Cox's book "The Great Regeneration," written with Courtney White, explores using opensource technology and regenerative farming to combat climate change and food scarcity.

Cox is research director at Wolfe's Neck Center for Agriculture and the Environment in Freeport, Maine. He helped develop the farmOS software platform and Farm Hack, and received the inaugural Hugh Hammond Bennett Award for Conservation Excellence in 2018.

Living on Earth, based in Cambridge, Massachusetts, is a weekly environmental news radio program broadcast on 250 public radio stations.

The program is presented in partnership with New Hampshire Public Radio and the University of Massachusetts Boston School for the Environment.

Registration open for Wentworth-Douglass Hospital's 10th annual Seacoast Cancer 5K

Registration is open for the 10th annual Seacoast Cancer 5K, one of the largest road races in New Hampshire, which benefits the Mass General Cancer Center at Wentworth-Douglass Hospital. The race is presented by Somersworth Nissan, who is serving as title sponsor for the third consecutive year.

The in-person event will be held on Sunday, Sept. 24, at the hospital's Portsmouth Outpatient Center on the Pease Tradeport. There is also an option to run or walk a one-mile loop, or participate virtually from Sept. 16-23. Runners and walkers of all ages can register online at <u>seacoastcancer5k.org</u> for \$35.

Organizers expect the event to draw a record of more than 1,800 participants. Last year's roster saw representatives from 161 cities and towns, 18 states, and seven countries. The event has raised nearly \$2 million over the last decade.

The funds raised are critical to underwrite the cancer center's supportive and wellness services, which offers integrative therapies and support that are often not covered by insurance. The program includes acupuncture, Reiki, massage therapy and exercise classes, as well as physical therapy, occupational therapy, and speech-language pathology.

"Our ambitious goal to raise \$450,000 tops all previous race totals," said Judy Pinkham, development officer for corporate and foundations philanthropy at Wentworth-Douglass. "Every dollar raised stays in our community."

The program also allows patients to meet with oncology social workers, nutritionists, and patient navigators. And supports basic needs for those who cannot afford transportation, gas cards, groceries, or other necessities during treatment.

"We have seen a dramatic increase in the number of patients turning to the Mass General Cancer Center at Wentworth-Douglass for their cancer care, especially in the last two years," said Pinkham. "The need for the services this event underwrites is continually growing."

For Danielle Erwin, senior administrative assistant for Health Partners of New Hampshire, participating in the Seacoast Cancer 5K is personal. "For me, it's about letting a patient at their lowest point know they are far from alone in this fight, that a whole community of people are helping them, so that they can get through this," she says. "As a patient, I do this 5k because I

see the amazing energy the Cancer Center has as soon as you walk in the door, it means so much to me in my journey. I'm a survivor and want to celebrate that this Cancer Center is the reason why I'm able to do this race. I 5k for those who can't and for those who fought the good fight and should also be celebrated and remembered for their amazing strength. And most importantly, I 5K for the hope that one day we find a cure."

For the fifth consecutive year, NBC Sports color analyst and former Boston hoops favorite, Brian Scalabrine will be in attendance, serving as "Honorary Team Captain".

"The one thing that really resonated with me when Wentworth-Douglass approached me was the fact that they focus on supporting the patient and their family," Scalabrine said after the 2022 race. "There are many people fighting cancer that worry more about their families than themselves, that's why it's so important to have a support system in place for the entire family so they know how to get through all the challenges cancer comes with."

The 2022 Seacoast Cancer 5K raised more than \$372,000 and organizers are hoping runners will continue to be drawn to the flat, closed course, ideal for both families and those seeking personal best times.

"This year marks the 40th year that I have been immersed in the world of oncology. My experience as a clinician and leader in oncology has led me to the fortunate place where I appreciate and respect every single day of life," adds Michael Meserve, director of cancer survivorship and wellness. "I think of this for all our patients, their loved ones, and the community surrounding them. It is our endeavor to create networks of support and care that will lift them up and help buoy them through their journey. The 5K helps us raise very important funds to deliver these services that are not billable but are essential to someone's care."

American Red Cross lifeguard training and recertification course

The Dover Indoor Pool will host a Fall American Red Cross lifeguard training program the third and fourth weekends of September. Participants seeking to become lifeguards must attend all training sessions and be at least 15 years old on the last day of the class. The training will be held on Saturday, Sept. 16 and 23, from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m., and Sunday, Sept. 17 and 24, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Recertification will be held on Sunday, Sept. 24.

The American Red Cross lifeguarding training program teaches participants the knowledge and skills to prevent and respond to aquatic emergencies. The course includes the latest science in first aid, CPR/AED for the professional rescuer, emergency cardiac care, lifeguarding rescue skills, and safety protocols.

Those seeking to take the course must meet the following prerequisites.

- Swim 300 yards continuously;
- Tread water for two minutes;
- The participant must be able to do the following within 1 minute and 40 seconds, starting from the water: swim 20 yards using front crawl or breaststroke, surface dive 7 to 10 feet, retrieve a 10-pound object, return to the surface, swim 20 yards back to the starting point with the 10-pound object and exit water without using a ladder;
- No refunds will be given for failing to meet prerequisite requirements.
- Must attend all course dates and times to pass the course.
